Big Spring woman killed in one-vehicle accident

Janet Lee King, 21, of Route 1, died early this morning from injuries she received in a one-vehicle accident on the 11th Place Extension, one-half mile east of Big Spring.

The accident occurred at approximately 12:15 a.m., according to officials from the Texas Highway Patrol. State Trooper Bill Jennings was called to the scene, as were members of the Big Spring Police Department and the Howard County Sheriff's Department.

Mrs. King was the only occupant in the Dodge pickup. She was reportedly thrown from the pickup, said Jennings. Mrs. King was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Lewis Heflin, and was transported to Sheppard Funeral Home via Shaffer Ambulance.

Mrs. King was born July 29, 1960, in Dallas. She married Billy G. King Oct. 13, 1979, in Big Spring, and was a

Services will be at 3 p.m. Friday in the Chapel of Memories at Sheppard Funeral Home.

Interment will be in Trinity Memorial Cemetery, under the direction of Sheppard Funeral Home.

Survivors include her husband; two stepdaughters, Amy King and Vanessa King, both of the home; her rents, Dr. and Mrs. Joe Simmons, Dallas; a sister, Karen Hahn, Big Spring; three brothers, Jody Simmons, Bryan, Charlie Simmons and David Simmons, both of Dallas; her maternal grandmother, Ladine McDaniel, Dallas; and her paternal grandmother, Mrs. Virginia Sim-mons, Dallas. \$2 million airport redesign shapes up

City officials voiced approval of a \$2 million airport redesign which calls for moving an east-west runway south and relocating the terminal and hangars from the eastern side of airport property to the west.

In a joint session with city council members sitting in and listening, the Industrial Park Steering Committee and the Airport Advisory Committee met at the airport late in the afternoon and heard planner Don Cress outline the

airport master plan his firm created.

Don Cress & Associates of Lexington, Ky., were hired to draft a master plan when O.I.L. asked the city for permission to expand its Industrial Park lease to cover nearly the entire western edge of the park as well as

substantial airport property.

Cress told the meeting his planners looked at five ways of relocating the hangars and terminal, which hinged on two plans of action for the east-west or cross-wind runway

leaving the runway where it is or moving it south.

Cress told the meeting he favored leaving the crosswind runway where it is. Such a plan would necessitate extending the runway some 800 feet on its western end, since industrial expansion would encroach on its eastern end and the Federal Aviation Administration sets

requirements for minimum runway length.

He said he favored leaving the crosswind runway where it is because even if the city decided to move it south, a part of the existing runway still would be needed for aviation operations. And, he said, the airport would obtain a fully operational cross-wind runway more quickly by extending the present one rather than building a new one.

He also told the meeting that keeping the cross-wind runway at its current location would mean a "better use of existing pavement" and would not limit industrial development as it grows north around the airport and heads south along the western side.

the impression that the FAA was telling the city it had little choice to move the cross-wind runway south.

FAA field representative Jerry Trujillo responded that his agency is "not happy with where it (the cross-wind runway) is at. But it's your airport. You don't have to move it (the cross-wind runway)," he said.

He said the FAA doesn't like the present location

because it means pilots must fly in too close to the nearby scenic mountain. It also means aviation operations are carried out too close to industrial activity. Additionally, moving the cross-wind runway south would give it a better wind alignment, Trujillo said.

(Pilots use the cross-wind runway so they can land into the wind when it prevails from the west.

Cress then told the meeting that if the city decides to move the cross-wind runway south, "you've got to do it fast, because the longer you stay up there, the longer you use an inadequate runway (because it's too short).

Trujillo said the city would have to extend temporarily the existing cross-wind runway while the newer one to the south is built.

The consensus of the meeting was that the cross-wind runway be relocated south but as a "long-term" project, since there's no FAA pressure to move it now. Meanwhile, the hangars and terminal will be moved to a location in between the primary north-south runways — a move which would necessitate closing off the southwest portion of the western north-south runway. The city hopes future industrial development will curve around behind the new hangars on the site of the closed portion of north-south

Cress - hired by the city for \$3,600 to do the planning was instructed to draw up a master plan incorporating the following elements: moving the cross-wind runway south as a long-term project, immediately building up a portion Steering committee member Granville Hahn remarked of the existing cross-wind for taxiway purposes, and that "we're going to find ourselves boxed in" if the existing runway is used and suggested moving the runway future cross-wind runway.

Korean missile misses U.S. plane

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Reagan administration withheld a response today to North Korea's apparent firing of a surface-to-air missile in the vicinity of a high-

altitude U.S. spy plane. President Reagan was described "concerned" about Wednesday's incident, which came a week after U.S. jets shot down two attacking Libyan planes during Navy maneuvers in disputed

Mediterranean waters off the cost of Libya.
In Seoul, the U.N. military command called today for a meeting of the Military Armistice Command that oversees the truce between North and South Korea. It was not known, however, if the missile incident would be the

subject.
The missile missed by miles, and the Reagan administration stopped short of flatly accusing the North Koreans of shooting at the Air Force SR-71 "Blackbird" reconnaissance plane.

The Pentagon and the State Department were evaluating the circumstances to determine how the United States should respond.

In Santa Barbara, Calif., deputy White House press secretary Larry Speakes said "the missile was so far away we are still treating it as an apparent incident." He did not

Details of the incident were sketchy a day later. It remained unclear early today whether the missile was aimed at the U.S. plane and exactly where it originated, government sources

Braniff suspending

service to 7 cities

DALLAS (AP) - Braniff International is suspending service to seven U.S. cities and increasing flights on other routes as part of a plan to revamp the financially

ailing airline, company officials announced. The flight restructuring, which company sources say should make Braniff a more formidable competitor in Texas and the Southwest, suspends service to Atlanta; New York; Boston; Hartford, Conn.; Phoenix; Tucson, Ariz. and Salt Lake City, company officials announced

A total of 10 daily flights will be dropped in those cities, while Braniff adds flights to an unspecified number of cities it already serves, said James Lawrence, vice president of governmental and in-Braniff will resume service to Fort Lauderdale, Fla.,

and Brownsville, Texas, two of nine routes suspended shortly after the air controllers' strike began Aug. 3,

At a Sept. 1 news conference Braniff will announce what president John J. Casey called "a brand new

Coyote kills child

GLENDALE, Calif. (AP) - A 3-year-old girl was killed by a coyote that apparently wandered down from the San Rafael Hills to the street where she lived, authorities said

Robert Keene told police he looked out a window Wednesday and saw the coyote mauling his daughter, Kathy, in a yard across the street. He ran out of the house and the animal fled, but the girl had already been badly mauled, Glendale Police Lt. Mike Post

The girl died at Glendale Adventist Hospital three hours later of massive internal injuries, external bleeding and a broken neck, hospital officials said. The coyote was not found. Authorities said such

attacks are rare but have occurred in the past in the hilly areas around Los Angeles. The last attack occurred two years ago, when a

coyote mauled a 13-month-old child but was frightened off by the child's mother.

Authorities have warned residents not to feed wild coyotes since that may lure them to residential areas.

Mayor threatened

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - Mayor Henry Cisneros has received more threats on his life in two letters received at city hall - one containing a .32caliber bullet and the ominous message: "Mayor Cisneros, you're a dead man.

The other letter, addressed to Vice President George Bush at city hall, said, "you and George Bush are going to be killed," prompting the Secret Service to take an interest in the threats, the latest of several directed against city officials in recent weeks.

"The police department has the letters and bullet for fingerprint examinations. We think we have the person identified," a spokesman for the Secret Service said. Secret Service and police intelligence officers were to confer today regarding the threats.

Cisneros declined to comment on the letters, which followed a telephone call to the city hall switchboard last Friday by a man who threatened Cisneros in

Meanwhile, a former city employee who allegedly threatened city manager Tom Huebner made a brief court appearance Wednesday and was returned to a hospital for psychiatric care.

City councilman Bernardo Eureste also received some threatening telephone calls at his home last month and reported them to city police and the FBI.

Voyager camera repaired

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — An electronic swat sent from a billion miles away freed the stuck camera platform on Voyager 2, and scientists were trying to find out today if the ship can get back to the business of looking at distant worlds.

A weary flight engineer accidentally sent an incorrect computer command to Voyager late Wednesday, telling it to move its jammed platform with a forward rotation 10 times greater than previous orders designed to free the platform. The mistake did the trick, freeing a vital camera platform that had been stuck for nearly a day.

"We are not permanently stuck," project manager Esker Davis said with relief late Wednesday. "I feel

Davis said Voyager's two exploratory cameras and three other instruments still needed to be checked out and are not considered operational vet. He said he couldn't predict when the 226-pound package mounted on a 71/2-foot boom might be put back to The camera platform had been unable to move from side to side. although it could still swivel up and down. The devices on the platform were working well; they just couldn't be aimed at what scientists wanted to

Seven of Voyager's 11 scientific instruments continued to perform exactly as planned, Davis said. Troubleshooters were still

analyzing what happened on the far side of Saturn at 11:30 p.m. PDT Tuesday to jam the crucial cameraaiming system. And they weren't sure the problem was permanently solved. Voyager 2, meanwhile, was racing

Saturn's churning clouds, glittering rings and icy moons The next leg of a journey that began four years ago takes it across another 1.7 billion miles of space for a visit to Uranus in 1986 and a dash past

away from its spectacular tour of

Neptune in 1989. While engineers worked on the jammed platform Wednesday, scientists at Jet Propulsion Laboratory were reveling in the new information and pictures of Saturn relayed to them by Voyager 2.

Photography team leader Brad Smith described the close approach with Saturn as "something like roughly 99 percent successful." He said the ship accomplished most of its crucial chores before the malfunction left its cameras staring uselessly at empty space.

A new puzzle for scientists was a strangely kinky ring apparently discovered by yet another lucky accident moments before the camera problems began and possibly even related to them.

The narrow ring, which seems creased and kinked like a bit of wire that's been unwound after being wadded up, was spotted as Voyager passed behind Saturn, said scientist Richard Terrile.

The narrow ring was discovered in the Encke Division, a gap in the bright A-ring, even though "we didn't have any pictures of the Encke Division scheduled." He said the cameras, as they were glancing about, somehow managed to capture the stillunexplained feature.

Justice Department intervenes in Corpus Christi desegregation

A Corpus Christi school board president says despite Justice Department objections he believes his school district deserves a chance to argue in court against continued forced busing of students.

The department asked a federal court Wednesday to deny the Corpus Christi Independent School District's proposal to modify its school desegregation plan.

In a memo filed with the U.S. District Court in Corpus Christi, the Justice Department's civil rights division said the request by the district should be denied without a

hearing. The action was in line with a policy announced last week by William Bradford Reynolds, assistant at-

torney general in charge of the civil But Corpus Christi board president

Clemente Garcia Jr. disagreed with the department's actions.

'We (board members) feel that, from all the information we received, busing is not working in Corpus Christi and has served its purpose,

he said Wednesday

opposes mandatory ministration school busing, Reynolds said the department would not seek to reopen school desegregation cases which had been settled by administrations which did not oppose mandatory busing. Now that all documents in the case

have been filed, the case can be reviewed by U.S. District Judge George P. Kazen of Laredo, who could either schedule a hearing on the case or rule on the matter without a

"The judge has not yet decided the case," Garcia said. "I'm sure that he will study all the information given to

The case began in 1968 when Hispanic and black parents alleged that the district illegally segregated minority children. The court accepted that view in 1970 after a trial.

The school district submitted a series of voluntary student transfer plans which were rejected and on July 26, 1975, the court ordered an attendance plan which mandated the busing of some 1,500 children.

In its court papers, the Justice

of the plan now proposed by the Corpus Christi Independent School District would substantially reduce the level of desegregation ... and essentially reinstitute a plan already found by this court to be ineffective and unconstitutional in 1975."

The department said the board's proposed modifications were effectively similar to previous proposals which the court found "unacceptable because they perpetuated and exacerbated the unconstitutional segregation."

The Justice Department said the school district had failed to offer an alternative which would effectively meet the remedial goals of the original court decree and had failed to show changed circumstances warranting a new desegregation plan.

But the Justice Department did say there may be other proposals which would provide equal educational opportunity and at the same time reduce the amount of mandatory busing now required. The department said the district may wish to consider submitting such an alternative in the

Vandiver is named new A&M president

Frank E. Vandiver says he is honored to accept the sidency at Texas A&M but feels bittersweet about leaving North Texas State University where he took the helm in the wake of a financial scandal.

The Texas A&M Board of Regents announced Wednesday that on Sept. 1 Vandiver, 55, a military historian, will become the 19th president of the university. Vandiver currently is

has been provost, vice and acting president of Rice University. He said his decision to leave North Texas and accept the \$90,000-a-year post at A&M was not influenced by the opposition that met proposed faculty reorganization plan.


But he said the unsettled proposal was "one of the things that made me a little" hesitant about taking the A&M presidency. The proposal would have

realigned the faculty into areas of expertise rather than general subject matter. "I'd still like to see that reorganization or some kind reorganization come about (at NTSU)," he said. "I'll be interested to see

what they do."

Vandiver is expected to meet with North Texas regents in Denton today to his formal resignation and recommend that board members name NTSU vice president Howard Smith to serve as acting president.

Reagan may veto spending bills to force deeper cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rekindling the budget battle, administration officials are hinting that President Reagan may veto spending bills in an effort to force deeper cuts than those approved by Congress last month.

In addition, government agencies are being told to draft budgets that would slash spending in line with the more stringent reductions proposed by Reagan last spring. The moves come as the ad-

ministration struggles to keep the federal budget in check in the face of predictions by congressional and private economists that high interest rates and lower government revenues resulting from hefty tax cuts will push deficits for 1982 and beyond well above Reagan's targets.

Administration officials say they still hope to salvage up to \$4 billion in spending cuts that Congress rejected when it passed a record \$35.2 billion package of budget reductions July 31. They also hope to net even larger savings in programs that still await

That is virtually certain to renew congressional battles over the budget. The budget measures already adopted by Congress this year — and signed by Reagan earlier this month set spending ceilings and targets for various federal programs. The appropriations bills actually provide

the money, but not always the maximum amount.

Edwin Dale, spokesman for the White House Office of Management and Budget, said the administration will try to make sure Congress doesn't appropriate the full amount in cases where the spending ceiling exceeds the requests Reagan made in March.

To help achieve that goal, Dale said, departments have been instructed to draft budgets pegged to the president's original plan, in effect reinstating cuts that Congress would not accept the first time.

The administration estimates the cuts approved last month fell \$6 billion short of what the president sought and counted on to meet his vow to balance the budget by 1984.

Examples of deeper cuts the administration wants include \$600 million in railroad programs, \$500 million in energy assistance payments for low-income people, \$665 million in direct loans by the Export-Import Bank and \$300 million for the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act.

So far, seven appropriations bills already approved by committees in the Democratic-controlled House provide \$2.7 billion more than Reagan's initial request. Five of those measures have passed the full House. Dale refused to say directly whether Reagan would veto those bills if they clear the Senate but he added that "the word has gone out" from the

budget office about that possibility.
The president's budget advisers forecast a deficit of \$42.5 billion for the 1982 fiscal year, beginning Oct. 1, and a thin surplus by 1984, providing that Congress agrees to trim at least another \$74 billion between now and then from Social Security and other federal programs. Those savings have yet to be identified by Reagan. Budget director David A. Stockman

denied Wednesday he has proposed cutting as much as \$20 billion to \$40 billion from the defense budget in 1983 and 1984, and other administration sources were quoted as saying the final figure might be only a fraction of

Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger said the Pentagon can rearm America with less money than it has sought, if essential to overall economic goals.

White House counselor Edwin Meese III, who met with Stockman and Weinberger for 41/2 hours Wednesday, said afterward there isn't enough money to pay for all the defense proposals, "so you have to make some decisions among them.'

Whatever they decide to cut, Meese reiterated that new strategic weapons systems won't be affected.

Angola reports more bombing by South Africa

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — Angola reported renewed attacks and "intense bombing" today by South African troops in

its southern Cunene province, the official Angolan news agency Agnop reported here.

The news agency said South African planes bombed the Angolan provincial capital city, Njiva, and reported heavy combat on the outskirts of the city.

There were no immediate reports of casualties. There was no immediate comment from South Africa.

Angola had reported earlier today that its troops and adverse international reaction forced a slowdown in the South African

incursion, Agnop reported.

"The aggressive forces now are trying to gain time for a discreet withdrawal of troops and material," the news agency said in a dispatch from the capital city of Luanda,

monitored here. It made no mention of new fighting, and provided no details of the Angolan forces involvement.

Angop said almost all civilian airports in neigboring South-West Africa, from which South Africa mounted the invasion Monday, had been reopened after being closed for "four or five days." The airports are usually closed when South Africa launches one of its periodic raids against Angolan-based

South African Prime Minister P.W. Botha asserted Wednesday that his country's invasion of Angola was just another "followup operation" against insurgent Namibians raiding South-West Africa.

The United States, Britain and West Germany condemned the incursion, and Britain and West Germany demanded that

Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafy said Libyans are prepared to fight "side by side" with Angola to stop South Africa's "racist and imperialist agression," the Libyan news agency JANA reported today.

The South African Defense Force refused to give details of the operation. But Botha reported the invaders destroyed bases and arms caches of the South-West Africa People's Organization (SWAPO), and military spokesman said eight members of the security forces and 29 guerrillas had been killed in recent operations.

The Angolan government charged that two South African armored columns crossed the border between Angola and South-West Africa (Namibia) early Monday, advanced nearly 100 miles into Angola and clashed with Angolan troops while South African warplanes destroyed two Angolan villages.

Angola charged South Africa had massed 45,000 troops in South-West Africa, the disputed territory between the two countries, and was preparing to occupy part of southern Angola.

Botha in a report Wednesday to the House of Assembly acknowledged that South Africa had launched a "two-pronged" attack but said the targets were SWAPO guerrillas and the Angolan bases from which they raid into their homeland.

The prime minister said Angola's charge of a large-scale invasion was "not only exaggerated, but an absolute misrepresentation of the real state of af-



A tiny current of electricity is put into the nerve higher up in the arm. The time it takes for that current to get to the hand can be measured. If takes longer than it should, the

Hush-Hush plans

WASHINGTON - The Central Intelligence Agency is quietly returning to its old ways of stirring up secret mischief abroad. But because its own covert capabilities have been dismantled, the CIA is using foreign forces, some of them of dubious reliability, to carry out its clandestine activity.

Of course, the CIA is keeping these plans hush-hush. But intelligence reports indicate that the intended victims usually are the first to learn about covert activities directed against them. The CIA may have acknowledged

the real reason for concealing its change of tactics from the American people. A top-secret planning document warns that openness "could panic an American public which has not yet recovered from the Vietnam morning-after syndrome.'

CIA strategists are actively planning undercover interestions in-cooperation with such countries as Egypt, Israel, Turkey, Pakistan. Guatemala, South Africa, South Korea and Communist China.

Some of these projects are already in the works. Through Egypt, for example, the CIA is funneling covert support to the rebels in Afghanistan emigres commando training again,

and is preparing covert operations against Libya. Both Egypt and Turkey will be used to mount operations against Ayatollah Khomeini in Iran.

Through China, the CIA is even supporting the jungle forces of the murderous Pol Pot in Cambodia. In Guatemala, the CIA has arranged for secret training in the

finer points of assassination. This has

been provided through Cuban emigre groups, with the CIA keeping a low The Guatemalan assassins intend to use their new skills against Cuban "revolutionary agents" — theoretically, at least. But unfortunately, the Guatemalan government takes a

broad view of who should be classified

as a "revolutionary agent." This could be almost anyone who opposes the ruling regime. The assassination program is directed, according to intelligence sources, out of an office in the presidential palace. The victims have included health workers who merely agitated against the distribution of baby-food formula that, in some places, is mixed with

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: I have been a Christian for many years, but I am facing some serious surgery very soon. Suddenly I find I am frightened at the thought of death. I know this should not be. but how can I cope with this? -Mrs. W.P.

DEAR MRS. W.P.: I hope that you will not think that I am being insensitive to you in what I am about to say, but I feel your question might be very helpful to someone who is reading this column and yet who may not be in your particular situation right now.

The time for you to prepare for your present crisis should have been many years ago - during all the years, in fact, that you have been a Christian. Your letter (of which I have only quoted a part here) suggests that you have been content to go to church although not as regularly as you might have done - but that you have not grown as much spiritually as you

You have apparently never taken time to read God's Word regularly, nor have you learned the discipline of consistent and believing prayer. Now

that you are facing a time of crisis you have discovered that you do not have the spiritual resources to draw upon resources you should have been developing ever since you came to know Christ.

That is why I say your question could be used to warn someone else a person who (like you have been in the past) is presently content to leave Jesus Christ on the fringes of your life. The time to gain strength for a crisis is now, not when a crisis crashes upon

Having said that, let me assure you, however, that God wants to use this time in your life to strengthen you spiritually, if you will let him. God loves you, and the proof of that love is that Jesus Christ was willing to die for you. And because he died for you, you

WATCH ON WASTE: The United States is heading for a trillion-dollar defense budget, but the Pentagon is still wasting billions of the taxpayers' money. One reason is that the military big spenders like to award contracts without competitive bidding.

This method of procurement which flies in the face of good old American free enterprise - is obviously a lot easier on the generals and admirals charged with making the decisions. But it also can cost the government big bucks. Investigators fo the General Accounting Office recently reported a "worsening trend in non-competitive procurement.'

Out of \$62 billion worth of defense procurement contracts for fiscal 1979. nearly \$40 billion was awarded without competitive bidding. The GAO sleuths figured that as much as 25 percent could be saved if more contractors were required to submit competitive bids, as the law requires.



New drug may prevent hardening of arteries

BOSTON (AP) — High levels of cholesterol in the blood, which doctors say contribute to the deaths of hundreds of thousands of Americans yearly, may someday be controlled with a new medicine developed in Japan, researchers report.

So far, the experimental drug, called compactin, has been successfully tested on people who have an inherited disorder that produces high blood cholesterol and leads to premature heart disease.

Even though much more research remains to be done. doctors say the medicine may someday be useful for the millions of otherwise healthy people who have too much cholesterol in their blood.

Two experts who reviewed the Japanese research said the discovery of the new drug "assumes great importance.

The study was directed by Dr. Hiroshi Mabuchi at Kanazawa University School of Medicine in Japan and published in today's New England Journal of Medicine.

The doctors gave compactin to seven people with a condition called hypercholesterolemia. Such victims often have two or three times the usual levels of cholesterol in their blood. They are five times more likely than normal to have heart disease, which often appears when they are in their 40s.

The medicine lowered their blood levels of a form of cholesterol called low-density lipoprotein, or LDL, by 29

LDL causes fatty deposits on the blood vessels and makes them narrow and clog. This condition, called hardening of the arteries or atherosclerosis, contributes directly to the heart attacks and strokes that kill 800,000 Americans each year.

In an accompanying editorial, Drs. Michael S. Brown and Joseph L. Goldstein of the University of Texas Health Science Center wrote that compactin may help more than those with the genetic defect.

Cholesterol is an essential chemical that is used to make cell membranes and hormones. However, it is dangerous when too much circulates in the blood.







Stabler back with Oilers

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston Oiler quarterback Ken Stabler returned to workouts today with no apologies to his teammates for his 35-day retirement, but with a promise that it won't take him long to get ready to play

Stabler, 35, who doesn't try to downplay his love of the night life, said he presently weighed "about 210 or 212, but it's all liquids so ...it won't take me long to get ready."

The 11-year veteran shocked the Oilers July 23 by announcing his retirement without previous notice and then disappearing until he resurfaced Wednesday to sign a two-

Stabler said his retirement announcement was an honest statement and had nothing to do with trying to get more money. Therefore, Stabler didn't feel he owed anyone an apology for missing the rigors of training

'I don't think they deserve it," Stabler said. "Fred Bilenikoff (a former teammate) didn't call me and say he was going to retire. George Blanda didn't tell me he was going to retire and I didn't expect it.

'You go out and play and try to win. That's all you ask of a player is to try to win. Thats the only thing you owe is to play as hard as you can everyday.

Although Stabler missed virtually the entire Oiler preseason training camp and will return to a newly installed offense, Head Coach Ed Biles doesn't think it will take Stabler long to get back in the groove.

'This is the answer to my dreams because I know things were set up with him in mind," said Biles, who revamped the Oilers conservative 1980 offense. "Our whole offense was predicated on what he (Stabler) could do along with the talents of the rest of the football team and now the guy that can do that is here.

Stabler said he had started to think about ending his retirement because "it was tougher to stay away than I thought." Stabler said Gifford Nielsen's injury last Saturday finalized his decision to return.

Nielsen, who had waited three seasons to get a shot at the starting job, suffered a shoulder injury in last Saturday's 27-17 loss to Tampa Bay and is out for at least three weeks.

'I think I retired and unretired a bunch of times but after Gifford got hurt I tink I decided to come back because there was a definite need," Stabler said.

Robinson was obtained from the New York Jets in Feb.1980 for the Broncos' first- and second-round draft choices and was immediately made the starting quarterback, but his performances were erratic and he lost the job after six games.

Steve Ovett sets new mile record that may not count

KOBLENZ, West Germany (AP) -Steve Ovett, the tempermental Britisher, broke the world mile record with a time of 3 minutes, 48.40 seconds – but will it count?

Wednesday night, after the 25-yearold Olympic 800-meter gold medalist had lowered the record of 3:48.53, set a week ago in Zurich, Switzerland, by his archrival and countryman, Sebastian Coe, there was some doubt that the mark would be accepted.

The International Amateur Athletic Federation, the world governing body for track and field, insists that any change in events must be included in the official program. Since Ovett had decided only Monday to switch from the 1.500 meters to the mile, the meet promoter did not have enough time to make the change

And since Ovett still was listed as competing in the 1,500 and no mile event was listed on the program, there is the possibility that the IAAF could reject the mark Ovett's last-minute decision left

several other competitors angry. Steve Scott of the United States, who had said earlier in the day that he would run the 1,500, found himself included in the mile field when he arrived at Rhine River Stadium. After



Council adopts 'austere' \$9.9 million budget

The Big Spring City Council adopted what City Manager Don Davis called an "austerity budget" of \$9.9 million for

fiscal 1981-82 at its meeting Tuesday night.

The council also passed a property tax hike to finance street improvements, and passed some flood control measures which will enable city residents to apply for

low-cost flood insurance. Both the tax hike and budget passage were subjected to brief public hearings before council members unanimously approved them. Two citizens showed up for the hearings and neither one addressed the council.

Municipal voters were foretold of the 15-cent tax rate hike back in December when they passed a \$2.3 million bond issue — \$1.1 million of which are slated for street

The city's property tax rate now stands at \$1.35 for each \$100 valuation, bringing the tax levy to \$2,349,687 for the

This compares with a levy of \$987,136 ten years ago and a 1971 tax rate of \$1.40 per \$100 valuation, according to

statistics contained within the 1981-82 budget. The budget, which Davis worked on over the summer with the council, establishes nearly \$10 million in expenditures for the fiscal year beginning October 1.

It is, as Davis pointed out, a budget marked by stable revenues and escalating costs, necessitating some cut-

backs, most notably in the area of capital outlays. It also is a budget whose various component funds will reach the end of the fiscal year with smaller reserves than

they began the year with — "which means, in essence, we're operating in the red," Davis said. "Obviously you can't continue that way," Davis told The Herald. "The old well's going to run dry at some point

in time." To prevent this, the city would have to either cut back on expenditures or find ways to increase revenues. The budget will "need close monitoring during the year," Davis told the council, suggesting a special council

session might be held at the end of the first quarter to study the budget's progress. Davis closed his budget presentation to the council by saluting the council members' efforts to help him prepare the budget. He said the council had spent more time with

him in budget preparations than any other council he'd worked for. In other action, the council passed an ordinance delineating the flood-prone areas of the city and stating what construction precautions must be taken by homeowners in the flood-prone areas. With the passage of the

ordinance, homeowners become eligible to apply for lowcost flood insurance.

Community Development Director Bill Hall explained to the council that the flood program is based on a 100-year flood probability for Beals Creek and Big Spring Draw the city's two sources of flood hazard during periods of

It's not known how many people live in the flood-prone areas, or how many have elected to pursue the low-cost insurance, but the insurance will be available for all

homeowners in Big Spring, Hall told The Herald. He said standard insurance rates were applicable prior to Tuesday night's passage of the flood ordinance, and when the ordinance goes into effect (it must be voted on twice, as must all laws) homeowners can purchase flood insurance for premiums averaging about 25 cents per \$100

property valuation In order to qualify, however, homeowners in the flood hazard area must follow strict construction guidelines which essentially are designed to restrict building in the flood areas, said Hall.

The city incurs no liability for any flood damages suffered by persons following the guidelines in order to get the insurance, according to a provision of the ordinance. Hall pointed out that only twice in the last 100 years have flood waters risen to encompass residential areas in 1902 and 1957

Other action taken by the council included:

Approving, in a private executive session, the hiring of Dick Wagner & Associates of Roswell, N.M., to prepare with Don Cress & Associates a master plan for the Industrial Park-municipal airport area. Cress will design the airport's new layout, which has been brought about by the expansion of O.I.L. at the adjacent Industrial Park. Wagner will design the proposed expansion of the park along the north side of the airport property. Both firms will receive a \$3,600 fee.

Hearing from the city manager that the city has a 'phenomenal" refund rate for its workman's compensation plan. Davis told the council he recently had been handed a check for \$106,371 from Jim Parks of Parks Agency — a check that brings the city's three-year refund total (it operates under a three-year plan) to \$175,822. Premiums paid by the city for its nearly 300 employees over that same period totalled \$324,910, making the city's net cost \$149,088 or an average of \$49,696 per year

Davis attributed the low cost to a "tremendous safety program which has reduced on-the-job accidents to vir-

Staff Writer Troubles with the electronic sign on the Howard College campus "don't lie in the installation" of the sign, said Grady Elder, owner of the Tri-Plex

Sign Company in San Angelo. Elder's company constructed the sign on the campus earlier this year. The sign has been plagued with problems since its installation. Elder contacted The Herald today to offer a

defense of his company. The sign was ordered from Data-Tronic Controls, a company out of Dallas, said Elder. The Data-Tronic company "is no rinky-dink deal."

Data-Tronic provides electronic signs which are constructed across the country, said Elder

Elder explained that "the sign is highly complex. It has more than 2,000 bulbs in it, and is a three-sided, double-faced information center. I have other signs like it (in this area) and they all require quite a bit of maintenance.

Members of the Howard County Junior College District board of trustees, during their meeting last week, expressed disappointment with the sign, and said they felt the sign should not be paid off until it is in perfect working order.

Elder told The Herald today that "I heard the board was not complimentary" about the sign. "In the last 45 days" he said, "I didn't receive

a phone call from Howard College.' He added "I tried to call them on numerous occasions. (Monday) I got Mike Bruner, and he was pretty sympathetic" about troubles with the

Elder said Bruner, who is district vice-president for fiscal affairs, seemed "to understand that the sign requires quite a bit of maintenance. Elder maintains that problems with

the sign are not the fault of his company. "Anybody who knows computers" would expect troubles, said Elder, adding that problems with this particular sign could be compounded by the fact that it is outdoors, and subject to wind and rain

Elder added that his company "bent over backwards to make the sign work

The sign did have serious problems when it was first installed, said Elder. "We had to re-dig the cable, and replace the driver unit of the sign." He added Tri-Plex employees

were down (in Big Spring) every day" for more than two weeks In addition to the 2,000 bulbs, the

sign has "1,000 switches in it." The switches are responsible for a light staying on in the system all of the time, a problem that the board of trustees pointed out during last week's meeting.

"I doubt seriously that the sign will

work" perfectly, said Elder today. Dr. Charles Hays, president of the Howard County Junior College District, told The Herald today "all

the problems have not been resolved' with the sign, but added he anticipated everything would be settled





Texas court to decide soon on House redistricting plan

Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau - The Texas Supreme Court promised Tuesday to rule within a week on the constitutionality of the 1981 House redistricting plan — one that opponents say needlessly splits county lines across the state, including the West Texas county of El Paso

The State Redistricting Board, which apparently would take on the job of modifying the split counties should the plan be declared unconstitutional, plans to hold organizational meetings Sunday afternoon and Monday

Board members already are charged with redrawing district lines for Senate seats because of a gubernatorial

Action by that board would have to come within 60 days of its first meeting, and Chief Justice Joe Greenhill indicated the court is well aware of the need for a quick

He also said Justice Franklin Spears, who missed the hearing after being admitted to the hospital with chest pains, plans to listen to a tape of the arguments and likely will be involved in the court's decision.

During the two-hour hearing, opponents to the redistricting plan painted the legislature as one that 'picks and chooses' in some illogical manner which counties it wants to split.

They noted that District Judge Harley Clark ruled in July that 12 of the 34 counties split by the plan were split

One of the most tangible signs of growing citizen involvement and interest in their government is the increasing volume of mail I receive from my fellow Texans. In recent months, I have received approximately 5,000 letters a week — plus mass-produced post cards which are part of organized mail campaigns.

I welcome both expressions of opinion, and requests for help in areas in which I am able to provide assistance. Letters are among the best means for me to keep in touch with your views. And, of course, a major part of my job is helping my constituents with federal problems.

Often, I become aware of strong opposition or support among Texans on a particular legislative issue, and I take those views seriously as I examine legislation.

Concerning problems my constituents are having with the federal bureaucracy, I am able to assist in making sure the right person has received all of the relevant information — and that the matter is receiving timely consideration. These requests for help range from retired persons whose Social Security checks have been delayed to military service members who need hardship discharges to cities apilying to federal agencies for grants. Unfortunately, I cannot order a federal agency to decide in someone's favor, but I can make sure it gives careful and full consideration.

In addition, I receive requests for military academy appointments, flags flown over the Capitol, and information about pending legislation.

All of these areas, as well as other federal-related questions, fall within my Senate responsibilities. But my jurisdiction does not extend to state or local matters. Nor am I able to give personal, legal or financial advice.

There are some things you can do to make it easier for me and my staff to answer your letters. If possible, all letters should be typed or printed neatly in ink. If you letter is not legible, we cannot help you. In addition, please include your name and return address on both the envelope and the letter. Often telegrams and mailgrams do not include a complete return address, and that makes response difficult

When discussing pending legislation, please describe the bill. If you know the bill number, that is helpful information.

Those counties include Nueces, Bexar and Webb counties in South Texas; Erath, Cooke, Tarrant and Dallas in North Texas; El Paso in West Texas: Corvell in Central Texas; Potter and Gregg in East Texas; and Harris in Southeast Texas.

Proponents, however, all but called the latest redistricting effort the best "balancing act" this side of the Ringling Brothers-Barnum & Bailey Circus especially in light of the need to meet requirements of the Texas Constitution, the federal Voting Rights Act and the federal court mandate of one-man, one-vote

"I believe history will prove that the 67th Legislature did a fantastic job," said assistant Attorney General Rick

Gray.

Despite such assessments, three state representatives and six others filed suit early this summer in an Austin district court seeking to have the plan thrown out.

Clark did just that on July 11, prompting the state to appeal to the Supreme Court.

In arguments before the Supreme Court, Austin attorney David Richards, representing the opponents of the plan, argued that his group's theory of how to approach redistricting "would require that you first take the state constitution and consider it seriously

To take it seriously, he said, would be to do everything possible to keep counties intact, while at the same time insuring equal representation and no dilution of minority

That was not done in El Paso, Erath and many other counties, Richards said.

Although Judge Clark's July ruling did not directly apply to the immediate Abilene area, a ripple effect from El Paso, Erath, Potter and Tarrant counties might cause some changes that could affect the Big Country districts.

Steve Bickerstaff, attorney representing the House redistricting committee and the state, said the legislature made a good-faith effort that should be judged in a rational manner

Any attempt by the courts to make the legislature prove that each and every county split was the only one possible would present an "unworkable" situation and be an unnecessary intrustion into the legislative process,



Berlin Wall still awesome after 20 years

National Geographic News Service WASHINGTON — Early on the morning of Aug. 13, 1961, barbed wire was strung along the 29-mile border between East and West Berlin, severing the last remaining free passage between the Soviet Bloc and the West. The Berlin Wall was born.

The wall sealed off what was once an open boundary dividing Soviet-occupied East Berlin from the French. British, and American sectors comprising West Berlin. Overnight, 800,000 West Berliners were separated from close relatives, and more than 85,000 workers, primarily East Berliners, were cut off from their jobs Money Drain Plugged

Though called the "anti-fascist protective barrier" by the East German government, the reasons for the wall were more economic than political. Since the East German state was established in 1949, almost 3 million East Germans (about 15 percent of the population) had fled to the West, most of them through West Berlin. Shortly before the construction of the wall, the refugee stream into West Berlin had reached 2,000 people a day

The loss of these people, many of them skilled workers and professionals, had placed a severe strain on the East German economy

The construction of the wall reduced the flow of East Germans to the West drastically. With its manpower drain halted, East Germany recovered remarkably and is today the most prosperous state in the communist world. East Berlin, its capital, is a showcase city attracting tourists from around the Eastern Bloc. For the East the wall has been a true success

Nevertheless, thousands of East Germans have attempted to escape over the wall or across the "death strip' that has surrounded the rest of West Berlin since the late 1940s. Nearly 40,000, including more than 500 East German troops, have successfully crossed since 1961. More than 70 have been killed trying to escape; thousands of others have been arrested by East German police.

Today successful crossings are rare; one occurred last year when two men hustled over the wall using a step-

Security Now Massive The odds against such an escape are enormous. What was once a barbed wire barrier, replaced a few days later by an ugly cinder block and wire affair, has developed over the years into an awesome security complex built to foil the most ingenious escape attempts.

Viewed from tourist observation stands in West Berlin, the wall presents a terrifying spectacle. Covered with derogatory graffiti and decorated with memorials to those killed while trying to escape, a 10-foot-high concrete wall stands on the border of West Berlin, topped by a thick pipe designed to thwart a grappling book

Stretching behind it is a no-man's land about 10 to 50 yards wide of tank traps, anti-car trenches, spike beds, attack dogs, electric fences, trip alarms, floodlights, soldiers in observation towers, and still another wall. Listening devices prevent tunneling.

A similar security system now surrounds most of West Berlin, replacing most of the former barbed wire or wiremesh death strip. A few highly guarded inspection stations, including Checkpoint C, better known as Checkpoint Charlie, provide the only access today between East

Although other West Germans, and foreigners, were allowed to pass through these checkpoints from the wall's inception, visits by West Berliners to East Berlin were severely restricted for over a decade.

In 1971, however, a package of agreements between the four powers that have occupied Berlin since World War II the Soviet Union, France, Great Britain, and the United States — improved the situation somewhat. In return for the West's recognition of the East German state, the Soviets agreed, among other things, to allow West Berliners 30 days' visitation in East Berlin a year.

The checkpoints soon became the scene of thousands of emotional reunions, as west Berliners streamed through to greet long-unseen relatives and friends in East Berlin. Visiting Limited

But traffic through the checkpoints has been curtailed since last winter, when the East Germans quadrupled the amount of money Westerners must spend the eliminated exemptions for old-age pensioners and children.

The increased exchange requirements have added to the strain of life for West Berlin's 1.9 million people (compared with 1.1 million in East Berlin). The unsettling presence of more than 500,000 Warsaw Pact troops within 20 miles, coupled with the cramped feeling caused by the city's insular situation, has caused thousands of West Berliners, particularly families with children, to migrate to other areas of West Germany.

With 23 percent of the population now age 65 or older, the population of West Berlin seems destined to drop even more in the future. But despite this decline and reliance on

remains an important symbol of resistance against Soviet expansion. Most world leaders and West Berliners agree that the city must not be allowed to die on the vine and fall






