The condition of the crop up to June 23, according to the report, was 75.9 against 76.6 one month ago and 71.2 one year ago.

The local cotton market recorded a net decline of 100 points, or a slump of \$5.00 per bale.

The only money to be spent by the county in the future on designated highways is the bond issue money noted for the purpose of aiding the State Highway Department in the

Dr. Charles Krusemarck, who attended Mrs. McClintock in her fatal illness, today testified before grand jury that she had died of heart disease-and not of mercurial poisoning as alleged by the earlier corner's jury.

Dr. W. H. Burmeister, representing the State, also declared that the autopsy on Mrs. Shepherd had revealed no traces of mercury as had been charged.






