FARMERS CO-OPERATING MARKETING ASSOCIATION

At Blackwell, Saturday, Oct. 9th, there was a meeting of farmers held for the purpose of further discussing the organization of a marketing association and the provisions of the Texas Permanent Warehouse and Marketing Act.

W. C. Calvert, County Demonstrator and J. H. H. Higginbotham, Assistant in Cotton Marketing, of the Office of Markets and Rural Organization, U. S. Department of Agriculture were present. Mr. Higginbotham stated to the farmers that he would be stationed in this section for some time and outlined some of the results desired to be obtained, as below stated.

"The office of Markets and Rural Organization is maintained for the collection and distribution of information relating to the handling and marketing of farm products and the study of cooperation among farmers. The subject that we are interested in is its relation to the cotton farmer.

It is not practical for each cotton raiser to become a grader and that is where an association comes in. The organization can secure the services of a grader, who can also keep in touch with the market values. In nearly every town there are several, who find that they can make a living doing the thing that the farmer as an organization should do for themselves.

The handling and the preparation for market of cotton offers an opportunity for much improvement. The proper warehousing of cotton is very necessary if we are ever going to adopt the policy of marketing the crop as the spinner needs it. Storage should be in a warehouse built according to such standard that the lowest rate of insurance may be obtained. The credit of the warehouse company should be such that the integrity of its receipts would never be questioned.

When the farmer adopts a policy of so marketing his crop that he may obtain a fairly stable price, he too, will be in position to plant and in a more certain degree know how his business would come out. It seems that this end may be hastened by the farmers handling their crop through cooperative marketing associations. Editor Martin of the Ford County News was here today enroute to Dallas where he will have charge of the Ford County exhibit at the big fair. He expects his country to receive some valuable advertising during the Fair.

JUDGE RENDERS STATE VALUABLE SERVICES

Postmaster Crane Enabled State Officials to Recover Valuable Relics.

The big state daily papers under date of the 9th inst., under big headlines told of valuable Texas Republic relics being recovered for the state and commented upon the work being a piece of very clever detective work. It may not be generally known, but true nevertheless, that this detective work was planned and worked out by none other than our own Postmaster, R. C. Crane. Several months ago Mr. Crane secured evidence that great quantities of Texas Republic money, bonds and other documents were in possession of New York parties and at once began a quiet, but thorough investigation. Finally when he had secured all the evidence necessary, even to locating accurately and definitely the man who did the stealing, he wrote Governor Ferguson regarding the matter, also State Comptroller Terrell. The governor replied immediately thanking him for his interest in the matter and said he had taken the matter up with the Comptroller. After some delay in the comptroller's department, Mr. Crane induced that department to get busy with the results as stated in the press dispatches. The face of the business, Mr. Crane had the goods located and the man covered and there was nothing to do but to send after them.

The press dispatch as appeared in the Star-Telegram and other papers is as follows:

AUSTIN, Oct. 9.—Through some clever detective work on the part of operatives engaged by Comptroller H. B. Terrell, over \$1,000,000 in currency of the Republic of Texas, bonds and other valuable state documents of that period bearing the signature of Gen. Sam Houston and leading figures of that early stage in the history of this state, have just been recovered, classified and catalogued. They were placed in a steel safe. This ancient currency and other valuable state papers were pilfered from the basement of the capitol where they

were carelessly deposited many years ago.

About six years ago Comptroller Terrell received a letter from a certain person in which the writer urged the state officials to use every possible effort to prevent the pilfering of these documents and their subsequent sale to collectors. He was advised several firms were offering for sale original documents of Gen. Sam Houston and various issues of Republic of Texas currency. The comptroller immediately instituted an investigation, employing detectives to carry on the investigation. It developed during the course of the investigation that part of the stolen currency and documents had been exhibited at the Panama-Pacific Exposition, and this was recovered. Another portion of the property was located at Fort Worth and this was returned.

Following a custom which has obtained for a long time, certain persons are permitted to see these old records and documents stored in the basement of the capitol. It was during one of these excursions into the basements that the documents were abstracted. The investigation also resulted in the finding of a suit case filled with this ancient currency in possession of a certain person. He was immediately accused of purloining the balance. This he finally admitted and arrangements were made to regain possession of that portion which had been sold or otherwise disposed of.

CITIZENS AND VOTERS.

Through misfortune it has become necessary for our mayor resign: It is now with the people to elect his successor. Truly realizing that it is an important and responsible place and that every mis-step is detrimental to the people and that correct economical and judicious administration means much in growth to the town and prosperity to the citizens and feeling that with the aid and council of the Commissioners, I can administer the affairs; I therefore submit my name as a candidate to fill the unexpired term of Mayor of the City of Sweetwater. First, I believe in the completion and enlargement of our water system; the encouragement of our Volunteer Fire Company, in the improvement of our Streets and sidewalks; the Sanitary Laws, so enforced as to give us a clean town; in the encouragement of property owners to beautify their premises; in traffic ordinances; in strict police regulations; in few ordinances, but such as are for the real betterment of the town and those strictly enforced; in inducing in every legitimate way capital to concentrate here and to foster and encourage every public enterprise here now; as soon as possible reduce the taxes; low taxes and a water supply are the two biggest factors in inducing capital. It cannot be done during this term, perhaps, but I am in favor of reducing the salary of all officers connected with the administration, except the two commissioners. This would be one item of economy, and I think others can be made. The most rigid economy should be used in all lines and in every particular and a plain and full quarterly report should be made for the inspection of the public. I stand for the betterment of the town and the people; Religiously, morally and financially. If you stand for the things enumerated and believe I am honest in my announcements; that I have the courage and ability, coupled with the council of the present commissioners, to do these things, then I respectfully solicit your influence and vote for Mayor. I do not feel that it is necessary to make a canvas of the town, little side talks will not influence you one way or another. You will vote as you think best. But should I be elected, I promise one and all, friend or foe, the very best service of which I am capable.

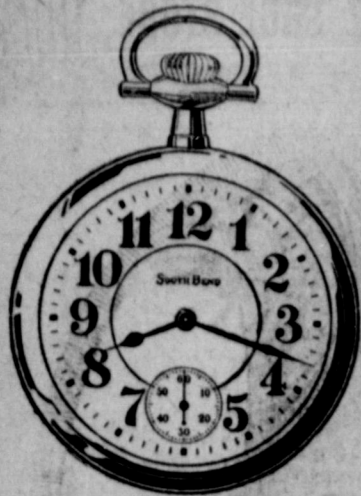



**Blackwell
Prospering**

Yesterday afternoon, the writer accepted an invitation from Mr. M. B. Howard, representing the International Life Insurance Co., to accompany him to Blackwell in his new Ford car.

The trip was made without a stop in a little over one hours drive. En route we saw large and small cotton farms, some of which are almost as white as snow banks with the fleecy and at present very valuable staple. On almost every farm one could observe large numbers of people busily engaged picking cotton.

At Blackwell, dozens of wagons could be seen loaded with cotton awaiting their turn to the two gins. We were informed that from 100 to 125 bales of cotton were now being ginned at that place by the two gins each day and in addition to these receipts, the town was receiving considerable cotton ginned at other points. After arriving at Blackwell we visited a number of business houses, among which were the Hunt Drug Co., Hunt Grocery Co., Bolin and Carlisle General Merchandise, Farmer's Hardware Co., Sanderson's Blacksmith shop and exchanged greetings with the managers and proprietors, most of whom it has been our pleasure to know for a number of years, and to have very pleasant business dealings with. Not a note of pessimism was heard by the editor while in the town. The merchants report splendid business and collections were never as good, they said. In fact, it was stated that it appeared each farmer who owed the merchants was in a hurry to pay off the whole account and they are doing that and will have money in the bank besides. One firm reported collections coming at the pace of around \$600 per day.

The people of Blackwell are enterprising and are interested in any move that has the best interests of the town and community uppermost. Just at this time a movement is being agitated to float bonds with which to build a splendid school building. They are in need of a suitable school building very badly and doubtless very soon the issue will be put before the people. Those we talked with about the matter feel sure there will not be serious opposition to the bond issue.

Blackwell has the largest trade territory of any town of its size in this section. The business firms carry a large stock of goods and are able to accommodate their customers in a handsome manner.

While in the city we visited the Blackwell Times office and enjoyed a very pleasant chat with Editor Davis. While he has only been running a newspaper there for a few months, he has built up a nice paper and the business firms and people generally are supporting him loyally. Blackwell can ill afford to be without a news paper and the Reporter hopes that the Times will continue to receive the hearty support of the people. Mr. Davis is a tireless worker and is striving hard to meet all demands in his line.

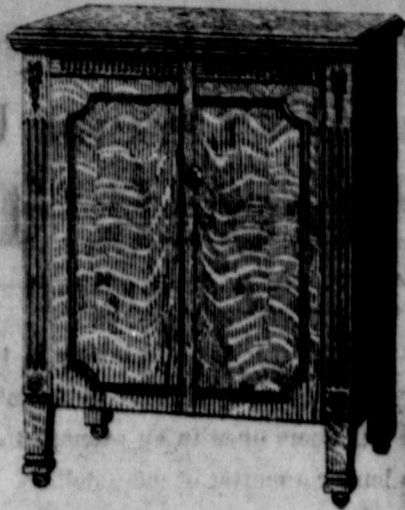

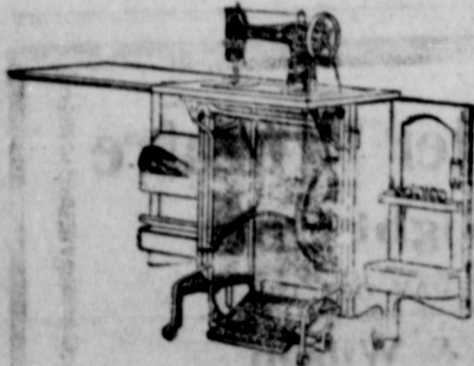
