THE TELEPHONE IS a very rude and irritating piece of electronic equipment. It interrupts your work and your train of thought and demands your immediate attention.

The other day a lady came into our office to discuss an item for the paper. The phone rang and she was left to twiddle her thumbs while I tried to excuse myself from the caller as soon as possible.

Of course this happens all the time and we are accustomed to it. However, I can't help but resent it when it happens to me. Shouldn't the one who has taken the trouble to call on you in person take precedence over the one who merely punched a few buttons to get you on the 'phone?

Now, we have another annoying bit of electronic technology known as the "telephone answering device." Like the 'phone itself, this piece of equipment is getting to be an indispensable fact of life. But I know some folks who still will not leave a message on a person's machine. They simply hang up.

True, you do feel a bit silly the first time you try talking to one of these things. But you get used to it, and if you are creative enough to come up with a smart-aleck remark to leave as your message, you can even have fun with it.

Sometimes, with an answering machine on your 'phone, you don't have to talk to all those bill collectors, book salesmen, siding salesmen, magazine salesmen, etc. Many people use this method to screen their calls when they actually aren't "away from the phone" at all.

Claudia Cohl of "Family Computing" magazine says that electronic answering systems are "taking over the phone-answering duties of human beings in many of the larger high-tech corporations around the country. These firms are part of the technology industry. Their advertising and public relations copy is full of 'user friendly's,' but if you try to contact an actual human being, there is no one with whom to strike up a friendship."

The part that Claudia is most upset about is the fact that these answering systems don't work correctly half the time. Do you call a company long distance to have a machine ask you to wait and listen to some recorded music? Or to punch more buttons to indicate which department you wish to talk to? You may never hear a human voice at all, and if you plan to ask for an extension number, you're probably in even bigger trouble.

Claudia must be right about all this, because I called a computer company about a piece of software the other day and got a machine. But instead of the machine asking me to leave my name and number, I got the playback of messages which other people had already left. It's not a lot of fun to pay for long-distance calls of this nature.

I think we all object to the fact that technology is being used to depersonalize our lives. You know what I mean if you've ever gotten a computer error on a bill and have tried to get it straightened out. Frustrating, isn't it?

Well, electronic technology is here to stay and these little irritations will eventually get ironed out, just in time, no doubt, for some new ones to take their places.

We've come a long way from the time when you had to turn a crank on the old wall-phone to get the attention of the "central" operator, who would then give the special ring (one long, three short, etc.) for the person you wanted to call.

Then, six or eight families along the partyline would all pick up their phones to hear what you had to say. That was probably irritating, too, but you were at least dealing with other members of the human race.

Bivins Brings His Campaign To City

Teel Bivins, Republican candidate for the state senate, was in Friona campaigning this week, with his county chairman, Ron Davenport.

Bivins said one of his priorities if elected would be to cut state spending. "We have more state employees per 10,000 people than any of the other ten most populous states," he said. Consolidation of state agencies is also his goal, if elected.

"If I go to Austin, I will sponsor a constitutional amendment to ban a state income tax," Bivins said.

Bivins was born and raised in Amarillo. His family has been in the cattle business around Amarillo for over 100 years. Bivins received a law degree from

Southern Methodist University in 1974.

Returning to Amarillo, he and a brother formed Bivins Brothers Partnership, which pastures and feeds cattle throughout the Texas Panhandle.

He has been elected to leadership posts in the cattle industry, and serves on the National Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board, and the Texas Cattle Feeders Assn. board.

He has also been active on community boards, serving on the executive committee of the Superconducting Super Collider, Inc.

"I am excited about the race, and will make a prediction that I will win the Republican nomination. I have good workers in all 29 counties of the district," Bivins said.

School Sets Spring Break

School will dismiss at 2:45 p.m. on Friday, February 26 for the Spring Break. Classes will be dismissed Monday, February 29 and Tuesday, March 1, resuming at their regular time on Wednesday, March 2.

Excel's Closing Is Cause Of Concern

The announcement that Friona's Excel plant will close next week has local leaders concerned about the economic impact on the community and the area, although most are hoping that the closure will last just a week.

Excel officials in Friona have been careful about addressing the situation. "We think we'll only be closed a week. We're hoping that's as long as it lasts," said Kerry Bahns, office manager of Friona's Excel plant. "But the word is 'indefinite,'" he added. "They haven't told us we'd re-open in a week," he added.

Meanwhile the plant was handing out instructions to their employees for applying for unemployment.

A spokesman for the Amarillo office of the Texas Employment Commission said they would send two teams to the Excel plant on Thursday, March 3, one team to assist employees in filing for unemployment compensation and a second team to assist in job placement.

"Excel is a vital part of the cattle industry, and even if they close down a single day it will affect the industry," said Ab Hendley, president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

"We hope that they will get their problems resolved and re-open as quickly as possible. They have been awfully good friends to Friona and to the cattlemen, and we'd sure hate to see them shut down or closed for any length of time," said Hendley.

"Excel has been a great supporter of the community, and anything that the Chamber of Commerce can do to help their situation, we'd sure be happy to do," said the local C-C spokesman.

Hendley added that not only Friona, but the entire area would be affected by Excel's closure. The allied (satellite) industries will also be affected, he pointed out.

In addition to Friona, employees at Excel come from Hereford, Bovina, Clovis, Muleshoe and other area communities. It is said that Excel is one of the major employers of Clovis' work force.

The Excel plant employs some 1,250 people. The exact number of Excel employees who live in Friona isn't known, but Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe said a check of school records this week showed that 27 per cent of the students (336 in all) in the local school system has at least one parent employed by the giant packing

plant. "We are certainly concerned. It's going to hurt the families who are laid off. We just hope that it's a short-lived situation. I don't think it's time to push the panic button, but we need to be concerned," said Friona mayor Clarence Monroe.

Excel spokesman Orin Thorback of Wichita, Kansas, said Wednesday that poor profit margins caused by high prices for cattle necessitated the shutdown.

Kathy Beard, executive vice president of the Chamber of Commerce, pointed out that a multi-million dollar renovation and expansion program at the plant is continuing.

"On that basis, we're optimistic," said Mrs. Beard. "They have been a great supporter of our community, and we to them," she added.

A smaller Excel plant near Cozad, Nebraska will also be closed on Monday, affecting about 120 workers. The company's plant in Plainview will not be affected by the shutdown.

Excel began operating as Missouri Beef Packers in Friona in April of 1968. The corporation later became known as MPBXL, and was purchased from Missouri Beef Packers by Cargill in 1979.

Samarron Seeking Return To State In Powerlifting

Friona is home to a 17-year-old "powerhouse" weight lifter.

Richard Samarron, senior at Friona High School, will be out to qualify for the state tournament in powerlifting for the second straight year when he enters a regional tournament at Littlefield on Saturday, February 27.

Samarron would have been a virtual shoo-in to make the state meet once again this year, except for a freak injury during a workout earlier this month, which has somewhat hampered his lifting abilities.

Richard is the youngest of three Samarron brothers, who have all been athletes at Friona High School. His older brothers, Juan, 24, and Jose, 21, were both football players at FHS. They are the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Juan Samarron, Jr. of 303 Grand Street in Friona.

But somewhere along the way, Richard decided that football was not his cup of tea. So, he became interested in weight lifting.

The weight lifters were encouraged locally for a few years by former FHS coach Lynn Weiland, who got several youngsters interested in the sport, and entered them in the open and regional powerlifting tournaments.

But since Weiland left FHS to coach at Canyon, the local weight-lifter has had to continue on his

Sale Gains By 40 %

The 1988 auction sale for the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show was up by 40 per cent over the 1987 sale, it was announced this week by Dr. Dale Schueler, who is in charge of the billing on the sale.

The auction totals for 1988 came to \$76,315. This was an increase of \$21,813 over the totals for 1987, which came to \$54,502.72.

The 1988 totals also topped those of 1986, which had rounded out at \$74,791.

Broken down, the 1988 totals included \$64,890.55 in premiums, and \$11,424.45 paid by floor buyers. The steer sale was broken down as \$2,940.45 in premiums and \$2,517.62 for floor; barrows, \$36,797.60 in premiums and \$3,428.08 floor; lambs, \$25,152.50 premiums and \$5,478.75 floor.

own. Samarron has been going to the Hereford YMCA every evening to work out in the organization's weight room. His brothers, also weight lifters, have more or less served as his coaches this year.

Last year, Samarron won first place at the regional powerlifting tournament and qualified for the state meet.

His drive for another regional title this year has been slowed somewhat when a bar containing 400 pounds of weights was dropped by another youngster, and came down on Samarron's leg, during a workout on February 6.

Samarron made an attempt to catch the weight, but missed, and the weight hit him on his quadriceps muscle. Luckily, no bone was broken. In fact, the force of the weight falling bent the bar so drastically that a new weight bar had to be secured.

In order to win at regional, Samarron says he will have to lift a total of 1,000 pounds on the squat

and bench press. Normally, he is able to bench press 400 pounds and lifts 600 pounds in the "squats."

The leg injury has hurt his performance more in the squat category.

Most boys in the high school age group lift 300 to 350 pounds in the "squat." Samarron has won a number of powerlifting meets in the open division, which accepts entrants up to 30 years of age.

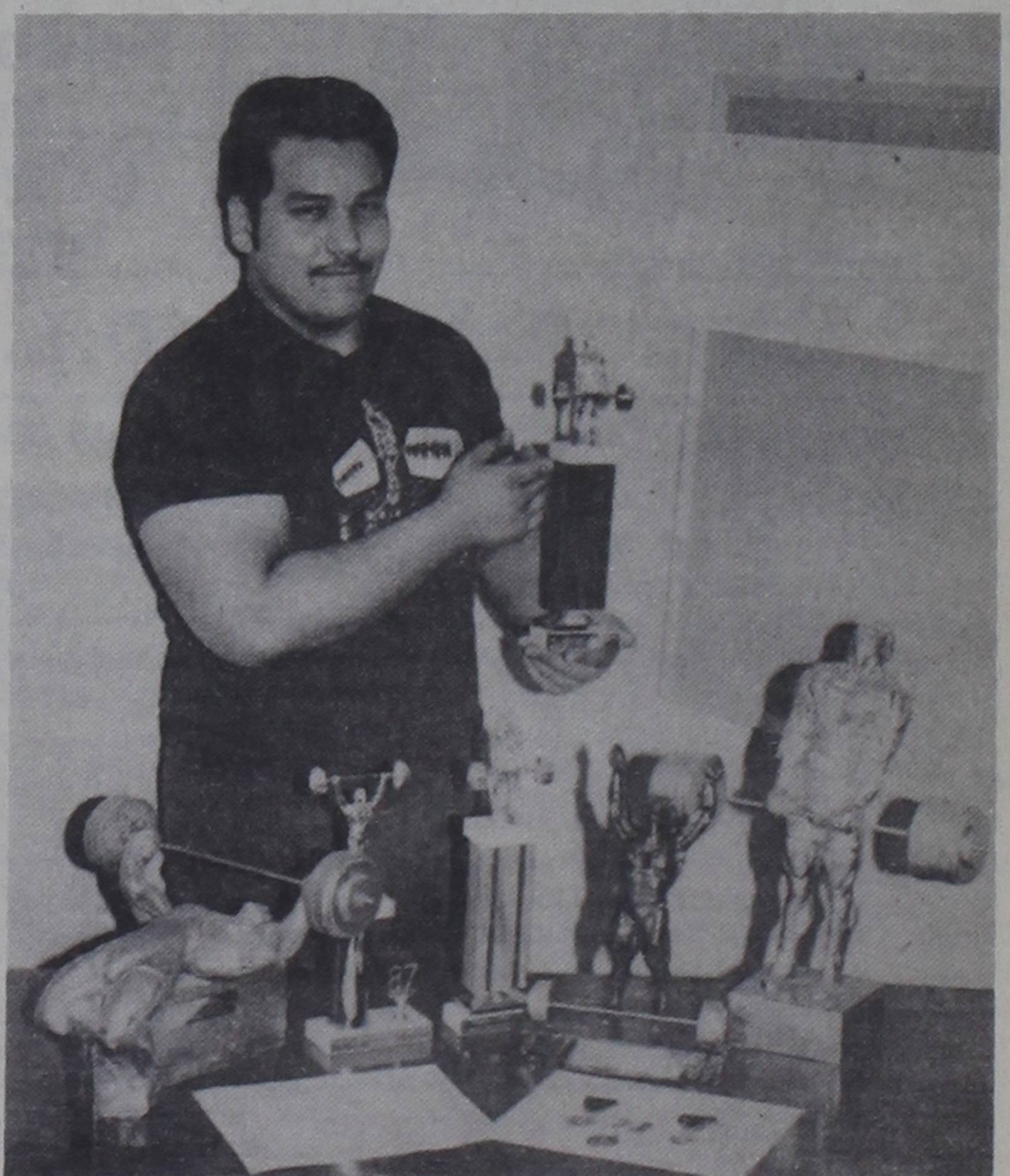
After winning regional in 1987, Samarron competed in the state meet at College Station, placing sixth in his division, the super heavyweight.

"I think I can still win (at Littlefield), in spite of the injury," Samarron says. He wants to qualify for the state tournament once again, which would be a credit to his dedication to the sport of powerlifting which he has continued on his own.

Samarron will be Friona High School's only entrant in the regional powerlifting competition Saturday.

Funeral services for Pearl Hand, 95, were held Friday, February 25 in the First United Methodist Church of Friona.

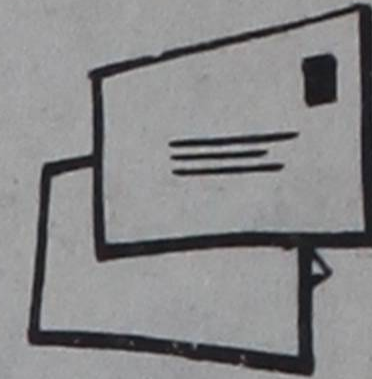
The Friona Cemetery Association will begin using water from the City of Friona in the near future. The association paid the city \$2,726.28 as its portion of the costs involved in extending the line.

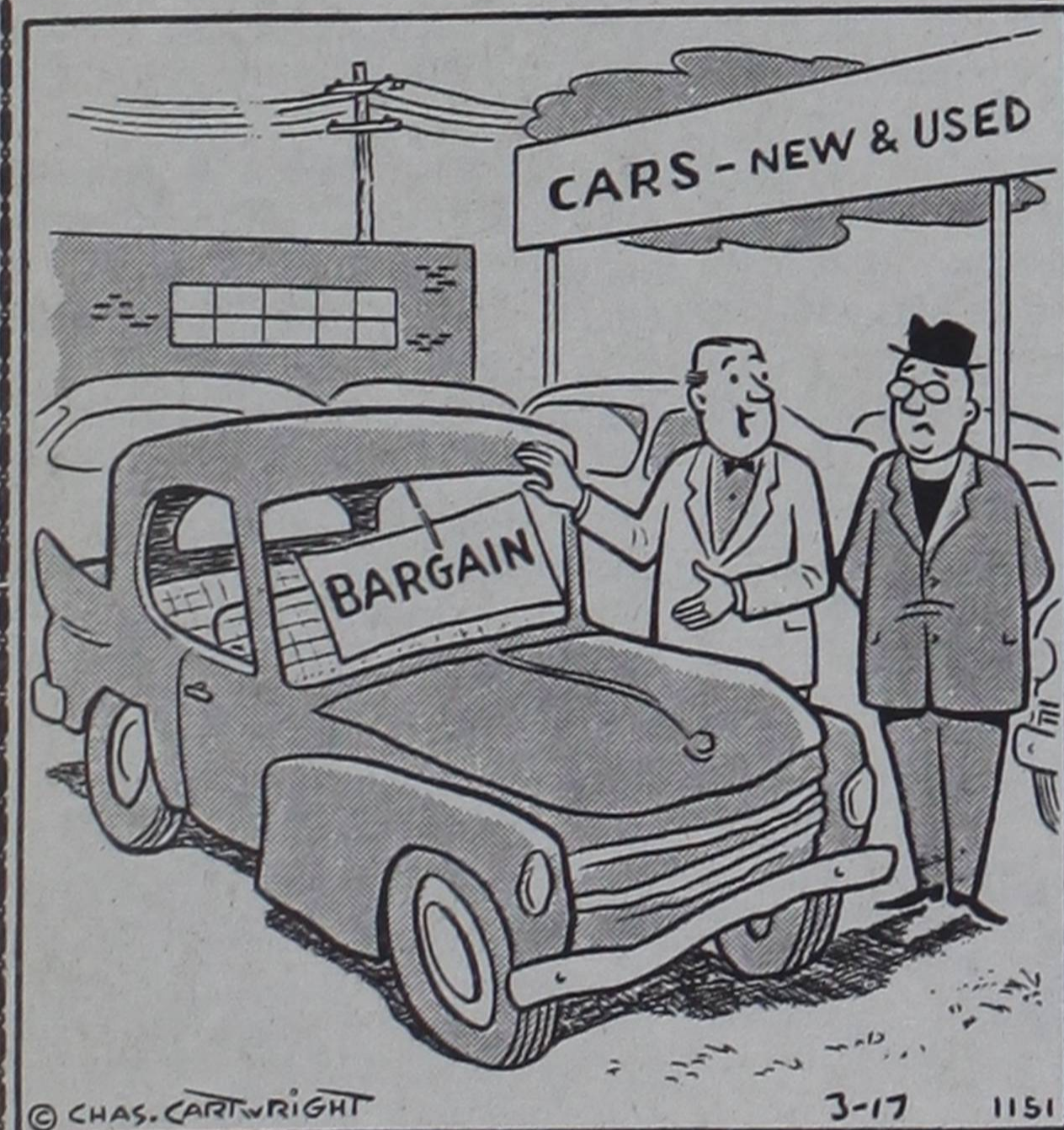

SPS, Cities Agree On Rate Decrease

Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) and a committee representing the cities SPS serves in Texas announced this week they have agreed to a \$14.4 million, or 3.1%, overall reduction in electric rates for SPS's residential, commercial, industrial and other retail customers.

Of that amount, \$10.9 million is applicable to customers within the city limits of the communities SPS serves in Texas. The remainder would apply to rural areas when approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT).

The decrease reflects lower SPS costs of providing service, principally through savings made possible by federal tax reform, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research. Effective with SPS's current fiscal year, federal tax reform decreased the Company's federal income taxes.

SPS announced in October, it intended to request a rate reduction. A committee representing the cities was organized to examine the proposed

lower rates. Chairman of the committee is Merrill E. Nunn, Amarillo city attorney.

SPS is filing the request with 74 cities it serves in Texas. If approved by the cities, the decrease is expected to go into effect March 28. A monthly bill for a residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours would drop \$3, from \$73.51 to \$70.51. In Texas, cities have original jurisdiction over rates within their city limits.

The PUCT regulates rates in rural areas, and SPS will request the commission approve an identical reduction for SPS's rural customers. SPS expects these rates to be approved within the next few months, Hunter said. The staff of the PUCT has been reviewing the effects of federal tax reform on electric and telephone utilities throughout the state to ensure tax savings are recognized in rates.

Echols Leads Boys' Basketball Stats

Senior guard Daniel Echols led the Friona Chieftain basketball team in virtually every category, according to season statistics released this week by Coach T.J. Parks.

Although he missed a couple of games due to illness, Echols still was far and away the team's leading scorer with 318 total points in 22 games, for a 14.5 points-per-game average.

His scoring average suffered due to curtailed time around the illness, and another time when he sat out most of the game due to fouls and failed to get into the scoring column.

Echols hit 118 of 272 attempts from two-point range, making 43.4 per cent of those shots. He also hit four of 18 tries from beyond the three-point line (22 per cent),

and had 70 of 123 from the free throw line (56.9 per cent).

Easily the team leader in steals with 69, the nearest in this category was Glen Trimmell with 38. The 5-11 floor leader also led in assists (passes leading directly to a score) with 59, to 29 for Trimmell, and was even the team's rebound leader with 143, to 122 for Brent Riethmayer.

Runnerup in the scoring department was junior Cody Burney, with 187 points in 24 games, for a 7.8 points-per-game average. Burney hit 65 of 244 two-pointers, five of 37 three-point attempts and 42 of 79 from the foul line.

Stephen Thornton had the most three point baskets, seven. Echols even led in fouls with 76, to 71 for Burney.
