ruins. Several people were killed by the collapse of a building occupied by the street railway and power plant at Bueva Vista. The shock north to south, and fissures were op-ened in the streets. Abode houses throughout the city crumbled, but the dead in these are not yet known. the dead in these are not yet known. The only known foreigner killed was a chinaman. The warchouse at the Gentral Station collapsed, killing an engineer. One of the wals of the National Palace was cracked, displacing a keystone of one arch, while the ancient cathedral of Santo Domingo was badly damaged.

The quake occurred just before the arrival of Madero but did not stop his ovation.




