Austin, Feb. 4 .- Indications point to the adoption at the present session of the legislature of the point resolution submitting an amendment to the constitution providing for woman suffrage to a vote of the people.

The resolution has received a favrable majority report in the house and is to be considered within the next week or ten days. In the meantime, there is a strong delegation of women here, headed by Miss Todd, of California, lobbying for the adop-Burmeister of McMullen county, who is championing the resolutions on the floor of the house, asserts that he has 84 votes pledged for the amendment. which is just ten short of the required two-thirds. There are a number of members, it is believed who will vote to submit the question, who will vote against it at the polls.
