Only a shred of uniform remain to most of the prisoners and no attempt to maintain any form of military formation was made by the little clumps of men, women and children which scuffled from the barbed wire stockade dragging with them a varied assortment of pots, pans, and personal belongings. The entire personal baggage of one cheerful looking Mexican woman consisted of one new.

A swarm of Mexican men and womn gathered Sunday night and early nday morning as close to the stockade as the guard would permit, and shouted farewell messages and greetings to their friends inside the wire fence. Many wrote notes and tossed them into the air in the hope that the stiff breeze blowing toward the fence would carry their missives within reach of the prisoners.

Dog Carries Messages

A dog belonging to one of the prisoners was made the carrier for many letters, trotting back and forth with the notes tied to his collar but he declined to accept parcel post business and refused to move when a heavy package of tobacco was tied to his
