"MY TURN"

REMEMBER THAT old party game where you ask all the guests, "If you were stranded on a deserted island and could take with you any famous person who ever lived, who would it be?"

My choice would be... see if you can guess. From a poor family, next to the youngest of 17 children, had only two years of schooling and went to work at the age of 12. When he died at age 84 he had made of himself a writer, publisher, scientist, inventor, politician, diplomat, and philosopher.

All over the U.S. there are cities, schools, universities, libraries and wood-burning stoves named for this wise fellow.

He was the only man to sign four of the most important documents in the founding of our country: The Declaration of Independence, The Treaty of Alliance with France, The Treaty of Paris and the Constitution.

Some of his lesser-known achievements include: established the first men's club, the first fire department, the first library, the first street cleaning department, the first fire insurance company, organized a modern postal system and founded a university.

He was known for having a sense of humor and he enjoyed wearing bright colorful clothing in a time period when we think of people as being rather drab, dull and serious.

He must have had an inquiring mind, as he was a man ahead of his time. If you have guessed Benjamin Franklin, you are correct. But it is as a writer, newspaperman and publisher that I would like a chance to visit with this venerable old soul. I'd like to see what he could do with a word processor.

The printed page in those days was put together one letter at a time, and that must have required a great wealth of patience. And he exhibited a lifetime of patience, diplomacy, wit and wisdom in 1787, when at age 81, he was the one to cool the tempers when debate became heated at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia's Independence Hall.

Having rubbed elbows with politicians and great minds in England, France and America, he would probably be appalled at the deterioration of the political scene of 1987. In his day, the business of running the country was considered serious and dignified. What would he think of today's political figures such as Gary Hart, Jesse Jackson, Pat Robertson, Joe Biden, Robert Bork, George Bush, et al.

More than that, what would he think of the modern press which works so hard to destroy the dignity of those office seekers, while ignoring their qualifications, their reasons for seeking the highest offices in the land, and their ideas for improving the country's problems.

We know nothing about how any of these people would handle the shaky economy, the Persian Gulf situation, the communist threat in Nicaragua, etc. But we know a lot about their personal problems and which pretty girls they did or did not sleep with; issues which have nothing to do with their abilities to guide, lead and advise while holding onto the many reins which keep our country running.

Twice each year, on about October 25 and April 3, I get really mad at old Ben because he is the fellow who invented daylight savings time. He first introduced the idea in Paris sometime in the 1770's. France now uses daylight savings time all year round, which would not be so bad. But this constant changing back and forth is nerve-jangling. I never know whether to spring backward, fall on my face, or just pull the covers over my head and stay in bed.

While we are busy changing all those awful digital clocks back next Sunday, I will be wishing for a buzzard to roost on the headstone of my old pal Ben.

Chiefs, Tulia Clash In Vital 2-AAA Game

Having tasted defeat for the first time after six wins, the Friona Chieftains try to stay in the thick of the race for a playoff spot when they visit Tulia Friday night.

It's virtually the same position Friona was in a year ago when they hosted the Hornets, except for the fact that Tulia lost their opening district game to Floydada, and with Littlefield yet to play, are perhaps even more desperate for a win.

Tulia stands 5-2 for the season and 1-1 in district play. Friona enters the game at 6-1 and 1-1.

"I think the kids know what they have to do, in order to have a chance at the playoffs. We still control our own destiny. If we win our last three games, we should make the playoffs," said Coach Tommy Moss this week.

However, Moss said that injuries could hurt the team this week. Albert Trevino, hurt against

Littlefield, had not worked out through Wednesday. And fullback Ben Osborn, second leading rusher to Daniel Echols, has missed workouts all week with a pulled muscle.

Osborn, who has gained 650 yards on 145 carries, has given Friona a great one-two punch teaming with Echols.

Tulia is led by three runningbacks, who Moss says "can fly." They are Trampus Goodwin, Merwyn Parker and Roy Caldwell. Caldwell just became eligible after the six-week period.

Goodwin scored a TD on an 80-yard kickoff return against Dimmitt, and Moss says the Chieftains will have to be especially wary of the kick return, or kick away from these threats.

Moss said the Chieftains have had good spirits in workouts this week.

Next Friday, the team returns home to host their longtime rivals, the Dimmitt Bobcats, in the ninth season game.

Kathy Beard Is Contest Winner

In a week spiced by upsets on the high school and college level, Kathy Beard, Friona's Chamber of Commerce manager, was the weekly champion in the Friona Star football contest.

Mrs. Beard was the only contestant entering the sixth week of the contest to correctly pick 16 of the 20 contest games, and won the weekly first prize of \$10 cash without a fight.

"My husband (Jim) is still in a state of shock. He just can't believe it," the winner stated. Jim Beard is in second place in the overall standings, but this week Kathy was the top predictor in the Beard household.

Nine contestants had scores of 15, and from this list the other two weekly winners were determined.

Steve Knox and Raul Brailiff were the closest on the Friona-Littlefield tie-breaker score, and they divided second and third place money after both missed the score by 16 points.

Knox picked Littlefield to win the game, 14-7, while Brailiff had it 21-14 favoring the Wildcats. The differential turned out to be 16 points for both contestants.

Others picking 15 games and

having a shot at one of the cash prizes were Joy Patterson (21), Tom Johnson (24), Bobby Thompson (24), Rickey Jackson (26), Joy Morton (27), Brenda Patterson (29) and Rhonda Bentley (45).

Sixteen additional contestants had scores of 14 for the week, 24 picked 13 correct games, and 22 managed 12 right. Scores ranged to a low of seven for the week.

Mrs. Beard's misses were Idalou-Slaton, Arkansas-Texas, Angelo State-ENMU and Houston-New England.

Knox missed Idalou-Slaton, Arkansas-Texas, Purdue-Ohio State, Houston-Wyoming and Washington-Southern Cal.

Brailiff mis-fired on Idalou-Slaton, Arkansas-Texas, Washington-Southern Cal, New York Giants-Buffalo and the L.A. Raiders-San Diego.

Tommy Moss continues to lead in the race for grand prize, with a score of 83. Jim Beard, Jerry Hinkle and Charlie Morgan are next at 81, and Mark Neill is in third place with a score of 80.

Friona High School's Chieftain Band won a "Division I" rating at the University Interscholastic League marching contest Wednesday at Jones Stadium on the campus of Texas Tech, Lubbock.

Friona was competing in the conference AAA division of District XVI in the competition.

"I was very proud of the band," said Friona High School bandmaster.

Getting ready for the UIL marching competition was made even more hectic when Parker had to revise his routines when just over ten per cent--15 members--of the band failed to make the "no pass, no play" requirement, causing some extra shuffling during the ten days prior to the contest.

The band received some nice comments from the UIL contest judges. "The band plays with a full sound. Nice rainbow effect. Band is well rehearsed. Good teaching is obvious. Keep up the good work at Friona. I know your community and administration is very proud of your organization," said Ron Edwards on his judge's sheet. Edwards also complimented the solo by trumpet player Gilbert Mendoza.

"Very good carriage and posture. The band needs to move more on 'Over the Rainbow.' The marching is really good. This is a good band..." said Randy Stone on his judging sheet.

The band will next begin to concentrate on the music for the UIL sight-reading and concert contests, the next steps toward the coveted "sweepstakes" award.

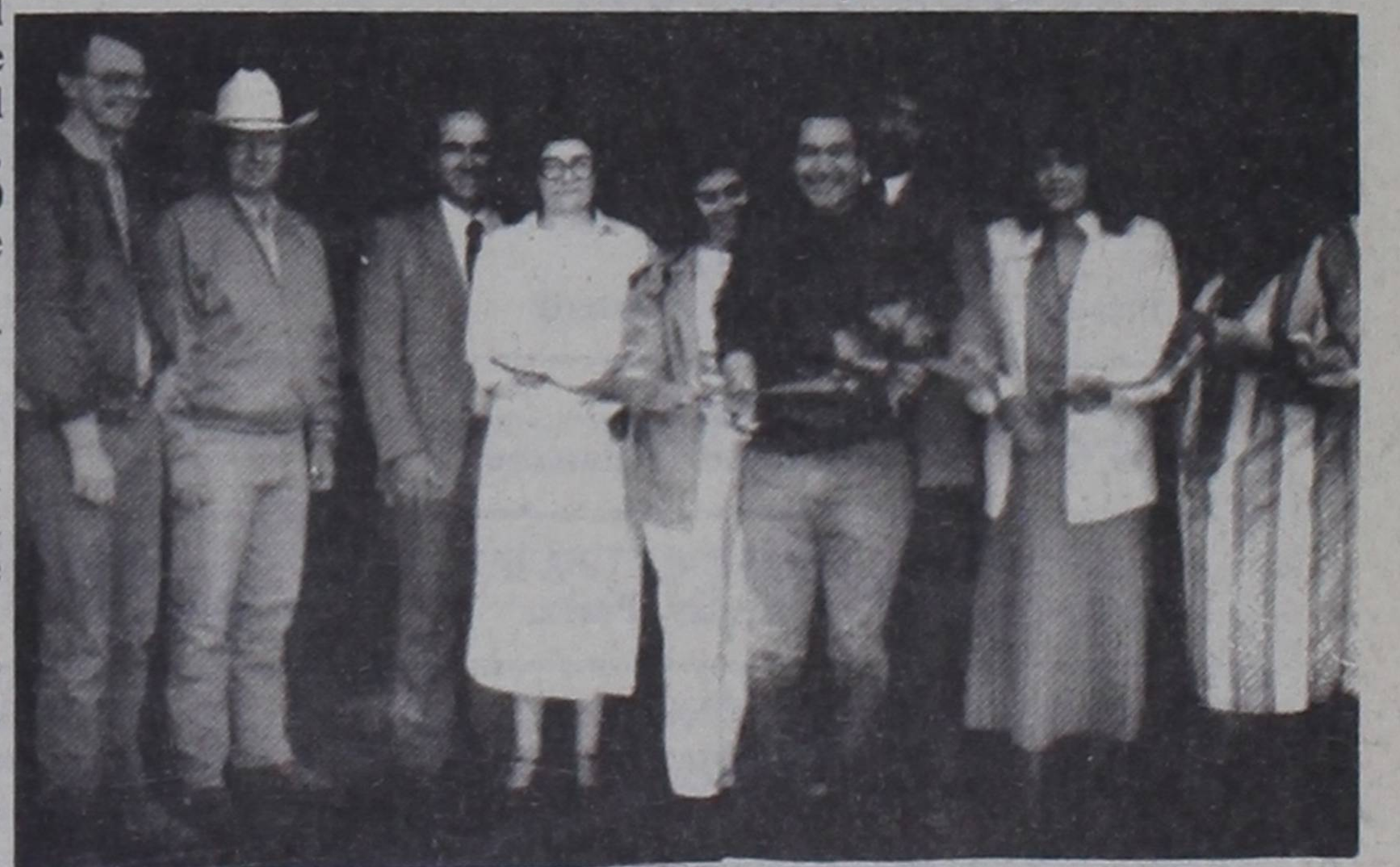
Daylight Time is observed throughout the United States, except for the states of Arizona, Hawaii, Alaska and a little old man's residence in New

C. Chitwood's Rites Slated Saturday

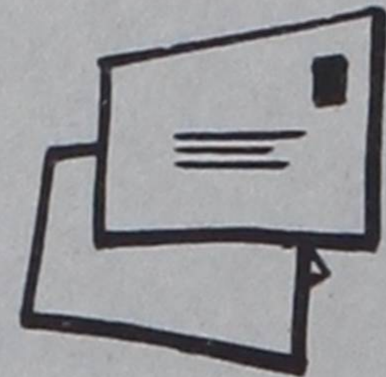

Burial will be in the Muleshoe Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home in Friona.

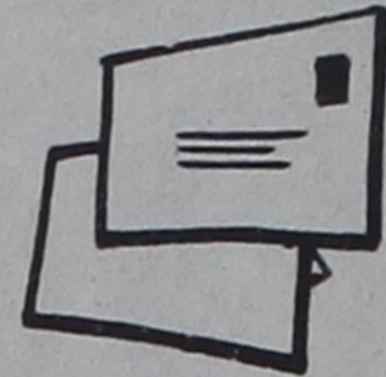

Letter To The Editor



Dear Bill:

In the upcoming election on November 3, there are many amendments and propositions to be considered. I realize how confusing these items are on a ballot. It is very difficult for us to know and understand what a "yes" and "no" vote really mean. I would like to address to you my concern about one of the items that will be decided.

Referendum Proposition 1 concerns your democratic right to vote. This proposition simply asks the people of Texas to give up their right to vote and allow politicians to make appointments for membership to the State Board of Education. There apparently are those who feel the people of this state do not have the ability to make intelligent decisions in the operation of the public schools and that the politicians in power should do it for them.

In 1984, the Ross Perot school reform package replaced the elected State Board of Education with an appointed body. The people of Texas were promised that this would be temporary in order to make a smooth transition to the school reform requirements. This promise stated to the people that their right to elect members of this body would be returned to them on January 1, 1989.

Since then, Perot forces, working with Governor Clements and key legislation leaders, have decided the return of these election rights might not be a good idea. They are now proposing and encouraging the people to give them the permanent right to continue appointing the members to the board. The Perot forces are actively working in the state to convince the people to give up their voting rights in the election of the members.

If Proposition I passes, the State Board of Education will remain an appointed board.

Elected officials are directly accountable to the citizens and voters. Appointed officials are accountable to those responsible for their appointment. I urge patrons and voters to consider these facts. Let's take a step toward returning the control of the public schools back to the people where our forefathers placed it in the beginning. This can be accomplished only by voting NO on Proposition 1.

Boosters To Enter Booth

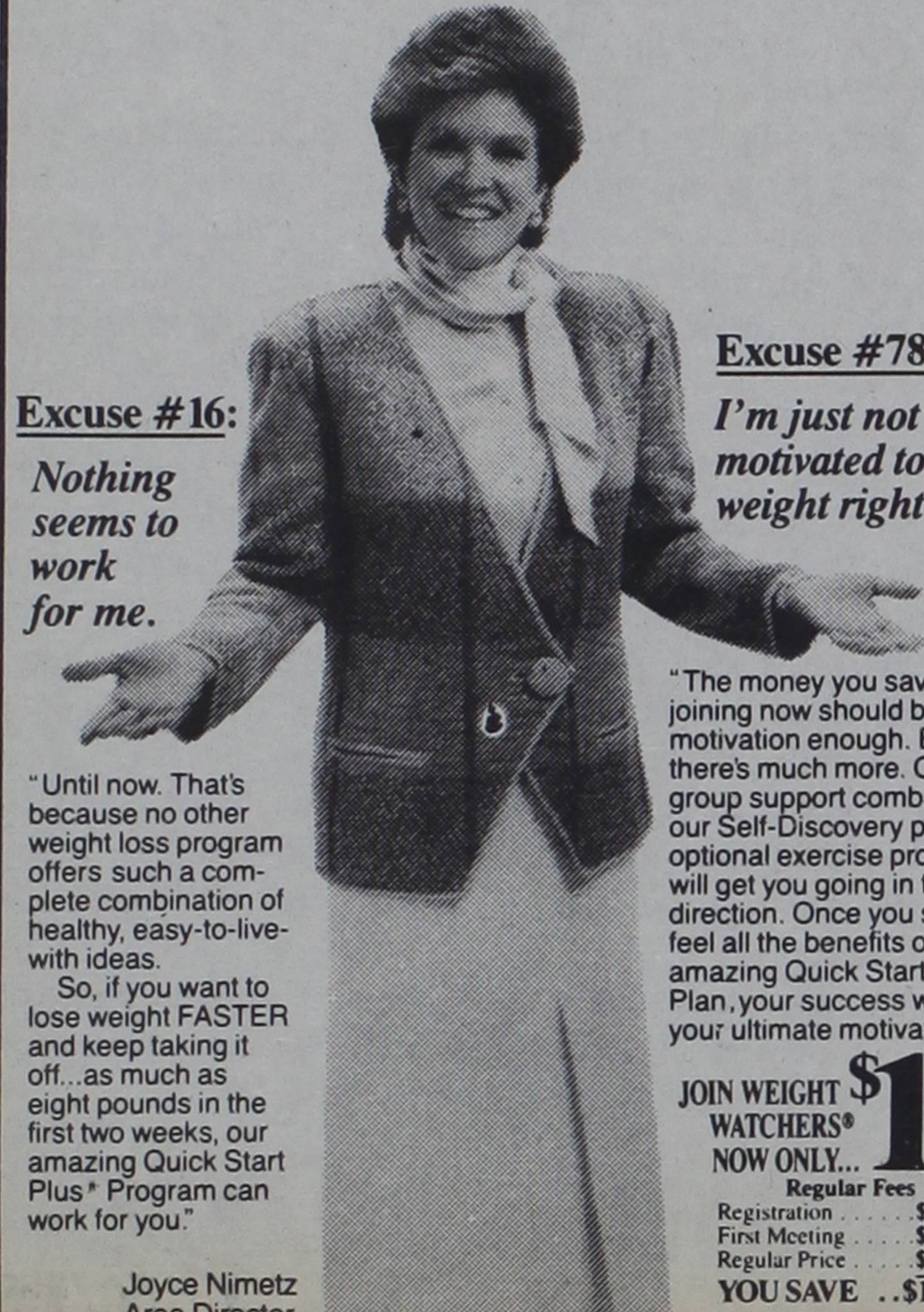
The Friona Booster Club met Tuesday, October 20 at 7:30 p.m. in the High School Cafeteria.

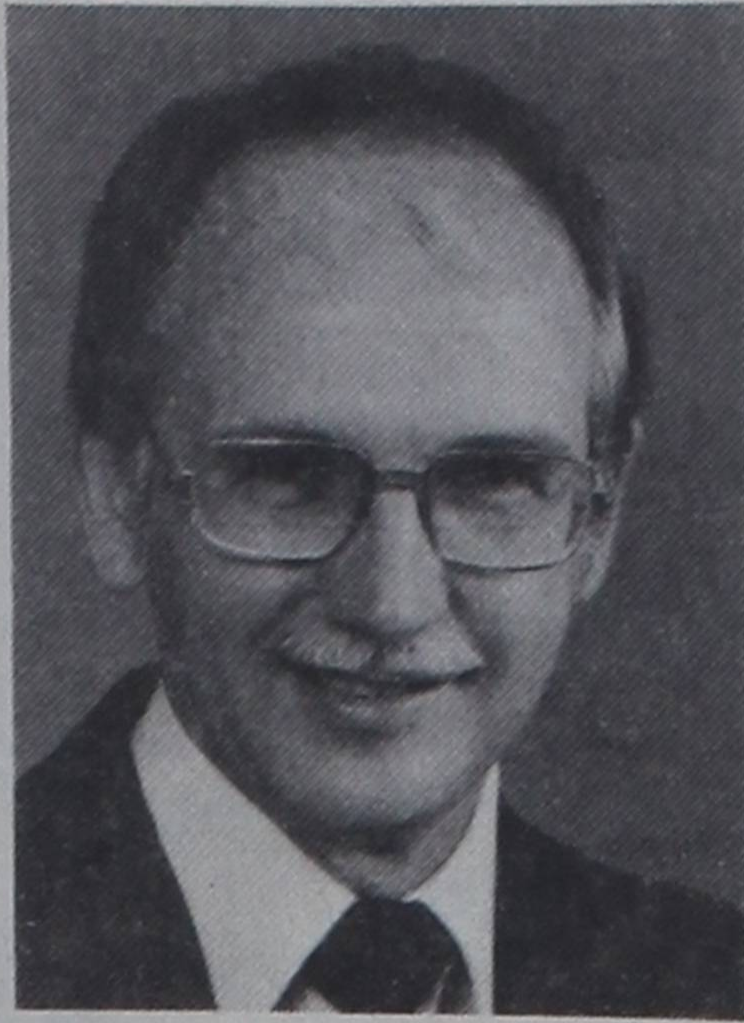

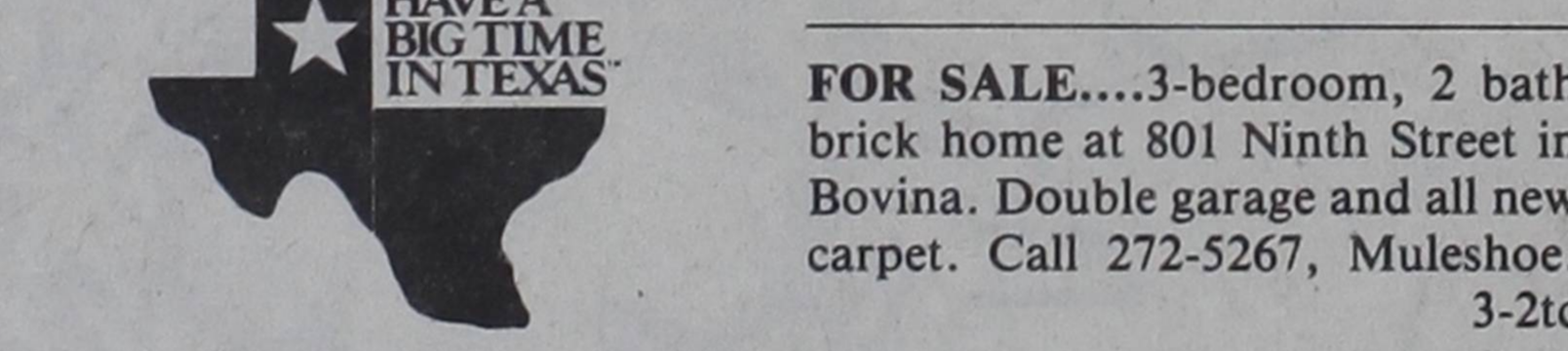

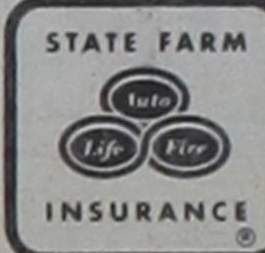

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FIRST LOSS OF SEASON

Chiefs Stumble To Potent Littlefield

The Chieftains carried the fight to the state-ranked Littlefield Wildcats for three quarters last Friday, before the potent 'Cats rallied for a 23-0 win.

It was the first shutout loss for the Chieftains in 20 games, since Tulia scored a 30-0 win there in 1985.

Littlefield had been held to a 3-0 halftime lead, and still had only a 10-0 lead after three quarters, before striking for a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns to put the game out of reach.

The Chieftains had three or four chances to score in the game, but just could not get the ball into the end zone against the Wildcats, who protected their record of not allowing a touchdown since their opening game.

Friona had a good chance to score in the first quarter, after defensive back Mickey Pena picked off a Mark Ellis pass and returned it 26 yards from the Littlefield 46 to the 20.

Stephen Thornton ran the ball to the Littlefield 11 on a reverse play, but on fourth down Ben Osborn was stopped for a two-yard loss by the fired-up Littlefield defense.

Early in the second quarter, Daniel Echols hit Thornton on a 30-yard pass play to the Littlefield 22. But three plays later, Littlefield's Ellis intercepted to thwart the threat. Friona had picked up its second penetration but scored no points.

The Wildcats proceeded to drive 71 yards, with fullback Louis Williams gaining most of the yardage. A 38-yard run by the big runningback gave Littlefield a first and goal just inside the Friona ten.

On the first down play, line-backer Albert Trevino was hurt, causing a long time out as the ambulance came out to get the injured Trevino.

The Chieftain defense tightened up and held Williams to only a

yard in two more tries, and the Wildcats had to settle for a 23-yard field goal from Mark King. That gave them the lead with 3:26 left in the half.

Friona tried to answer. Osborn gave the team two first downs, and Cody Bracken had a nice run. Echols had a good run, most of which was called back for a holding penalty as the clock was winding down.

Inside the 30-second mark, reserve quarterback Cody Burney passed to Echols who snaked his way inside the Wildcat 10, only to have the play called back for a

motion penalty. Burney's 42-yard field goal attempt was blocked as time ran out in the half, Littlefield clinging to a hard-earned 3-0 edge.

The Wildcats got a break to start the third quarter. Thornton had a punt go off the side of his foot, giving Littlefield the ball at the Friona 44.

Ellis passed to Hernandez for a 37-yard gain. Thornton saved the touchdown. But two plays later Williams went over from a yard out. Hernandez' kick gave the Wildcats a 10-0 lead after 3:16 in the third quarter.

The Wildcats were called for a late hit on Echols, after which Daniel ripped off a 20-yard gain, his best run of the night, to move the ball into Littlefield's end of the field.

Echols later ran nine yards to the Wildcat 32, but three plays later, his opposing quarterback, Ellis, intercepted again as the Chieftain quarterback was rushed by Wildcat defenders.

A series later, Friona was forced to punt. Tragedy struck when the snap went over Thornton's head. He retrieved the ball, but was tackled at his own 24 yard line.

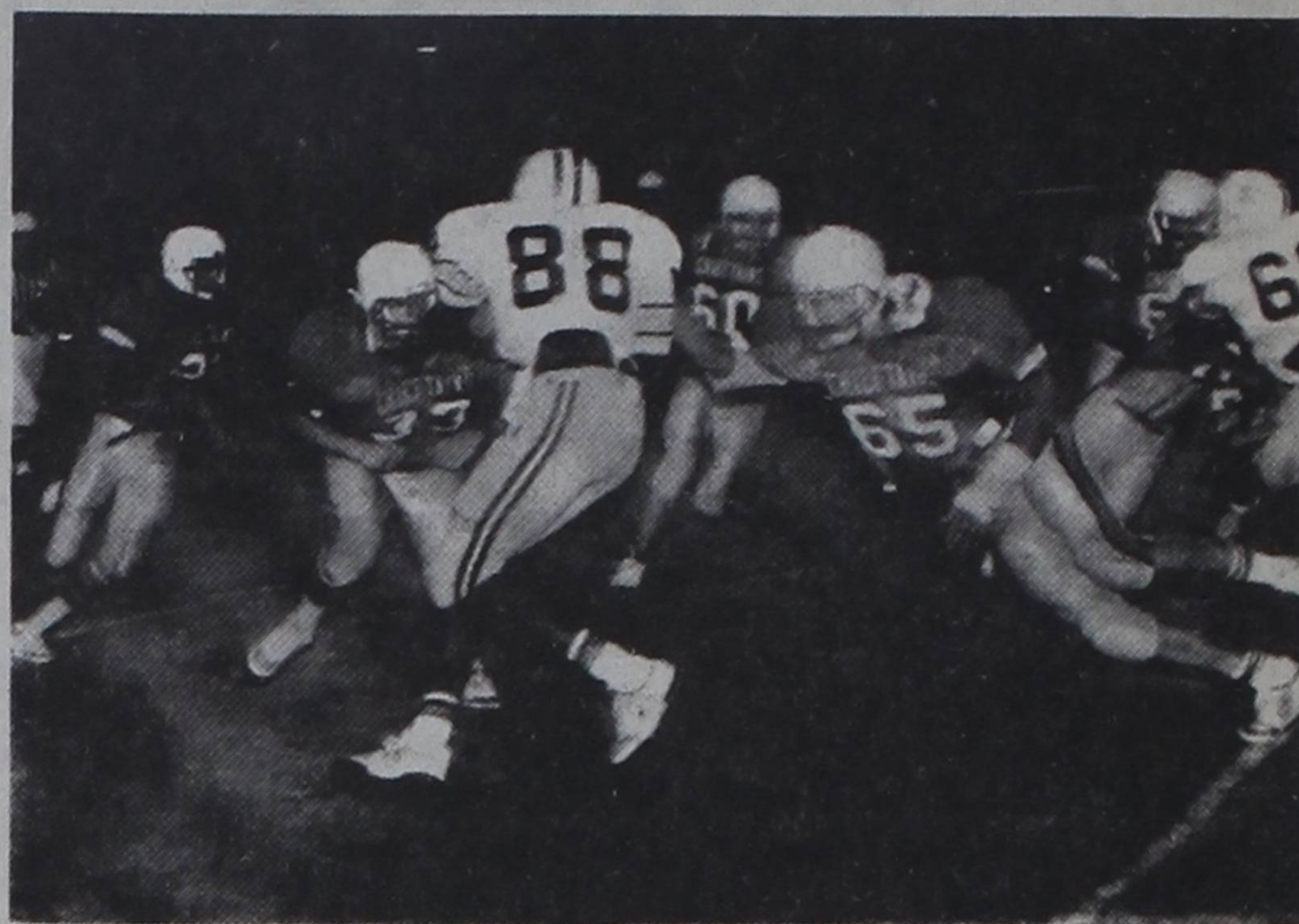
Littlefield took advantage, going the distance in only four plays. Ellis went in from six yards out, and Hernandez' kick gave the Wildcats a 17-0 lead with 10:31 left in the game.

Friona again couldn't move and Littlefield took over on their own 46 after Friona's punt. On first down Ellis faked the ball to Williams, pulled back and hit the wide-open Hernandez who caught the ball and completed a 54-yard scoring pass. The score became 23-0.

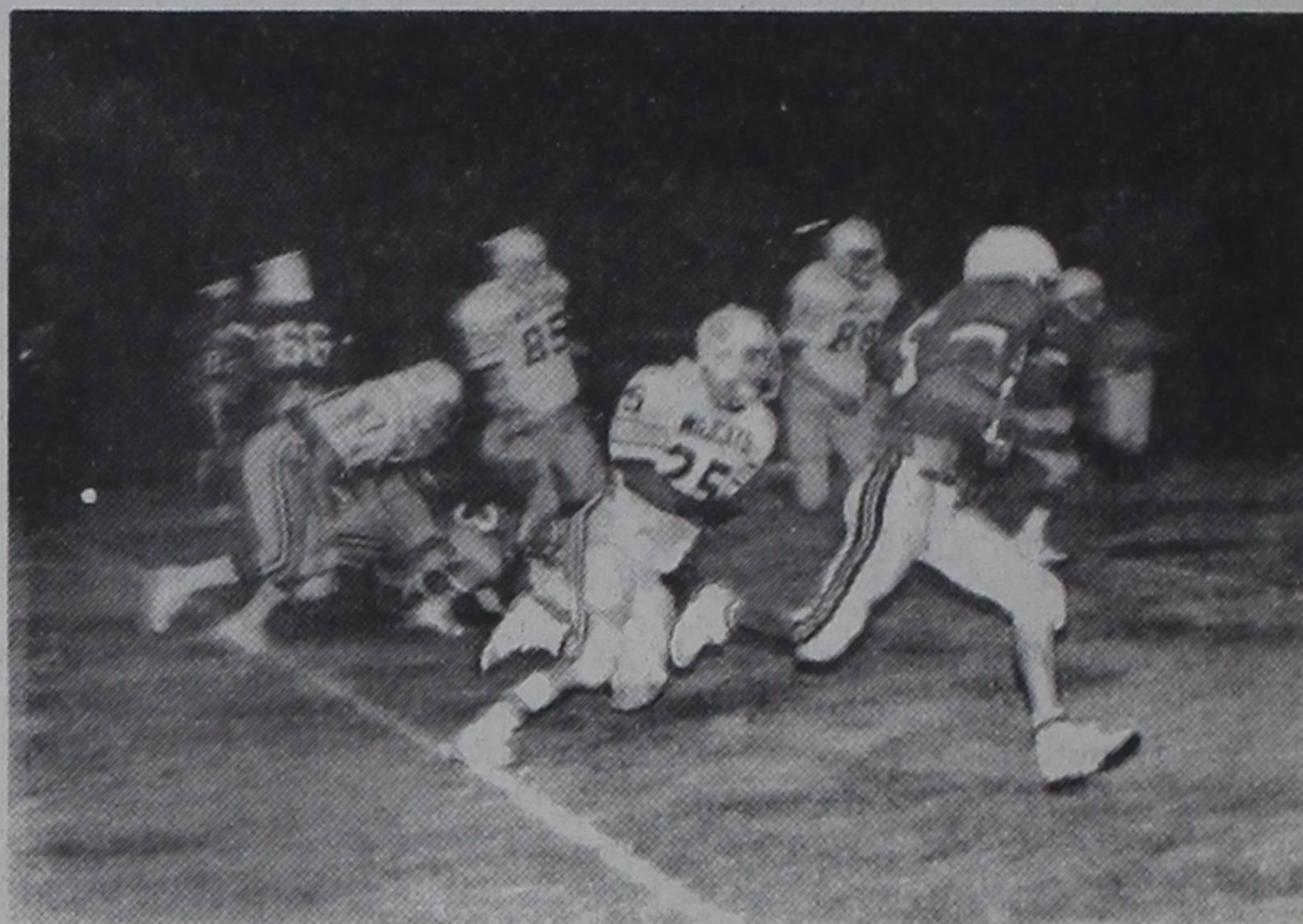
Friona didn't give up. Echols ran six yards, and Friona again benefitted when the Chieftain signal-caller was hit out of bounds near the Wildcat bench.

Osborn ripped for 13 yards to the Littlefield 18, and Echols ran six yards to the 13. But Osborn was stopped for no gain and Echols for minus one. Burney came in again to try a pass, which went incomplete and the Chieftains' fourth scoring threat was foiled.

The game was played before a standing-room only crowd of over 2,500 at Chieftain Field, and featured television coverage from Channel 7, Amarillo along with the daily newspapers from Amarillo and Lubbock.

Temperature Hits 30° Here

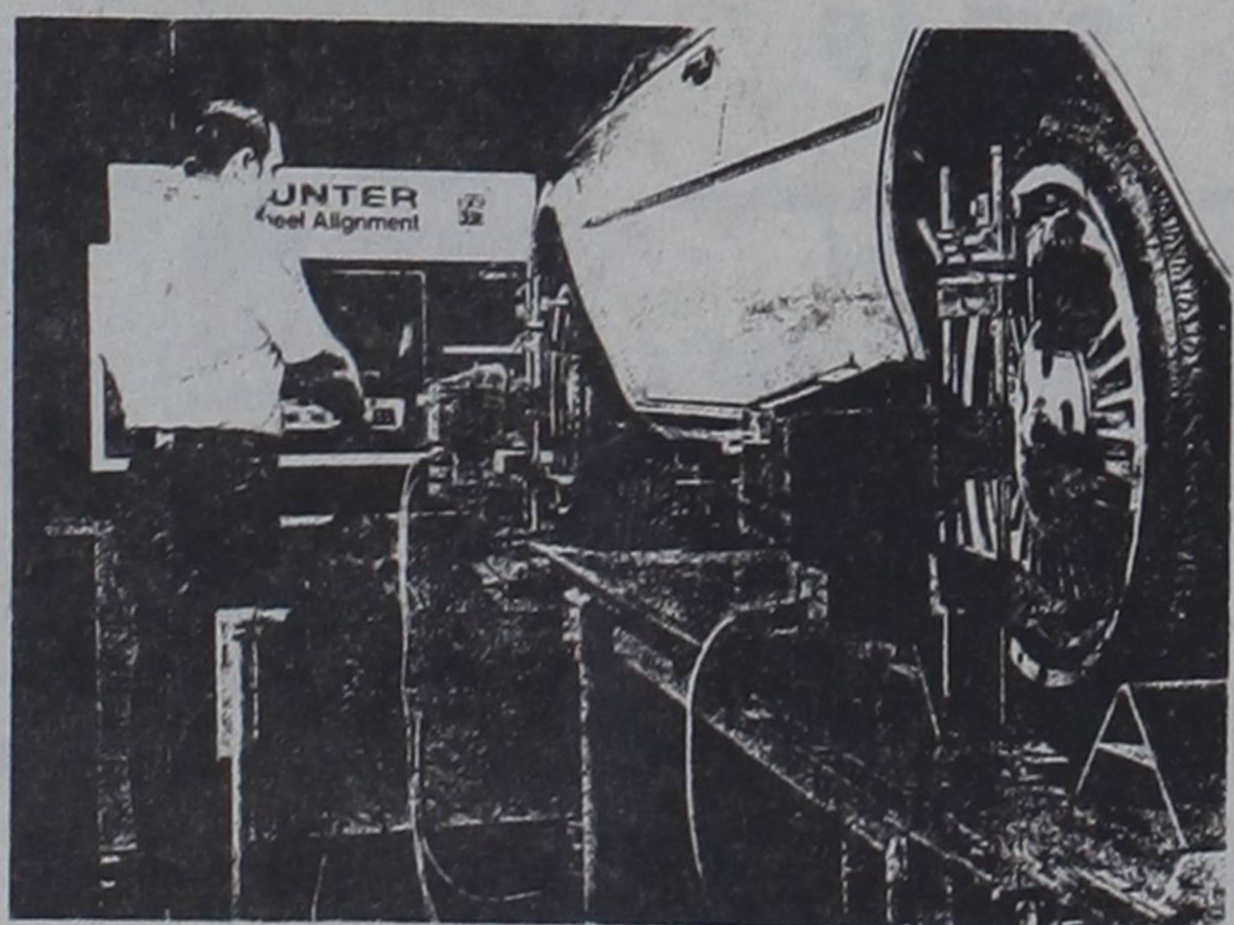
The temperature hit a low of 30 degrees in Friona Tuesday morning, October 20, the first sub-freezing reading of the fall season.
