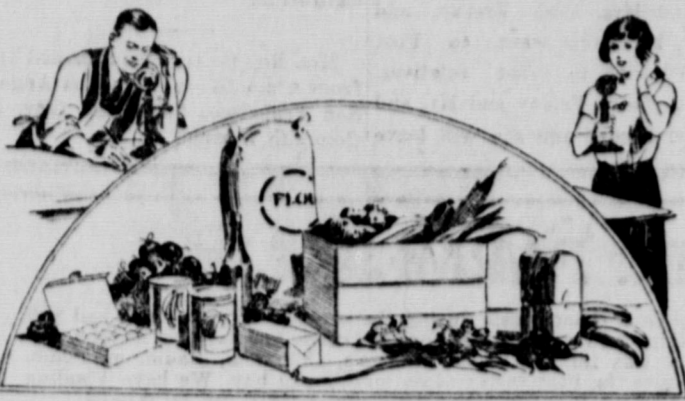

TEST STATIONS ARE NEEDED

GARAGES WANTED TO TEST HEADLIGHTS OF CARS UNDER NEW LAW

Only four garages and filling stations have made application for appointment as headlight testing stations under the new headlight law recently passed by the 39th Legislature, according to County Judge A. S. Mauzey.

Applications will have to be made immediately as they will be sent in to the state officials in the near future. Appointments will be made immediately and equipment sent to the testing stations for use in adjusting the headlights of all motor vehicles and of all bicycles of the county. All such vehicles are supposed to have their headlights adjusted by September 1, at which time the new law goes into effect. Violators of the law will be punished.

At these stations the headlights will be adjusted properly through use of testing apparatus so that lights will not glare or be blinding.

All of the four stations that have made application are located in the city of Sweetwater, and Judge Mauzey states that there should be at least one each in Roscoe and Blackwell. Garages and filling stations which are appointed to adjust headlights will be allowed to charge car owners 25c. for adjusting the lights on each car.

Those who have already made application are: Dabney Motor Co., C. S. Boyles Motor Co., Buck and Henry Service Station, and Sweetwater Battery Co.

College Head Talks At Methodist Church

Dr. H. E. Stout, president of Texas Woman's College at Fort Worth, preached at the Methodist church Sunday evening on the subject of "Religions." The talk is said to have been one of the best heard here in some time.

Dr. Stout said he believed in creeds as being essential, but that religious creeds and forms did not, in themselves, make us better people. He stated that the religion of the heart was the true religion.

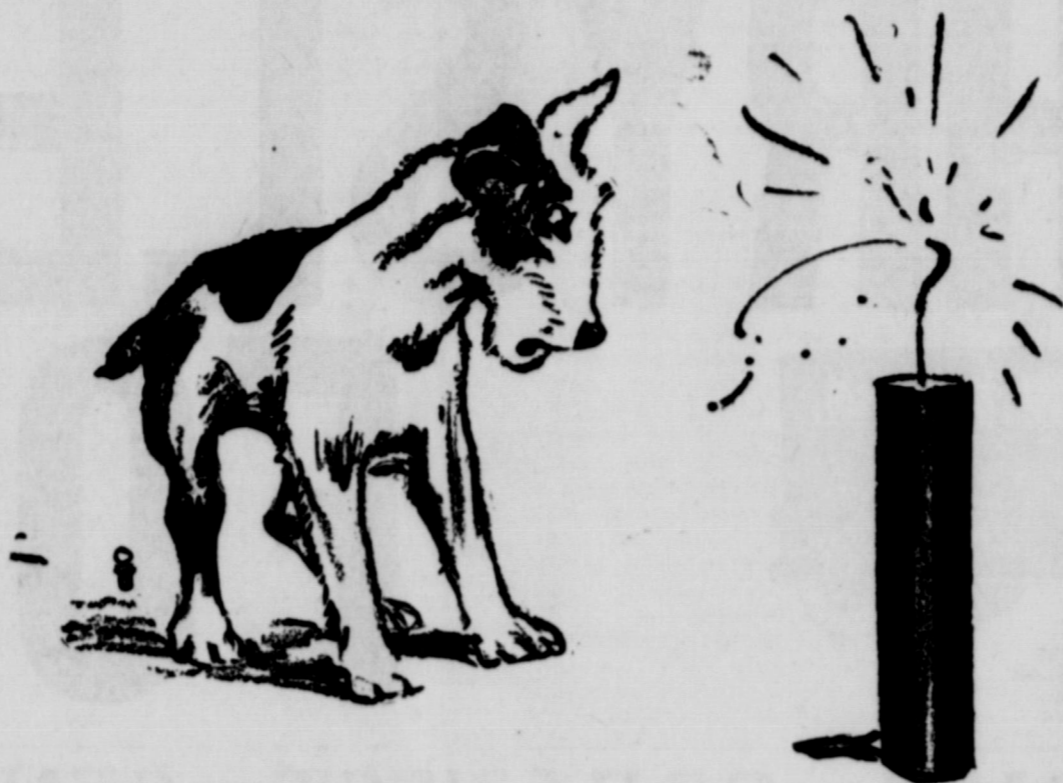

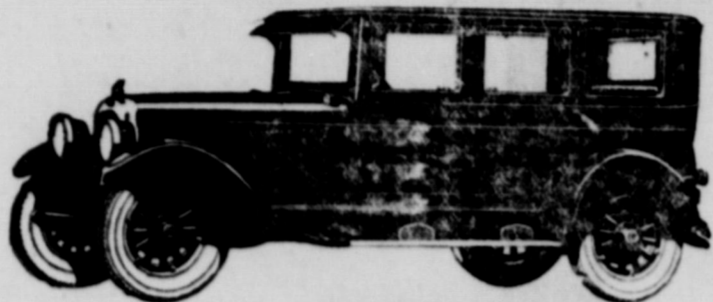

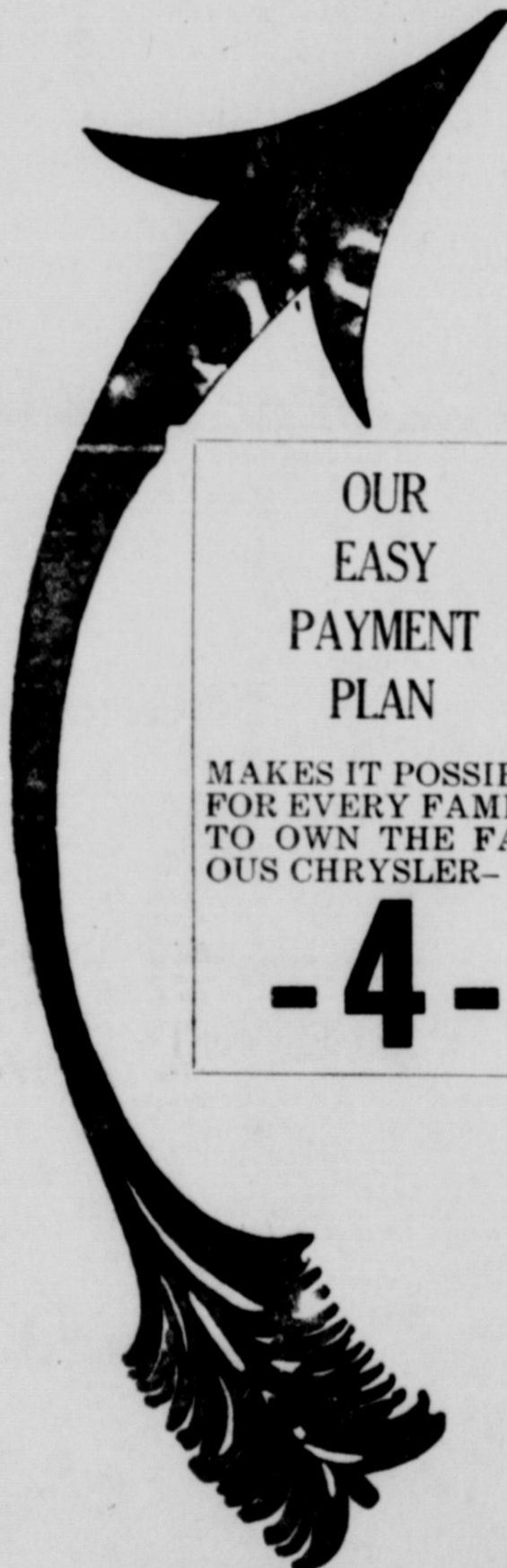

The boys hold the bottled drink concessions for the American Legion celebration on Friday and Saturday, and all money derived from their sales will go to the improving of the City Park through the erection of a large meeting and camping place. Some of the money for the building has already been raised, and the boys are hoping to complete the necessary amount during the celebration, according to R. L. Shaffer, scoutmaster of Troop No. 1.

The adobe building will be about 24x24 feet in size and will be located on the north side of the lake. A large fireplace will occupy one side of the large council room, built to accommodate the 32 members of the troop.

The troop members are earning the money for the building themselves and are not asking for donations from anyone. When completed they expect to hold all of their meetings in the hut, the ground for which city officials are allowing the use free of charge.

State To Keep Up Highways

HEALTH SURVEY IS SUGGESTED

SWEETWATER AND ROSCOE SHOULD TAKE HEALTH INVOICE STATE SAYS

A health survey of Sweetwater and Roscoe and other towns of Texas is being recommended by the Texas Public Health Association in order that diseases may be determined so that people may have a basis on which to work in bringing about longer and more healthful life.

The fact is pointed out that diseases are not any more prevalent in Nolan county than in some others, if as much so, but that, nevertheless, by taking such a survey the health of the communities may be improved to a great extent and there will be less danger of epidemic breaking out and less danger of spreading tuberculosis and other such diseases.

The Health Association points out that such a survey for Sweetwater and Roscoe or for the county as a whole would have as its purpose "to find out what diseases you have, to find out where the diseases are located, to attempt to locate the cause, to know what your health problem is, to stop wasted energy, and to increase the efficiency of your present health machinery."

"You have your auto examined," they further state. "You should have yourself examined; you should have your community's health conditions examined; when the weak parts are found they should be repaired. The result will be 'more health! more wealth! more happiness! less suffering.'"

The Taylor County Tuberculosis Association has just recently completed a tuberculosis survey of that county. Sixty-eight tuberculosis patients were discovered, 64 of whom were legal residents of the county, and with these 64 patients 77 adults and 5 children were living. Eighteen citizens died during 1924 with the disease, and, estimating that the county lost \$4,000 by each death, would mean a total loss of \$72,000 for the year.

The Health Association further points out that after one has been found to be tuberculous, arrangements must be made for his care. The best place is in a sanitarium. This not only gives the patient the benefit of the best care, but removes the patient from the home and makes it a safer place for the rest of the family.

CREW WILL WORK ON NEW HIGHWAY TO KEEP THEM IN CONSTANT REPAIR

Means by which Nolan County's million and a half dollar highways are to be maintained after they are built have been and are being misinterpreted by many citizens recently to the extent that some discussion and argument has arisen over the question.

In answer to the misunderstanding County Engineer John Focht, states to The News that Nolan county will not be out one penny directly, and no further taxes will be levied on the citizens for the upkeep of the highways.

Maintenance of the highways will be made by the State Highway Department and a road gang working under a road foreman and with much highway machinery at their disposal will be busy on the roads at all times. The roads will be kept in an almost perfect state of repair, and State Department officials will not allow the roads to run down at any time. The bond money that we voted for roads will be used for construction work only.

Must Repair Roads

"The Federal aid act, as passed by Congress," Focht states, "provides that roads constructed with Federal aid shall be maintained to the satisfaction of Federal engineers if the State expects to receive any further such aid. Therefore, the state not only will keep up its hard surfaced highways, but it must keep them up in order to get the additional Federal aid."

To meet this requirement of the Federal Highway Department, the 39th Legislature passed an act, which went into effect on June 18, to the effect that all new construction work be handled by the State Highway Department.

Similar To Railroads

The county's roads will be kept in condition by a repair organization similar to that of the railroads. From one to ten men will be kept busy in the upkeep of the roads, the number depending on the amount of work to be done from time to time as pointed out to the road foreman by a road superintendent working under the State Highway Department and using funds allotted by that department.

The funds for the upkeep of such roads in Texas are being derived from two sources. One source is the one cent gasoline tax which is levied on every gallon of gasoline produced in the state, one-fourth of which goes to the school fund and three-fourths of which goes to the highway maintenance fund. The other source is the registration fee levied on all cars in the state, about three-fourths of which goes to the Highway Department and part of which amount is used in the upkeep of the roads of the state.

Registrations Total \$42,000

There has been raised in Nolan county alone since December 9, 1924, up to the present date \$42,072.00, according to Miss Willie Elliott, tax collector. This sum comes from the registration of a little over 3,000 motor vehicles. Of this \$42,072.00, a total of \$29,518.00 will go to the Highway Department, to be used by them in the construction of highways. The balance \$12,554.00 will remain in the road and bridge funds of Nolan county to be used by the County commissioners on public roads other than the designated state highways. The only money to be spent by the county in the future on designated highways is the bond issue money noted for the purpose of aiding the State Highway Department in the building of state highways.

Citizens are reminded that there need be no fear of the highways not being kept in the best condition in order that they will last for many, many years, as it is necessary that State Department keep them in good condition both from an economical and sound business standpoint and in order that they may continue to receive aid from the Federal Department.

**Shepherd Freed On
Poisoning Charge**

CHICAGO, July 3.—The shadow which has hung over the life of William D. Shepherd was completely lifted today.

Following his acquittal on the charge of having poisoned his millionaire ward, Billy McClintock, with typhoid germs, Shepherd today was cleared of the suspicion of having caused the death of Billy's mother, Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock, sixteen years ago.

Dr. Charles Krusemarck, who attended Mrs. McClintock in her fatal illness, today testified before grand jury that she had died of heart disease—and not of mercurial poisoning as alleged by the earlier corner's jury.

Dr. W. H. Burmeister, representing the State, also declared that the autopsy on Mrs. Shepherd had revealed no traces of mercury as had been charged.

The grand jury then voted a "no bill" and closed the McClintock case.

From the Criminal Courts Shepherd now will turn to the civil courts—not as a defendant but as a prosecutor—to battle for the "fatal fortune" of the McClintock family to which he has fallen heir through the request of his word.

Shepherd will appear before Probate Judge Horner tomorrow morning to offer proof of his heirship, contesting the action of attorneys for the McClintock blood relatives and Miss Isabelle Pope, fiancée of Billy. Miss Pope, under the terms of the will which would make Shepherd a millionaire, is to receive an annual income of \$8,000.

As though to further obliterate traces of the criminal trial which stirred the country for six weeks, Dr. Charles C. Faiman, Shepherd's accuser and confessed co-conspirator, was released from custody and announced that he would leave Chicago.

"I shall probably go to Europe," he said.

**Club Not Owned
By Roscoe Citizens**

The following letter was received by The Nolan County News this week from Roscoe:

"The citizens of Roscoe wish it understood by the public at large that a certain dance pavilion near this city, known as the Roscoe Country Club, is not owned or operated by citizens of our town, and we do not wish any reflections to be cast on our little city in connection with the same.

"The dance pavilion, to the extent of our personal knowledge, has been operated on a plan such that has not been extremely degrading. 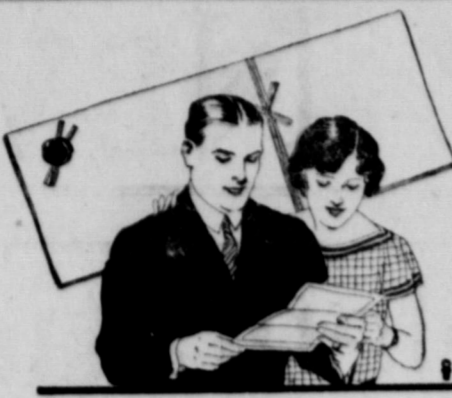

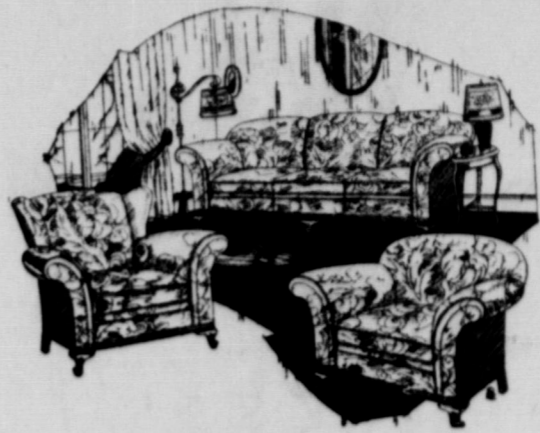

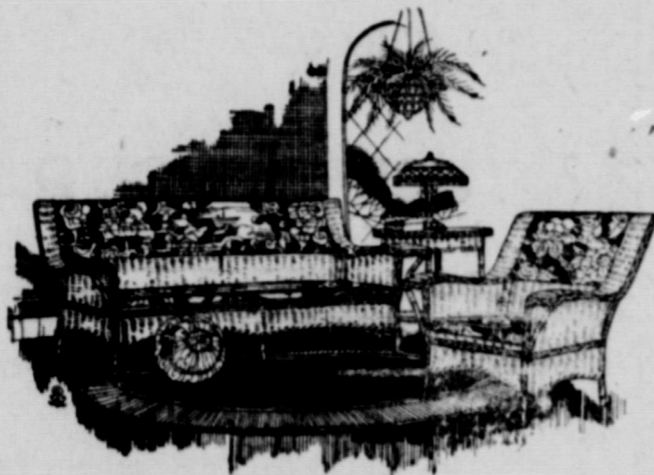

rods.

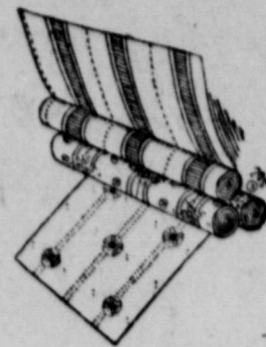
R. A. Carter, who recently hooked

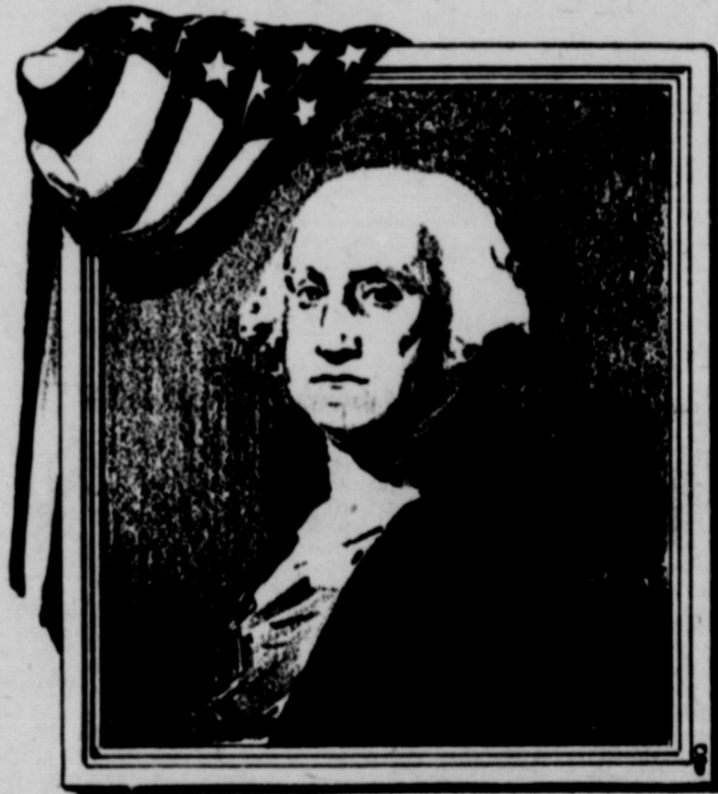
