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Deportation hearings for Haitian refugees halted

Deportation hearings for the Haitians detained in the Big Spring Federal Prison Camp were halted today after a lawsuit blocking the hearings was filed in Miami, Fla., federal court Wednesday night.

Claiming the Haitian refugees in Big Spring and three other detention facilities around the country weren't getting adequate legal help, the Haitian Refugee Center obtained a 10day restraining order blocking the

An Immigration and Naturalization Service attorney, who asked that he

not be identified, said the hearings for the Big Spring detainees were about halfway through the preliminary stage. It wasn't known how far the hearings at the other camps had progressed.

A Midland-based legal service which had announced its intention to represent the Big Spring Haitians notified the INS last week that it was pulling out of the case, the INS attorney said. He said the firm, West Texas Legal Services, had intended to represent about half the refugees. It wasn't clear if the firm's withdrawal from the case was part of the cause for the lawsuit

A spokesman for West Texas Legal Services was called several times this morning by The Herald but could not be reached to confirm whether it had dropped out of the case.

Asked if he felt the charge that the Haitians weren't getting adequate representation was applicable to the local deportation hearings, the INS attorney said he thought the West Texas Legal Service attornies "were

He said translations of the hearings into Creole by an INS interpreter were "adequate." Most of the Haitians all of them males — speak Creole.

The INS attorney said West Texas

Legal Services "notified me personally last Thursday, I believe,' that the firm was no longer interested in representing the Haitians.

He said that without the temporary restraining order it would have been business as usual today as the INS sought to complete preliminary proceedings against the rest of the

In the preliminary phase they are advised of their rights and asked if they want an attorney. All who have undergone the first phase so far have asked for an attorney, according to

The second phase of the hearings

will determine the merits of the refugees' request to stay in America. The INS attorney said the government should have started on that phase by the third week of September.

It's not known just how long the lawsuit will hold up the hearings. The Associated Press reports that the American Civil Liberties Union is seeking a permanent injunction to halt the hearings until a more equitable procedure of hearings can be worked out.

Had things gone as scheduled, it's expected that some of the refugees would have based their request to stay

County tax board approves

Any request by the refugees for asylum due to political repression in their homeland would have to be evaluated by the State Department, said the INS attorney. The State Department then sends back an "advisory opinion" on whether the Haitians fled their Caribbean island homeland because of political tur-

Most of them have claimed they came to the U.S. because they couldn't find jobs in Haiti.

All told, about 800 Haitians are affected by the lawsuit, according to

A 1982 operating budget of \$373,470 was approved by members of the Howard County Consolidated Tax Appraisal District board during their meeting Wednesday.

The 1982 budget is 10.61 percent lower than the 1981 budget of \$417,788, according to Gene Pereira, chief tax appraiser for the county.

Roy Watkins, president of the board, told those present that the 1982 budget may seem "like a lot of money, but we've really come a long way since last year.

He added, concerning Pereira, 'we've hired as fine a man as could be had, and that's going to be a benefit."

A break-down of the 1982 budget shows \$209,119 alloted for salaries; \$23,597 for benefits; \$20,936.57 for auto allowance; \$29,850 for office operation; \$1,600 for office equipment; and \$12,000 for computer costs.

Other costs are \$58,725 for an oil and gas appraisal; \$1,500 for a board of review; and \$16,142 for contingencies.

Board members discussed the appraisal office report as submitted by Pereira and Ruth Mitchel of the tax appraisal office. Pereira told those present that his appraisers, who are out in the county now re-appraising property, "have the right to go into and check personal property" such as homes, but that the appraisers were

Jack Watkins, board member, said that right, certified by a constitutional amendment "won't last long," calling it "an invasion of privacy.

Texas, Big Spring register plunge in gasoline prices

Gasoline prices in Texas have plummeted by as much as 31/2 cents per gallon since July 4 to reach their lowest level since prices were decontrolled last January, according to a survey conducted by the American Automobile Association.

Triple-A surveys have shown gasoline prices declining each month since March and the latest survey found gasoline selling for as little as \$1.14 per gallon at a number of stations, and no station was charging. as much as \$1.50 a gallon for any grade of gasoline.

Here in Big Spring a random sampling of stations showed prices to be average in relation to other Texas cities. Current full-service prices in Big Spring for gasoline are: \$1.32 for regular and \$1.36 for unleaded. Self-

service prices are: \$1.23 for regular and \$1.27 for unleaded. A few local stations were selling regular at \$1.20.

Not enough premium grade gasoline was sold in Big Spring to be included in the survey

The average prices for full-service gasoline in other Texas cities are: \$1.33 for regular and \$1.38 for unleaded. Average self-service prices are: \$1.21 for regular and \$1.29 for unlead

A spokesman for Exxon in Dallas said the overall supply of gasoline should remain adequate for current

The spokesman said people are driving less and the fleet of cars now on the road is getting better mileage and both factors serve to decrease demand for gasoline which keeps the price down

Walesa gains confidence vote from polish workers

GDANSK, Poland (AP) - Solidarity leader Lech Walesa today urged his independent union to be "fast, operative and a little dictatorial," and won a crucial rote of confidence from increasingly defiant delegates to the labor federation's first national congress.

Meanwhile, Poland's communist regime attacked Solidarity anew, declaring "a political fight is going on. It is between those who want to refresh the structures of socialism...and those who reject cocialism, trying step-by-step, institution-by-institution to take over authority

Walesa told the delegates before the vote: "I am in the union to win battles and not to lose them. But if we do not have a strong leadership, we shall be losing

Walesa's reference to Solidarity being "a little dictatorial" was aimed at unionists demanding im-

"Perhaps in four years we can get to democracy, but not now," he said. "Not now when we have a big fight for our existence and the nation's good ahead.'



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More time, money to be spent on redistricting

By JIM DAVIS

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Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau AUSTIN - If Texans graded the legislature on the effectiveness of 1981 redistricting, they probably would be generous in giving a D-minus.

After months of work and hundreds of thousands of dollars in cost, the redistricting process still is one-third complete. In reality, even that assessment may be

Only the plan for redrawing congressional district lines for the 1980s is standing today, and the legislature required a special session to produce it. Forces are at work to knock that plan flat as soon as possible.

The legislature's other two redistricting jobs, involving its own two Houses, are as dead as a Capitol grounds squirrel hit by a limousine.

Gov. Bill Clements vetoed the Senate's plan because he didn't like the way urban counties were cut to give needed population to rural Democratic senators. The Texas Supreme Court said the new House of Representatives boundaries cut too many county lines in violation of the State Constitution.

The result: two dead plans and more time and more money to be spent on redistricting, but now by a fivemember State Redistricting Board rather than by the legislature.

That board began work last week with less than a flying start, putting off any further meetings until public hearings to begin Sept. 23. Its plans for the two legislative

houses must be completed by Oct. 28. As with the legislature's redistricting process, the board's public hearings probably will be mere window dressing for the behind-the-scenes work that will produce new district boundaries.

Rumors already abound about secret plans being prepared by the board's five members - Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, chairman, House Speaker Bill Clayton, Attorney General Mark White, Comptroller Bob Bullock and Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong.

Speaker Clayton has entertained representatives in a steady flow through his Capitol office in recent days, but he denies that he's seeking support for a particular plan. "I don't have a plan drawn," Clayton told a reporter when pressed on the issue last week.

Comptroller Bullock commented at a board meeting that he had a plan handy, but it's impossible to tell when he's joking.

Bullock actually has numerous plans to choose from,

since his staff has been working on redistricting the past

Even before the ink dried on proposals of the legislature last spring he pinpointed problems that would come back to haunt the plans later.

With a record of being right, his agency's own computer system to provide information and his own redistricting consultant, Bullock could be a power on the board if the other members take him seriously as the exercises his caustic humor and sharp tongue.

Land Commissioner Armstrong is the only member with previous board experience, having served during a similar redistricting dilemma.

He says the principal difference he notices between the two times is the current attention to protecting incum-

"This time everything is pervaded with the idea that 'This is George's district' and 'That is Mary Sue's

district," Armstrong says Others have pointed out that such protective considerations plagued the efforts of the politically oriented legislature to draw new congressional and legislative

Disagreement over which incumbent members of

Congress should be protected led to the legislative stale mate last spring that produced the special summer session

Cutting up urban counties to prevent the pairing of rural incumbents in the same districts led to the governor's veto of the Senate plan and to the Supreme Court's order against the House plan.

Of the redistricting board members, Hobby, who presides over the Senate, and Clayton have demonstrated strong desires to protect friends in each of their legislative

Favoring incumbents is not prohibited per se. Courts have indicated that political considerations are allowed as long as they do not cause violation of other criteria, such as equal propulation distribution and protection of minority rights

The problem comes in judging whether all the criteria have been met. Even after a district judge and all nine members of the Texas Supreme Court ruled against the House redistricting plan, Clayton defended it.

This sort of judgmental quagmire almost assures that whateve plans the board adopt will be challenged in court

Budget shortfall seen \$23 billion above goal

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan's embattled economic program is receiving another jolt — a forecast from congressional economists that the budget shortfall for next year will be nearly \$23 billion above Reagan's target of \$42.5

The report from the Congressional Budget Office also predicts that in 1984, the year for which Reagan has promised a balanced budget, there will be a \$50 billion deficit.

The budget office provides independent budget data for Congress. The report was being presented today at a meeting of the House Budget Committee.

While indicating a gradual decline in budget deficits over the next several years, the report said "that budget balance will not be attained by 1984 unless the proposed growth of defense spending is curtailed, nondefense spending is scaled back even further or increases in revenues are

Meanwhile, the report included an economic forecast predicting "substantial improvement in the economy compared with the lackluster performance of recent Nevertheless, the report said, "CBO is not

as optimistic as the administration. Although Congress enacted record budget- and tax-cutting packages before its August recess, interest rates have remained high, threatening to push the federal budget deficit well beyond Reagan's target of \$42.5 billion for 1982 and wipe out hopes of the balanced budget the president promised for

That has sent administration officials searching for additional budget cuts in order to hold down spending


During a White House meeting Wednesday to consider ways to cut the defense budget, Reagan said a 1982 deficit of \$42.5 billion is "manageable and we can do it."

"We're determined we're going to come in at 42.5." Reagan said.

Reagan also commented on a proposal by Republican congressional leaders for legislation that would give Reagan limited authority to impound - that is, not spend money that Congress had voted to spend. He called the impoundment proposal

'very interesting. "I think I can be very helpful," he said.



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

DEAR DR. GRAHAM: I have recently joined a church which observes the Lord's Supper fairly frequently. What do you think is the real meaning of the Lord's Supper? - Mrs. S.F.

DEAR MRS S.F. There have been differences between Christians of various backgrounds about the exact meaning of the Lord's Supper, and it would not be possible for me to go into too much detail about some of these. Nevertheless. I think there are several important things we can say which are underlined in the Bible and which all Bible-believing Christians would say

In the first place, whenever we commemorate the Lord's Supper it should always remind us of the depth of our sin. All too often today we take sin lightly, or even try to explain it away. But God does not take it lightly! Sin is an offense to God, and it has caused us to be separated from God and his blessings.

She doesn't have menstrual period

Dear Dr. Donohue: I am a 24-yearold woman who has been told by my doctor that I am in excellent physical shape and good health, but I suffer from what is, I believe, termed amenorrhea - no menustral periods. I have had this problem for approximately two and a half years, since I seriously began working with weights, running daily, and dieting.

Not that the conditions really bothers me, but I do have one question: My husband and I would like to start a family in the near future, and we wonder what my chances of pregnancy are. Does amenorrhea mean I don't ovulate? We do use birth control (not the Pill), so there's no way of knowing whether I have been fertile or not over the last two years. Please explain the condition, and how it affects chances of pregnancy. — P.L.

The absence of menustral periods has many possible causes. I can tell you, though, that it is possible not to menustrate and still be ovulating. That would be a case in which there is a problem with the uterus itself.

I can take a guess as to the cause of vour amenorrhea. Remember, it's only a guess. A woman must have a certain amount of body fat to ovulate and menustrate. Many female athletes, who are low in body fat, become amenorrheic and it is usually but not always associated with no ovulation. Your heavy exercise along with what might be too stringent a die can combine to create such amenorrhea. When body fat is regained, menustration and ovulation is resumed. Authorites doubt that permanent infertility results from a loss of body fat.

I cannot leave you with a mere guess. Let me give you a couple of other possible causes. The pituitary gland, at the base of the brain, can be a source of the problem. Often this

amenorrhea is accompanied by the secretion of breast milk. Or your ovaries may not be making enough estrogen. These conditions can be tested for relatively easily. Whether or not you were planning on having a family, I would advise an examination to learn the exact reason for your lack of menustral periods

Dear Dr. Donohue: Phenylpropanolamine seems to be everywhere, not only as a diet aid, but in cold relief medicines as well. What is its function when used in cold medicines? In view of its widespread usage as a diet aid, your valued opinion on the subject would be most timely and welcome. - Mrs. K.L.

I know what you mean. It does seem be everywhere. Phenlypropanolamine is one of the members of a family of drugs that makes blood vessels constrict. That's the basis of its use in cold medicine; as a blood

leakage of congesting fluids The drug is also related to the amphetamines. I feel it is better to lose weight by sensible dieting and exercise, and in fact, the phenlypropanolamine preparations are recommended for use only with such a broad plan for weight loss. I'll give you the opinion of a respected clinical pharmacist, Dr. John Mitchell, who is with a large urban hospital. He disapproves of its use for dieting and warns those with heart disease to be especially careful with

The drug can cause the heart to beat peculiarly in those with a background of heart disease. There are dozens of medicines that contain phenypropanolamine. 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'Young love at it truest'

1937 Miss America didn't want the honor, but found romance

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Young Bette Cooper was too tender and too terrified to be Miss America. Dashing Lou Off was the handsome gallant who stole her away only hours after she was crowned.

Friends still say it was young love at its truest. But it is a love lost and, 44 years later, a graying Lou Off recalls with a smile, "Yes, she was a gem and I admired

"Who wouldn't be interested in a young girl like Bette and who couldn't fall in love with Miss America?" he said in an interview. "But I don't think Bette and I ever could have... Besides, I haven't the slightest idea where she's

In September 1937, Bette and Lou were an item, all

Bette was 17, a blue-eyed blonde who became Miss America "on a lark." Lou was the son of a prominent hotelman, a 22-year-old man-about-town who owned a biplane and a cabin cruiser and quickly became Bette's 'first fancy.

But Bette never wanted to be Miss America and shortly before dawn on the first morning of her reign, she called Lou in tears, begging him to drive her home to rural

Lou spirited her away to his boat and anchored just offshore for 14 hours as angry pageant officials and state troopers scoured the New Jersey countryside for the "missing Miss America" and her new beau.

Lou Off, now 66, is happily married and a successful businessman in nearby Linwood, growing lush orchids for New York City flower shops. His fling with Bette ended with World War II and he hasn't seen her for almost 30

Bette would be 61 now and her whereabouts are unknown. Six years ago, she was living quietly in Greenwich, Conn., a widow named Elizabeth C. Moore. But today, reporters, Miss America officials, even her alma mater - Centenary College in northern Jersey cannot locate her.

That long-ago summer, teen-ager Bette visited an amusement park with girlfriends and entered its beauty contest on their dare. She unexpectedly found herself the Miss Bertrand Island" entry in the Miss America

Lou was one of many local young men assigned to escort contestants during pageant week, a pleasant chore that included dancing every night on the Steel Pier.

Bette fell in love. Her father, the late Le Brun Cooper, a state highway engineer, remarked then that Lou was Bette's "first fancy and an awfully nice young fellow."

Judge orders execution stay

HOUSTON (AP) — A federal judge has delayed the execution of Rudy Ramos Esquivel, who was scheduled to die Tuesday for his conviction in the 1978 shooting death of a Houston narcotics officer.

Esquivel, 44, was convicted of gunning down Timothy Hearn on June 8, 1978. Hearn and another officer had topped Esquivel for questioning.

The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals upheld the conviction in January 1980, and the U.S. Supreme Court turned down an appeal in November.

U.S. District Judge Woodrow Seals agreed Wednesday

Esquivel, who is a prisoner at the Texas Department of ('orrections' Ellis Unit in Huntsville, claims he was unable to obtain all the evidence he wanted to present at his capital murder trial.

Lou, too, was entranced. Hours before the Saturday finals, he and Bette took a drive and stopped at a nearby restaurant to chat.

'During lunch I asked her, 'Bette, what are you going to do if you win this thing tonight?' And she laughed and she said, 'Oh, that's just not possible.' And I said, 'Don't bet on it, Bette," he recalled.

"And I said, 'You realize, Bette, that if you become Miss America, I'm not going to be your Mister America. I'm not going to follow you around on your coattails.' I think that affected her.'

Bette's father said then that she was "very nervous from the excitement" by the time she sang "When the Poppies Bloom Again" to win the title on Sept. 11, 1937

About 2 a.m., the phone rang and it was Bette," Lou remembered. "She was in tears and she said, 'I want to see you. I don't want any part of it.' And I said, 'If you don't want it, you don't have to have it."

With the blessing of her parents, Lou and two buddies smuggled Bette from her hotel and sailed his boat into the Atlantic, anchoring a half-mile off the Steel Pier.

"I figured the boat was the safest place to be. They

couldn't search the ocean," he said. Bette slept soundly below as her guardians fished and watched the commotion on the pier, where pageant officials, photographers and the paying public ever more anxiously awaited the first public appearance of the new Miss America.

She never showed. Police began a state-wide search. Shortly before sunset, Lou brought Bette ashore. As they drove through the New Jersey mountains toward her home, the sweethearts heard Walter Winchell pronounce them married.

'Well, that was one time Walter Winchell was wrong,' he chuckled

Bette refused the pageant's prizes - a \$400-a-week vaudeville contract, a \$1,000 fur coat and an "airplane trip

to Hollywood for a 'deluxe' screen test.' Although pageant historians claim Bette Cooper was the only one of 54 Miss Americas to "abdicate" her title, Lou Off said she made several formal public appearances in New York — but only in his company

"Her father looked to me to take care of her and he trusted me with her anywhere," he said, explaining that he slept on the floors of her hotel room "for her protection" during public appearances.

"But I never took advantage of Bette," he said. "Oh, no, there was no hanky-panky. We cared for each other for a good many years. We were sort of comfortable together. Lou courted Bette for about three years, until they were separated when he enlisted as a Navy pilot and she took a sales job in Kentucky. Their last meeting was in 1952,

his wife. "I guess she found the life she wanted," he said. "I'm sure she looks back on the pageant as a dirty thing, a very objectionable thing. But it was a pity to see her so distressed when she should have been so happy.'



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Public exposure to radio frequency radiation rises

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — The coming of the communications age has caused the public's exposure to radio frequency radiation in an average American city to be 100 times greater than it was at the beginning of the 20th Century, a researcher says.

Dr. James Frazer, a specialist in roentgenolgy at the University of Texas Health Science Center, estimates that 8 microwatts per centimeter of radio frequency power is sailing invisibly through the air in an average city today, compared to ess than 1 percent of that amount at

the turn of the century.

These levels of "background radiation" could increase even more if proponents of space-age solar energy, normally thought of as a 'clean" source of power, have their

way, the scientist said. The effects of the radio frequency waves on humans are not clearly understood, Frazer said, and other than a minute rise in body temperature there is no evidence the

present levels affect health. Frazer, involved in such research since 1957, believes it would take 10,000 times 8 microwatts to cause visibly detrimental effects on health. but admits there is no consensus of opinion by the world's scientists.

Background radiation levels have caused public concern in recent years as the use of power lines, radar, microwave transmission towers, children's hand-held toy transmitters and CB (Citizen Band) transmitters has increased," said Frazer.

He is a member of a National Academy of Sciences panel reviewing the health impact of a proposed satellite system that would collect solar energy and beam it back to earth by microwave - a program that Frazer says would significantly increase background radiation levels.

It was first suggested in 1968 that the technology of the space program be used to capture perpetual sunlight

from space and send it to earth to replace oil and other fossil fuels as a source of power, and Frazer said the idea "was seriously proposed as a start program during the Carter

Although proponents of solar energy promote it as a clean one with no negative environmental or health consequences, Frazer notes that the method of transmitting solar energy from 60 satellites — microwaves are "less clean."

"In order to transmit the energy collected, each satellite's collected power would be beamed by microwave to a one-square-mile receiver on the ground. This process multiplied by 60 would raise the background radiation level in this country considerably."

Microwaves are considered the best way to send solar power because they lose less energy than other radio frequencies and would not heat the ionosphere as much as other frequencies, Frazer said.

During the Carter Administration, Frazer said scientists decided to go ahead with engineering feasibility studies, but said they wanted "to see long-term experiments" with several species of animals and "several engineering examinations of field distribution in man" before building the system.

"We're looking at the problem real careful," he said.

Frazer estimated that the rise in a human's body temperature brought on by an average 8 microwatts of radio frequency radiation would amount to 0.09 times 10 to the minus 6 degrees centigrade. "In other words, you'd never be able to measure it," he

"We do a lot of experiments at field levels of 1,000 to 10,000 times higher than that and there you can measure the temperature increase," he said.

"...There's no doubt about the fact that they're much, much less hazardous to human beings that ionizing x-rays and things like this," he said. "There's a new imaging technique that would allow you to make pictures of people with radio waves and be able to do this on almost a continual basis at field levels really not much greater than they're exposed to anyhow.

"So there is a lot of attraction to using that sort of thing for medical imaging, plus we can get very chemically specific information out of

And Frazier said unless you get to fields 10,000 times the ones he expects to be used for diagnostic purposes, he really doesn't see any health hazards.

Frazer planned to present some of his findings on diagnostic imaging and chemical interrogation with radio waves during a September meeting of the Association for Physics, Engineering and Biology in Medicine

Numerous tests have documented a small temperature increase in humans and other animals exposed to radio frequencies with amplitudes similar to those of television and FM (frequency modulated) radio stations. the researcher said, and total scientific literature on biological effects of radiowave and microwave transmissions now total more than 7,000 articles in nearly 20 countries.

But Frazer said no strong concensus exists among scientists about the health effects of background radiation in the environment.

The World Health Organization has a special panel trying to arrive at an international concensus, without much success, said Frazer. He added that number of private groups and federal agencies in the United States also are studying the issue.

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Collins furious about anti-busing failure

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. James Collins, R-Texas, says never in eight terms of Congress has he been blindsided like he was Wednesday in failing to get an antibusing amendment tacked onto an appropriations bill.

He accused the bill manager, Rep. Neal Smith, D-Iowa, of rushing through the final 16 pages of a 43-page bill and ignoring three amendments to call for final passage during a 2-minute span that Collins was talking to reporters just off the House floor.

'I wouldn't have thought it of Neal Smith," said a furious Collins after the late-afternoon flurry of action. The bill, providing appropriations for the State, Justice, Commerce and Judiciary departments, carried by a vote

"He didn't offer it (the anti-busing amendment). You'll have to ask him why," Smith said moments after the vote.

"We just proceeded in normal manner with the bill. Apparently some others were going to offer amendments and didn't," he added

Smith admitted he opposed Collins' amendment but denied he called for the vote to take advantage of the Dallas Republican's temporary absence from the floor. "There was nothing like that. I was opposed to it, yes. It would have carried overwhelmingly. It always has,"

Smith said. A similar amendment by Collins on June 19, to an authorization bill, carried by 265-122. But it was deleted

Collins was off the floor, telling reporters Charles Richards of the Associated Press and Mark Nelson of the Dallas Morning News why he'd just withdrawn only moments earlier an amendment regarding the Legal

"My main interest is the busing amendment, and I don't want to do anything that will affect that," Collins was explaining as a major reason he'd decided against pursuing the anti-Legal Services Corp. legislation in the face

of opposition. Precisely as he was saying that, the appropriations bill was being pushed through only feet from where he was standing, without his getting an opportunity to offer his

The move angered him so much he went immediately to the House press gallery to see if the two reporters had been put up to calling him from the floor.

The amendment he withdrew would have prevented lawyers for the Legal Service Corp. from representing anyone involved in a dispute with the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

Collins said he was persuaded by the argument of Smith that the latest changes in regulations provide ample protection against LSC lawyers representing illegal aliens and by the argument of Rep. Peter Rodino, D-N.J., that Collins' legislation would hinder low-income American citizens with passport or other problems with the INS.

Also a factor, he said, was the 272-122 vote in which the House had rejected an amendment by Rep. F. James Sensenbrenner Jr., R-Wis., to delete all funding for the LSC. He expected a greater anti-LSC vote, he said

"I'd been sitting in the House all afternoon waiting for it (his busing amendment) to come up, and they said it probably wouldn't until tomorrow," Collins said.

Police scare abductors; woman hostage released

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) — Kidnappers nesday morning who threatened to cut off the head of a woman they held for ransom became frightened when they learned police had been notified and released their hysterical hostage unharmed, officials said.

Carol Joy Smith, 20, the daughter of former state district judge Charles B. Smith was freed Wednesday morning about 15 hours after she was abducted by two men who threw a blanket over her head at a Galveston shopping center.

"She said they hauled her up three flights of stairs, tied her up, gagged her and threw her in a bathtub. We don't know much more because she is hysterical," said Galveston County Sheriff Joe Max Taylor.

He said authorities are seeking two men who in a series of telephone calls demanded \$20,000 ransom in \$50 bills, but released their hostage before any money was paid.

"They apparently got scared off and decided to abort it," said Galveston County Sheriff Joe Max Taylor.

Smith said his daughter overheard the kidnappers say, "There are pigs on the judge's tail.

Taylor said Smith followed telephoned instructions of the kidnappers and withdrew the \$20,000 in \$50 bills from his bank Wed-

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"They told me if they did not get the money they would cut her head off and deliver it to me." Smith said.

Smith was sent from place to place to await calls from the kidnappers at various pay telephones, including one near the Houston Astrodome, Taylor said. But before the kidnappers collected the money, Taylor said his men told him Smith his daughter had been freed

Taylor said she was released unharmed at a shopping center in Clear Lake, south of Houston, at about 11 a.m.

The kidnappers had stated in a gruff voice they would kill her and send her head back in a bucket" if Smith did not follow instructions, Taylor said.

The sheriff said the kidnappers allowed the woman to talk to her parents Wednesday morning and afterward Smith's wife, Joyce, telephoned authorities and reported the

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The St. Louis Cardinals have listed quarterback Jim Hart as "doubtful" for Sunday's game at Dallas even though everybody concedes the veteran has no chance of playing at

"If you can walk, you can maybe run," Sullivan 'And if you can run, there's a chance you can play. If he was laying in some hospital bed, we'd list him as definitely out.

The NFL has no quarrel with designation, said league spokesman Joe Brown.

"The other clubs, particularly Dallas, see 'doubtful' and have read about Hart," Brown said. 'They don't expect him to play.

"Of course if he throws for two touchdowns and 300 yards and you call back next week, that's when I'm going to be out to lunch." Brown added.

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
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
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Not everyone happy with oil boom

True or false: in an oil boom economy, everybody benefits.

False, according to representatives of several local businesses who met with Chamber of Commerce and city officials Tuesday afternoon.

Complaining they were losing workers to the oil industry, the owners and managers of several Big Spring area companies sought answers on what the city might do to solve their

The type of businesses affected by the problem appear to be small manufacturing outfits that employ skilled tradesmen such as machinists and welders - laborers who are in high demand by the 24-hour-a-day oil industry, an industry known for paying top wages

'It seems like the main topic of conversation these days is the lack of employees in town," said Harold Davis, chairman of the board of Gamco Industries, an educational supplies company. "We're all in this together. We all want to grow. But sometimes it seems that in the town ... smaller industries are overlooked." urgency of bringing new industry to

The reference was clear

'There's one item of talk you hear." Davis continued. "O.I.L. has 400 employees. They say they're going to have 2,000. That's great. But if they take them from the smaller businesses in town, they (the smaller businesses) will be in trouble.

"The people that are being hurt are the people that use welders and machinists. That's a skill that O.I.L. has great need of. That's a highpriority job in the Big Spring area," echoed John Taylor, owner of Taylor

Implement Co.

"I lost my last lathe operator to O.I.L. last week," complained Bob Michael, vice-president of Fiber Glass Systems. "You start out with people and bring them along and pay what you hope is a fair salary. Then somebody else comes along and offers more money — you just can't keep

"We need employees and we need resolved," he said

No one seemed to know. The key is to bring interest rates down so developers can borrow money and charge "affordable" rents - but when the rates come down is anybody's guess.

City Councilman Russ McEwen closed the meeting by telling the group he appreciated "your bringing this to our attention. So often we move forward full-speed with one mind-set

James Johnson of Southwest Tool and Supply Co. summed up the problem in two sentences: "There's

too much oil here. They can make too

much (money), too easy "If my employess get mad at me, they can go out and work on an oil rig," said Troy Fraser, owner of Fraser Industries, a pallet maker. We've seen more turnover in the last six months than in any other period." O.I.L. became such a hot topic

and earned the ire of some local businesses who employ the same type of skilled tradesmen as O.I.L. - after it asked the city for permission to more than double the space it rents at the city's industrial park — a move the city is indicating it will allow, even though it means the displacement of 14 park tenants as well as the rebuilding of the adjacent airport's hangar and terminals

Pay raise voted for city workers an optimism few industries except the oil industry can express in today's slumping economy, and those who find themselves unable to reap the sort of bonanza the energy industry is

The city has a budget for the coming fiscal year, a property tax hike and a raise in store for all city employees starting next month, due to some swift taking care of business by the Big Spring City Council at its Tuesday

The property tax hike and budget already had passed a required first vote late in August and there was little likelihood either one would meet opposition during Tuesday's second and final vote.

The raise for municipal employees underwent its first vote Tuesday and is expected to pass again the next time it comes before the council.

The raise offers at least an 8.3 percent increase to all employees, with some employees who had their positions reclassified receiving more than that, said City Manager Don Davis (see accompanying chart).

Davis explained the pay hike was necessary in order to put the city in a competitive position with the local job

In other matters, the council passed on second vote an ordinance delineating the flood-prone areas of the city and stating what construction precautions must be taken by homeowners in the flood-prone areas. With passage of the ordinance, all homeowners in the city become eligible to apply for low-cost flood insurance, according to Community Development Director Bill Hall.

Hall said the premiums would average about 25 cents per \$100 property valuation.

The city incurs no liability for flood damages suffered by persons following construction guidelines in order to get the insurance, according to a provision within the ordinance.

The council also gave Cosden Oil and Chemical Co. the go-ahead to lay some 13,000 feet of pipeline through city property at the airpark. Davis told the council the pipeline "wouldn't present any problems to us because of its location." Councilman Robert Fuller abstained from voting on the resolution because he works for Cosden.

In other business, the council approved recommending the Energas Co. that it shut off the gas to the Big Spring Federal Prison Camp since the city has had no luck getting an easement from the camp so the city can convey an easement for all the pipelines under and around the camp

City Attorney Elliott Mitchell explained that the city has sought since April, 1980, to obtain the easement from the prison.

Energas needs the easement in order to gain access to the gas pipelines under the city-owned airpark. The city has tried to convey the easements but has to convey an easement for the airpark. Without permission from the prison, whose pipes run through federal property, the city can't convey anything.

In other action, the council instructed city staffers to investigate the possibility of allowing some of the Big Spring Area Student Involvement Council (BASIC) members to sit in on city committees as non-voting

Colorado City rate set at

COLORADO CITY — The Colorado City Council set the 1981 tax rate at 42 cents per \$100 valuation at Tuesday night's regular meeting.

City Manager Brenda Tarter said the rate would produce a 3 percent tax increase in real dollars received by the city, but the changes in tax valuations brought about by the new state laws would mean a sharp in crease for home and land owners and a decrease in taxes for utilities and oil companies

"These new valuations will not benefit the city but will hurt the citizens of our community." she said. She said that the 3 percent increase in taxes will amount to \$5,142, making up a small part of the city's budgeted \$216,000.

Mayor Elmer Martin, a former

state legislator, said that in his opinion that equal valuation law had turned out to be one of the worst laws the legislature had ever passed.

The council also heard Gary Smith Abilene, a representative of Randolph-Gilreath and Associates, a company specializing in working for block grants for cities and towns in the West Texas area.

He told the council that his firm would make a survey of Colorado City's needs and prepare a preapplication for about \$200.

If the grant is received, Randolph-Gilreath will administer the grant Councilwoman Nina Crout asked Smith what the charges would be for this service, but Smith did not reply directly to the question

Councilmen will study the proposal and hear from City Attorney Pete McKinney before making a decision.

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
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
