FIVE INDICTMENT RE- TURNED BY GRANDJURY

Body Adjourned Until April 27th At
Which Time They Will Con-
tinue Their Investiga-
tion.—Cases tried
This Week.

District Court has been grinding
along at a pretty lively rate this
week. Several cases have been tried
and as we go to press the case of
Jenkins vs. the Orient Ry. Co. for
alleged damages to stock is on trial.
The case of A. J. Hall vs. the Orient
for personal injuries went to the
jury Wednesday evening and yester-
day morning a verdict was returned
in favor of the railroad company.
This case had been on trial here be-
fore and a verdict of \$12,500 had been
returned. The case was set for a
new trial by the higher court. The
case grew out of injuries received by
Mr. Hall several years ago in a
wreck near Benjamin.

The Grandjury adjourned its ses-
sion yesterday to meet again April
27th. Five indictments were return-
ed, four of which were for felony and
one misdemeanor.

The Echols murder case which was
transferred from Big Springs to this
place will come up for trial April
29th.

BUSINESS MEN HAVE BANQUET TUES. NIGHT

Members and Friends Enjoy Splen-
did Time at Moose Hall
Tuesday Night.

The Merchants & Business Men's
association of this city entertained
their members and invited guests
with an oyster supper and smoker
at the Moose Hall, on Tuesday night
of this week. No regular program
was followed, but many questions of
interest were freely discussed, and
a good time was enjoyed by all present.

The annual convention of the State
Association will be held at Galves-
ton this year. The exact date has
not been set, but it will be early
in the month of May. This year's con-
vention is expected to be the largest
ever held under the auspices of this
Association, owing to the fact that the
rates to Galveston will be especially
attractive, and we are informed that
the Santa Fe Railway will have through
trains to Galveston via Sweetwater and
we believe that several of our mer-
chants will attend.

as has now on its membership rolls
over 8000 merchants and business
men. Through the rating bureaus
of this Association it is now possible
to determine the extent of credit ac-
commodation which is safe and con-
servative business, and this system
has saved many a man from becom-
ing entangled in the meshes of a
net of indebtedness, out of which it
would be impossible for him to ex-
tricate himself on the income earned
or from the receipts of a small busi-
ness. Misfortune or business dis-
aster, while it impairs credit, does
not hurt a man's reputation for hon-
esty, and a record of the facts en-
able him to secure assistance which
otherwise might be withheld. The
value of the credit rating system
has been recognized by merchants in
every line of business, and the people
are realizing that a credit rating in-
stead of being a detriment, is of
great assistance in establishing a
legitimate line of credit.

BABY BEEF CLUBS ORGANIZED IN COUNTY

Chamber of Commerce Takes Lead in
Movement—Expert Organ-
izers Here.

Monday and Tuesday of this week
several enthusiastic Baby Beef and
Hog clubs were organized at several
communities in the county.

Mr. W. M. Connolly, who is employ-
ed by the State Department of Agri-
culture, Mr. C. C. French repre-
senting the Ft. Worth Stock Yards,
Mr. J. D. Tinsley Agricultural agent
for the Santa Fe Ry Co. accompanied

Secretary of the Chamber of Com-
merce, Ben Anthony together with
several other citizens, made a tour
of the county by automobile visit-
ing nine schools and organized as
many Baby Beef Clubs.

This work is being effected through-
out the State with splendid success
and the Nolan county clubs bid fair
to make a splendid showing during
the year.

Clubs were organized at Maryneal,
Decker, Nolan, Dora, Blackland,
Brownlee, Champion, Mesquite, and
Goode.

BONDS SOLD AT HANDSOME PREMIUM

Many Bids Received for Bonds Which
Are Sold For \$2,500 Above
Par.

The City Commission closed a
deal the first of the week with a
strong Chicago firm to sell them the
\$220,000 water works bonds for 127
and \$2,500 additional, the cost of litho-
graphing or printing the bonds to
be paid by the purchaser.

As soon as it became known that
Sweetwater proposed to issue the
bonds, bids began to come in large
numbers and quite a number of the
offers were above par only the one
bid was as high as the pur-
chaser's bid.

It is believed that within a very
short time the bonds will have been
approved and the money available
for immediate use.

PAINFULLY HURT IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT

Dr. Dudgeon and Mrs. Sparks Seri-
ously Injured When Auto
Turns Turtle Near Ros-
coe Yesterday.

Yesterday morning about 8 o'clock
as Dr. L. Dudgeon and Mrs. Geo.
Sparks of this city were a short
distance from Roscoe answering an
urgent professional call, the auto
that they were in turned over sud-
denly throwing them to the ground
with terrible force. Dr. Dudgeon
was thrown beyond the car but Mrs.
Sparks was caught under the machine
and was released only after assist-
ance reached them. Both were pain-
fully bruised and first reports from
the scene were that possible fatal in-
juries had been sustained by each.
However, after examination it was
found that such was not the case
and while each have been suffering
much pain their injuries are not
thought to be dangerous. They were
conveyed to the home of Dr. Young
at Roscoe where medical treatment
was given them. They will be
able to leave their homes today.

While the many friends of both
Dr. Dudgeon and Mrs. Sparks re-
gret the unfortunate occurrence, all
are indeed, glad that it is no worse.
The wreck was caused by some-
thing getting wrong with the steer-
ing gear of the machine which caused
the front wheels to make a quick
turn, turning the machine over.

TO THE FARMERS, TRUCK GROWERS AND GARDENERS

A year ago I received some Squash seed from my children in Oregon. I planted them late in June. They grew off well and bore bountifully. They grow a vine very much like the pumpkin, of the "old States." In the absence of a name we dubbed them the "Oregon Squash." They are both a squash and a pumpkin. The young tender fruit makes the best squash I ever ate. They are not so watery as the ordinary garden squash, and are far more pleasant and agreeable to the taste. When matured the meat is very much the same as that of an ordinary pumpkin; but has the flavor of a pumpkin yam potato. For pies they are superior to the pumpkin, and are possessed of a most delicious flavor. They may be stewed and eaten without making into pies. They grow 20 to 36 inches in length, and slope from the center to each end. They do fine under irrigation, but I believe will do well under any ordinarily favorable conditions.

I have about a half gallon of these seed which I want to distribute among the farmers, and truck growers who want them, and will try to succeed with them. Of course the supply to each will necessarily be limited. I am doing this to encourage the cultivation of this excellent vegetable and to introduce it.

A prize which will be named later, will be awarded to the one presenting the best sample of the product to the following committee: J. I. Payne, W. R. Carr and W. A. Perry.

For the convenience of those who reside in the Southern part of the County, and do not often visit Sweetwater, some of these seed will be left in the office of the Blackwell Bulletin, at Blackwell. The rest will be at Payne's Furniture store, where I shall be pleased to personally give them to those who call for them, as long as the supply shall last. In my absence Bro. Payne has kindly consented to attend to this for me. Call at one or the other of these places as may be the most convenient for you. It is desired that you call in person; don't write or send by another.

We should be glad that every one receiving some of these seed would join in the contest for the prize. This is not a requirement, however.

JUDGE CRANE SPENT SUNDAY IN ABILENE

Thinks Sweetwater Will Gain Much From New \$320,000.00 Water System to Be Installed.

Judge R. C. Crane, who has recently entered upon the duties of Postmaster at Sweetwater, spent Sunday in Abilene visiting friends and attending the Simmons Bible School. Judge Crane is one of the old time settlers of Western Texas, having settled in Fisher county in the early days of the eighties and being a close observer of his views of the future events become interesting. Referring to the recent bond election at Sweetwater for the purchase and completion of a water works system for that city he spoke enthusiastically over the project. He said: "We studied the question thoroughly before we voted the bonds and the city agreed to buy the present plant for \$50,000.00. Under new laws of Texas the profits of the Company can be used to pay interest on bonds and to create a sinking fund to pay the bonds off as they mature. After having expert engineers to go over the proposition it was found that the plant could be installed and an abundance of water secured for the amount of \$320,000.00, and furthermore that the city would have to pay interest by taxation not more than two cents per annum on the bonds. Have a high opinion of the project. Have a high opinion of the revenue from the business will take care of the interest on the bonds and create a sinking fund to pay them. We felt that it was a great opportunity for the city and the people and that accounts for the almost unanimous vote in favor of the seemingly large bond issue. Already a flattering offer has been received to buy the bonds."

Judge Crane is an ardent admirer of Woodrow Wilson and does not hesitate to predict a bright future for the Democratic party under the superb leadership of the President. He says that the parcel post will be further developed and that it will prove a great boon to the people of the United States.—Abilene Daily Reporter.

J. J. DILLARD CHARGED WITH SWINDLING AND FORGERY

J. J. Dillard was arrested at Wichita Falls, this week by Deputy Sheriff Box, of this county, on an indictment by the recent grand jury, charging forgery. Dillard is well known here and was for many years a prominent citizen of Lubbock county, representing that district in the legislature in 1912-13. It is alleged that a year or more ago Dillard forged a quit-claim deed to a section of land in Swisher county. The deal was made here with Jas. R. DeLay, and it is alleged that Dillard forged the name of Joshua Truitt, Sr., of Shelby county, in the extreme eastern part of the state, who was the owner of the land to the deed; also forged the name of a notary public of Shelby county, and imprinted on the deed the seal of a Shelby county Notary public. Dillard is said to have received \$3,000 in cash and several thousand dollars in vendor lien notes. It is alleged that the deal was made through a man named Haney, who lives at Canyon, and who is also indicted in the case and was arrested two weeks ago, and is now out on bond. It is said that Truitt is 85 years of age and blind. Dillard made bond in the sum of \$1,000 at Wichita Falls and was released. The trial will likely come up at the next term of court here, in August.—Plainview News.

SAN ANGELO CITIZEN

GORED TO DEATH
Mr. A. H. Moore Mutilated in Most Frightful Manner By Infuriated beast.

San Angelo Standard.
Mutilated in a most terrible manner and with his clothing rent into shreds in many places, the dead body of Dr. Austing H. Moor, who resides west of the city near the brick plant, was found Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock in a pasture near the home, the aged Confederate having presumably been gored to death by an angry bull. The gruesome discovery was made by A. Ham Moore, a former neighbor who was en route to the city with a load of feedstuff. Huddled in a heap in a small clump of mesquite bushes and trampled almost beyond recognition, the body was discovered by Mr. Moore, who immediately notified the family and officers here. An inquest was held by Justice I. J. Corsinger, which revealed beyond a doubt that death was caused as the result of being gored by a bull, as blood was found on the animal's horns. Foul play was at first suspected.

When found, the body was in somewhat of a sitting posture, it appearing, according to Mr. Moore, upon first sight that someone had sat down and was dozing with his head between his knees. However, upon raising the head, the story was told. Signs of a race to escape the enraged animal had the spot where the ill-fated man was overtaken were in evidence. The doctor's whip as well as a large pocket knife, with which it is supposed he attempted to defend himself, were found lying several feet from the clump of shrubs where the body was discovered. Besides numerous wounds on the body there was found a gored chest which probably caused immediate death. It is estimated that the man had been dead at least two hours before his discovery.

Mr. Goodrum also stated, that he would be here all the time and that he expected to see that in every detail the plans and specifications are carried out in the erection of the building.

Mr. Goodrum tells us that Sweetwater voted \$300,000.00 worth of Water Works Bonds last Saturday at a vote of approximately eight to one, which speaks well for the town. He says Sweetwater is growing steadily along and he sees no reason why she will not be the Queen City of West Texas.

TO Build Character, What is Character?
 Character is defined as the combination of qualities which distinguish any person or class of persons; any distinctive trait or such marks or traits collectively belonging to any person, class or race; the individuality which is the product of nature, habits, or environment. It is the sum of the qualities commonly attributed to any person or any thing. The word character also means the standing or reputation of a person. Would you build a good character for your children? Would you build a good and strong character for yourself? See from the pages of Self-Culture how this has been and may be done.

"The crown and glory of life," says Samuel Smiles, "is character." It is the noblest possession of man or woman, constituting a rank in itself, and an estate in the general good will; dignifying every station and exalting every position in society. It carries with it an influence which always tells, for it is the result of proved honor, rectitude and consistency—qualities which perhaps more than any other, command the general respect and confidence of mankind. Character is human nature in its best form. Franklin attributed his success to his known integrity of character. "Hence it was," he said, "that I had so much weight with my fellow citizens." 14, 127,356 BALES GROWN IN 1913
WASHINGTON, March 20—One of the largest cotton crops ever grown amounting to 14,127,546, equivalent 500-pound bales of line and 639,595 equivalent 500-pound bales of linters was produced by the farmers of the United States during 1913, the Census Bureau announced today in its preliminary report of cotton ginned as reported by ginners and delinters to February 28.

These figures compare with 13,703,421 equivalent 500-pound bales of lint and 609,594 bales of linters last year, and 15,692,791 bales of lint and 557,575 bales of linters in 1911.

The Department of Agriculture's estimate, announced December 12, placed the 1913 crop at 13,677,000 equivalent 500-pound bales.
