Poll Sites Are Given

Polling places for the November 3 constitutional election have been announced. They are as follows: Precinct 1, old Tri-County Elevator, Black; Precinct 2, Friona Fire Station; Precinct 2-1, Calvary Baptist Church; Precinct 2-2, Friona Community Center; Precinct 3, Legion Hall, Bovina; Precinct 5, Lazbuddie School; Precinct 6, Oklahoma Lane Community Center; Precinct 7, Rhea Community Center; and Precinct 8, Dee Willard residence.

Local school teachers have voiced their opposition to Referendum Proposition 1, which would allow the governor to appoint members of the state school board (see advertisement, this issue).

A sample ballot is also being printed on page 12 of this issue, courtesy of Friona State Bank and Excel, so voters may familiarize themselves with the propositions.

BOO! SCARED YOU, didn't I? It's time to roll up the garden hose, park the bicycles in the garage, hide the lawn furniture, lock the dog in the bathroom, and stock up on snacks and goodies because the little spooks and goblins will be roaming the town on Saturday night.

By the way, kids, if you do not need to paint on a moustache because you are now growing your own, it means you are too old to go trick-or-treating this year.

The older youngsters usually enjoy touring a "haunted house" or watching a scary movie with friends on Halloween. Even adults like getting up in costumes, attending parties and acting totally uninhibited. But most of us dull folks just stay home and answer the doorbell.

The local Halloween Carnival is a nice safe, highly-recommended alternative to all of the above.

We seem to enjoy the fantasy of trying to scare others and ourselves because it makes the warmth and safety of our own everyday lives seem all the more secure by comparison. It is good that the celebration of "All Hallow's Eve" has evolved into one autumn evening of innocent pranks and silliness. It was not always thus.

Superstition, fear of the unknown, religious intolerance, and loathing for those who are "different" were once the basis of this annual event.

One of the earliest forms of religion known to man was a sort of nature worship where the believers met outdoors for a festival during times when the seasons were changing. The ancient Druids, a priestly sect of the Celtic people of ancient Gaul and Briton, held such festivals twice each year; on the eve of May Day and on the eve of All Saints Day (Oct. 31). These pagan people believed that on this night, those who had died could return to Earth in some strange form such as cats, birds, goblins or ghosts.

This date marked the end of summer when the sun retreated before the powers of darkness and the evil ones became free for one night of wicked triumph. Any sort of light could offer protection against the evil and so grew the custom of building bonfires and carrying torches and candles. Today we carve funny faces in pumpkins (a carry-over from the ancient harvest celebrations) and light them to frighten off the "ghouls and ghosts and things that go bump in the night."

When Roman civilization took over Britain about 54 BC, the old religions were banished, but did not die out completely, as some people continued to practice the old rites in secret.

From time to time, Roman knights or monks would swear that they had come upon a clearing in the woods and had seen a group of witches dancing around the devil. What they probably saw was a group of old people celebrating one of the ancient festivals led by a priest of the heathen religion, dressed in an animal skin.

These were somewhat similar to the tribal rites practiced by American Indians led by their medicine man. The animal, killed for the sacrifice would most often be a bull or a goat.

So when the priest donned the animal skin complete with horns on the head and with tail hanging down, it would indeed appear as though the devil himself were leading a flock of people in devil-worship.

During the middle ages, fear of the unknown, led to terrible atrocities and the wrongful persecution of entire races of people. Unaccountable hardships such as disease, plagues, defeat in battle, crop failures, storms, infant deaths, physical deformities, etc.; these had to be blamed on someone. The obvious "someone" to be blamed and hated would be those who looked different, or adhered to some belief different

55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 12, 1932

It has been suggested that the board try to pay one-half of all salaries of teachers and bus drivers until more funds are received. It is hoped that all taxpayers who can possibly do so will meet their tax payments as soon as possible after November 1.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 9, 1942
Ray Landrum, proprietor of the Regal Theatre, who is now employed at loading bombs at the Pan-Tex Ordinance Plant, came home Saturday evening and spent the weekend here with his family.

35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 10, 1952
Committeemen representing the 13 counties in the Hi-Plains Water Conservation District voted to require permits for drilling water wells and to leave well spacing in the hands of county committees.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 10, 1957
Easements for seven and two-tenths miles of new farm-to-

market road right-of-way has been arranged with property owners bordering the proposed road, reports E.G. Phipps, county commissioner. The road is planned to start at the Clyde Goodwine corner, extend to the Elmer Euler corner a mile east, then a mile south, and then about six miles east to the Claude Blackburn intersection. Total mileage on the project is about 7.2 miles.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 11, 1962
It was a case of "almost but not quite" for the Friona Chiefs in their bid to snap the 21-game losing streak at FHS last Friday. The Chiefs, who visibly were out to beat the unbeaten Happy Cowboys, didn't make many mistakes, but the ones they made were costly, and Happy was able to avoid the upset and remain unbeaten, 24-20. The game produced Friona's biggest point production of the season and best offensive showing.

15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 12, 1972
Funeral services are scheduled for 10:30 a.m. Thursday at Friona's Union Congregational Church for Mrs. Rose Lange, 84, a resident of Friona for the past 55 years. Mrs. Lange first moved to the Black Community in 1917, later moving to Friona. Cindy Hutson was selected as

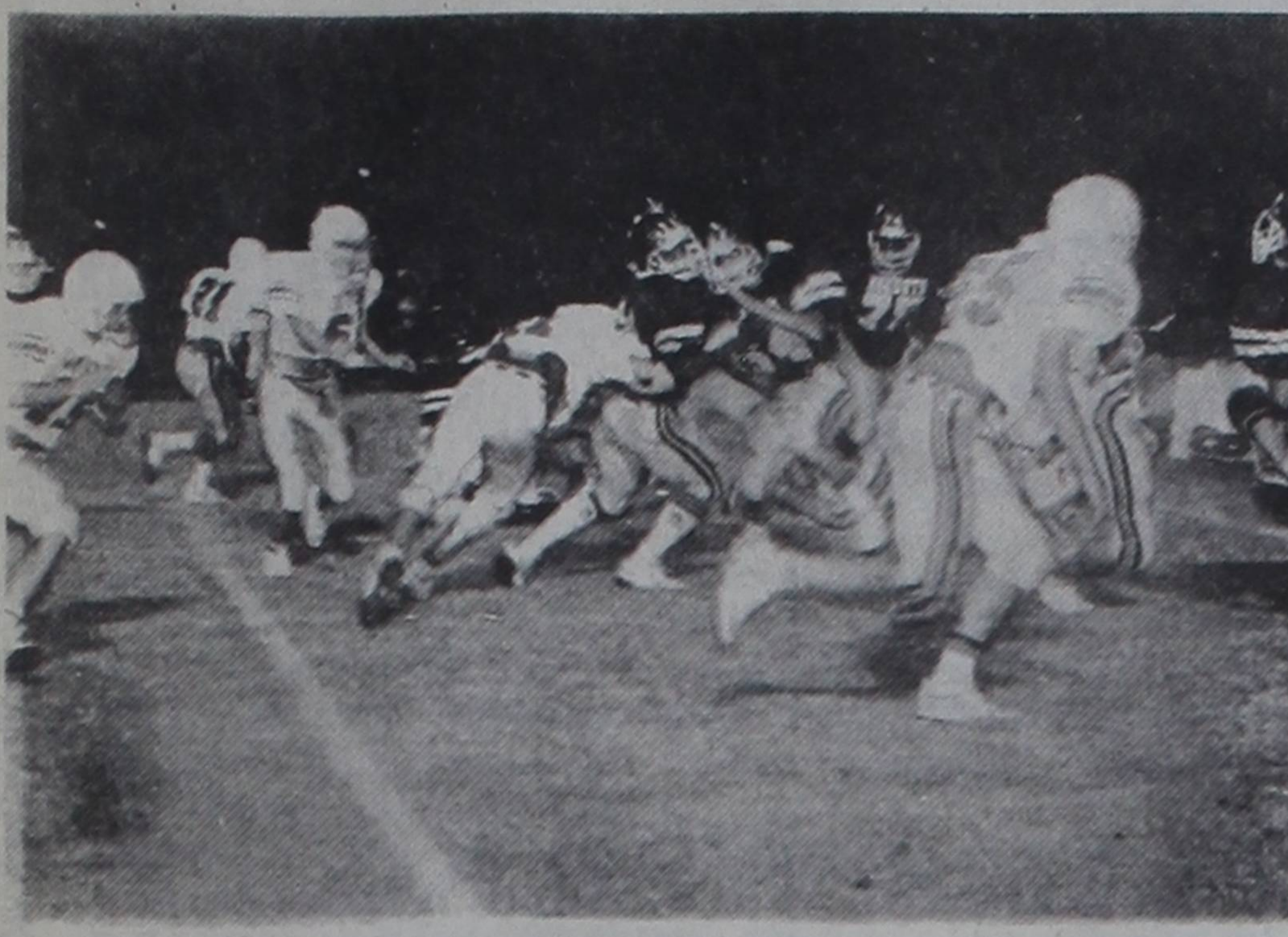

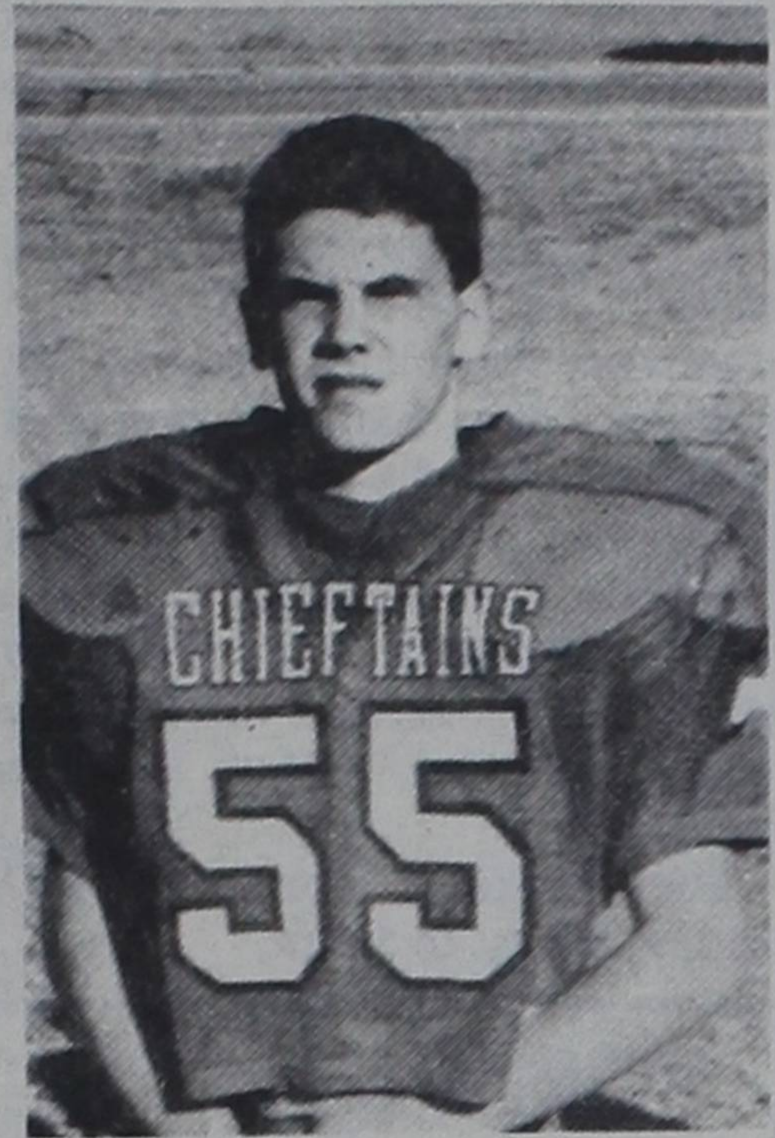

from those who happened to be in power at the time.

The superstitions which grew from dread of the occult, traveled across the ocean in the 17th century with the Puritans who colonized the New World, culminating in the famous witch trials of Salem, Massachusetts. The Puritans were anything but tolerant of dissent. The religious freedom they sought in America was for themselves only. It did not extend to those who disagreed with them. Blasphemy in the Massachusetts Bay colony in 1640 was a crime punishable by death.

In the colonies, being accused was the same as a guilty verdict regardless of the evidence. The charge of witchcraft allowed communities to rid themselves of dependent old or senile women, disabled people and poor widows. Those who could work and contribute to the community were seldom accused of any crime.

Contrary to popular notion, there were no witches burned at the stake in America. However, twenty people met death by hanging for the crime of witchcraft.

The Salem debacle is best known today, but an old woman was hung for witchcraft in 1688 in Boston, four years before the first execution in Salem. Also not well-known is the fact that all of the witches were cleared of all charges within a matter of less than twenty years. All convictions were reversed by Gov. J. Dudley in 1711 and compensation was provided for the heirs of those who had been hanged. Prosecution for witchcraft became illegal in 1736.

Ignorance and superstition have been almost completely erased in modern America and witches have become the charming villains of children's literature. Except for a few nutty folks who still believe in all that stuff, Halloween is now simply a time for fun and frolic with friends.

It looked as though the Tulia Hornets had set up an ambush for the Friona Chieftains in their District 2-AAA game at Tulia last Friday.

The Hornets, apparently primed to revenge their stinging loss to the Chiefs a year earlier, did it in fine fashion, routing Friona by a margin of 37-16, after running up a commanding 30-0 halftime lead.

It took the fired-up Hornets only 3:04 of clock time to take the lead, and by the time 4:04 had elapsed, they had a 14-0 advantage and Friona had run only two plays from scrimmage.

The Chiefs let Tulia have the ball first. That might have been a fatal mistake. Led by the speedy Trampus Goodwin, Tulia went 60 yards in only six plays. Goodwin broke clear on a fourth down play, going 37 yards for the score and a 7-0 Tulia lead.

The charged-up Tulia defense caught Ben Osborn for a yard loss, and then intercepted a Daniel Echols' pass at midfield and ran it all the way to the Friona ten.

On the first play from scrimmage, the other half of Tulia's tandem, Merwyn Parker, went in untouched for another touchdown. Goodwin's kick made it 14-0, and only 4:04 had elapsed off the clock.

Friona drove for a score that might have tightened up the game. Echols gained 44 yards on the keeper play, his best run of the night. It looked like he might go all the way, but was forced out of bounds at the Tulia five.

On first down, Echols swept left on a run-pass option. Hindsight showed he should have run. His pass was intercepted in the end zone, to stymie a great scoring chance for the Chiefs.

A little later, Friona found itself in a hole at its own 13-yard line. Stephen Thornton went back to punt, and for the third game in a row, had a snap force him into the end zone.

Thornton threw the ball out of the end zone, costing Friona a safety, and the score went to 16-0.

Those with recent injuries are expected to be able to play Friday.

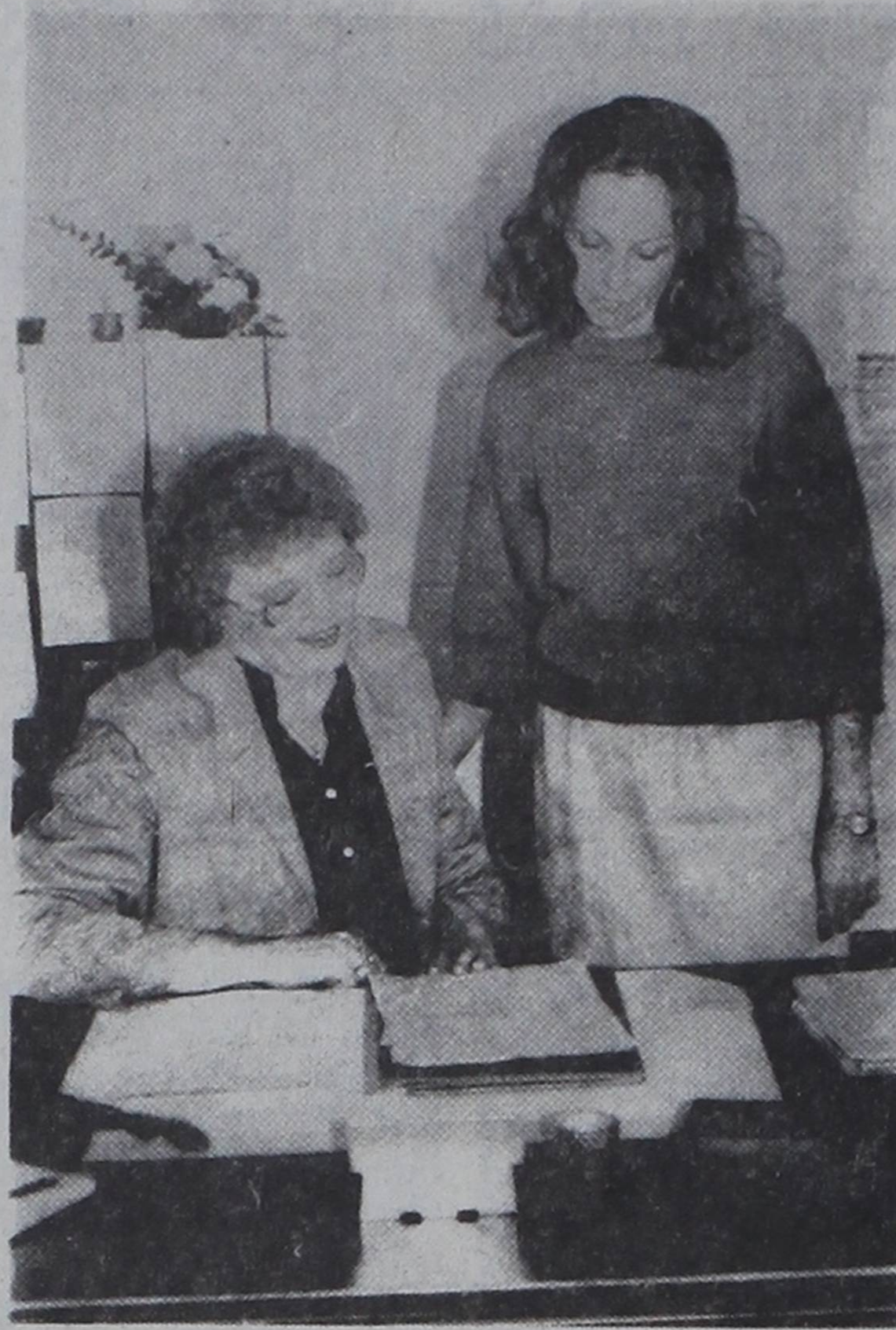
"We have had good workouts this week. The kids have accomplished a lot, and we need to finish on the right track," said Coach Tommy Moss this week.

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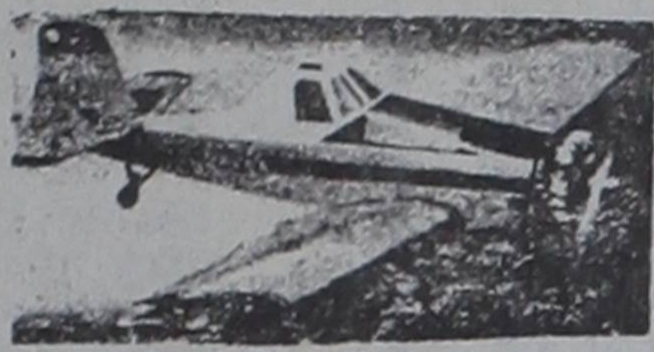

New Agreement Is Signed By Co-op

A new mortgage agreement with the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation was signed October 12 by officers of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Inc., according to James Hull, president of the cooperative.

The officers, acting in full authority vested in them by unanimous action of the full Board of Directors, signed the new mortgage document which replaces the old REA all inclusive lien on cooperative property. Eldred A. Brown, chairman of the Board of Directors, Donald J. Wright, vice-chairman of the Board of Directors, and Jerry L. Roberts, secretary-treasurer of the Board of Directors acted on behalf of all members of the Cooperative in signing the new mortgage and thereby releasing lien restrictions on many assets of the \$29,000,000 electric utility plant.

The new mortgage has no lien on all motor vehicles, cash and other interest bearing investments, accounts receivable, warehouse inventory, fuel, and CFC Capital Term Certificates which amount to over one and one-third million dollars. The old voided REA mortgage included a lien on all assets of the Cooperative, but on December 30, 1986, this Cooperative retired completely all outstanding debt to the United States Government at a 31 per cent discount amounting to a write-off by the government of 3.1 million dollars.

Another advantage of the new mortgage will be to provide an opportunity for the cooperative to negotiate for lowest interest rates available when borrowing money for new construction, that is, investment in distribution plant, electric generation, or in transmission lines. These borrowing options include the Texas Bank for Cooperatives, sale of bonds, local banks, and the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation.

Since this Cooperative retired 100 per cent of its REA debt at discount, a total of 30 electric cooperatives over the nation have done likewise. This was made possible because of Public Law 99-509, which expired September 30,

1987. Retirement of this debt at discount increased member equity in Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative to 66 per cent. Many of the old REA requirements still exist under the new mortgage, however, as related to engineering standards, accounting standards, and annual audits by approved CPA firms.

The Board felt that adoption and acceptance of this new mortgage agreement would provide the cooperative members with much more flexibility and latitude in operating the rural utility system, and over the years, would save the member owners of the cooperative vast amounts of money in operating expenses and eliminate compliance with non-applicable government regulations.

Area Gins Receive Service Awards

A total of 745 gins that processed 3,568,692 bales of cotton during the 1986-87 crop year have received the Distinguished Service Award from the Cotton Board. The annual award is given to gins with greater participation levels above 80% in the Cotton Research and Promotion Program.

"Consumer demand for cotton is higher today than it has been in 15 years, proving that cotton's self-help program is obviously one that works," says Cotton Board chairman Tommy Funk. "These gins, and the growers they serve, have done a tremendous service for the cotton industry with their outstanding support for Cotton Incorporated."

The gins that achieved a support rate above 80% represent approximately one-third of all gins across the cotton belt. Of the 745 award-winning gins, 238 were first-time recipients.

"Every segment of the cotton industry is in their debt for the tremendous support they have shown for a research and promotion

program that is achieving solid, verifiable results," says Funk.

"Thanks to the belief that a strong research and promotion program is the most viable way for the cotton industry to gain a larger share of the apparel and home furnishings market, these gins are helping make this goal a reality," says Funk.

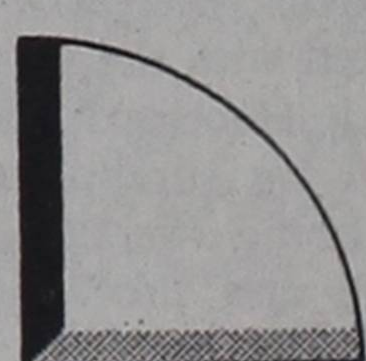
