FORD SHIPMENTS CREATE RECORD IN ALABAMA STATE

Within the past few days the Ford Motor Company, heeding the urgent pleas from the Brownwell Auto Compa- ny, Inc., has shipped to that firm dur- ing the last three days 22 solid car- loads of Ford cars to Birmingham, Ala.—122 Fords.

In addition they have shipped to subagents under the Brownwell auto Company, Inc., during the same three days 15 car loads—90 Ford cars.

This total of 222 Ford cars shipped to Brownwell's territory in Alabama in five days and telegrams are pouring in from subagents begging for more shipments. This is the biggest ship- ment to Alabama on record. Mr. Brownfield in a letter to Mr. Adams, stated that his company had on hand last Monday 76 bare fide orders for Ford cars, which were being filled as fast as the cars reached them.

The Mobile distributors, the Ad- ams Machinery & Auto Company, through its manager, Mr. L. G. Adams, announced to a Register reporter that his firm is doing work equally as well as the above mentioned firm. His only

trouble being his inability to get cars. In the past three days five solid car- loads have been shipped to the Mobile agency, and two carloads to sub- agents under the supervision of The Adams Machinery & Auto Company.

In addition to this Mr. Adams stated that his company had on hand last week deposits for fourteen touring cars and several roadsters, which or- ders are filled as fast as the cars can be procured.

The above mentioned figures do not include eight counties in the north- ern part of Alabama, which counties are under the supervision of the Mem- phis, Tenn., branch.

From these figures it can easily be- seen that the promised rebate from the Ford Motor Company, provided they sold 300,000 cars to the retail trade between August 1, 1914, and August 1, 1915, is practically assured. Another indication that the rebate is assured is a statement published in the form of an advertisement) by a large Ford agent and Mr. Ford over the name of the Adams Machinery & Manufacturing Company in today's Register. Other states are showing the same volume of business as Alaba- ma, in proportion to their population.—Mobile (Ala.) Register.

Mr. Adams of the Sweetwater agency states that his local office is equally swamped with orders for Ford cars, and at the present time they are four carloads behind with their orders, and could deliver today four solid carloads if they had them.

He states that they are coming and deliveries will be made as fast as the cars are received.

The local company is a most prog- ressive one and has evidently put Sweetwater on the map as an automo- bile distributing point.

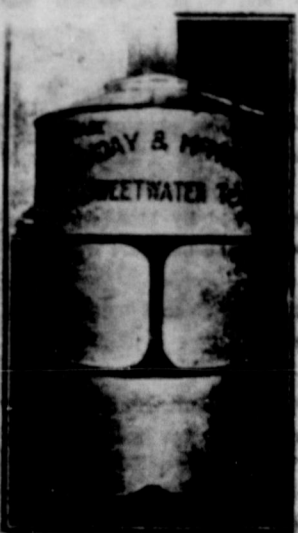
