## ANOTHER FINE RAIN HAS FALLEN

All Texas Soaked with Recent Rains. Much Damage Reported in South Texas

A steady rain has fallen for the last three days over this section. While at this place the rain has been mild, other sections have received tremendous downpours and much damage has been reported. In and near San Antonio houses have been washed away and several persons drowned.

According to Mr. G. G. Black, who keeps an accurate record of the rainfall, the precipitation here for the last nine days is 3.25 inches, and for the twenty-four hours before 9 a. m. today the amount was 1.7-16 inches.

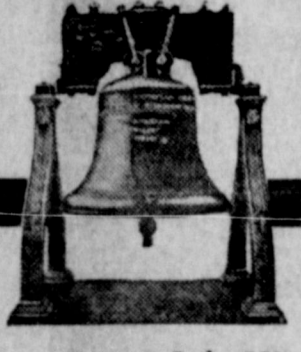

**ONE OF SWEETWATER'S FIRST NEWSPAPERS**

Copy of Sweetwater Advance Published more than Thirty Years Ago Found in Old Building.

Volume 1 No. 7. of the Sweetwater Advance was found in the old building recently occupied by Anna Johnson (colored) Monday, By T. E. Crutcher, while tearing down the old structure and was observed with no little interest by a number of the "old timers." Mr. John Montgomery had the paper in his possession when the reporter inspected it. Mr. Montgomery is one of the oldest citizens of the county, having come here more than two years before the paper in question was published.  
 The Advance had A. J. Wilson at the masthead as editor and proprietor, and on the front page was the frank motto, "Published in the interest of Sweetwater and the proprietor."

In this paper appeared a notice requesting bids for the erection of the county court house. W. C. Johnson was county clerk at that time and Judge Wheeler, county judge. The latter afterward became Lieutenant governor of Texas.

The first statement on the editorial page was the statement, "Spring fights have opened up."

Among the local items appeared the following: "Mr. Hull has bought the old court house and hoveed it to the south side of the railroad."

Messrs. Posey, Montgomery and Cowen will soon have their sections of land fenced just north of town.

For watches clocks and jewelry go to Posey and Montgomery.

Ads of the following firms are noticeable in the paper: City Drug Store Douthitt Bros., proprietors, Prince & Durham, Saddles and Harness, Sweetwater Saloon, G. H. & W. E. Connell, Dry Goods, Posey & Montgomery, Dry Goods, Clothing, N. I. Dulaney, Lumber, Central Hotel, F. S. Rey, Prop; Wright & Fowler, Furniture, Sweetwater House, Mrs. S. M. Bula, Prop.

The paper recalled many incidents of early days in Sweetwater and it was instructive as well as interesting for the Reporter man to listen to the conversations of Messrs. Montgomery, Frank Oley and others who have been here from the time the county was organized and some of them came to the county even prior to that time.

J. C. Montgomery sr. was the first sheriff of Nolan County and when the county was organized, he with County Clerk, W. C. Johnson went to Albany and returned with the official records, this county having been a part of Shackelford county for judicial purposes.

The first session of county court was held at "Blue Goose," and it is said that the term was quite short, but lively.

Mr. Crutcher has favored us with another copy of the advance under date of March 3rd of the same year. Below are some of the items taken from its columns.

"The public school was opened Monday with 28 scholars under the tutelage of Professor Haynes. The school is in a prosperous condition and the

It is the handsomest and most secure jail in West Texas, costing the county \$9,755. It was first intended for court house and jail, but we are informed that the commissioners court have determined to use the first floor, which was designed for court room and offices as jailor's residence, and build a stone court house on the summit at the head of Main street. They have advertised for plans etc., for a two story stone building to cost about \$20,000.

**NOLAN ONE OF FEW COUNTIES TO SECURE SERVICE**

County Agricultural Demonstration Agent, W. C. Calvert has just received official notice that Nolan county is one of the twelve counties in the state to be included in an experimental truck farming service. While attending the Farmer's Congress he learned that the government would expend a sum of money in assisting a few counties in maintaining the service and lost no time in getting busy when he returned home in an effort to have Nolan included in the list.  
 In conversation with a reporter this morning about the matter he stated that a lady who has taken a course in plant culture and in the art of canning at the A. & M. College will be employed, her salary and other expenses to be partly paid by the government and partly by the business interests of the county, whose duty it will be to interest the girls, boys and grown up people in the work of cultivating vegetables, and fruits and in canning and preserving all valuable plants and fruits.  
 Mr. Calvert is feeling mighty good that Nolan county will have this additional service and is advising the people to prepare their soil well and where practical irrigate during the winter and have the land in the best possible condition. He says those who take the proper interest in this work will be in position to supply their less fortunate neighbors and the town people who have not the opportunity of growing such products.  
 The Sweetwater Chamber of Commerce in view of its policy of aiding in all work that will benefit the farming interests of the county will take an active part in assisting in this line of work throughout the county.
