



MAKING UP THE BED

ESSENTIALS FOR COMFORT ON A HOT NIGHT.

Proper Arrangement of Clothes and Mattress Means Healthy and Restful Sleep-Linen Sheets Are Cooler Than Cotton.

One of the essential conditions for comfort on hot nights is to sleep in a perfectly made bed. An illy made bed is bad at any time, but it is most objectionable and causes more suffering in hot weather than in cold.

Far better take the time to do it right in the early morning, even though it is warm, than to try to sleep in it when it is waym, during eight hours of the night.

It is rather remarkable how bad the majority of beds are in the way they are made, in the kind of materials used, in the shape of the mattress and in the formation of the springs.

Each one of these defects is a distinct thorn in the flesh when one is trying to woo sleep on a warm night. It is probable that given a comfortable, refreshing bed more than one-half of the people would sleep soundly during the summer season. In some houses the beds are not

pillow cases are spread out all day in the coolest, darkest room. The bed is made up only an hour before retiring so that it will be fresher and cooler than if the bed clothes had

made up until after night fall at this

time of the year. The sheets and

Even people who have small purses try to arrange these frequent changes. If it is a question of too much laundry, then they economize by alternating with sheets and pillow cases every night, letting one set always hang in

son who is not well-to-do In summer, sleep and baths are the preservatives of endurance against the heat, and doctors say they rarely know of a case of serious pros tration among any set of people who

the night, remember these suggestions: Have linen sheets if you can. for they are twice as cool as cotton. If the latter, keep two or three sets

smooth with a cold iron while still damp, fold and put away in lavender.

Do not have pillow cases too large for the pillows. This is irritating. When making the bed, tuck the first

sheet under the mattress with a firm make dle until every wrinkle is removed Do not tuck the upper sheet and the spread under the mattress, for, when they are turned down, they pull the first sheet out with them and make it

wrinkle. Do not put a fancy spread on the bed, which will heat it during the day. Never put feather pillows in the sun. as the heat draws the oil from the quills and greases the ticking.

Never let the head of the bed rest against the wall. Put it in the middle of the floor if possible; if not, give it as much space from the wall as pos sible, so the air can circulate back of the bed and keep the head cool.

Salad Dressing. Take four tablespoonfuls butter, one tablespoonful flour, one cup of milk, three eggs, one tablespoonful sugar, one large teaspoonful mustard, one scant tablespoonful salt, one-half cup vinegar. Put butter into double boiler; when melted add to the flour; stir till smooth and then add the milk and let heat. Stir the eggs, sugar, mus-


