



SPS Files For Fuel-Cost Credit

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) Tuesday filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) for approval to credit its Texas retail customers about \$11 million for fuel-cost savings. The "typical" residential customer, based on monthly usage of 600 kilowatt-hours, will receive about a \$10 credit.

The proposed refund includes interest at an annual rate of 11.7 per cent. Most SPS customers will receive the one-time credit in their December bills. The remaining consumers will receive their refunds in January.

"Several factors made this refund possible," said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research.
