The agenda for the meeting will include reading of the minutes from the 1987 meeting, a financial report, and a report on the progress and plans for the Santa Fe depot restoration. Discussion and input from members is welcomed.

Also, directors are to be elected for a one-year term on the board.

Present board of directors are Lois Norwood, Dianne Tatum, Carol Ellis, Joe Tongate, Ilene Osborn, Debbie Smith, Carrie Tatum, Mary Johnston, Alló Reeve, Peggy Monroe, Ann Nichols and Beth Thompson. Beelee Goodwin is an ex-officio member of the board.

The organization's 1988 dues are \$5 per person, and are now due and payable. "We need all present members, and also need to recruit new members," says Lois Norwood, president of the organization.

Immediately following the annual meeting, there will be a meeting of the board of directors to elect officers for 1988.

No Decision On Application

The Parmer County Commissioner's Court applied for a grant to make the county courthouse handicapped accessible and worked to maintain the county's roads during the past year.


The decision to apply for the money to build an elevator and renovate the restrooms for the handicapped came toward the end of the year, although commissioners discussed the proposal for several months.

The commission sent the grant application to Austin, and Judge Porter Roberts said it was his understanding that the application was to be considered on January 5. He said on Wednesday that he had received no word concerning the grant.

During the past year, commissioners also allocated \$10,600 in local funds for the renovation project.

In other business during 1987, commissioners approved a new budget with a 10 per cent salary increase for county employees. The budget called for a three per cent tax increase.

The tax increase was made necessary because the state came up with an "effective tax rate" that was three per cent below the county's level a year earlier. The hike had to be made to keep the county's income even with the prior year.

Williams Files For Sheriff

Rex Williams, 53, patrolman and assistant chief for the Friona Police Department, announced this week that he will be a candidate for the office of County Sheriff.

Williams' candidacy is subject to the action of the Democratic primary in March.

A resident of Parmer County for 26 years, Williams has been employed by the Friona Police Department since 1980. Prior to that, he served as ambulance driver for the City of Friona.

A native of Anton, Williams came to Parmer County in 1962. He was employed by Herring Implement Company in Friona for 16 years.

"I feel that my experience as assistant chief of police in Friona since 1981 has prepared me to be able to handle the sheriff's position. If elected, I will serve the residents of Parmer County to the best of my abilities," Williams said.

FHS Hosts 18 Schools In Meet

Friona High School will host its 24th annual Invitational Speech Tournament on Saturday, with competition being held at both the high school and junior high school facilities.

Joy Morton, tournament director, said that weather had somewhat affected the number of schools attending, but was still expecting 18 schools for the annual tournament.

Schools entering include: Muleshoe, Lubbock Cooper, Levelland, Borger, Hereford, Groom, Hobbs, N.M., Boys Ranch, Canadian, Tascosa, Pampa, Miami, Canyon, White Deer, Dimmitt, Dalhart, Stratford and perhaps Jayton.

Squaws To Visit DHS On Tuesday

The Friona Squaws will visit Dimmitt for their district-opening basketball game on Tuesday night.

Coach Vicki Hatton is urging a good following for the team, saying this will be vital to Friona's chances. Since there are only girls games, it's also a challenge for the Friona fans to go and back the Squaws.

"We need a good turnout. Everyone knows how important that is, especially when you're playing at Dimmitt," Coach Hatton says.

The Squaws have played considerably better basketball than their 4-8 record would imply. In fact, you could add just a couple of points here and there and the team's season record could easily be reversed.

Considering the fact that the Friona girls have been in the middle of a rebuilding season, and also have been plagued by injuries in the early season, their record also belies the team's potential.

Next Friday, the Squaws return home to host the Littlefield girls, in what will also mark the Chieftains' opening district encounter.

The girls always inaugurate district play one game earlier than the boys, due to the fact that girls' UIL playoffs have to start a week before the boys' playoffs.

The varsity teams are both competing in the Abernathy tournament this weekend, their last tourney of the season. Both were meeting Abernathy teams on Friday, in delayed first-round games.

Winter Keeps Its Icy Grip Around Area

Old Man Winter continues to keep the local area in an icy grip, as the temperature had failed to make it past the 32-degree mark as of Thursday of this week.

After having the temperature reach into the 40s on Sunday, January 3, the mercury has nose-dived, and has never recovered to as high as the freezing mark.

An Arctic cold front, or "Siberian Express" moved through the area on Tuesday, plunging temperatures and bringing freezing drizzle and fog to the local area.

Friona escaped the brunt of the snow, while some parts of the Panhandle have received their third major snowfall within a month's time. Locally, the snowfall was less than an inch, whereas Amarillo received four inches and northern Panhandle cities had as much as nine inches, with over a foot reported in Oklahoma points.

Residents awoke Wednesday morning to find streets covered with ice and snow, making the traffic very slow. However, Friona schools have operated on schedule all week. Wednesday's high temperature reached only 19 degrees, and the low Thursday morning was four degrees. At the same time, Amarillo set a record low for the date of -6 degrees.

The sun came up on Thursday--the first time residents had seen the sun all week, and stayed out until noon. However, the deep cold front kept temperatures from warming past 24 degrees for the day. However, the sun, along with traffic, helped to clear the highway through town, although most streets remained icy.

A chart published by the Amarillo *Globe-News* this week showed that temperatures in the area since Christmas Eve have averaged ten to 20 degrees colder for the low readings to 30 degrees colder on the high readings.

The soil temperature measured at Bushland (near Amarillo) was 32 degrees on Tuesday, and officials said "That's about as cold as it ever gets."

While the moisture received this winter has been beneficial to farmland, the prolonged cold has hampered the winter wheat. "It's not looking as good as it should be, due to the cold. Sometimes the extreme cold can burn the wheat, and that hurts your wheat pasture," said Jim Dixon, resident of the Rhea community.

The extreme cold also has had a detrimental effect on local business, as residents have been getting outside only for necessities. "Tuesday and Wednesday we might as well have been closed," said Hanna Malouf of Malouf's Shopping Center, probably speaking for the majority of local businesses.

And the worst part of it is--it is still 73 days until the first day of spring. So we might as well enjoy the winter weather.

60 YEARS AGO--JAN. 6, 1928

The probable lineup for Friona will be Singleterry and Spring, forwards, Reeve Guyer, center, Bill Guyer, Roden and Richardson, guards.

50 YEARS AGO--JAN. 7, 1938

Bethel Hicks, who for the past two or three years has been proprietor of the recreation hall known as "Bek's Place," has recently sold the business to a Mr. Miller. Mr. and Mrs. Hicks have moved to Seagraves.

Wayne B. Stark, station agent for the Santa Fe Railroad here, spent the Christmas holidays at Woodward, Oklahoma, visiting his father and his brothers and sisters.

45 YEARS AGO--JAN. 8, 1943

Minister C.B. Glasgow of Amarillo has accepted the call to become the minister of the Sixth Street Church of Christ at Friona, and he and Mrs. Glasgow have become residents of this city.

J.L. Spencer, principal of the Friona Grade School, has resigned to take the job of principal at Miami High School.

40 YEARS AGO--JAN. 9, 1948

Mr. and Mrs. C.A. Turner, Friona, announce the engagement and approaching marriage of their daughter, Miss Jean Turner, to Bob Coker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Coker of Summerfield.

35 YEARS AGO--JAN. 8, 1953

Influenza cases of epidemic proportions have since Christmas touched most every family, the schools and businesses of Friona. Manager Jimmie Baxter of the Parmer County Community Hospital reported that about 90 per cent of all callers at the hospital the last two weeks have been flu cases.

30 YEARS AGO--JAN. 9, 1958

Friona City Commission Monday night appointed a five-man committee to re-vamp the city's code for building, including requirements for construction, electrical wiring and plumbing. Members of the committee are Raymond Fleming, chairman;

Glen Stevick, Dan Laceywell, Weldon Dickson and Kenyth Cass.

Buddy Lloyd, moisture recorder for the U.S. Weather Bureau, reports .88 inches of moisture was carried by the snow, the first of the year. Unofficial measurements of the depth of snow that fell, place the amount between seven and eight inches.

25 YEARS AGO--JAN. 10, 1963

Andy Hurst and Newman Jarrell, Jr. are announcing this week the sale of Jarrell's Variety in Friona to Hurst, who operates Hurst Department Store.

Deposits at three Parmer County banks stood at an all-time high of \$14,317,383.51 on December 31, it was reported this week. Friona State Bank led with deposits of \$6,302,459.61.

20 YEARS AGO--JAN. 4, 1968

The first baby born in 1968 is Alan Dean Faulkner. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Faulkner. The baby was born in Parmer County Community Hospital. He was born January 2 and weighed seven pounds, six ounces. His father is director of bands at Friona Junior High School.

A new camera was installed at Friona's driver's license office. The new camera will take pictures for driver's licenses issued during 1968. A busy day was reported on Tuesday, the first day the applicants used the new office facility.

15 YEARS AGO--JAN. 4, 1973

Residents of Friona and the surrounding area were greeted Monday morning, January 1, by a cloudy and overcast sky. Snow began falling about eight o'clock and fell intermittently all day and by evening the ground was covered to a depth of two inches. During the night and early Tuesday morning, snow continued to fall. Two and one-half inches fell during the twenty-four hour period and by six o'clock that evening the ground cover measured four inches. Total moisture received during the two day period amounted to .32 inches.

For the first time in a number of years, Friona had a New Year's baby born January 1--and this year there was not one, but two babies vying for the "first" honors. Brian Bush was born at 9:47 a.m. January 1 at Parmer County

Community Hospital, to capture "first baby" honors. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Max Bush of the Lazbuddie community. Less than an hour later, at 10:40 a.m., Gary Miller Stowers was born. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Jackie Stowers.

10 YEARS AGO--JAN. 15, 1977

Two men are in custody in the county jail in Farwell, charged with robbery and assault with a deadly weapon, following the armed robbery and stabbing last Friday night of Piggly Wiggly manager Joe Tongate, who was hospitalized following the incident.

Friona's United Fund recently closed its books on the 1977 drive, which was very successful, according to Gale Warren, chairman. Total contributions amounted to \$11,150.43, 104 per cent of the goal of \$10,727.

5 YEARS AGO--JAN. 9, 1983

The Friona area received a nice snow the day after Christmas with measurements of around ten inches being the average.

Funeral services for longtime Friona businessman, ElRoy Wilson, 76, were conducted Tuesday, December 28 at the Calvary Baptist Church. Wilson became owner of Plains Hardware in 1955, and continued as owner-manager of the store until September of 1978, when he sold to Steve Bavousett and retired.




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

I plan to have monthly articles in the paper that I hope will be informative and interesting to both large animal producers and pet owners alike. From time to time, new products and services become available and I hope that this newsletter will allow us to bring them to you. Also, there are animal disease conditions that are prevalent during different times of the year that we will be able to alert you of.

Over the past eighteen years, your support has enabled us to grow and keep abreast of the latest developments in all phases of animal medicine and I hope to be able to communicate with more people through the newsletter.

During this cold weather, we are seeing a variety of weather related problems. Pets and livestock alike drink more water than you think and they cannot drink any if it is frozen.

Remember that tylenol is poisonous to cats.

Beware of bloat around the first of February, as

wheat begins to grow. There are several products available to prevent this problem.

We have an instrument available that allows us to vaccinate cattle without catching them in a chute or even putting them in an alley. The vaccine is very good and essentially stress free, since cattle are not handled at all.

Thanks again for your support and we wish you a happy and prosperous new year.

There's only one license for people who carry a lot of weight. A new law for truck and bus drivers.

You may have only one driver's license issued by the state where you live, according to a new federal law. You should return any other licenses you hold to the states that issued them. Effective July 1, 1987, if you have more than one license, it will be illegal, and you may be fined up to \$2,500.




Farm Program Set Locally

"We scored pretty well, and shot better than average for us. That bad first quarter just killed us," said Chieftain coach T.J. Parks.


Echols led the scoring with 23 points. The senior guard hit ten of 17 from the field and three of three from the line.




