Guests Are Slated For Benefit

ONE OF THE best-attended annual functions in Friona for the past few years, has been the local Science Fair in conjunction with open house at the schools during Public School Week. I am always amazed by the variety of excellent science projects which are created by the students each year.

Teachers, bless their little old hearts! They have to put up with a lot from all of our off-spring for 12 or 13 years. We should give them a lot of credit for causing some thought-processes to be activated in the brains of our reluctant youngsters.

High-technology is taking over in the work-place across our country. It is necessary now, more than at any other time in our history, for us to turn out well-educated young people from our high schools. However, the sad fact is, that prospective employers can no longer assume that just because someone comes in with a high school diploma, that he or she is going to be prepared to do an adequate job.

I believe that the schools in our local area turn out a fair majority of students who are well above average. However, one out of every three adults in this country lack the reading and writing skills they need to hold a job.

This poorly educated work force is costing the business world hundreds of billions of dollars in waste. For example, instances have been documented in which employees misordered millions of dollars in parts, overpaid bills and claims and endangered work-place safety. In one case, a feedlot operator misread a label which ended up killing a pen of cattle when they were fed poison instead of feed grain. Costs of this nature always end up filtering down to be eventually paid by, guess who, YOU the consumer.

District Attorney Johnny Actkinson told a group at Lions Club Ladies Night last year that the one thing that 80 per cent of all criminals in jails across the state of Texas had in common was a lack of education. He pointed out that the majority of those prisoners had no more than a seventh grade education.

I haven't seen any figures, but I'll bet the U.S. spends more on educating its children than practically any other country in the world. So why, then, are we turning out so many young adults who are totally inadequate to function in society?

A lot of folks have been blaming the educational system in general for this sad fact. I don't think that is exactly fair. My father used to have an old saying that went like this... "You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink." We are leading a lot of children to the fountain of knowledge, but they simply aren't drinking in very much of it. They seem to exhibit a rather large lack of interest in learning. Why?

This generation of youngsters seems to feel that they should be entertained at every waking moment. Well, some amount of education can be made entertaining. I am sure that most of our teachers work toward making their respective courses as interesting as possible for the students. But the children need to be made to understand that, from ages 5 through 18, it is their JOB to learn, whether it happens to be entertaining or not.

We need to impress our children with the fact, at a very young age, that they will some day be expected to go to work and earn a paycheck. You cannot earn a paycheck by watching TV, playing video games, or "hanging out."

Times have changed. Jobs are different. But one thing remains the same. You can't get ahead in life without an education and you can't hold down a job if you don't know your "three R's."

Demos Set Runoff; Convention

Drawing for ballot position for the April 12 Democratic party runoff was held this week, according to Wendol Christian, County Democratic Chairman.

In the county sheriff's race, Rex Williams drew place one on the ballot, with John Armstrong taking place number two.

In the state senate runoff, Mel Phillips drew first position, with Bryan Poff taking second position.

Christian announces that for the runoff, there will be only four polling places, rather than the ten which operated for the primary.

Voters in Commissioner's Precinct 2 will vote at the American Legion Hall in Bovina, Precinct 3 voters will cast ballots at the Community Center in Farwell, and Precinct 4 voters will vote at the Lazbuddie School.

The Parmer County Democratic convention will be held Saturday, March 19 beginning at 2 p.m. at the Community Room of the First Bank in Bovina.

"We would like to encourage all delegates to the county convention to attend this meeting," Christian said.

Allsup's Store Held Up Here

Allsup's Store No. 217 was the target of a daring daylight robbery last Friday, March 11.

A white male, believed to be 20-25 years of age, about six feet tall and 175 pounds, took an undetermined amount of cash from the store while threatening the clerk, Dede Evans, with a pocket knife.

Mrs. Evans told the Friona Police Department that the man walked in at 12 noon, brandished the pocket knife and told her to give him all the money.

She opened the cash register and stepped back, and the intruder reached across and grabbed a handful of money. Then the man, who wore a nylon stocking over his face, told Mrs. Evans to go to the back of the store and get inside the freezer.

He followed her back to the

freezing compartment to make sure she got inside, then ran out.

Mrs. Evans said she left the freezer to see the man running away on foot. No vehicle was ever spotted. The Friona Police Department was on the scene shortly and investigated, but the man could not be found. Investigation was continuing late this week.

Police were told that the robber had dark or black hair, and was wearing blue jeans, a blue striped shirt and a maroon jacket with a bulldog emblem and the words "Ranger Bulldogs" around the emblem.

Assistant Police Chief Rex Williams said they had contacted the police department in Ranger with the man's description.

No other convenience stores in the immediate area had been victimized, Williams said.

Firemen Have Big Week With Calls

While grass fires were causing considerable damage in Central Texas last week, the Friona Volunteer Fire Department had a busy schedule.

In a five-day period, the department was called to fight four burr fires, beginning with a fire at West Plains Feed Yard on March 7.

On March 10, the department was called to fight a burr fire at Paco Feed Yards at 4:06 p.m. Twenty-three firemen responded.

Less than 30 minutes later, at 4:25 p.m., another call was received for a fire at Friona Feed Yard. Fourteen firemen responded to this call, which took three hours

to contain. Extremely high winds hampered the firemen's efforts on March 10.

The local firemen were at Paco for 12 hours from the time of their first call, and then at 10:30 a.m. the following day, the department was called back to Paco where wind had re-ignited the burrs. Firemen spent 15 additional hours at the fire on Friday's call.

A total of nine fire departments were represented at the Paco fire. In addition to Friona, fire departments responded from Bovina, Lazbuddie, Muleshoe, Dimmitt, Hereford, Walcott and Cannon Air Force Base, Clovis, N.M.

60 YEARS AGO—MARCH 12, 1928

At an election held here Monday for the purpose of determining whether or not Friona should become an organized municipality or remain a mere hamlet, a good turnout assured incorporation, by a vote of 65 for and 34 against. There being perhaps 125 qualified voters in the described corporate limits, the turnout of 101 voters was considered excellent.

50 YEARS AGO—MARCH 25, 1938

An epidemic of measles has broken out in Friona and vicinity during the past two weeks, and the number of cases seem to be increasing rather than decreasing.

In this issue of the Star will be found the announcement of James W. Witherspoon of Hereford, as a candidate for re-election to the office of District Attorney, an office he has held the past two years.

45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 19, 1943

Mr. and Mrs. Ray Landrum have sold the Regal Theatre to Bill McGlothlin, who will take charge within the very near future, it is reported this week. Mr. and Mrs. Landrum have also sold their residence property in Friona to McGlothlin and their farm near Rhea to other parties, but have not as yet decided on their next location or plans.

40 YEARS AGO—MARCH 19, 1948

The Friona Chamber of Commerce was revived and re-organized at a meeting in Friona Monday night, when Fred Phelps, secretary-manager of the Portales (N.M.) Chamber of Commerce, addressed a group of Friona businessmen. A temporary board of directors was formed, with W.L. Edelman as chairman. Members are Nelson Welch, C.W. Dixon, Hoyt Smith, Weldon Dickson, Otho Whitefield and Ray Landrum.

35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 19, 1953

Construction of the first drive-in theatre in Parmer County is

scheduled to commence within a few days at Friona. Marvin Lawson, who will build and operate the theatre, states that everything possible is being done to provide a modern drive-in, with equipment already on order. Goal for completion date is May 15.

30 YEARS AGO—MARCH 20, 1958

Construction began this week on a 600,000 bushel capacity addition to the Black Grain Company. Completion is scheduled for June 1, in order to be ready for this year's wheat harvest.

Saturday, March 29 has been set as the last day of business under the present ownership of the City Steam Laundry according to E.E. Houlette, owner.

25 YEARS AGO—MARCH 21, 1963

Friona's Squaws, losers to Little Cypress in the semi-finals, 57-46, trounced Cotulla, 64-38 for third place in the state tournament last weekend. Two Squaws, Janet Buckley and Kay Burleson, were named to the All-State team.

"Star Lites," a column written by young editor Bill Ellis, appeared in the Friona Star for the first time.

20 YEARS AGO—MARCH 21, 1968

Open house for Missouri Beef Packers' Friona plant has been set for Saturday, April 20, it was announced this week. Activities at the world's largest beef processing plant, including a "name" guest speaker are in the works, according to Charles Allen, president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

Jack Hightower, state senator for the 30th senatorial district, will be the guest speaker for the Friona Junior Chamber of Commerce installation banquet April 5.

15 YEARS AGO—MARCH 22, 1973

Winners of the "Fighting Chieftain" awards at Friona High School are Sylvia Malouf and Todd Bandy. They were named at the All-Sports Banquet.

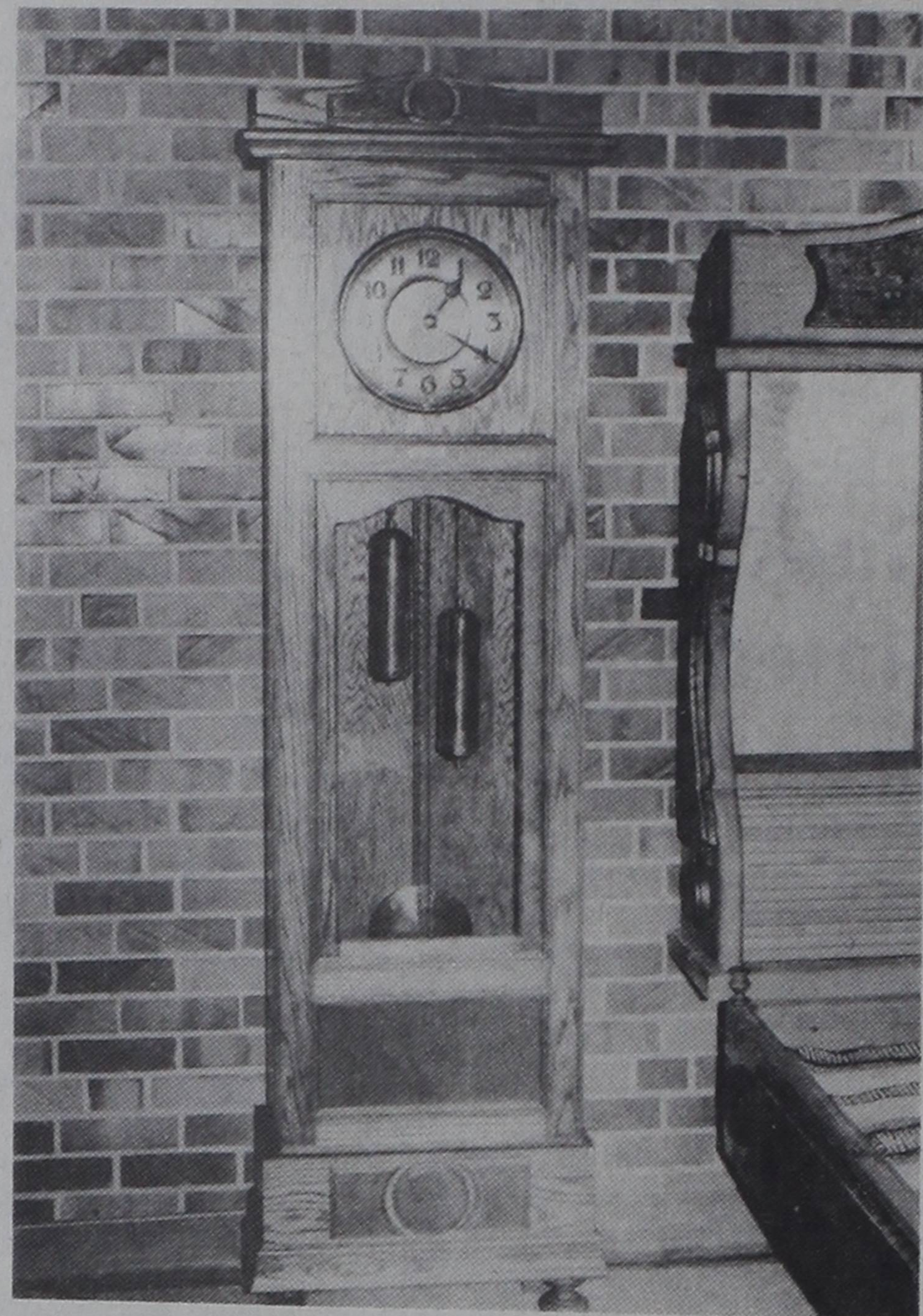



Winners Are Given For Grain Contest

Gary Matthews, who farms in Gaines County, Texas and brothers, Terry and Gary O'Neal, farming in Gray County, Texas, have been named winners in the 1987 National Grain Sorghum Production Contest.

The Yield and Management Contest, sponsored by National Grain Sorghum Producers Association, is conducted in two categories—irrigated and non-irrigated. Contestants were scored against the three-year average established for their county by the Crop Reporting Service. Winners were those producers whose yields were highest in relation to the county average.

Matthews is winner of the irrigated category. He is 35 years old and has been farming 12 years. Matthews rotates his crops and applies fertilizer according to soil test recommendations. He produced his winning yield of 171.07 bushels per acre on land which he had prepared to produce 9000 pounds (160 bu./ac.) He credits optimum growing conditions for the high yields. The three-year average for Gaines County is 51.9 bu./ac.

Other winners in the irrigated category are: second place, Jerome Mueller, who lives in Yankton, South Dakota and farms in Cedar County, Nebraska and third place, Houston Lee of Roosevelt County,

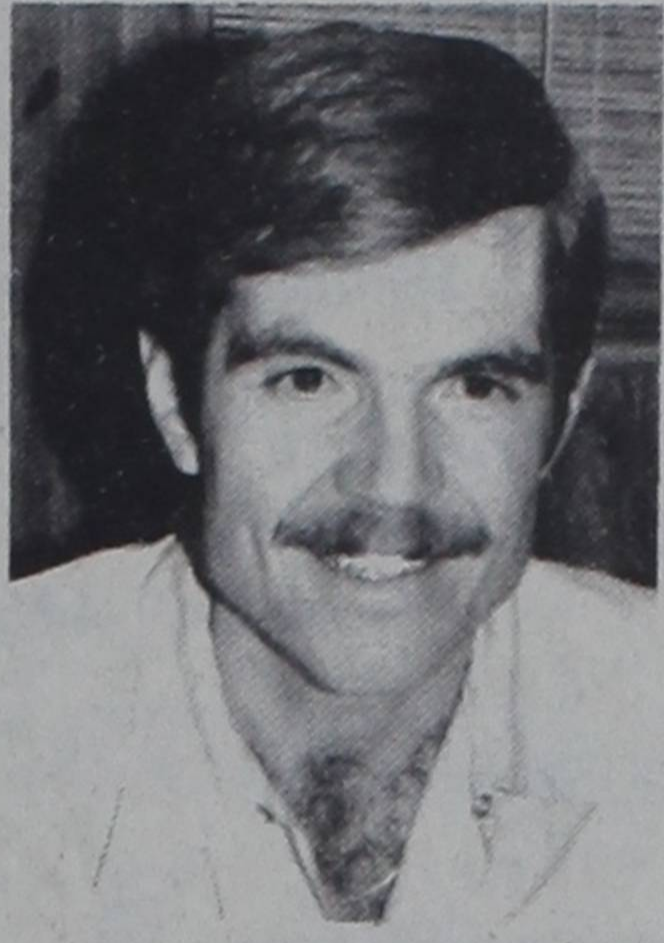
New Mexico.

The O'Neal brothers, Terry and Gary, entered in two Texas counties and won with both. Their Gray County entry, taking national first place in the non-irrigated category, was the Texas first place winner in that category. The O'Neals' second entry from Carson County, Texas, took the state's second place prize. The winning yield was 97.81 bu./ac. compared to a county three-year dryland average of 30.7 bu./ac.

Other winners in the non-irrigated category are: second place, Terry Carsten, Rooks County, Kansas and Jeffrey L. Clark, Pennington County, South Dakota.

The contest had 233 entries from nineteen states. Contestants were asked to complete a management information questionnaire on method of tillage, seed per acre, use of herbicides, insecticides, fertilizer, etc. National GSPA recorded this information in a computer program for reference and analysis. The information has also been printed in handbooks which will be distributed to contestants, the Extension Service, seed company sponsors and others who request it.

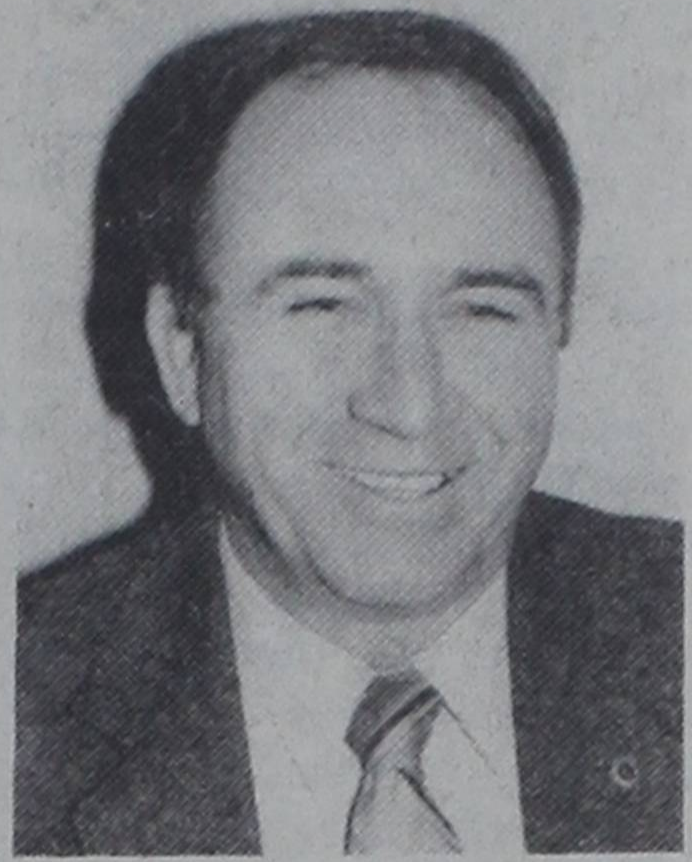
The national contest winners will be honored by National GSPA at an awards banquet in San Antonio, Texas on February 15.



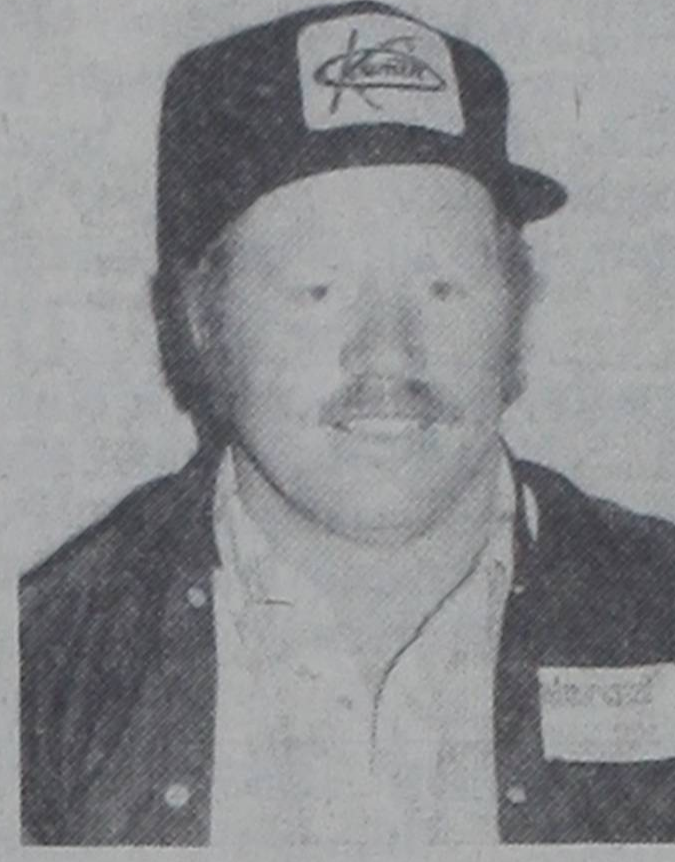

The Friona Chieftain track and field team survived the wind and cold to place second at the Panhandle Relays last Saturday.

The meet was held in weather with the chill factor well below the freezing point.

A trio of first place finishes sparked the Chieftains' effort.

Cody Burney remained unbeaten in the high jump event, winning his specialty with a leap of 6-4.

Daniel Padilla won the discus throw with an effort of 140 feet, eight inches.

Stephen Thornton kept up his pace in the 200-meter intermediate hurdles with a gold medal and a time of 40.9.

Daniel Echols placed second in

the 400-meter race, for the second week being edged by Dalhart's Charlie Tiggs. Echols had a time of 50.6.

Friona's 1600-meter relay team placed second behind the Dalhart team, with a time of 3:29.2. Members of this foursome are Cody Bracken, Thornton, Toby Gibson and Echols.

Ben Osborn placed third in the pole vault, clearing 11 feet even.

David Bugg followed teammate Thornton home in the intermediate hurdles race with a time of 41.2, good for third place, giving Friona 16 points in the event.

Mickey Pena wrapped up Friona's scoring with a sixth place finish in the 800-meter run, with a time of 2:12.

Bond Sales Are Given For Parmer County

Sales of United States Savings Bonds in Texas amounted to \$23,223,419 during November 1987 for a two-month total of \$44,504,322. T.J. Morrow, District Director for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Texas, announced recently. These sales represent 12.7% of the state's fiscal year 1988 assigned dollar goal of \$350 million.

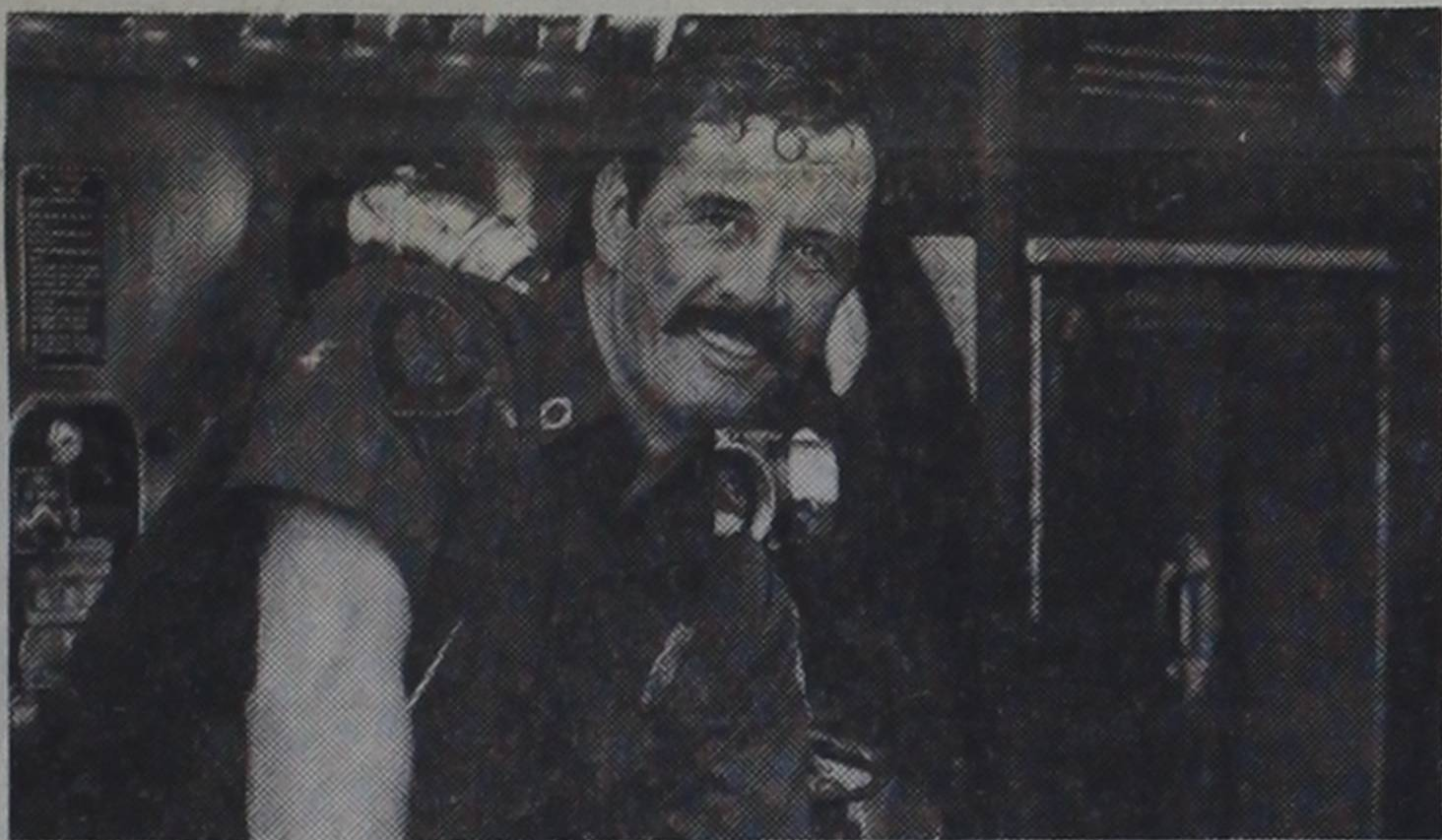
Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$1137 during October-November 1987 in Parmer County, officials said.

Nationally, fiscal year 1988 began with total sales of \$1,029 million for October-November 1987. The amount outstanding in United States Savings Bonds as of November 30, 1987 topped \$100 billion—a milestone, the highest total in the history of the Bond

Program. All Series EE Bonds purchased on or after November 1, 1982—and held at least five years—will earn 85 per cent of the average market yield on Treasury marketable securities. The average yield for Bonds held since the beginning of the market-based interest rate on November 1, 1982 is 8.75 per cent; the rate for the period November 1, 1987 through April 30, 1988 is 7.17 per cent. Outstanding Series EE and E Bonds and Savings Notes held for at least five years after November 1, 1982 are also eligible for this market-based yield. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.

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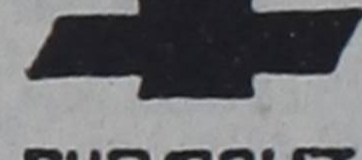
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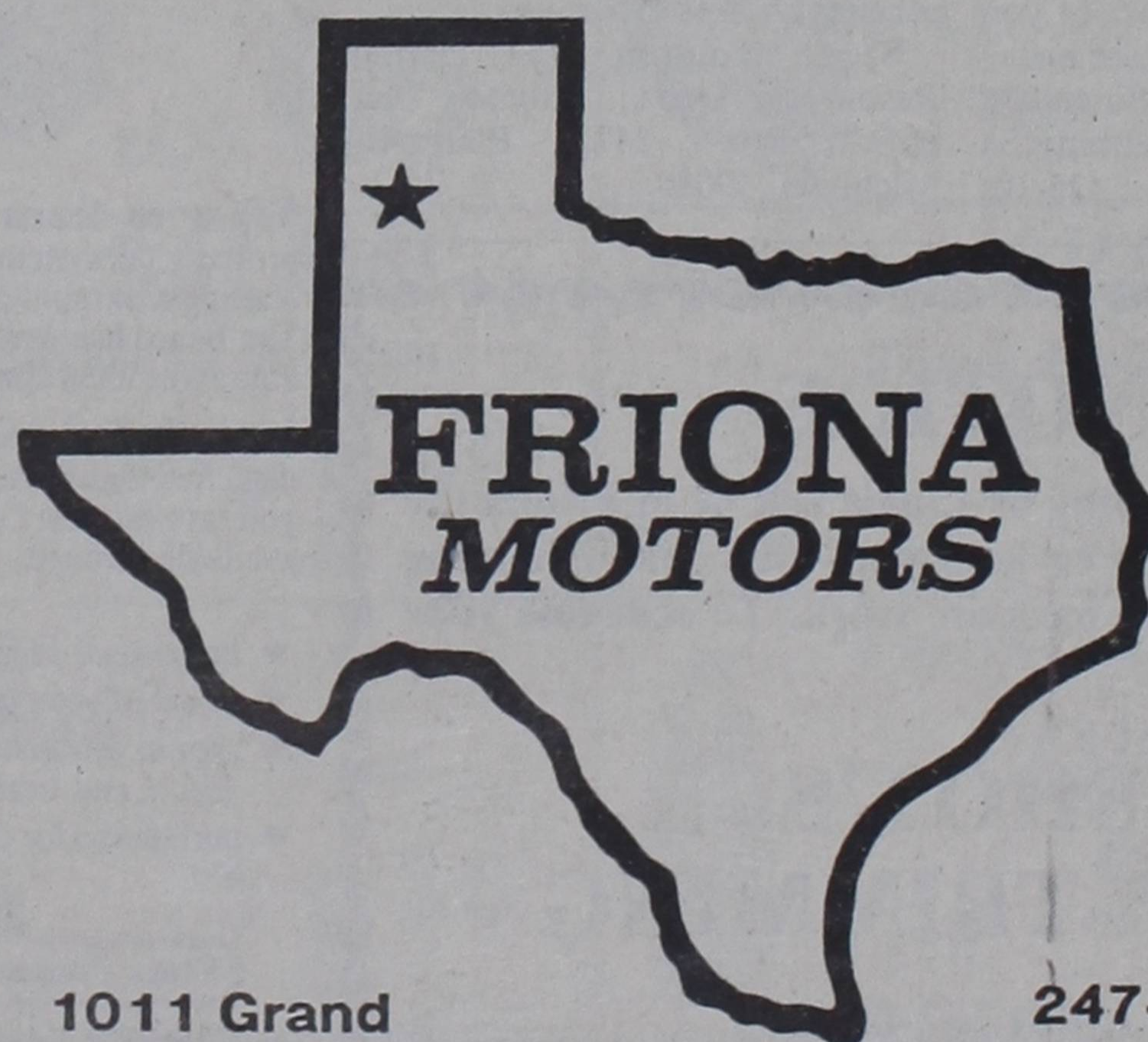

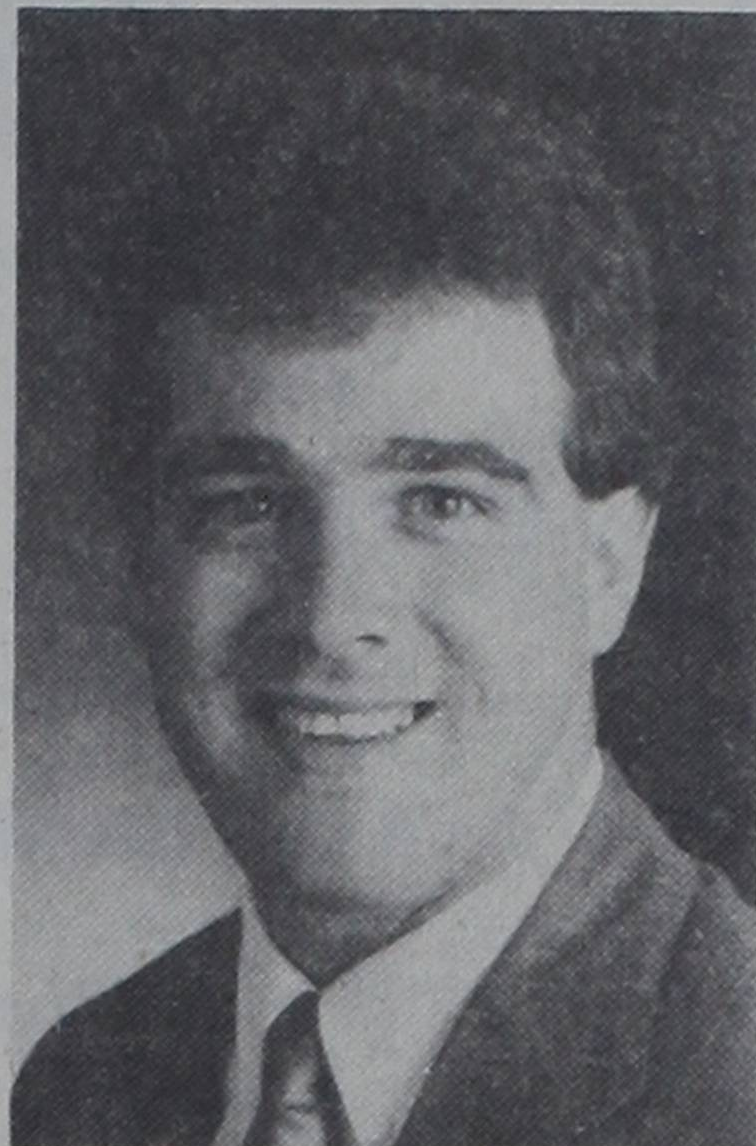
At Texas Tech, Frazier is a member of the Ambassadors for Agriculture. He is studying agricultural education, and is an active member of collegiate FFA.

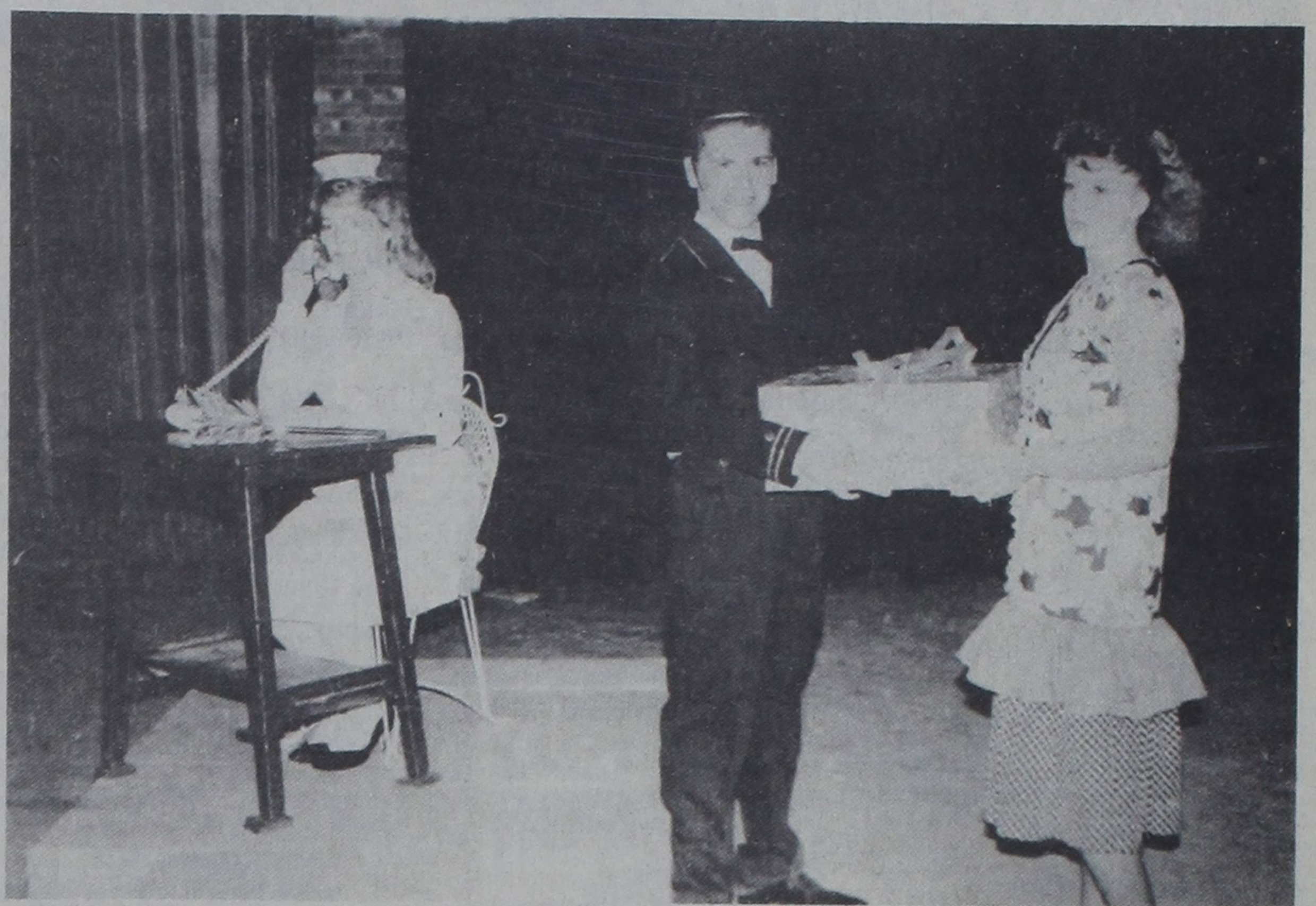
agricultural processing, swine production, diversified livestock production, agricultural mechanics, agricultural sales and service, and public speaking.

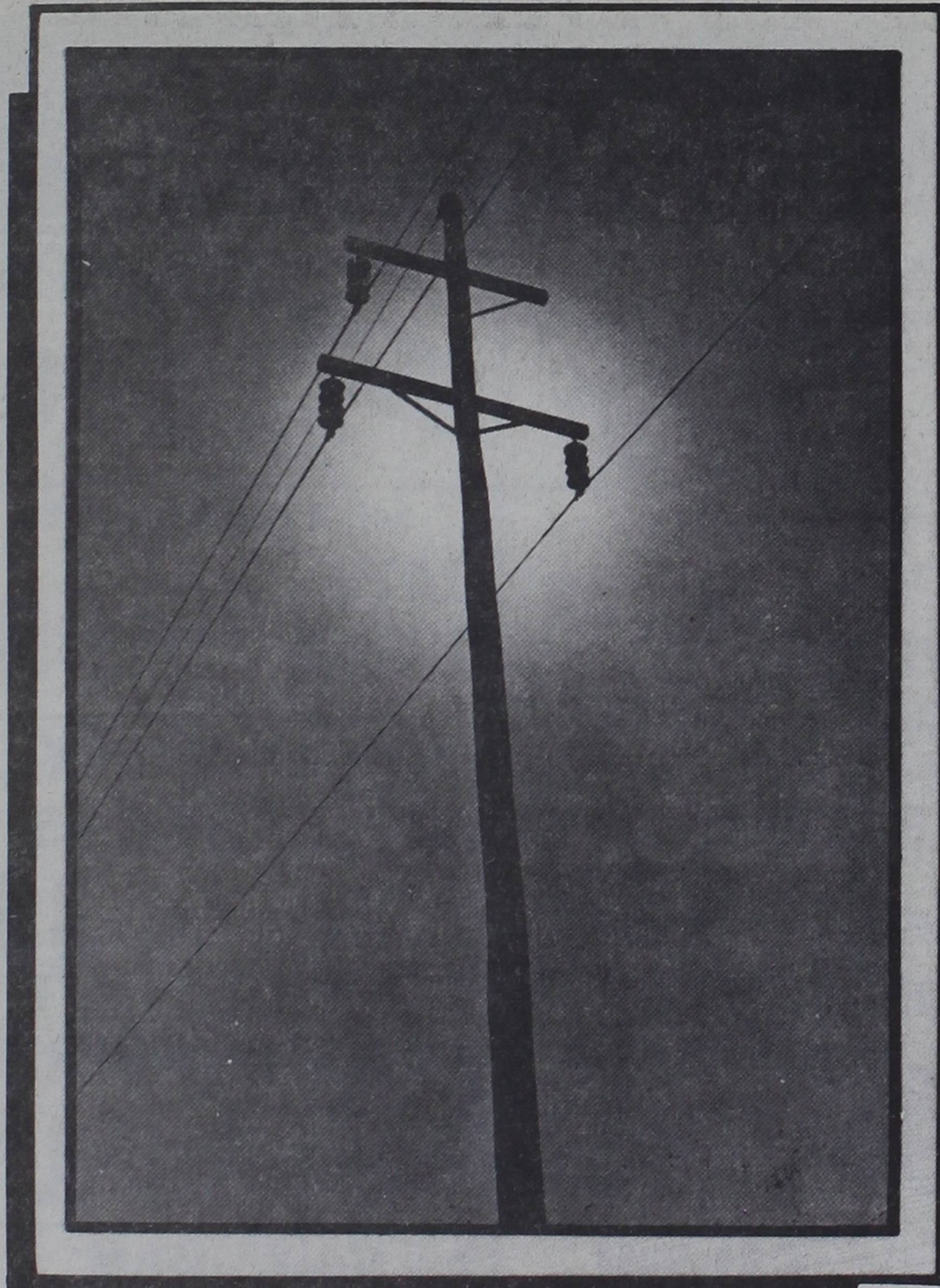

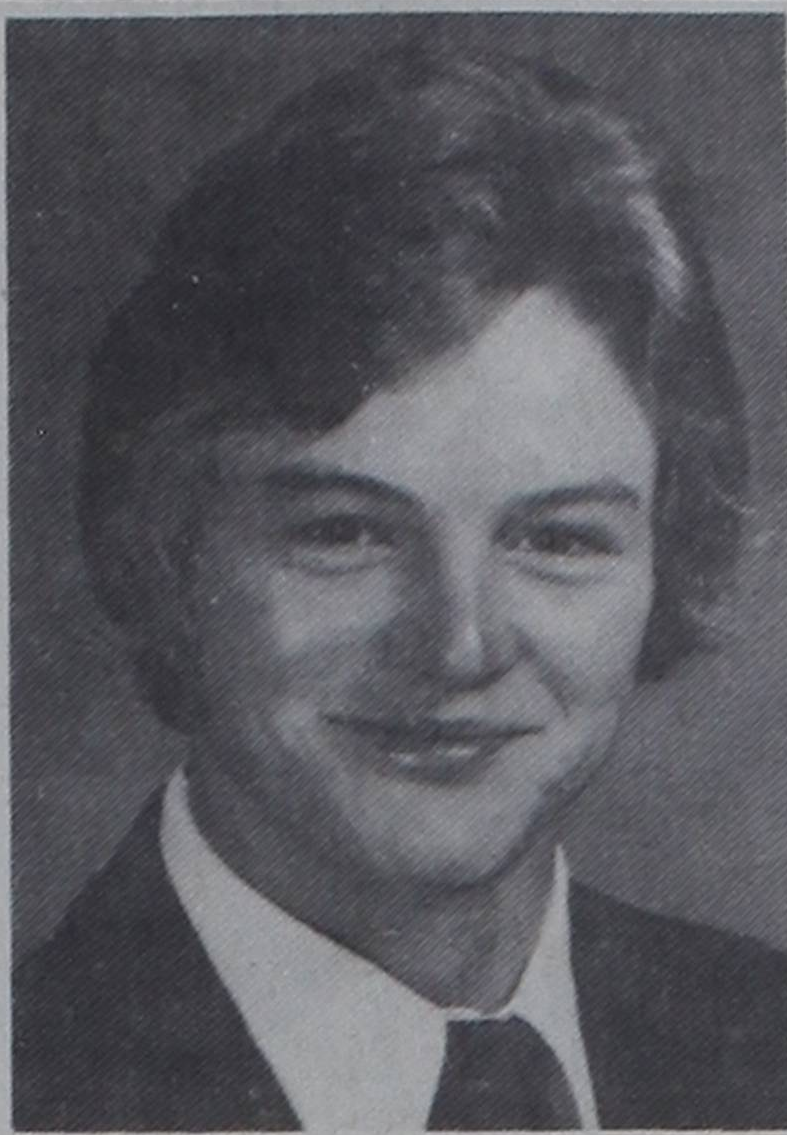

Dimmitt Man Killed In Sunday Accident

An outing near the Canadian River ended tragically last Sunday afternoon when Gary Bruegel, 27, was killed when his three-wheel all-terrain vehicle (ATV) ran off a 25-foot cliff.

He and friends reportedly were steering patterns on Bull Taco Hill at Rosita Flats Park, approximately three miles east of the Canadian River Bridge, when Bruegel steered wide and his ATV toppled over the edge of the cliff.

The fatal accident occurred at 12:45 p.m. Sunday. Bruegel, who reportedly was killed instantly, was pronounced dead at the scene by Potter County Justice of the Peace Lewis C. Brazier.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at the Fourth and Bedford Church of Christ of Dimmitt, with Ronnie Parker officiating. Charles Cotter, who had been Bruegel's industrial arts teacher in Dimmitt High School, delivered the eulogy.

Burial followed in Castro Memorial Gardens, under the direction of Foskey-Fleming Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Jack Stewart, David Allison, Joe Barrios, Howie McClure, Lee Schilling and Keith Jones.

Born May 19, 1960, Frederick Garrison Bruegel grew up in Dimmitt and graduated from high school here in 1979. He was president of the DHS Industrial Arts Club, played football, and was a member of the Key Club while in high school. He later

received an associate degree from Texas State Technical Institute in Amarillo. He was a carpenter.

He married Rhonda Brooks of Hart on February 15, 1987.

He is survived by his parents, Carl and Gail Bruegel of Dimmitt; a brother, Curtis of Dimmitt; two sisters, Sherri Young of Stephenville and Teresa Kemp of Fort Worth; and his grandmothers, Juanita Bruegel of Dimmitt and Jessie A. Garrison of Childress.

The family has requested that any memorials be made to the Dimmitt High School Industrial Arts Club through the First State Bank of Dimmitt.

Sorghum Yield Contest Plans Announced

The National Grain Sorghum Producers Association (NGSPA) has announced a change in the way its national sorghum yield contest will be scored.

The National Sorghum Yield and Management Contest was initiated by the NGSPA in 1985 to recognize the nation's outstanding sorghum producers and determine management practices which contribute to maximum yields. A high priority of the contest has been to adapt it to all sorghum producing regions of the country.

With that purpose in mind, the contest committee has modified the procedure for scoring the contest. Beginning in 1988, contestants scores will be the amount produced above the county average. For example, if a contestant produces 115 bushels in a county with a county average of 45, his score will be 70. If another contestant produces 160 bushels in a county with an average of 90, he, too, will have a score of 70.

Based on a computer analysis of yields and scores of all contestants in the past three years, this method had the best distribution throughout the country.

Another important factor of the contest is the publication of management practices of all entries. The *Results and Data* handbooks have been recognized as one source of information for sorghum producers as they make their management decisions. It is significant that producers have kept back issues of the handbook and refer to all three (1985, 1986 and 1987). Some have noted trends in tillage practices and chemical use in certain areas. All of this information is in the NGSPA computer databank and will become more significant with each additional entry.

The 1987 National Grain Sorghum Yield and Management Contest was officially concluded with an awards banquet in San Antonio, Texas on February 15. Even then, entries were being recorded for the 1988 contest. Interest and enthusiasm for the contest has developed much earlier than in previous years.

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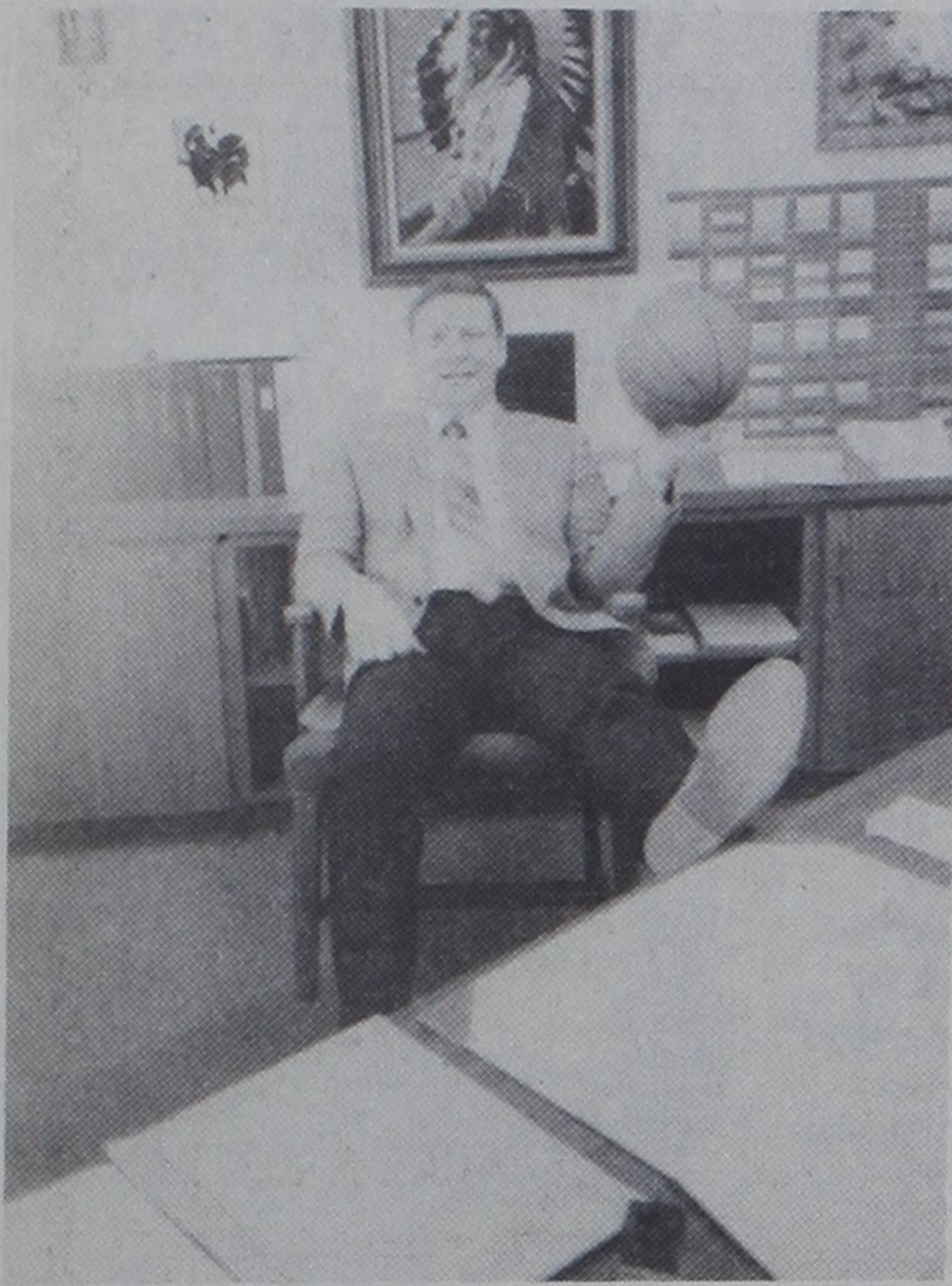
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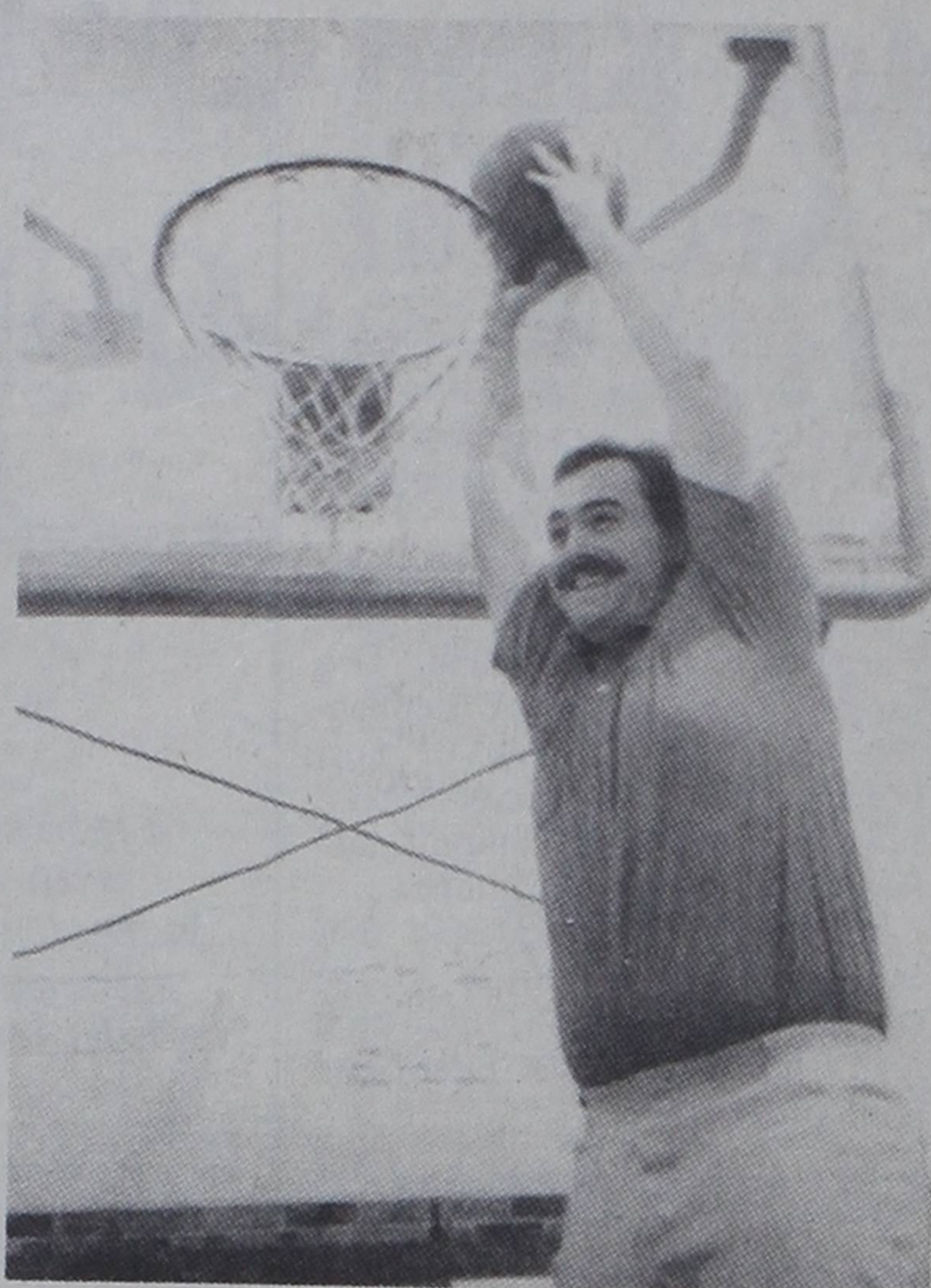

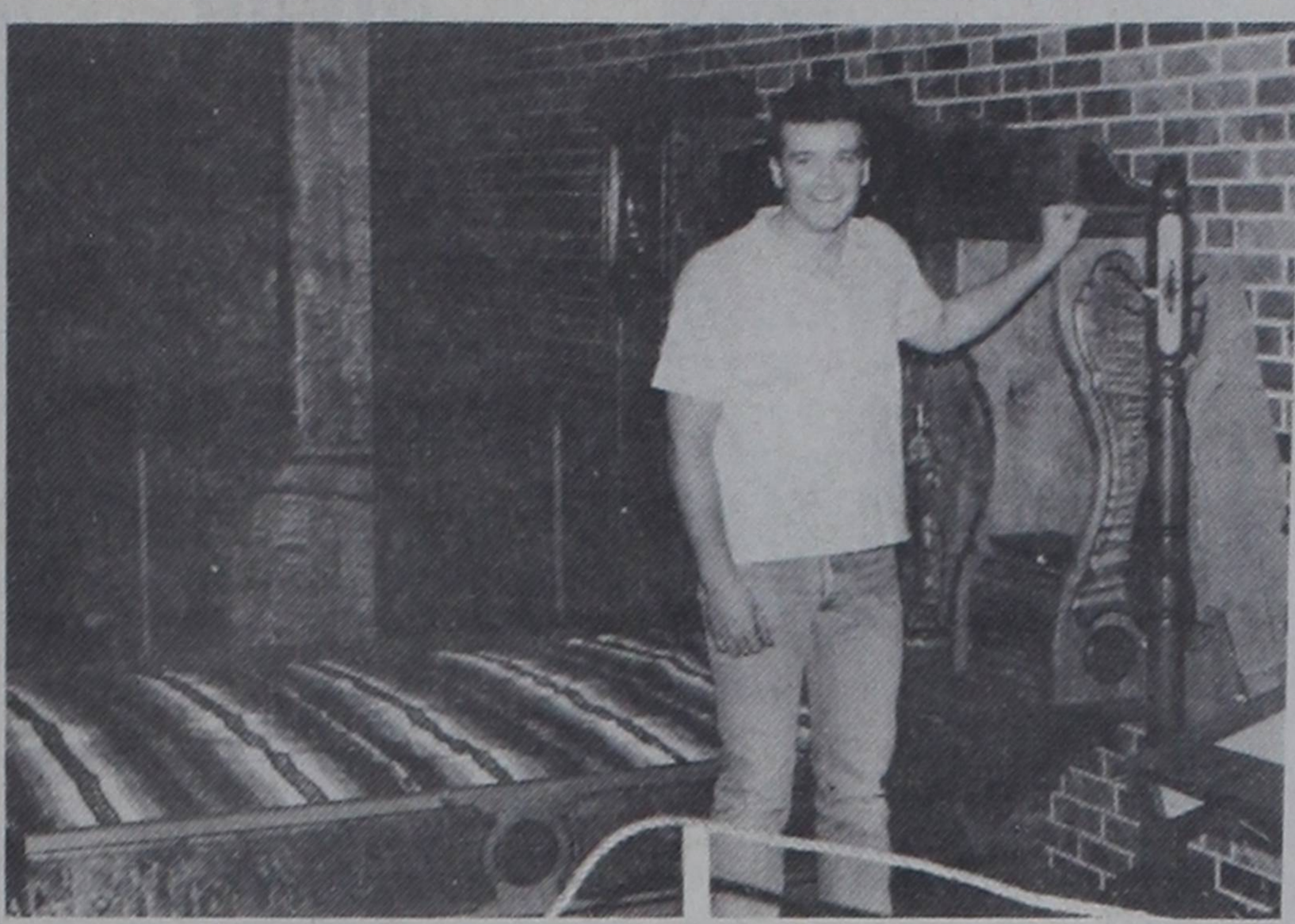

McCathern Challenges Combest

Gerald McCathern, candidate for Representative of the 19th Congressional District, has challenged Congressman Larry Combest to a series of issues debates to be held in each county seat of the 15 counties in the 19th District.

"Now that the primary is over, it is time for the voters of the 19th Congressional District to start separating the grain from the chaff in the Congressional race," McCathern said. "They need to know exactly where each of us stands on the issues which affects them the most."

An unofficial tally of the primary votes in the 15 counties shows McCathern led with 35,203 (50.7%), to Combest's 34,210 (49.3%). However, excluding Lubbock County from the 15 county tally, McCathern's lead stretched to 62% against 38% in the remaining 14 counties.

"I have confidence that an informed electorate will make the proper political decision in November concerning the Congressional race. However, only through a face-to-face forum where we each address the same issues and respond to the same questions will the voters have an opportunity to reach that informed decision," McCathern said.

"I am suggesting these debates be held in August or October, while Congress is in recess," McCathern said. "This will give Combest adequate time to arrange his calendar in order that there will be no conflicts," he added.

Although McCathern requested similar debates during the 1986 campaign, Combest refused. "I am issuing this challenge early enough in the campaign that he should have sufficient time to arrange his schedule to include the debates," McCathern said.

"It is our responsibility as candidates to see that every voter in the district is given the opportunity to question us side-by-side and face-to-face on the issues," McCathern concluded.

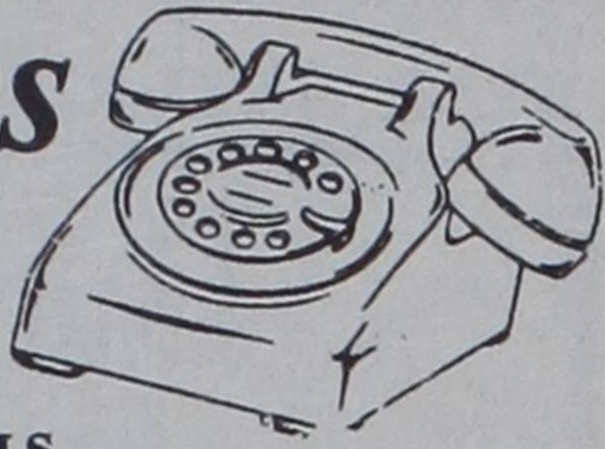

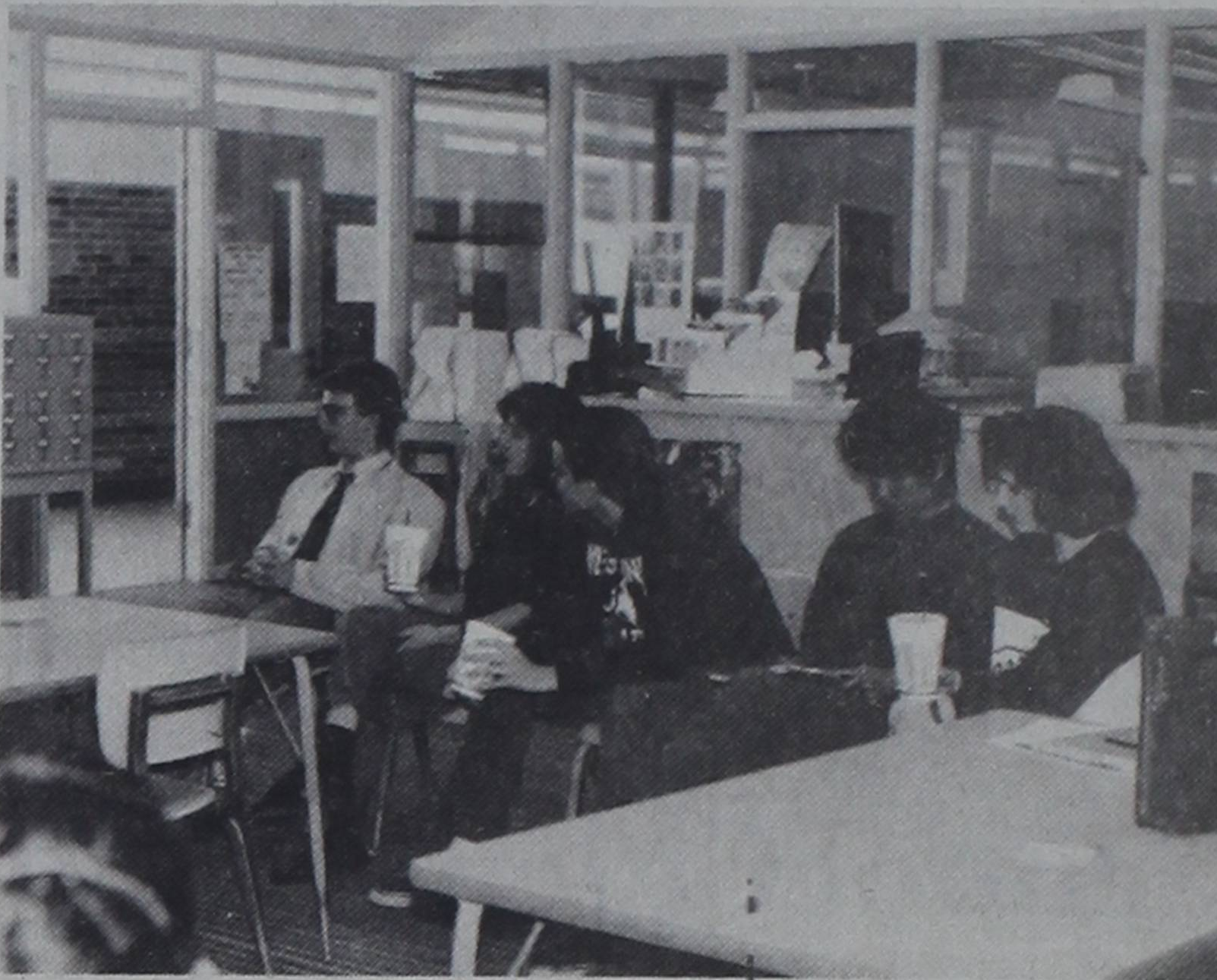

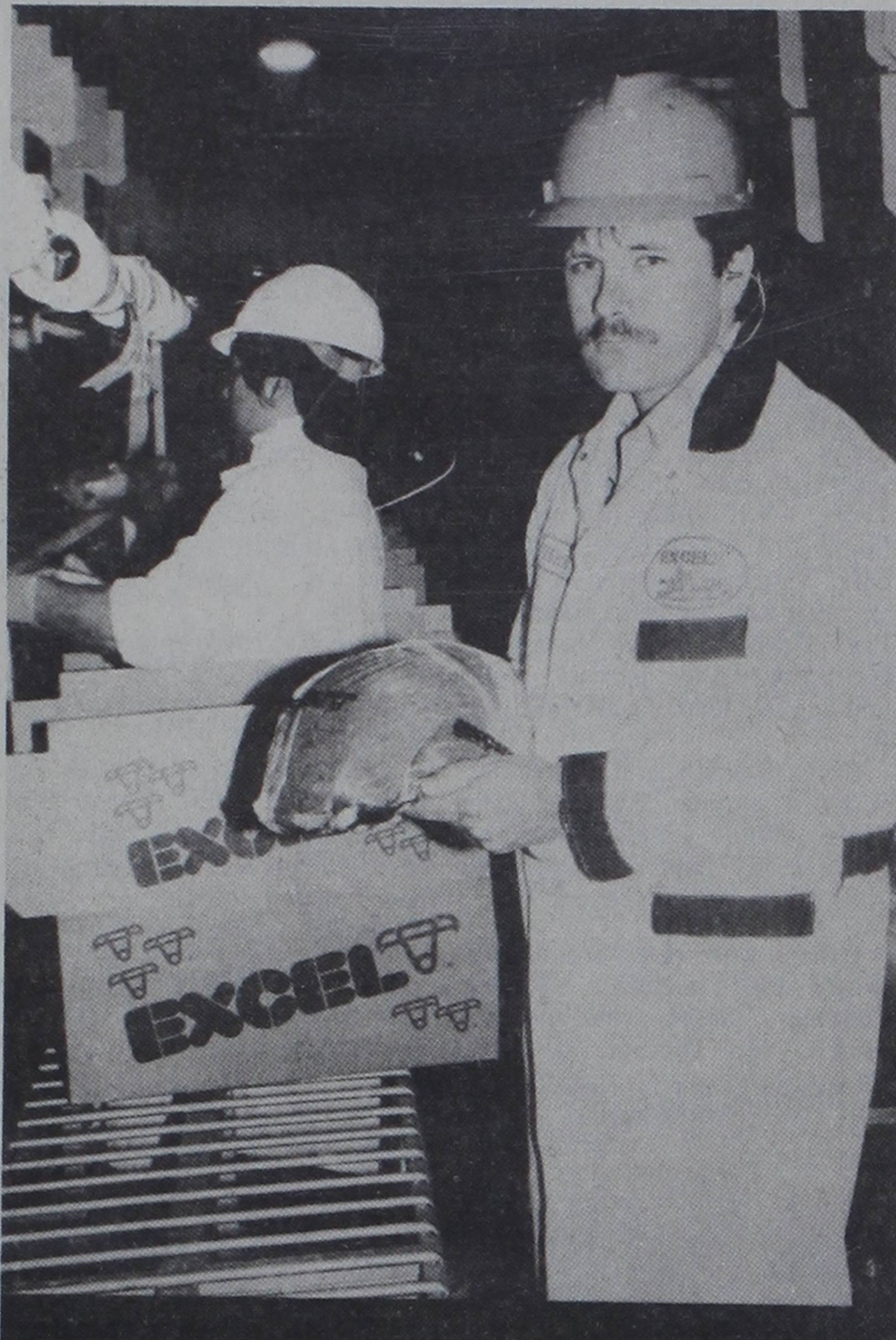
