## Dealership Adds To Its Line

THE NEAREST "big city" newspaper in our area is currently in the process of learning a lesson which has been known by small-town weekly newspaper people for many years. Freedom of the press carries a lot of responsibilities which, when overlooked, can end up being quite expensive.

The Amarillo Globe News recently ran an eight-segment series of front page articles examining purported racial discrimination in Hereford. This has resulted in a backlash against the newspaper which probably has the editors wishing they had never heard of Hereford.

In fact, after a citizens committee, "Panhandle Citizens For A Better Amarillo Newspaper," was formed, the managing editor of the paper was transferred to an out-of-state position within the ownership corporation.

There are a lot of old cliches which fit this situation. "People who live in glass houses shouldn't throw stones." "Rare is the person who can weigh the failures of others without putting his thumb on the scales." And so on.

People in the small towns surrounding Amarillo look toward the city for leadership in many areas because we all spend a certain amount of time and money there. Amarillo wholesalers supply our stores; Amarillo concerts and theaters entertain us; and we often depend on the city's large medical facilities for health problems which cannot be taken care of locally.

So it is with this in the back of our minds that local folks have been closely following the aftermath of that ill-fated series of AGN articles about Hereford. Any small town in the area might be the next target for a series of critical "in-depth" newspaper articles.... Bovina, Friona, Muleshoe, Dimmitt, Tulia, Plainview. Just about any town in America has a few problems of their own, and you can bet the local citizens are generally working as hard as possible behind the scenes to correct whatever problems exist.

A good case in point would be the recent emergency in Midland when the little McClure baby was trapped for three days in the abandoned well-shaft. The national news media seemed really surprised at how nicely all the Midland people worked together to get that problem solved. But we all know that's just the nature of Texas folks, don't we? The rest of the country seems to think that our state is populated only by rich oil magnates and redneck hicks.

Small town newspapers work hard at supporting their respective communities with a positive and progressive attitude. In fact, the small town paper is the last fortress of GOOD news in the country today. The large papers and national media (meaning TV networks) tend to concentrate only on bad news. They are usually too busy covering wars, plane crashes and doing character assassinations on prospective presidential candidates, to give anyone a pat on the back for a job well done. I think that's why little Jessica's story was so captivating that it knocked the Persian Gulf and Judge Bork's problems completely out of the news for three or four days.

The Amarillo paper gives Parmer County communities good coverage on our high school sporting events. We surely don't have any complaints there. But we don't get much recognition in any other area unless some problem crops up.

In Hereford, the Hispanic population has more than doubled in the last two decades. You don't have that kind of growth without some problems. But I'll just betcha' that Hereford folks, given a little time, will get their problems worked out without help from outsiders of any color: white, brown or black.

## Bank Is Offering New Service

Friona State Bank has begun offering a special check-cashing service on Thursday afternoons between the hours of 4 and 6 p.m.

Next week, due to the Thanksgiving holiday, the special period will be held on Wednesday, November 25.

"We hope that by doing this we can promote more local business," said a spokesman for the bank.

It was pointed out that the reason the bank has to close between the hours of 3 and 4 p.m. is to balance their day's activity. Transactions handled during the 4-6 p.m. period do not go on record until the following day's work.

Friona State Bank's ATM teller is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, as a courtesy to their customers. Those who do not have an ATM card are urged to get one at their next convenience.

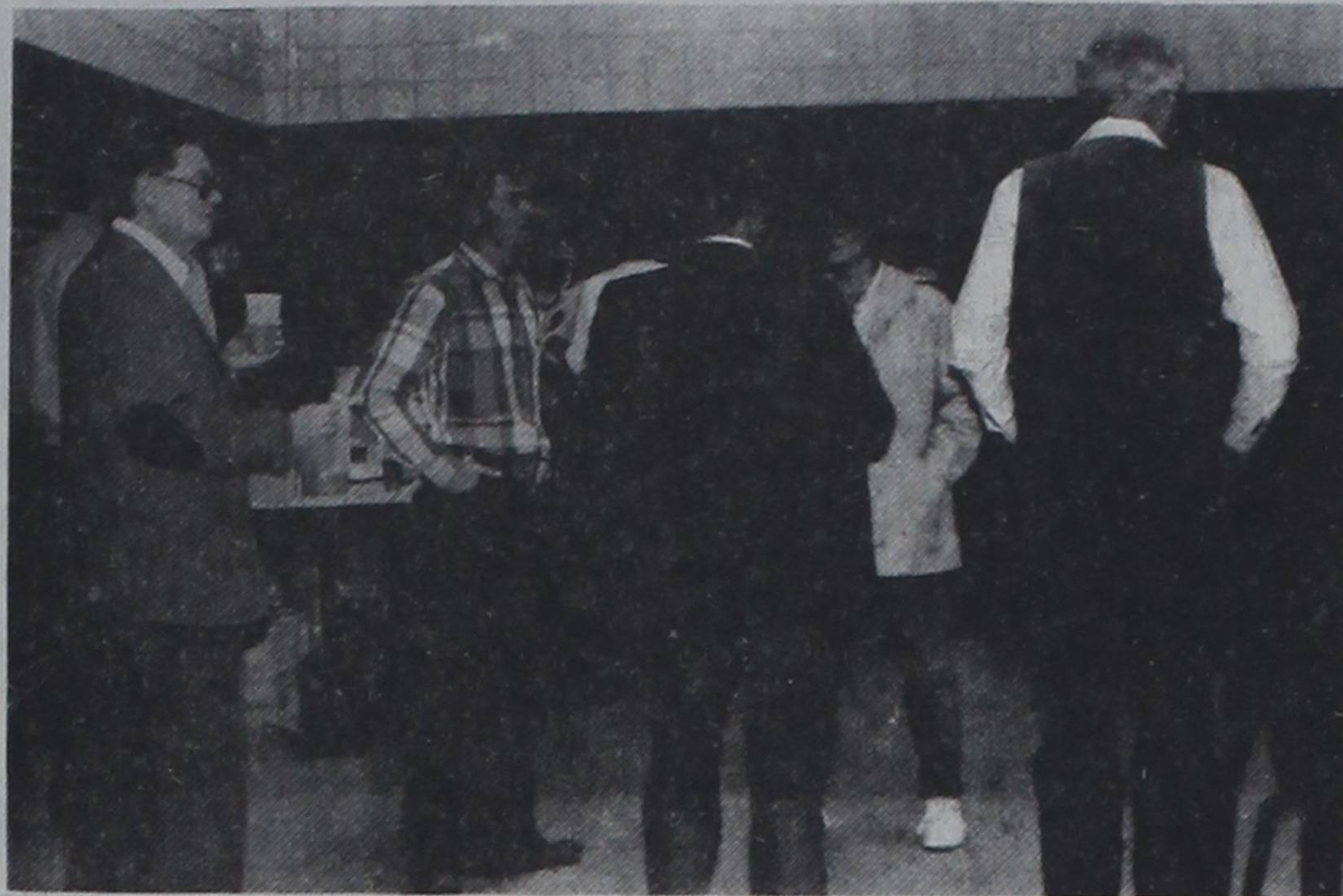
Jim Parker will provide the choir for additional entertainment. Santa will also be on hand for pictures in the depot following the lighting of the Community Christmas tree.

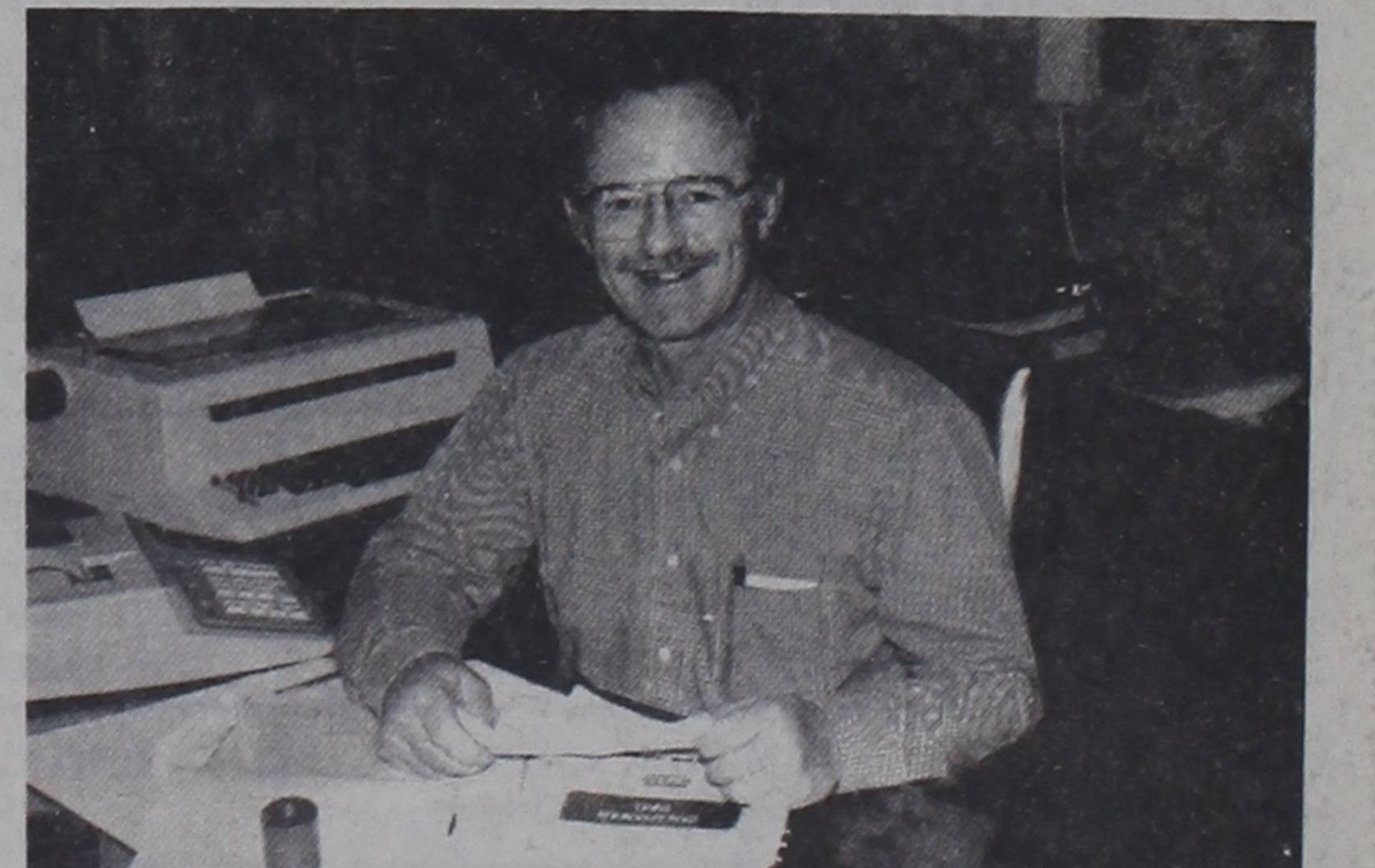
Fourteen contestants had scores of 13 for the week.

**55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 11, 1932**

**45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 13, 1942**

W.L. Edelman, local representative of the Magnolia Petroleum Co., reports no clues as to the perpetrator of the burglary of his filling station one night last week.

Saturday, November 28 has been set as the date when the judging committee will visit the candidates for the 1942 Gold Star award, the most cherished of 4-H medals. Three clubs have entered candidates. They are Tomilou Turner of the Friona 4-H Club; Barbara Foster of the Oklahoma Lane Club and Laura Seaton of the Lazbuddy Club. They have all three been clothing demonstrators for their respective clubs this year.

**35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 6, 1952**

Attending the State Convention of the Farm Bureau in San Antonio Monday will be several members of the Parmer County organization. Going as voting delegates will be Earl Stevenson, Aubrey Ellison, Melvin Sachs, Ralph Smith, T.E. Lovette and Earnest Anthony. Raymond Euler, Service Representative, will also attend.

**30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 7, 1957**

ENMU Homecoming in Portales Saturday. They marched in the homecoming parade, competing with 17 other school bands from this area. The Friona Band was named the winner in their division. They were awarded a first place trophy.

A firm located in Friona this year is demonstrating the beneficial aspects to the city from a local agriculture devoted to other crops besides the traditional grain acreage of the Parmer County farms. The firm is Friona Growers and Shippers. The other crops include potatoes and carrots, which are the two products handled to any extent this year, with others to be added.

**25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1962**

The Friona City Council voted Monday night to accept bids for a second overhead water storage tank for the city. The bids are being advertised beginning with this issue of the Star. Bids are to be opened the afternoon of December 10. In order to provide for a site for the new tower, the council voted to purchase on option lots belonging to Raymond Jones, which is just outside the present northern city limits.

Funeral services were held in Friona Monday for Mrs. Fred Carson, 39, killed in a head-on automobile collision near the city last Saturday. Mrs. Carson and a Kentucky woman, Mrs. Maxine Spencer Banks, were each killed when the automobiles they were driving collided on U.S. Highway 60, two and one-half miles southwest of Friona.

**20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 9, 1967**

Final approval was given at the City Council meeting Monday for the increase in rates by Southwestern Public Service Company, along with the adjustment in the electrical franchise rate to the city from two to three per cent of annual gross dividends.

Friona is faced with an acute housing problem, in the form of a big potential population increase, Friona Chamber of Commerce members told local builders this week. Members of the Chamber, along with building representatives met with officials of Missouri Beef Packers Tuesday to determine approximately how much housing would be required when the giant place is opened and begins production in April of 1968.

Near-record numbers of voters turned out in Friona Tuesday to help re-elect President Richard Nixon and Commissioner Tom Lewellen of county precinct number one. Lewellen won reelection in a landslide over challenger Forrest Osborn, 838-432.

Entering play Friday, three teams, the Chieftains, Muleshoe, and Littlefield, were tied for the district's top spot with 3-1 records.

**5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 14, 1982**

The Friona Chieftain Marching Band received a "Division I" rating at the annual University Interscholastic League marching competition last Monday in Lubbock. All three musicians judging the UIL marching event gave the Friona band a Division I (superior) rating.

A tremendous defensive performance by the River Road Wildcats in the second half overcame a 14-12 Friona halftime lead, and knocked the Chieftains out of the playoffs Friday night in Hereford. River Road defeated the Chieftains 26-17.

**26-Yr.-Olds Reach Milestone**

Men who turn 26 during the remainder of 1987 will be reaching an important milestone according to the Selective Service System.

Young men born in 1961 were required to register with Selective Service in July of 1980 when President Carter reinstated the registration requirement. These men turn 26 in 1987. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept a young man's

registration after he has reached his 26th birthday.

Harold Doyle, Texas Selective Service State Director, warned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for federal student financial aid, job training benefits and most federal employment. Additionally, non-registrants face possible prosecution as felons.

**SPS Files For Fuel-Cost Credit**

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) Tuesday filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) for approval to credit its Texas retail customers about \$11 million for fuel-cost savings. The "typical" residential customer, based on monthly usage of 600 kilowatt-hours, will receive about a \$10 credit.

The proposed refund includes interest at an annual rate of 11.7 per cent. Most SPS customers will receive the one-time credit in their December bills. The remaining consumers will receive their refunds in January.

"Several factors made this refund possible," said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research. "We purchased coal and natural gas, which are major costs in generating electricity, at lower prices. Additionally, the mild summer allowed us to operate only our most efficient power plants, and SPS has continued to improve the efficiency of its generating units."

Hunter pointed out SPS recently was cited as seventh best among the 100 largest investor-owned electric utilities in the United States, in terms of generating efficiency.

# Company To File For Rate Decrease

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) announced last week that it is preparing to file for an annual rate decrease of approximately \$13 million, or 2.8%, for its residential, commercial, industrial and other retail customers in Texas, primarily due to savings resulting from federal tax reform.

In addition, SPS is requesting to credit to its Texas retail customers \$11 million in fuel-cost savings and interest.

The lower rates and the one-time credit could be effective by December, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research.

Currently, SPS is conferring with the cities it serves in Texas and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) on the amount and timing of the rate reduction. In Texas, cities have original jurisdiction over base rates within their city limits. The PUCT established base rates in rural areas and regulates the fuel-cost portion of electric rates.

Effective with SPS's current fiscal year, which began September 1, its federal income tax rate was dropped to 34% from 44%. Although some corporate tax credits and deductions were eliminated by tax reform, the net effect is a smaller tax burden, Hunter said. Taxes are included in the cost of providing electric

service.

"The fuel-cost savings resulted from several factors," Hunter said. "First, we obtained lower prices for coal and natural gas. Second, because of the relatively mild summer, we did not have to operate older, less efficient power plants as much as in the past. Third, we have continued to improve the efficiency of our plants."

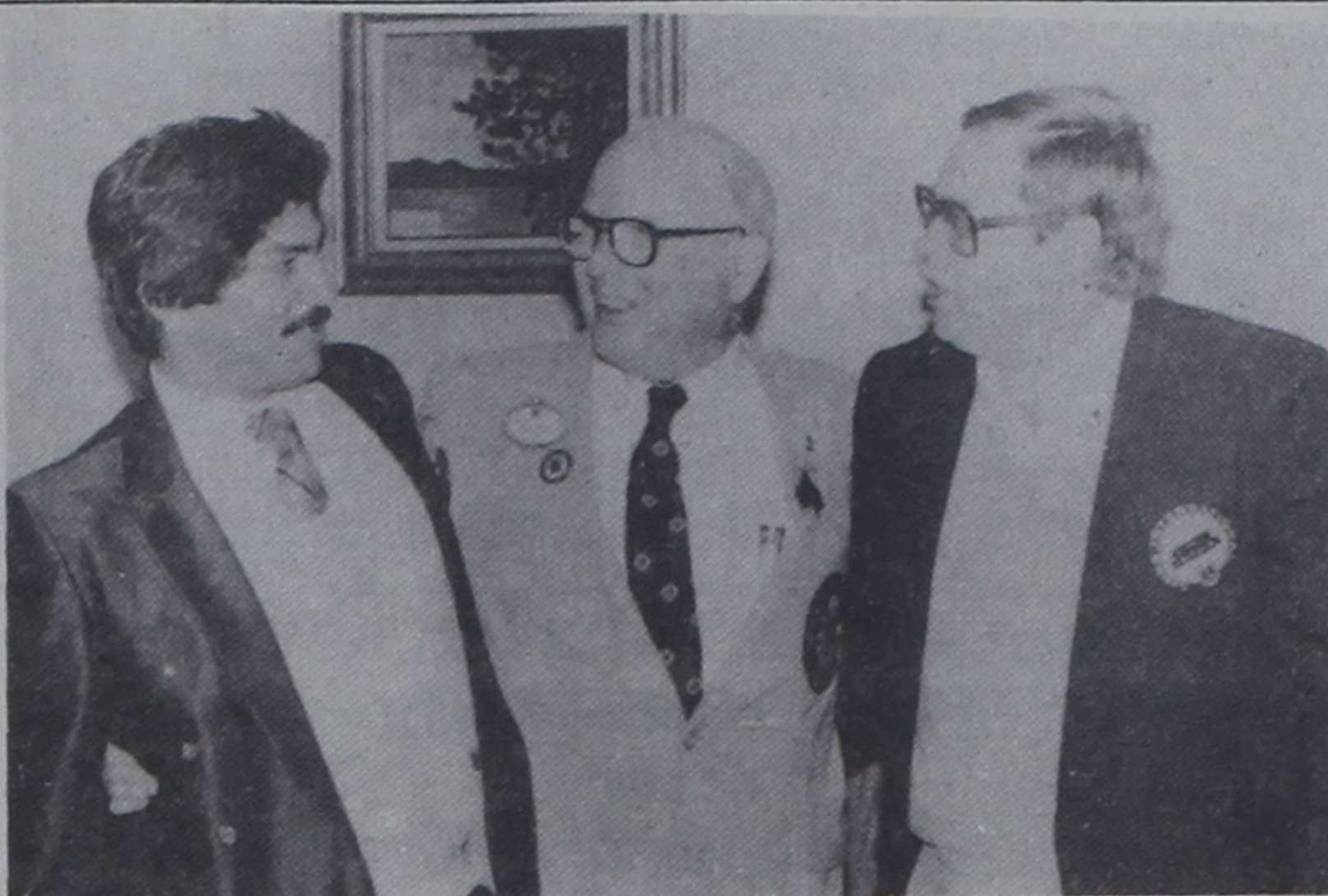
SPS recently was cited as seventh best among the 100 largest investor-owned electric utilities in the United States, in terms of generating efficiency.

In New Mexico, SPS is preparing to file for a rate reduction of \$2.65 million, or 2.1%, because of tax reform, Hunter said. Fuel-cost savings have been passed through to SPS customers in New Mexico by monthly automatic fuel-cost adjustments, which are not allowed in Texas.

Wholesale customers of SPS—rural electric cooperatives and municipal utilities—in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma are expected to receive a rate decrease of \$13.2 million, or 6.9%, and a one-time credit of \$5 million, Hunter said. SPS is discussing the proposed wholesale rates with its wholesale customers prior to filing a rate request with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) in Washington, D.C. SPS provides wholesale power to 16 rural electric cooperatives in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma, and to municipal electric utilities in Lubbock, Floydada, Tulia and Brownfield, Texas.

For SPS's retail customers in Oklahoma, the benefits of tax reform were factored into rates from a previous rate case and placed into effect October 1. Tax-savings also will be factored into SPS's Kansas rates.

Southwestern Public Service Company primarily provides electric service to a population of about one million in a 52,000-square-mile area of eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwest corner of Kansas.

# Commission Tells Highway Promo

The new guidelines for the Adopt-a-Highway program are now final. In July, the highway department announced new guidelines for the highly successful program. The temporary guidelines were published in the Texas Register, with a 60-day period for the public review and recommendations.

In its October meeting, the highway commission gave its final approval to the guidelines.

The Adopt-a-Highway program, begun in late 1985, allows groups of private citizens to adopt two-mile sections of highway for litter pickup. The highway department provides the groups with safety vests, litterbags, and safety instructions, and installs signs at each end of the adopted section giving credit to the group.

By early summer of 1987, the number of groups in the program

had mushroomed to over 2,300, including church organizations, garden clubs, motorcycle clubs, and civic groups.

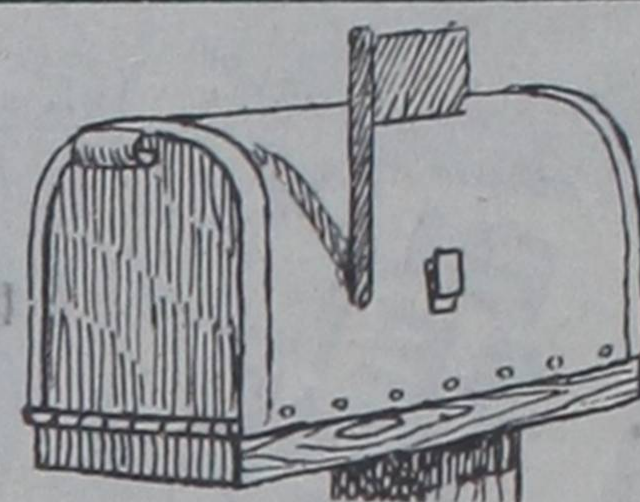
But in June, the department administration directed district offices to accept no new groups, pending a review of the program. Questions regarding adoption by political organizations and the program's cost-effectiveness prompted the action.

The new guidelines require four pickups a year by adopting groups, and a two-year adoption period, among other things.

After feedback from the public, the department has made some modifications in the guidelines. For example, several groups in West Texas felt that their sections of highway did not have enough litter to require pickup four times a year. The department has decided that, in such cases, the district engineer may permit some sections to be cleaned only twice a year.

Comments from school groups noted that it is difficult for them to commit to having one of their four pickups during the department's Great Texas Trash Off in late April. The department's response is to change the groups' participation in the Trash Off from a mandatory requirement to a recommendation. The Great Texas Trash Off for 1988 will fall on Saturday, April 23.

Dear Bill and Friona Citizens,  
The Community Heritage Society of Friona, Inc. was organized originally with the purpose of restoring the Depot which is the oldest building in our city.

The Santa Fe Railroad gave the Depot to the City of Friona but the City could not take on the responsibility of restoring it, so they could not accept the gift unless some other entity could take over the project.

After the decision was made to move the Depot to the middle of the City Park, city officials and interested citizens went to work and the Park was finally deeded to the City by the Commissioners of Farmer County.

The Heritage Society needs more support from the community. Restoration of the Depot is a city-wide project—not just a project of the Heritage Society. The organization is merely a "vehicle" to accomplish this goal.

The Society's membership has dropped to less than half of the original number. Your input and membership are needed and welcomed. Dues are only \$5.00 per person per year. There is an annual meeting for all members and extra meetings are called when needed.

# FmHA Loans Available

Emergency loans for farmers or ranchers are available through county offices of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), Weldon C. Rainey, FmHA County Supervisor, said this week.

Weldon C. Rainey asked that

those who need farm credit as a result of hail make their needs known at the Farmers Home Administration office at 207 Avenue D in Farwell, Texas.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until July 11, 1988 for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Weldon D. Rainey said.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of 4.5 per cent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster.

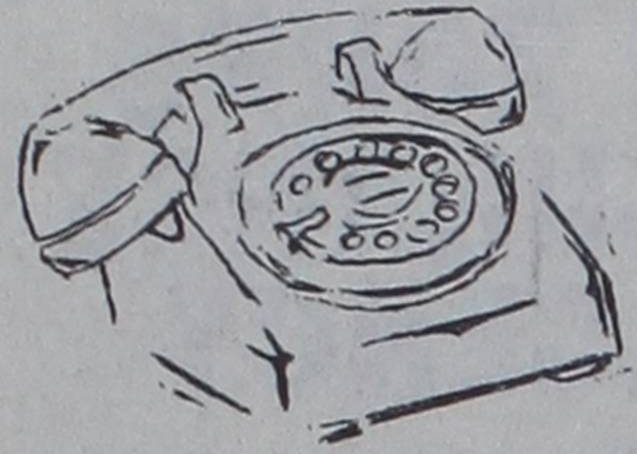

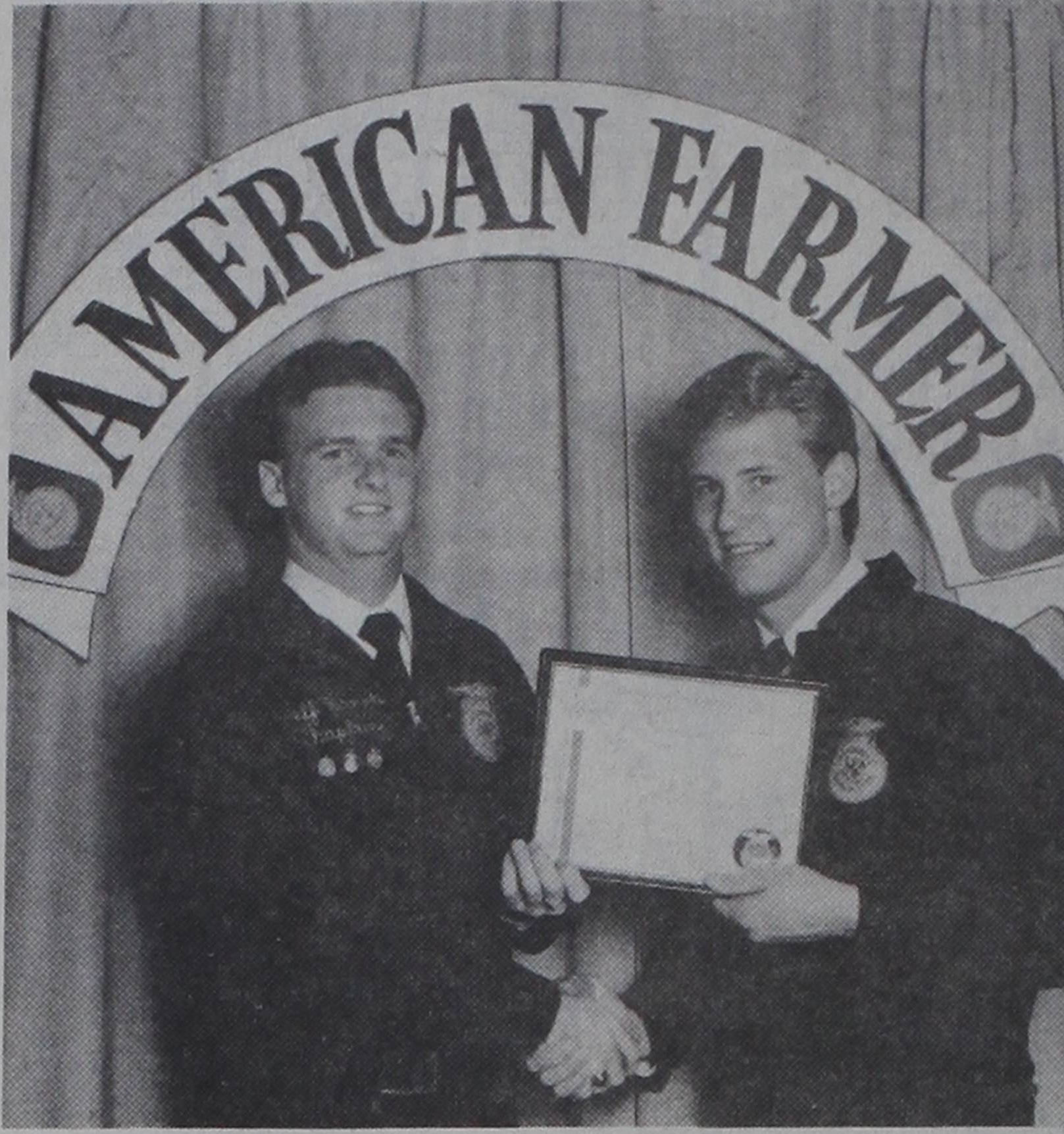

"Local and area residents are invited to purchase a ticket and have an enjoyable tour," urged Mrs. Nieman.

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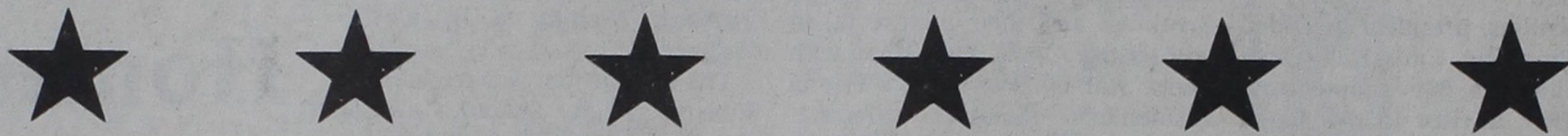




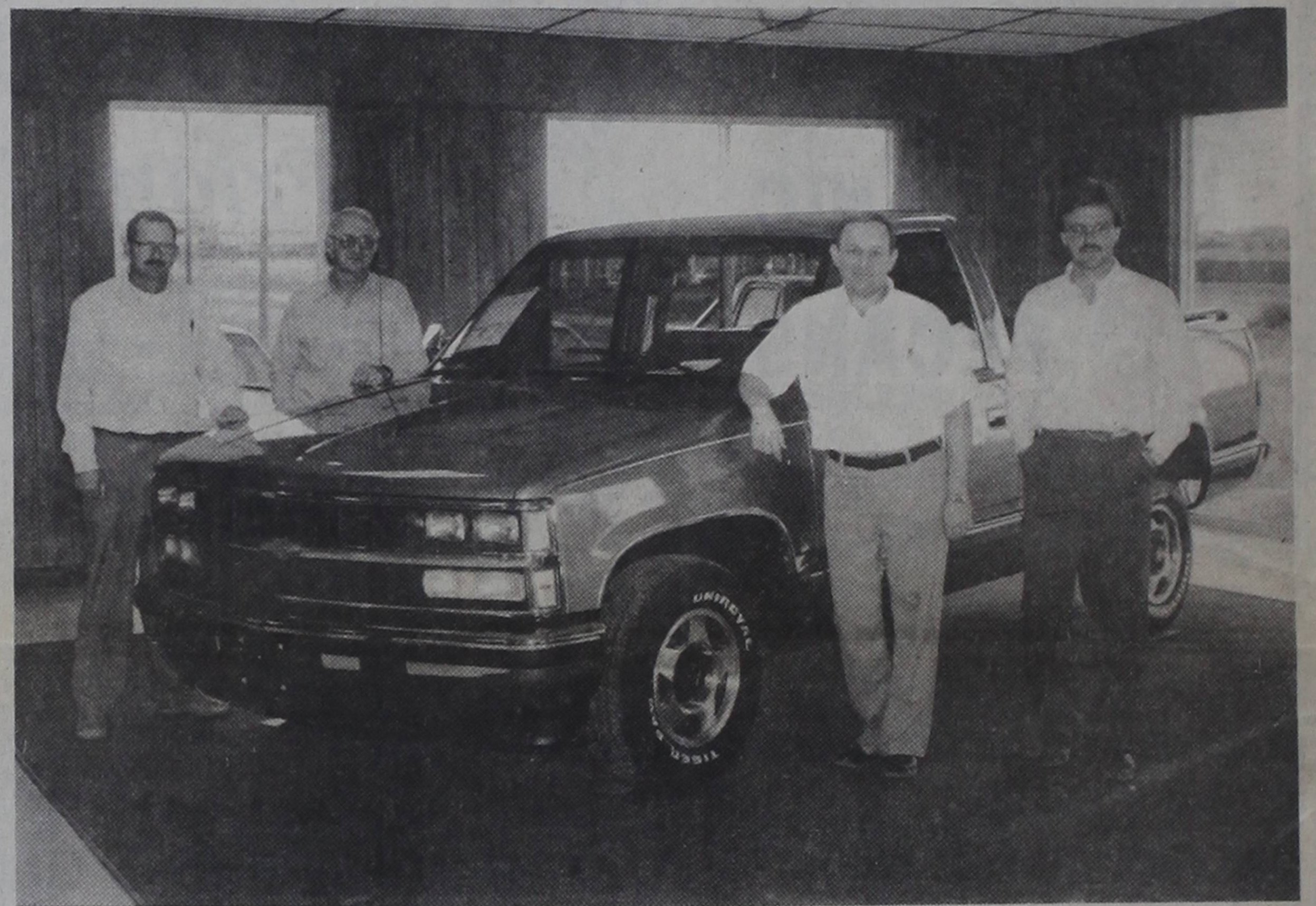
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
