Shaw, Monahans rep paired in same district

Staff Writer With less than eight hours to go before its midnight deadline, the Legislative Redistricting Board voted 4-1 Wednesday to adopt new House districts that includes the pairing of Reps. Larry Don Shaw, Big Spring Democrat and Jerry Cockerham, Monahans Republican.

The new plan will force Shaw to choose between running against Cockerham in a district that favors Cockerham or moving to a new district or not running for re-election.

The new district - District 69 - is composed of the following counties: Howard, Borden, Glasscock, Reagan, Upton, Crane, Winkler, Ward, Loving, Reeves, Jeff David, Hudspeth and Culberson.

Shaw retains Howard and Borden from his former district, while Cockerham retains Crane, Winkler, Ward, Loving and Reeves which tilts the district race in Cockerham's favor, according to Shaw.

According to reports from the Harte-Hanks Austin Bureau Shaw made an unsuccessful last-minute, behind the scenes effort to stave off being paired with Cockerham. He said the reason or the pairing was because he had remained independent of Speaker Billy Clayton's "team"

Shaw had told The Herald earlier he was confident that if Clayton's redistricting plan was accepted by the board it would not stand up in the courts. Shaw said he believes the plan violates the voting rights act.

Attorney General Mark White, a member of the redistricting board, said he believes both the House and Senate plans fulfill federal law.

The plan, as adopted, should allow for the election of at least three or four more black and brown legislators because of pro-minority requirements under the federal Voting Rights Act. Shaw said Howard County's com-

munity of interest goes north rather than west and he would have

preferred the pairing arranged for him by the Clayton team in last spring's regular legislative session.

That would have put him with Rep. Bill Heatly of Paducah, the Dean of the House with 28 years of service. But the Texas Supreme Court threw out the legislature's statewide plan for cutting across too many boundary lines. That ruling sent the House redistricting chore to the special five member board.

The legislative redistricting board was composed of Speaker Billy Clayton, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, Attorney General, Mark White, Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong and Comptroller Bob Bullock. Clayton and Bullock drafted two plans for the House. Clayton managed to garner support from three of the board members while Bullock remained loyal to his plan.

While Clayton's plan mostly paired incumbents who haven't been prominent members of his team during his four terms as speaker, he did have to put two friends together in the same district: Gary Thompson and Walter Grubbs, both Abilene Democrats.

Clayton wanted to pair Heatly and Foster Whaley of Pampa, but Attorney General White opposed pairing Heatly because of his long tenure. That forced Clayton to put

Capital improvement projects expected to get rolling soon

Capital improvement projects for the city of Big Spring should be under way in the near future as a result of action taken by the city council last night.

The council accepted the bid of an Odessa construction company to perform water and sewer projects included in the first phase of the city's five-year capital improvements program.

Councilmen learned, however, that bond revenue to be used to finance the sewer improvements will fall short of the cost of the improvements.

Bennett Reaves, an engineer with the Lubbock firm drafting the city's capital improvements program, told the council the city would fall about \$5,300 short in sewer

projects financing We suggest the city loan this amount to this project until the next sewer bonds are sold," Reaves said in a letter to the council.

A 15-inch sewer line project on Columbia was omitted from the contract to be signed with Clouse in order to trim the deficit on sewer projects down to \$5,300.

Each company submitted two bids for water works improvements in the Washington Place neighborhood, since the city has been exploring two possibilities for doing the work in that area: replacing faulty water lines in their existing easements behind the homes and relocating the lines to the streets in front of the homes.

After a public hearing in which Washington Place homeowners urged the council to repair the lines and leave them in place — even if it meant surrendering a foot or two of private property to an expanded easement - the council began to think in terms of the plan to leave the

lines in place. Clouse's bid for this alternative was \$254,289, compared with a \$295,307.50 bid from Panhandle Construction Co. of

Lubbock Formal consent from the approximately 125 property owners in Washington Place is expected to be obtained in two or three weeks, at which time the city hopes Clouse can begin construction work.

In other business, the council announced its intention to put to bid the lease rights for oil and gas production on about 400 acres of city property at Moss Creek Lake.

The council learned last month that the current lease with a Midland drilling concern was due to expire Oct. 26. The council was prepared to rush through a resolution announcing a new lease was being sought. But after Councilman Larry Miller remarked that Griffin and Burnett Inc. — the lease holder — might strike it rich in the closing weeks of their lease, the council decided to let the lease expire before it sought a renewal.

When the matter came up before the council last night, Miller also remarked that it made sense to include a requirement for specific drilling commitments in the bids submitted. Councilman Robert Fuller suggested the bids state drilling would begin within a certain time period, such as six months.

The council then pondered when to date the six months from: after clearing title or after payment of the bonus (the up-front money the lease holder pays the city).

It was decided to require that drilling commence within six months after title clearance, and that the bonus payment be made upon signing a contract with the city.

In other action, the council formally approved the dispensation of a \$25,590 state grant to the Police Department Major Crimes Task Force. The grant will cover 40 percent of the annual budget of the task force, now in its third year of existence, said Police Chief Elwood Hoherz.

Hoherz told the council the grant would represent a savings since the grant was not budgeted for the current

The council next went on record in support of two constitutional amendments which Texans will vote on Tuesday. The council endorsed Proposition 1, which it said provides "an unparalleled opportunity for revitalizing the rundown and unproductive areas of our communities." The proposition would create tax incentives for improvements in commercial and industrial zones of Texas cities.

Councilman Jack Y. Smith hedged at supporting the proposition — "I can see this being good for a big city," he 'but for a city the size o financially prudent - but later joined the rest of the council in endorsing the measure.

The council also endorsed Proposition 4, the water trust fund amendment. City Manager Don Davis pointed out to the council that passage of Prop. 4 could enable Big Spring to get a better bond rating which would facilitate some water projects scheduled within the five-year capital improvements program. Specifically, Davis said, Prop. 4 could help finance the construction of a "fourth pressure

The fourth pressure plane is a \$1.1 million project to increase water pressure to the higher sections of the Highland South neighborhood.

The proposal would exempt livestock and poultry from ad valorem, or property, taxes. The Texas Constitution stipulates

that "farm products in the hands of the producer are exempt from all taxation." But in 1976, former Attorney General John Hill ruled that livestock and poultry are not farm

products. Supporters of the amendment say without the tax relief, farmers and ranchers will be forced out of business and meat prices will continue to soar.

'Without passage of Proposition 5, which could remove such taxes, we fear that some Texas meat producers may conclude that they cannot afford to remain in that business," said Rep. Susan McBee of Del Rio, sponsor of the bill during the last legislative

"Then, we'll see a drop in production, meaning eventual increases in consumer prices," she said. Meat is the only food presently taxed in the state, she said.

In most cases, the exemption would shift the burden to other taxpayers within each taxing unit.

But advocates of Constitutional Amendment 5 say the additional burden picked up by other taxpayers would be negligible because most tax entities do not bother to collect on livestock anyway

School districts don't tax at least 81

percent of the market value of a tax category that includes livestock, according to the State Property Tax Board. So the districts would not be losing much money, because taxes from livestock and poultry are not collected presently, supporters of the

amendment say. But Dr. Floyd Meyers, president of the Texas Association of School Boards, says the exemption would put some rural districts in the Texas Panhandle in trouble.

"They (Farmers and ranchers) have a problem and I understand that." Meyers said. "But I've got a little bit of a problem, too.

"The elderly, the veterans, the timber people and homeowners all have tax exemptions," Meyers said. "If you're going to have a tax base, how are you going to do it with all these exemptions?

School districts in the Panhandle that count heavily on livestock as part of their tax base already are figuring their loss.

Livestock property taxes comprise about 12 percent of Hereford Independent School District's tax base in Deaf Smith County.

Although school districts have a chance to recoup some of the tax loss should the amendment pass, there is no provision in the law for counties to make up revenue other than to raise taxes, said Harrel Holber, superintendent of Hereford Independent

Two men accused of murder freed on bail

Staff Writer Two men suspected of murder in a double homicide at a westside bar Tuesday night were released on bond from the Howard County Sheriff's Office Wednesday. The men - Rudolfo Sandoval Jimenez and Benito

Albarado Marquez — were released after each posted a \$50,000 bond set by Judge Lewis Heflin. Jimenez, of 1603 Robin, and Marquez, of 2602 Carlton,

are suspects in the slayings of Clarence Yanez of 704 N.W. Fifth and Benedicto Yanez, reportedly of Louisiana, at the Water Hole No. 3, a tavern on West Highway 80. The men have not been formally charged with a crime

in connection with the incident, officials said this morning, pending further police investigation of the slayings. The Yanezes were found shot to death in the bar at about p.m. after a fight broke out in the bar, according to

It's believed that the suspects may have been trying to break up a fight between the Yanezes and a man who was stabbed by one of the Yanezes, sources have told The

Jimenez is the owner of Water Hole No. 3, several

sources have told The Herald. Part of the investigation to be completed by police is the result of an autopsy on the Yanezes ordered by Heflin, who pronounced the men dead at the scene

Police recovered two weapons at the scene of the shootings: a Colt Python .357 magnum and a Colt .45 automatic, detective Lt. George Quintero, said.

Jimenez and Marquez were apprehended inside the bar after witnesses pointed them out to police, Quintero said. Marquez is the father of a young woman who died of an apparent hit-and-run two miles north of town on Snyder Highway in January, said Sheriff's Deputy Bill Shankles. He said he didn't think there was a connection between the death of Cindy Marquez Machado and the arrest of her father. The sheriff's office continues to investigate the girl's death, which was "a hit-and-run, in my

opinion," said Shankles. Bond for Marquez was made by Thompson & Hamby, while bond for Jimenez was made by Jack Thompson and R.G. Jimenez, according to sheriff's office records.



Chamber industrial committee to contact area businessmen

Staff Writer The Big Spring Area Chamber of Commerce Industrial Team stated yesterday that 80 percent of Big Spring's growth and prosperity comes from within the city. This was stressed by Granville Hahn, chairman of the team as he urged committee members to begin contacting area businessmen in hopes of finding ways of expansion for Big Spring's industries and businesses

"We hope to establish a contact committee that will stay current with business managers in Big Spring to let them know of all assets we have. We want to let them know we are here to help them." Hahn said.

Members of the Industrial Team soon will begin meeting with local managers to hear troubles and complaints and to aid in helping the businessmen to streamline their organizations.

Hahn also reported on the Southern Industrial Development Conference he recently attended in Daytona Beach, Fla. Hahn said a main concern at the meeting was Internal Revenue Bonds. The bonds are used to help businesses expand and create more jobs.

Hahn said the Reagan Administration is considering cutting back the IRB's because the bonds have been used for other purposes other than creating jobs. Hahn explained that fast food restaurants and apartment buildings have been built with the funds which raised some eyebrows in the Reagan Administration.

Hahn said it would be advisable for businesses that are interested to the IRB's to go ahead and apply for them before any legislative action is taken to curb the bonds. Hahn said the bonds have a \$10 million limit and the

business must expand within three years of receiving the Hahn reported that Oilfield Industrial Lines is in final lease negotiations for the east side of the Industrial Park.

Hahn said the city of Big Spring will realize \$6 million dollars over the term of the lease. Hahn said Western Container Corp. located in the Industrial Park is the most efficient bottle-making plant

in the world. Western Container is quadrupling the size of its operation and should be creating 40 to 50 more jobs, Hahn said. LeRoy Tillery, vice president of the Chamber of

Commerce reported Cotton Machinery Co., Inc. is testing a self-propelled cotton stripper and if the idea is marketable CMC will begin construction of a new building adjacent to the west side of its present operation to house The Industrial Team discussed the possible transfer of

the old Cabot, Corp. plant to the Industrial Foundation. Hahn said Cabot had been asked to donate the plant to the city. He said Cabot could use the donation as a tax writeoff and the city could add the plant as an asset.

Meanwhile, in a separate report, the Labor Department said the productivity of American business fell at an annual rate of 1.9 percent in the third quarter, the largest decline in 31/2 years.

The Commerce Department's Index of Leading Indicators dropped 2.7 percent during the month, a fall characterized as "an especially steep plunge" by Robert Dederick, an assistant Commerce secretary

'The report strongly suggests that industrial production will be sliding into the autumn and that real gross national product will be down for the third successive quarter," Dederick said in a prepared statement released by the department.

'Any upturn is unlikely before early 1982,' he said. The Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics said the productivity performance in the overall private business sector, including farming, was the poorest since the 2.3 percent annual rate of decline registered during the first three months of 1978.

The bureau's preliminary productivity figures showed

that it was the first decline in the overall private business sector since the 1.1 percent dip during the fourth quarter of last year. The 1.9 percent annual rate of decline came after two quarters of modest growth - 4.6 percent in the first three months of this year and 3.5 percent from gapril

The figures for the quarter ending Sept. 30 showed that private business output fell 1.2 percent while the working hours of all people in that sector increased 0.7 percent on a seasonally adjusted annual basis.

Although there have been some rises in productivity, it has been mostly in a state of decline or stagnation in

recent years Productivity normally declines during a recession A Reagan Administration goal in reviving the U.S.

economy is recapturing America's business productivity The Commerce Department reported last week that the 'real" Gross National Product, the GNP after adjusting

Under state law, the commissioner of the Texas Education Agency could declare a district an "economic disaster" and adjust its tax formula.

If the amendment passes, Hereford school district would lose about \$355,000. Under the economic disaster classification, the district could recover about \$245,000, Holder said. Taxes would go up about four cents per \$100 valuation with the recovered money from the state and about 10 cents without.

The board projects that if the amendment doesn't pass, livestock and poultry tax revenue would total about \$7.8 million in 1982. For the same year, total ad valorem, or property tax, revenue will add up to about \$5.5 billion, more than 700 times the revenue gathered from livestock and poultry taxation.

Mrs. McBee said the tax is a small percentage of the state's tax vase and is not applied uniformly

Currently, feedlots are more heavily taxed because it's easier to tax cattle gathered in one place than to count them out on the range, she

assessing farmers' and ranchers' livestock "an administrative night-

Tax assessor-collectors depend on renditions compiled by farmers and ranchers listing their stock. But not everyone renders their stock inventory, Graeber said. So taxes are often based on estimates, he said.

'There is no penalty for failing to render, so it's an ineffective tool,' Graeber said.

The Vote for 5 Committee, a coalition of nine meat and poultry producers' associations, point out that Texas is the only one of the seven largest cattle-feeding states to impose an unconditional property tax on livestock.

Thirty-three states exempt livestock completely or partially, putting Texas at an unfair disadvantage, according to the committee.



Judge will determine verdict in Daniel trial

LIBERTY, Texas (AP) - Vickie Daniel, saying it's time for her murder trial to end, has thrown her fate into the hands of the presiding judge.

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"One way or the other, it must end," Mrs. Daniel said in a rare comment to

She spoke after waiving her right to a jury trial Wednesday, thus allowing the judge to decide if she murdered her husband, former Texas House Speaker Price Daniel Jr.

The prosecution readied witnesses today to rebutt the defense's case, specifically the testimony of Mrs. Daniel this week.

"I do not feel well. I do not have enough time to spend with my children, now the most important people in my life. I'm ready for it to be over. One way or the other, it must end," Mrs. Daniel said Wednesday in a rare comment to reporters.

"I've lived through nine months of this, one tragedy after another. First Price, then they tried to take my children away, then my mother .. died the days and days of court sessions, and then this trial. Physically and mentally, I am exhausted," she said.

Jurors were dismissed Wednesday morning after listening to 10 days of sometimes lurid testimony.

Daniel, 39, was shot to death at his Liberty home Jan. 19. Mrs. Daniel said it was an accident.

Visiting State District Judge Leonard Giblin of Beaumont agreed to hear rebuttal testimony today and tentatively set final arguments for

He said he probably would render a verdict within an hour of the closing statements.

Conviction on the murder charge carries a penalty of five years to life in Probation also is a possibility.

Mrs. Daniel, 34, twice married and the mother of four, never denied shooting her husband, the son of Texas political lion Price Daniel Sr., a former Texas governor and U.S.

But she said the fatal bullet discharged accidently during a bitter argument at the couple's ranch-style

Their divorce was pending.
Stunned jurors reacted with a mixture of anger, disappointment and relief at their discharge and disclosed

that they favored aquittal by an informal vote of 10-2. One member of the panel, Wayne Ballinger, predicted a hung jury "most likely" would have been the

One of the two jurors who favored covnviction was the wife of a Liberty constable and the other was the widow of a murder victim.

"I believe she got the gun, she shot him and she's dead," said Lynn Allen.

But the majority agreed with lead defeanse lawyer Jack Zimmermann, that the evidence did not support a guilty verdict.

"I don't think the state proved it's case beyond a resonable doubt." said Zimmermann, but admitted he did not want to risk a hung jury.

"Vickie has already been tried for this thing twice and I don't think emotionally she could go through a third trial," he said, referring to an earlier child custody battle.

"If there was a hung jury, you better believe there would be pressure for a new trial."

Chief prosecutor Carroll Willborn said he agreed to the waiver because he likewise did not relish a hung jury and suspected that jurors misunderstood the legal principles in the state's case.

The prosecution does not have to prove that Mrs. Daniel intentionally shot Price, he said, only that she "recklessly" grabbed, cocked and fired the rifle twice.

kicked and threatened to kill her before she removed the rifle from a closet and ordered him to leave. She testified that she fired a warning shot but could not recall firing the second fatal bullet.

"But as a consequence," said Wilborn, "a man is dead. And that is the issue before this court ...

"I think the state of Texas will get as good or better a shake with the court than the jury," said Wilborn.
Giblin, 40, a state judge since 1977,

said he told the opposing attorneys he would assume the traditional jury role but warned them that "it's a roll of the

He said he gave neither side so much as a hint of how he might rule, but assured them he would do the best that he can "I'm going to be fair, look at the

Reagan wins AWACS battle

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan, exulting in a victory that even his opponents called awesome, says the 'cause of peace is on the march again in the Middle East' with Senate approval of his AWACS arms sale to Saudi

With his first major foreign policy test behind him, Reagan said only a radical takeover in the Mideast now could thwart delivery of the Airborne Warning and Control System planes, the world's most advanced, in 1985. The \$8.5 billion sale is the largest arms deal to a

foreign nation in U.S. history. In the meantime, Reagan reaffirmed the United States "unshakable commitment" to Israel, which had argued that the sale would threaten its security, as his administration worked on compensating arms aid to the

The Senate approved the sale 52-48 Wednesday after Reagan converted seven opponents and won over all seven undecided senators in the final two days of an extraordinary lobbying blitz. It was a performance that moved House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. to say, "He is showing awesome power."

The Israeli Cabinet said today that the approval of the

sale of AWACS planes to Saudi Arabia posed "a new, serious danger" that Israel would do everything necessary to overcome.

Saudi Arabia's government-controlled newspapers hailed Reagan as one of the greatest American leaders in

Egypt's Foreign Minister Kamal Hassan Aly lauded the vote, calling it a "positive turning point in relations between the United States and the Arab nations" that will enable "Arab countries to defend themselves against any foreign intervention." 'Thank God!'' Reagan exclaimed when told of the

victory by aides who had been monitoring the roll call, via a phone line, in the office of chief of staff James A. Baker III. Keeping tally were Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr., national security adviser Richard Allen and deputy chief of staff Michael K. Deaver. The president said the sale will "protect our economic lifeline to the Middle East, win favor among moderate

Arab nations" and reassure the world that America "is

indeed a reliable security partner."
"Because of actions like today's by the Senate, the cause of peace is on the march again in the Middle East," Reagan said. In a letter delivered to the Senate earlier in the day, he pledged that a condition of the sale will be "substantial assistance of Saudi Arabia" in Mideast

"Our friends should realize that steadfastness to purpose is a hallmark of American foreign policy while those who would create instability in this region should note that the forces of moderation have our unequivocal support in deterring aggression," he said.

The Senate vote, two weeks after the House rejected the sale by almost a 3-1 margin, crowned an uphill fight that less than 24 hours earlier had seemed likely to end up in a 50-50 tie. That, too, would have been enough for Reagan, since opponents needed a majority for the first-ever

congressional veto of a U.S. arms sale. Senate Republican leader Howard H. Baker Jr. telephoned the president to report the victory, saying, "There are more brave souls in the Senate today than I

Reagan shared the credit in the White House mess with the interagency group that spearheaded the ad-

ministration's campaign. "It was in the fourth quarter with goal to go," he said.

U.S. arms sale in history.
The package includes five AWACS aircraft, the world's most advanced radar planes, plus 1,177 Sidewinder missiles, fuel pods and flying tankers for 62 F-15 jets

In his letter to the Senate, Reagan pledged that U.S. personnel will have the right to periodically inspect security arrangements for the sophisticated weapons and that Americans will be involved in Saudi operation of the planes "well into the 1990s."

Four of the 24 AWACS planes within the U.S. inventory already are operating with American crews in Saudi Arabia to guard against possible air attack by Iran or other hostile powers. The ones the Saudis will buy will lack advanced features such as jam-resistant com-

Administration officials assured Congress last spring that Israel's qualitative edge over its potential Arab foes would be maintained.

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

Proposed Amendment 5 in next Tuesday's election deserves a "yes" vote. It is the amendment to exempt livestock and poultry from property taxation.

This amendment actually is a correction in language.

In 1879, the Texas Constitution declared that all farm products would be exempt from taxation. Supposedly that included livestock and poultry.

But in 1976, Attorney General John Hill ruled that crops were farm products but livestock and poultry weren't.

Amendment 5 simply puts cattle and chickens back in the category of farm products.

THE AMENDMENT would cure a large inequity in taxing across the state. Many school district do not tax livestock or poultry at all, while others do. Also, it is difficult to tax livestock because it's hard to find them on the range and count them

By eliminating the tax, voters would be eliminating an expensive and timeconsuming administrative headache. In some cases it costs more to administer the tax than would be gained by taxation. Some jurisdictions use airplanes to count animals. Others spend hours driving through rangeland.

Another example of the current inequity is that someone who puts cattle in a feedyard on Dec. 31 must pay property taxes on 100 percent of the cattle, because they will be counted by the tax assessor on Jan. 1, the day property is appraised. A neighbor who puts cattle in the feedyard on Jan. 2 may be taxed on very few animals, since animals on the range are rarely counted. The tax puts the feedyard industry at a competitive disadv untage with those states whose livestock are not taxed.

SOME PEOPLE have argued that schools will suffer because of the tax loss. Actually, the revenue from taxation of livestock statewide currently is less than one-fourth

of one percent of all tax revenue.

Another argument has been that this amendment would give ranchers and farmers a tax break, and why should they get one when automobile dealers, for example, have to pay taxes on their cars. The difference is that businesses can pass on the costs of property taxes to consumers by setting their price, but ranchers must accept the market rate and are unable to pass on their costs

Last but not least, Amendment 5 will be a significant step in helping hold down the cost of livestock and poultry production in Texas. This action is a step we can take to help hold down rising food costs.



believer? - R.S. DEAR R.S.: Only you know whether or not you are really trusting Christ for your salvation, and whether or not you have committed your life to him. If you have, the Bible assures you that you are a child of God (see 1 John 5:11-

I suspect that your doubts about your relationship to Christ really reflect a spiritual problem which has grown because of the circumstances you have faced. Nowhere in the Bible are we promised that Christians will always be immune to difficulties,

including illness. We are part of a sinful, fallen world and that means we also have problems and difficult times. Furthermore, you should remember that sickness often opens the door to discouragement and depression. We all are affected emotionally by our physical condition.

But that does not mean discouragement and doubt are inevitable or necessary. If we have learned the secret of committing everything that happens to us into God's hands, then these things do not need to touch us. 



There is some evidence that more males are conceived if the egg is fertilized a little later after release from the ovary and more girls when fertilization occurs sooner. The evidence is interesting, but no more than that. There was a flurry of interest in this subject a few years ago, and it was discussed in the lay press However, no conclusions can be drawn. Furthermore, no attempt should be made to time the fertilization of the egg, which is possibly only for about 12 to 18 hours after ovulation anyway.

There is some evidence that the older the egg gets, the greater the chances that it will have some chromosomal damage with possible ill effects on the fetus. Again, the evidence is interesting, no more than that, and no reliable conclusions should br drawn.

spaces in them and that make them look like sponges. The condition most often does not cause symptoms and does not affect lifespan. Two possible complications from sponge kidney have to be guarded against - infection and stone-formation. A person with sponge kidneys should keep himself well-hydrated to avoid stone formation. He should report any urinary disturbance (increase in frequency, burning on urination, flank pain) to his doctor so that any infection can be treated promptly. When kidney X-rays are taken for other reasons, sponge kidney shows in about one in every 200 of them. So it is not all that uncommon.

Strategic forces vital



Of all the elements of national defense, our strategic, or nuclear, capability is perhaps the most important. The existence of our strategic forces protect the United States itself from foreign attack, as surely as ships and forts did in the pre-nuclear age.

Only a strong strategic system can deter attack from another nuclear power — which would know that they could not possibly "win" a nuclear exchange.

During the past decade, our superiority in that area has dwindled. It is essential that we modernize our forces so that our deterrent remains strong for the rest of this century. President Reagan has proposed a 5-point program to redress the inadequacies of our current forces. By and large, it is an excellent program, one I can support with few exceptions.

The program addresses the need for improved communications and control systems, a new long-range bomber, submarine forces, land-based missiles, and strategic defense.

Communications and Control refers to the survivability, performance and area of coverage of the radars and satelites used to warn us of a Soviet missile attack. It also includes the command centers that would direct U.S. strategic forces during a nuclear war and the way in which they would communicate with our forces. Improving these systems is essential if we are to have the capability to use our weapons systems.

In the area of strategic defense, the Administration's program calls for upgrading, in coordination with Canada, the North American air surveillance network. This would include defensive systems ranging from radars to anti-satellite capabilities, as well as civil

The heart of our strategic system is the "triad" of weapons systems on land in the sea and in the air. The

Budget has deficit for 12th straight year

 ${\bf WASHINGTON} \; ({\bf AP}) - {\bf Despite} \; {\bf perennial} \; {\bf presidential}$ pledges to slash federal deficits, the government continues to spew a torrent of red ink that is blotting out President Reagan's promise to balance the budget by

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The Treasury Department reported Wednesday that the budget for fiscal 1981, which ended Sept. 30, ran \$57.9 billion in the red, marking the 12th straight year that federal spending has outpaced receipts.

This was the same budget that former President Carter and Congress redrafted 18 months ago to bring it into balance. Instead, the budget produced the third largest deficit in history, surpassed only by a \$59.6 billion deficit in 1980 and a \$66.4 billion deficit in 1976.

The new figures underscore the widespread skepticism about Reagan's latest pledge to balance the budget by 1984 a goal that many economists and politicians contend

may fall short by a staggering \$100 billion or more. Economists discount presidential budget forecasts as rosy political scenarios that intentionally avoid inevitable economic realities. As time passes, events force

For our sea-based forces, it includes an improved missile, with greater accuracy and a larger payload. It also calls for building Triden submarines at a steady rate and deploying Cruise missiles on many ships and sub-

marines.

As for the air-based leg of the triad, our B-52 bombers which have served us so well for many years need to be replaced by a new long-range bomber. The Administration's program calls for a vigorous program to develop a bomber using advanced — or "stealth" — technology. In addition, the Administration proposes to develop a variant of the B-1 bomber to use during the period until the advanced technology bomber can be developed. The B-1 can be used to launch Cruise missiles,

even after the Stealth bomber is in use. We in the Senate Armed Services Committee will be looking closely at this recommendation to see how best to use limited available money in the best way to ensure that we have a viable replacement for the B-52's during this

The final element of the strategic modernization package is the MX missile. This missle is a major improvement over our existing Titans and Minutemen, and its development is vital to our national defense.

I do not approve of the President's recommendation for deploying the missile in the existing missile silos instead of developing a deceptive basing mode. It is my view, and that of the military experts, that only a deceptive basing mode will provide us the survivability we need to maintain an effective land-based deterrent.

The Armed Services Committee will be looking closely to the various basing modes for the future. But, in the interim, development of the missile itself must continue.

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House panel rejects MX missile

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan's plan to strengthen the nation's strategic defenses is being set back with a House subcommittee's refusal to appropriate money for the MX missile and a Senate Republican leader's statement that the B-1 bomber is unnecessary.

In separate votes behind closed doors Wednesday, the House Appropriations subcommittee on defense voted 7-5 to fund the B-1 bomber, shelved by former President Carter in 1977, and reject Reagan's request for \$1.9 billion for the MX missile during the current fiscal year.

At the same time, Sen. Ted Stevens of Alaska, chairman of the Senate defense appropriations subcommittee and the No. 2 leader of the Senate's GOP majority, called the B-1 an unnecessary, temporary replacement for aging B-

Stevens told Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger that he sees "a substantial conflict in Congress" over whether to revive the B-1.

Reagan asked Congress for \$2.4 billion in fiscal 1982 for the B-1 as part of a \$200.9 billion defense appropriation. The MX, B-1 and the radar-eluding Stealth aircraft are the keys to Reagan's \$180.3 billion six-year program for building up the nation's defenses

Reagan, rejecting an option to shuttle MX missiles among shelters in the Western deserts, decided instead to place the first three dozen in strengthened silos now occupied by the aging Minuteman and Titan II missiles, located in the Midwest and West

He said he would decide by 1984 on a long-term basing plan for the MX

Rep. Joseph P. Addabbo, chairman of the House Appropriations defense subcommittee, said the panel's refusal to fund the MX "is a significant expression" by Congress that it is reluctant to appropriate money until the administration decides how and where to deploy the

OPEC may raise oil prices

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) — The oil ministers of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries met today for the third time in five months and were expected to agree on a base price for crude oil of \$34 a barrel.

That increase would raise the price charged by Saudi Arabia, OPEC's biggest producer, \$2 a barrel. It could raise the price of gasoline and heating oil for American consumers about 21/2 cents a gallon, U.S. petroleum industry analysts said.

Potential snags remained, however, on such related issues as how long to maintain the base price and a price range for top-quality crudes, OPEC sources said.

Prices among OPEC's 13 members vary from Saudi Arabia's low of \$32 for a 42-gallon barrel to nearly \$40 charged by Algeria. The oil ministers discussed the \$34 price proposed by Saudi Arabia during meetings in May and August, but Venezuela and others refused to agree. So Saudi Arabia kept its price at \$32.

Mail order companies face stiff regulations

consumers shop by mail. They find mail-order shopping the most convenient way to satisfy their shopping needs. To meet the demand, there are now more than six thousand firms that share the U.S. mail-order market with total annual sales estimated to be \$40

Mail-order companies are ment is made. responsible for the largest number of complaints handled by Better Business Bureaus. The most frequent complaint received from consumers is failure to deliver ordered mer-chandise. To help alleviate this problem, in 1976 the Federal Trade Commission put into effect a trade regulation rule for the mailorder industry.

The rule requires that a mail-order company must ship ordered merchandise within 30 days from the time it receives an order, unless the offer clearly and conspicuously states some other time frame for shipment. If the company cannot ship within a 30-day period, or within the time it advertised, it must notify the customer of the delay.

This notice of delay must be accompanied by a free means of reply, such as a postage-paid postcard, by which the customer has the right to cancel the order or agree to the delay. If a customer chooses to cancel the merchandise, company is required to give a full refund of any money paid within seven business days from the date it received the cancellation notice. If the money has been charged, the company must provide a copy of a credit memorandum which shows the customer's account cleared of all related charges within one billing period

If the customer does not respond to the notice the company has the right to assume that he agrees to a delay of up to 30 days.

The FTC's rule does not apply to all the mail-order

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Each year thousands of industry. A few of those products which are excluded are photofinishing, seeds and growing plants, and magazine subscriptions. The

rule also does not apply to C.O.D. (cash on delivery) orders, orders with which you send no advance payment or for which you are not billed nor your account charged until ship-

The only problem with this regulation is that it is almost impossible to enforce. It has been the experience of BBB that a few companies fail to send the required delay notice. Therefore, it is up to you to protect yourself. Use the following guidelines if you will be ordering by mail for the approaching holiday season:

 Beware of exaggerated claims for products or unrealistically low prices for merchandise. If possible, investigate the advertiser's claims by comparing similar

merchandise in local stores. • Read the catalog descriptions carefully. Always keep a copy of the ad

Before ordering find out if the merchandise is offered on a satisfaction guaranteed or moneyback basis.

• Be sure all forms are completely filled out, including your name and propriate, where you wish the gift to be delivered.

 Always place an order at least 4 weeks before you want the merchandise. Pay special attention to cut-off dates for ordering holiday merchandise

 Never send cash through the mail. Pay by check or money order and be sure to include any shipping and handling charges. • Keep a record of your

order including the name and address of the company and the date you placed your

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

Reagan's AWACS fight rough but it worked

WASHINGTON (AP) — Intense, 11th-hour intervention by President Reagan, on top of skillful political maneuvering by his chief of staff, rescued the AWACS arms deal. It wasn't smooth, but it worked.

"The president was given a bum deal by the people who look out for him at the State Department, the Pentagon and the National Security Council," Sen. Roger W. Jepsen, Rlowa, told a reporter sadly as he reiterated his opposition to the deal.

Eventually, Jepsen came around, and therein lies the tale. Loyalty to the president and attention to the considerable persuasive powers that come with the office triumphed over congressional opposition and the administration's own miscues.

Reagan spoke with almost half the Senate, including more than a dozen in the final days when it became clear that he might actually lose in his first foreign policy showdown on

White House chief of staff James A. Baker III put together the strategy and the appointments that won most of the uncommitted and reversed seven Republican onents in the last two days.

Wednesday sync were a for Reagan Sen. Sam Nunn, a defense minded Georgia Democrat who supported Reagan, "If we were voting up or down on whether the administration handled this

right, it would be 97 to 3 against them, and I would be one of the 97." Criticism of the administration ranged from ineptitude to needless internal power struggles to undertones of anti-Semitism

that confused and irritated several senators. Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., said a businessman told him, "I realize the only reason you oppose the sale is because of your Jewish constituents, but I want you to be objective.

Said one administration official involved in the lobbying: "There was pulling and tugging for a while between State, on the one hand, and the National Security Council on the other and then you had Defense in there, too. We didn't have clear coordination in there for a period of several weeks.

The sale of Airborne Warning and Control System jets to Saudi Arabia was drafted last spring. Originally, the administration wanted to sell the Saudis weaponry for F-15 jets. But AWACS were added, representing a victory for Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger over Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr., and the opposition began to build.

Coordination of the arms deal with Congress was a long time coming — it was

not formally presented until Oct. 1.
Senate Majority leader Howard H. Baker, who led the administration's fight on Capitol Hill, found out about AWACS only when he glanced at the latest briefing books before leaving on a trip to Saudi Arabia early last April.

Senate Democratic leader Sen. Robert Byrd of West Virginia was not contacted by administration lobbyists until September He declared against the sale in the last week, interrupting Reagan's momentum.

Brushed aside by the White House were overtures from senators seeking to avoid a confrontation. Two of them, Boschwitz and Democrat John Glenn of Ohio, were to help lead the charge against the sale.

The White House was absorbed with tax legislation and other major domestic issues. While it avoided even low-key lobbying for the Saudi purchase, the American Israel Public Affairs Committee, unions and other groups concerned about Israel's security made major gains on Capitol Hill. By fall, only 13 senators were counted as supporting Reagan, 60 as opposing it.

As senator after senator trooped into the White House for private meetings with the president, there were arguments about security in the Middle East and about protecting the extremely sophisticated AWACS equipment.

In the view of White House chief of staff James A. Baker III, who sat in his office and listened over a telephone line as each vote was called in the Capitol, the clinching argument was national security.

But Reagan - and even former President Carter, who argued for the sale of the Airborne Warning and Control Systems airplanes to Saudi Arabia - returned to a key point: The ability of the president to conduct foreign policy was on the line. This is what he could have lost, both the past and the present president said.



Confessed 'mad-dog' wants death penalty

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Confessed "mad-dog killer" Marion Albert Pruett says he led officers to the body of savings and loan employee Peggy Lowe because he wants the death penalty.

"I think the people of Mississippi want to see me dead as much as I want to die," Pruett said in a jail cell interview Wednesday. "I just want the death penalty from

Pruett, 32, led Mississippi and federal officers to Mrs. Lowe's body during the predawn hours Wednesday. The 43-year-old mother of two had not been seen since she was abducted during the Sept. 17 robbery of the Metrocenter branch of Unifirst Federal Savings and Loan in Jackson.

Despite warnings from his court-appointed attorney against making any statements to reporters, Pruett said he also had killed two people in Colorado and one in Arkansas and linked the slayings to his "\$4,000-a-week cocaine habit.

"I became a mad-dog killer," he said. "That's

Asked why he had decided to discuss to the killings now, Pruett said he was "tired of living. I killed four innocent people and I've stayed straight (off drugs) long enough to see what I had done.' Pruett, dressed in a jail jumpsuit and white slippers and

wearing several days' growth of beard, at one point rolled up his sleeves to show what he said were needle marks from repeated drug injections.

In addition to robbery, kidnap and murder charges in Mississippi, Pruett is wanted for violent crimes in seven other states, including murders in Colorado and Arkansas and robberies in Washington and in Pennsylvania Discussing the deaths of two Colorado convenience

store employees on Oct. 16, Pruett said he was "high on cocaine" at the time. He said he was "messed up. I guess you call it mercy killing."

Pruett, who has a glass eye because of a childhood in-

ury, described himself as a troublemaker throughout his but said that when he began the robberies he had not

District Attorney Nathan Watkins of Livingston, Ala., said Mrs. Lowe's body was found in a wooded area beside a dirt road about 12 miles north of Livingston. He said she had been shot at least once in the back of the head and had been dead since the day of the Jackson robbery.

Watkins said Pruett allegedly told investigators he first made Mrs. Lowe strip to her underclothes and left her on the dirt road near Alabama 17.

He said it was alleged Pruett "got to thinking about it and went back" and shot her because she could identify him and his car. The body was found off the road in a wooded area.

Pruett would not discuss details of Mrs. Lowe's death but did say that he had rode with a hostage for 30 minutes after the Jackson holdup. He declined to say whether Mrs. Lowe was killed in Alabama or Mississippi.

The slaying of Mrs. Lowe, the mother of two, was 'something that ... just happened. I was too high. It was accidental.

Pruett, who was paroled from prison in 1979 under the federal witness program after serving time for bank robbery and attempted escape in North Carolina, said he held up financial institutions to embarrass the federal government because of what he said was wrongdoing within the witness program and his own treatment by federal parole officers.

He said he had started out only to rob financial institutions but after killing a person during a holdup "I got

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Brinks holdup pistol

traced to Texas town

NEW YORK (AP) — An automatic pistol found near the spot where two policemen were killed last week in a Brink's truck robbery was traced to the Texas hometown of a woman sought for questioning in the holdup, authorities said.

Rockland County District Attorney Kenneth Gribetz said Wednesday that the .380-caliber weapon was purchased in Austin in October 1979.

The FBI is searching for Marilyn Jean Buck, 33, a former Austin resident who allegedly rented apartments in New Jersey and Mount Vernon, N.Y., used as hideouts by the gang involved in the Brink's robbery

"Marilyn Jean Buck is a former Austin resident," said Greg Rampton, the FBI's agent in charge in Austin. "She is being sought for questioning in the robbery, and she is also a federal fugitive."

Ms. Buck failed to return to a West Virginia prison in 1977 after being furloughed. She was serving a sentence for weapons charges

FBI spokesman Joseph Valiquette said the FBI in Washington was comparing results of ballistics tests on guns or slugs found at the site of the Brink's robbery in Nanuet, N.Y., and the subsequent roadblock shootout in Nyack. The FBI was also examining other evidence, including items found in raids on what were described as

"safehouses" used by the gang.
An armored van was held up Wednesday in the New York City borough of Queens, and the New York Daily News quoted an unidentified FBI spokesman as saying the bureau was examining evidence from the robbery to see whether there was a connection with the Brink's holdup.

Two armed robbers with camouflage jackets took \$28,000 and critically wounded a guard outside a bank. Sgt. Tom Fahey of the New York City police department said today there was no apparent link between the robbery Wednesday afternoon and last week's holdup.

Four suspects, including Katherine Boudin, a federal fugitive identified as a member of the Weather Underground, were arrested Oct. 20 at the scene of the Nyack shootout, where Nyack police Sgt. Edward O'Grady and officer Waverly Brown were fatally

The four suspects also are charged with killing Brinks guard Peter Paige earlier in the day at a \$1.6 million robbery. The money was recovered. The three other suspects seized that day are Judith Clark and David Gilbert, also identified as members of the Weather Underground, and Samuel Brown, who has no known political connections.

Cynthia Boston, described as an officer of a terrorist group called the Republic of New Africa, was arrested Tuesday in a Mississippi farmhouse and charged with

participating in the Brink's heist. Her common-law husband, William Johnson, believed by police to be a member of the Black Liberation Army, is thought to have gone to Mississippi with her and is the object of a manhunt, as is Donald Weems, an escapee from a New Jersey prison.

Estimates of damage to the Chowan College cafeteria

ranged from \$2,000 to \$3,000, officials said. 'Food was all over the ceiling,' said town police Officer Tommy Gee, who arrived soon after the worst of the rioting. "The floor was such a mess you couldn't walk on

it. It was a total wreck. Police Chief Robert Harris said he and three officers went into the cafeteria and found "students just screaming and hollering, throwing food and trays, breaking up furniture — they broke the door open, too.'

Some of the doors were broken down by panic-stricken students after a college official tried to calm the crowd by

Harris said nine students were charged with inciting to riot. They were held on \$2,000 bond and scheduled for court appearances Tuesday. More arrests were expected,

No serious injuries were reported.

"I was in the cafeteria when it happened," said infirmary night nurse Marie Elliot. "I haven't seen any injuries. The biggest thing I saw was somebody got hit in the back with an apple and got a pretty good bruise.



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


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
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
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


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

Dr. Geoffrey Bourne, vice chancellor of the school of medicine, said university officials are concerned about bad publicity stemming from the enrollment of the 40year-old former Houston lawyer in 1980, when he still was

He was released on a \$5,000 personal recognizance bond after his 1978 conviction but left for Grenada in June 1980.

He is now being sought on charges of failing to appear in court Aug. 11 to be sent to prison.

Texas authorities tried to have Yarbrough extradited through the State Department, but U.S. officials expressed concern that Grenada's Marxist government would provide asylum for the fugitive.

Grenada government officials "have not actually told him to go. They have just impounded his passport until they decide," the Star-Telegram quoted a St. George's University official as saying.

"The Grenada government will only allow students to remain on the island if they are members of the school," Bourne added. "Mr. Yarbrough has been suspended for some weeks now. I believe the immigration people in Grenada are considering if it means he is not a member of the school

He said Yarbrough is being allowed to audit classes but receives no credit.

"He's now doing second-semester work. He took the first semester and failed and had to repeat it. Even if he was a full student now it would take him three and a half years (to complete the program)," Bourne said.

He said Yarbrough has conferred with him only a few times — one of them two weeks ago when he asked what could be done to get his passport back.

"I told him there was nothing he could do except to sit quiet and see what the Grenada government did," Bourne

Yarbrough's attorney, former Texas Attorney General Waggoner Carr, said his client did not respond to letters



NEW YORK (AP) - So much for waiting until next year.

Once, when they lived in Brooklyn, that was a way of life for a team called the Dodgers. Wait till next year. Things will be better then.

It took them seven visits to the World Series before they won one. And they had lost their last three bids for baseball's world championship. Frustration was being a Dodger fan and always waiting for next year.

Well, now 25 other major league clubs will do the waiting. Things have gotten better in a hurry for these Dodgers from Los Angeles who found happiness in a house of horrors called Yankee Stadium on a chilly evening in October

They are the final survivors of baseball's longest, most frustrating season, a year fragmented by a bitter seven-week player strike that created a new tier of playoffs and kept the games going almost until

They are world champions, and next year is here at last.

The Dodgers won this World

Series the same way they won everything else in this postseason — by bouncing off the deck, and coming from behind. They lost the first two games of the divisional playoffs to Houston and recovered with three straight victories at home. Then they trailed Montreal 2-1 in the League Championship Series but won the last two games in Canada to clinch the pennant.

Food director signed fake milk invoices?

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - The Mission school food services director says he unwittingly signed fake milk delivery invoices when a dairy official needed a signature on the tickets one day

Michael Jon McCarthy testified Wednesday that Ernie Strickland of Golden Jersey Creamery came to his office at the Mission school central cafeteria with some invoices

Stickland, an un-indicted co-conspirator in the case, asked for McCarthy's secretary, said the food services director. McCarthy said he signed the papers because he secretary was away from her desk.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Eddie Medrano prepared to cross-examine McCarthy today.

McCarthy and three other school personnel are charged with conspiring to defraud a federal school lunch program of almost \$500,000 over a five-year period.

Indictments returned this summer charged 13 defendants with falsifying milk delivery tickets to make it appear the school had ordered enough half-pints of milk to claim all of its school meals for federal reimbursement.

Under federal regulations, all federally reimbursed meals must include milk.

According to testimony, school district payments for the phony invoices went into a dairy special account, from which the school district would be credited for other dairy products like ice cream and cottage cheese.

McCarthy became food services director in 1978 and said he did not learn the school district was actually paying the false milk invoice tickets until 1980 during a visit from dairy official Duane Towne.

New York's sticky wicket

NEW YORK (AP) — The city's parks department is up against a sticky wicket: there aren't enough cricket fields in the borough of Queens to meet demand.

The borough's only field for the British game is at Flushing Meadow-Corona Park in the shadow of Shea Stadium, the home of the New York Mets. And the field is overbooked, according to Matt McElroy, an assistant in the Queens branch of the Parks Department.

McElroy said Wednesday the boom is a reflection of the growing number of Pakistanis, Indians and other Southwest Asians in Queens.

The British introduced cricket to those countries as they were colonized, and many immigrants from there have settled in Queens, bringing with them their zest for the sport.

The India Sports Society, based in Flushing, approached the Parks Department this summer with a design for a cricket field in Kissena Corridor Park, McElroy said.

"We try to be responsive to the needs of park users," he said, adding that the department will pay for construction, estimated at

AP Television Writer NEW YORK (AP) - For all the viewers it got last season, "Hill Street Blues" was probably mistaken for a ragtime tune from New Orleans. Six Emmy awards and a major promotional campaign later, "Hill Street" returns, and NBC hopes audiences know it's a television show - a

Aware that "Hill Street" might attract a large curiosity audience tonight, the producers structured a dynamic opening before the title and credits even roll. It dares you to turn the dial.

It's typical of "Hill Street's" authentic glimpses of police life - raw, funny and human - instead of fitting glossy fantasy into a conventional TV format.

Grant Tinker, whose former production company created "Hill Street Blues," is chairman of NBC. He promises fewer story lines, the completion of at least one of them and an anchored time slot.

Still, "Hill Street" is not easy to watch because it's so provocative. Everything doesn't unfold in neat 15-minute segments. There are shifting sub-plots — some based on the action but more rooted to the characters' undulating emotions and feelings, a remarkable feat for TV. While it's own quality may be an obstacle to popularity.

"Hill Street" is burdened by NBC's mediocre Thursday night comedy schedule. It's immediate lead-in, "Gimme A Break," takes the lowest road and should have viewers

"Gimme A Break" stars Tony award winner Nell Carter as housekeeper for a widowed police chief (Dolph Sweet) and his three daughters. This vehicle, well beneath Miss Carter's enormous stage talents, retreads a worn TV theme begun by Ethel Waters' "Beulah" in 1950.

This show doesn't know what !! wants to be. Whenever a

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little sentiment creeps in, the mood is clobbered by some

tasteless, pointless joke. NBC's other new comedy tonight, "Lewis and Clark." is funnier and has much more class.

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

Oil rig blast to produce at least four lawsuits

Staff Writer Personal injury and property damage lawsuits arising from a fatal drilling accident in Martin County last month should be filed in area courts within the next month or so, say the attorneys who will file the suits.

At least four lawsuits — three representing workers killed or injured when a rat hole rig struck a natural gas pipeline and a fourth on behalf of the rat hole service - will be filed, The Herald has learned

Bob Freeman of Midland will file in federal district court with his partner John Hyde "probably within the next 10 days," Freeman said.

The pair will file on behalf of the estate of Joe Greg Dawson, a 19-year old Midlander and employee of Harris Rat Hole Service who died in a blast that investigators said sent flames 200 feet into the air.

Freeman said he and Hyde were naming the Jet Oil Co. of Oklahoma as a defendant in the suit and 'probably" other parties whose inclusion in the suit the attorneys are

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exploring. Freeman said the grounds for the suit were negligence and the amount the attorneys would seek to recover hadn't been determined yet.

The crew was drilling a preparatory shaft for an oil rig eventually to drill within when the pipeline was rup-tured. Jet Oil has the oil lease for the property, which is owned by John Hale of Big Spring.

The crew was drilling 193 feet from the stake site surveyed and marked

for drilling, according to Martin County Sheriff Dan Saunders, who is supplying attorneys with information his department has gathered in an investigation. Bob Huff, a Lubbock attorney, will

file a suit on behalf of the wife and children of 32-year-old John Paul Hemphill, a machine operator for the Britt Trucking and Construction Co. of Lamesa. Hemphill, of Lamesa, died in the blast

Huff said he hoped to file within 30 days in the state's 118th District Court office in Martin County. The case would be under the jurisdiction of Big Spring-based state Judge Jim Gregg.

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Two men slain in bar

Two men were shot to death after a fight broke out in westside bar Tuesday night, and two suspects are being held in connection with the slayings, police said.

Officers arriving at the Water Hole No. 3, 3204 W. Highway 80, found Clarence Yanez Jr., 36, and Benedicto D Yanez, 20, dead on the floor of the bar when they arrived

Clarence Yanez lived at 704 N.W. Fifth and Benedicto Yanez's address is unknown, police investigators said. The men possibly were second cousins, said Lt. George


The names of the two men taken into custody and questioned about the incident were not released, pending filing of formal charges, Quintero said. The suspects were arrested at the bar shortly after

police received word of a fight in progress at Water Hole No. 3. Quintero said Justice of the Peace Lewis Leflin pronounced the victims dead at the scene, according to police reports of the

The altercation started about 10:59 p.m. and "seemed to be very brief." Quintero said.

Officer Ron Wood was the first policeman to arrive on the scene. He got to the Water Hole No. 3 at 11:03 p.m., according to his report, and found the two Yanezes slumped on the floor of the bar showing no signs of life.

The two suspects were apprehended at about 11:15 p.m. after witnesses to the shootings pointed them out to police, Quintero said. The men are local residents, he added.

No information was released on how many times the Yanezes had been shot or with what type of gun, pending the results of an autopsy ordered by Heflin.

It is believed each suspect had a gun, Quintero said. Charges are not likely to be filed until this afternoon. Quinteco said, since detectives probably will not complete their investigation until that time.

The other half would be set aside and used later for whatever the Legislature deems appropriate.

If approved, the amendment also would make the state's current water project bonds more attractive by raising the interest rate paid to investors from 6 to 12 percent, and would allow the state to use \$500 million of its credit to guarantee up to \$1 billion in water project bonds issued by cities and counties, as well as water and river districts.

The proposal, supporter say, will help Texas avert what could be a water deficit of 8.6 million acre-feet a vear by 2030.

With 20 years needed to build new dams and reservoirs, they say, Texans must start thinking about water today.

Also, supporters argue that setting aside excess tax revenues, mostly generated by the booming oil and gas business, will mean lower taxes in the

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Serving West Texas Over 46 Years

News Service WASHINGTON — Ten years ago the historic Potomac River was internationally notorious for its polluted condition, a blight on the nation's capital. Huge, floating, oxygen-greedy clumps of algae created a stench that embarrassed officials hosting foreign dignitaries and made an eyesore of the city's most beautiful natural

Fish died for lack of oxygen or headed south toward the Chesapeake Bay. Sportsmen took their fishing poles, rafts, canoes, kayaks, and water skis to cleaner streams. Swimming in the murky water was unthinkable, even on the most sweltering summer day.

NOW, AFTER A BILLION-DOLLAR CLEANUP, the river abounds with life. Nearly 100 species of fish can be found in the Potomac and its eight main tributaries, and each spring more species move farther up the river for spawning runs. Enough largemouth and striped bass have returned to waters within the city's boundaries to support

at least one full-time fishing guide. On any summer day, kayakers, canoeists, swimmers, and white water rafters make the river their playground Although it remains illegal to swim in the District of Columbia portion of the Potomac, this could change. The financially pressed city government is looking for funds to establish bathhouses and beaches along the river.

The Potomac now stands as a symbol of what can be done to revive the nation's polluted waterways.

Health authorites closed the last beach in 1925, but the river's bacterial count now meets federal standards for swimming — except immediately after heavy rainstorms when the river swells with sewage overflow and other

The cleanup of the Potomac has resulted from cooperative efforts of Maryland, Virginia, and Washington aided by federal grants, the three jurisdictions upgraded sewage treatment plants to remove up to 95 percent of the pollutants. By the mid-1970s, nearly all point-source pollution, discharges of municipal or industrial wastes, had been eliminated.

A major report to be published later this year documents the Potomac's improvement during the decade ending in 1980. Orterio Villia of the Environmental Protection Agency, one of the authors, summarized its findings:

There have been major reductions in phosphorus and chlorophyll A, creating a healthy plankton supply; an increase in the level of oxygen, which is necessary for aquatic life; and a nearly 50 percent reduction in the amount of organic material in the river.

THE CHANGE DID NOT COME EASILY. Nearly \$1 billion was spent over the past 10 years to make it possible. But the Potomac now stands as a symbol of what can be done to revive the nation's polluted waterways.

Rich with history and an immense variety of beauty, the Potomac stretches 382 miles from high in the Allegheny

Mountains of West Virginia along Maryland's southern boundary to the tidewater Potomac, where watermen make their livelihood from its abundant shellfish.

In between, the river crashes 150 feet across spectacular Great Falls gorge, only minutes from Washington's urban congestion. As the Potomac meets the Atlantic coastal plains at Washington, it becomes a true estuary influenced by the tides of the Chesapeake

Bay.
The Potomac far upstreams from Washington finds its sources at the beginning of two main forks. The 97-milelong North Branch begins in a meadow near Fairfax Stone, W.Va. As it flows through the coal-pocketed Alleghenies, it is saturated with acid draining from abandoned mines. No fish can live in the lethal waters.

The clean South Branch, 133 miles long, begins near Hightown, Va., in a hillside meadow and winds its way through fertile farm valleys. The rugged South Branch's three main forks converge near Petersburg, W.Va. known

FROM CUMBERLAND TO WASHINGTON, 184 miles, the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal hugs the Potomac as it flows through history: Antietam, the bloodiest battle of the Civil War, and Harpers Ferry, where John Brown led a raid on the Federal Armory in 1859.

Below Great Falls, the river broadens as it streams past Arlington National Cemetery, the monuments to Presidents Washington, Jefferson, and Lincoln, an island memorial to Theodore Roosevelt, and the restored colonial seaport town of Alexandria.

Stately homes grace the Virginia shore from Washington south: George Washington's home at Mount Vernon and birthplace at Wakefield. Robert E Lee's mansion overlooking Washington and his ancestral home at Stratford Hall, and Revolutionary patriot George Manson's Gunston Hall.


The river also provides a major habitat for the nation's symbol, the endangered American bald eagle. The largest concentration of bald eagles in the eastern United States is found along a five-mile stretch of Potomac shoreline in King George County, Va., where they depend on the river's supply of fish.

In 1634, Maryland's first English settlers arrived at St. Clements Island in the Potomac and Father Andrew White wrote: "This is the sweetest and greatest river I have ever seen, so that the Thames is but a little finger to

With four million people now living near its banks — three million in the Washington area alone — the Potomac will never again be as clean and fecund as it was in the 17th century

Silting from agriculture and construction, as well as urban refuse from storm runoffs, are now the most significant forms of pollution, said Paul Eastman, executive director of the Interstate Commission on the Potomac River Basin

'There's still a lot to be done in adapting agricultural and construction practices to cut down non-point pollution," Eastman said, "but I'm optimistic for the future."

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Amendment 3 would create state financial committee

AUSTIN — Texans must decide Nov. 3 whether a seven-member committee headed by the governor should be calling the state's financial plays while the Legislature is away.

Those pushing Proposition 3, one of seven on the constitutional amendments election ballot, say that like a team whose head coach is seldom around to consult, the state needs some kind of budget leadership to fill the vacuum during the 19 months between legislative sessions.

Opponents, such as the consumeroriented Common Cause of Texas, are

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quick to acknowledge the problem, but say Proposition 3 is not the answer for two reasons:

One, it lacks enough safeguards to protect against abuse.

Two it lacks accountability to the voters because only two of the seven state officials on the committee are elected on a statewide basis.

'Basically, five of the members are locally elected and the voters of the state as a whole have no say-so as to the decisions of these five," says Robert Dahlquist, vice chairman of Common Cause of Texas.

The proposal would set up a committee consisting of the governor, lieutenant governor, House speaker, and the chairmen of the Senate Finance Committee, the Senate State Affairs Committee, the House Appropriations Committee and the

House Ways and Means Committee. Should the proposal pass Nov. 3, the Legislature already has restricted the committee's power for the time being to allocating only a few federal block grants - those that are targeted for more than one state agency.

But opponents add that they expect

the committee's power to be broadened considerably after the Legislature has a chance to see how

"It could be used in the future to meet financial emergencies and would do away with the need for costly special sessions if the Legislature gives it the power," says Don Cav-ness, an Austin lobbyist and coordinator of the Sound Financial Management Committee for Texas.

Cavness' group is the main force pushing for adoption of Proposition 3 and it claims wideranging support.

"I don't think this is a liberal or conservative issue," says Cavness, but a financially responsible one.

As it is now, state government must make do with a biennial budget that takes more than a year to prepare. That means state budget experts

must look well into the future. 'The idea of having to estimate state needs three years ahead of time is outmoded," Cavness says.

He also notes that the current state budget process is so inefficient that during the recent special session, lawmakers made eight changes to a

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state budget passed only six weeks before during the regular legislative session

Other selling points offered by proponents, include:

State agencies would operate more efficiently and be more accountable to the people if they rece ved supervision from a state finance management committee.

Budget emergencies that can't wait for the next legislative sessi n could be handled with commit ee meetings instead of costly spec al sessions of the Legislature.



Rep. Shaw optimistic about outcome of remap

Weary and concerned, Rep. Larry Don Shaw of Big Spring said he is still optimistic about the outcome of House redistricting plans now being considered by a five member board composed of Speaker Billy Clayton, Comptroller Bob Bullock, Attorney General Mark White, Lt.

Gov. Bill Hobby and Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong. The board is considering two plans: One drawn up by Speaker Clayton which pairs Rep. Shaw with Rep. Jerry Cockerham of Monahans, and one put together by Comptroller Bullock which is much more favorable to Rep.

The Clayton plan would take away all of Shaw's 63rd

District except Howard County and give him a very large portion of West Texas that stretches almost to El Paso.

'It's apparent that Clayton is out to get me. The plan he has drawn up is a blatant attempt to get rid of me. The plan is as bad as they can make it for me," said Shaw in a phone interview with The Herald Tuesday

Rep. Shaw said he favors Bullock's plan and he expects some form of the plan to be accepted as a final House redistricting decision.

Rep. Shaw said Clayton has had it in for him every since Shaw declined to become of a part of the Speaker's

"There are a lot of politics involved here, but basically

Clayton dislikes me for three reasons. I supported John Bryant in the last speaker's race, I defeated one of Clayton's team committee chairmen (Rep. Mike Ezzell of Snyder) in the 63rd District race and the fact I opposed Clayton's first redistricting plan," said Shaw.

Clayton's first plan was declared unconstitutional after the Texas Supreme Court decided the plan unlawfully cut across county boundaries.

Clayton's plan would give Shaw a very large district of 300 miles. The counties included are Howard, Glasscock, Reagan, Upton, Crane, Wrinkler, Ward, Loving, Reeves, Jeff Davis, Culberson and Hudspeth. The plan would also pair him with Rep. Jerry Cockerham of Monahans forcing the two into a runoff for the district

Bullock's plan does not pair Shaw with anyone and gives him a much more compact district comprised of the following counties: Martin, Howard, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Nolan and Jones.

"If I'm paired with Jerry the plan favors him. I'll still have Howard County, but the rest of the district will be new to me. Out of 90,000 people in the district only the 33,000 in Howard County will know who I am," Shaw said. Cockerham, although a supporter of the Clayton team,

has never been really accepted by some team members a Democrat in the 1980 general election, Shaw said.

because he defeated House Dean Richard Slack of Pecos, "It's a way of getting rid of one of us," Shaw said.

Senate redistricting plan. He was hoping for the board to deliberate most of Tuesday so that he would have more time work out some form of compromise between the two plans submitted by Bullock and Clayton.

Shaw got his wish as the board used up most of Tuesday deciding on a senate plan drawn up by Lt. Gov. Bill

The board is expected to meet Wednesday in an attempt to decide on a plan before the midnight deadline. Shaw said he is hoping that Bullock's plan will be supported by Attorney General White and Land Commissioner Armstrong, Shaw said if the board can't decide on one of the plans by midnight he expects the decision to be left up to the courts.

"I don't know what they may decide. I'm optimistic that things will go my way. There is a tremendous chain of power here and I'm a thorn in the flesh of Clayton's team politics because I chose to be independent. I'm not sure if some of the team members remember why they were elected, they just don't seem to listen to the people in their districts," Shaw said.

In Clayton's first redistricting plan that was declared unconstitutional Shaw was paired with House Dean Bill Heatly of Paducah and the district covered 290 miles. This time Shaw is paired again and the district is spread out

"It's the same song second verse, Billy Clayton sings the blues to us," Shaw said.

Budget power grab rears head again

In last year's general election, the voters of Texas soundly defeated a proposed constitutional amendment that would have given the Governor budget-execution authority over funds appropriated by the Legislature. (Actions by the Governor would have required the approval of a budget-execution committee consisting of the Governor, the Lt. Governor and the Speaker of the

Now it's general election time again and, lo and behold, another budget-execution amendment is rearing its sinister head as Proposition 3.

This year's version would allow the creation of a state finance management committee to manage the expenditure of appropriated funds. This committee would consist of the Governor (chair), Lt. Governor (vicechair), the House Speaker, and the chairs of the Finance committee and State Affairs Committee of the Senate and the Appropriations Committee and Ways and Means Committee of the House. Of these, only the Governor and the Lt. Governor are elected by voters statewide. The Speaker is elected by the House, and the committee chairs are appointed by the Speaker and the Lt. Governor. I am opposed to Proposition 3, and I urge its defeat at

In my opinion, this amendment would tamper with the fundamental constitutional principle of separation of powers. The proposed committee could assume some of the executive branch, and some of the budget-setting power that properly belongs only in the legislative branch. on the basis of purely political considerations. And with finance committee members running for re-election or aspiring to higher offices, "logrolling" and political favoritism might prevail over the professional judgment of state agency administrators.

In short, it would be possible for this small committee — by transferring funds between agencies or between programs within an agency - to eliminate programs, commit the state to new programs and, in effect, circumvent the intent of the people's elected representatives in

It's bad policy, and the voters should put the idea to rest once and for all on Nov. 3.

This amendment would create enormous potential for abuse in the form of mutual back-scratching by the

Governor, Lt. Governor and Speaker. The proper function of the Legislature is to create or approve policies for the various agencies of the executive branch, establish a legal framework, appropriate funds for the programs, and then let professional administrators run them as non-politically as possible.

If Proposition 3 passes, we will be inviting political meddling by an all-powerful, seven-member state finance committee, six of whom are legislative leaders. The committee's power could be used to harass agencies. Funds could be transferred from one program to another
