## JUDGE A. B. YANTIS LED IN MAYOR'S RACE; MAY HOLD SECOND ELECTION

The election yesterday for mayor passed off quietly notwithstanding considerable interest was apparent throughout the day.

The number of votes polled was 334 which was less than was expected and far less than the city's voting strength. However many people took it as a matter of fact that whoever was chosen would make the city a good mayor and had no special choice. While some others evidently forgot to visit the polls until too late to vote.

There were five candidates who submitted their names and the vote stood as follows:

Judge A. B. Yantis—129.

J. D. Sloan—68.

J. H. Snell—65.

R. Wright—37.

Chas. W. Watson—35.

The City Charter provides that a candidate to be elected must receive a majority of all the votes cast in the election. While Judge Yantis led in the race by a handsome plurality, it will be necessary to hold another election not within thirty days, at which time the names of A. B. Yantis and J. D. Sloan will be the names presented. They were the two highest.

### Judge Crane is Thanked

Rendered State Great Service in Recovering Valuable Currency and Documents of State.

Judge R. C. Crane of this city is receiving numerous letters from state officials and others expressing their appreciation of his splendid services in recovering and preventing the further distribution of currency, bonds and numerous documents of the Texas Republic.

The State papers contained a report of the matter that did not in any way do Judge Crane justice in the premises. Credit was in the main given to others when as a matter of fact, Judge Crane worked single handed and altogether without encouragement from some of the officials who should have been most interested.

He is in receipt of a letter from Governor Ferguson in which he heartily thanks Mr. Crane for his good service of the Texas Republic. You are at letter reads as follows:

"I have read the clippings in the papers and agree with you that they do not exactly give credit where credit is due. To you and you alone ought to be given the praise for preventing this wholesale distribution of the currency of the Texas Republic. You are at liberty to use this letter in any way that you can. I shall bear in mind the suggestions which you offer, for future reference on this point, etc.

A letter received from Mrs. A. B. Loosan, president of the Texas Historical Association heartily thanked Judge Crane for his great service in locating and being instrumental in recovering the valuable documents. She said it was especially gratifying to her that a member of the Association (referring to Judge Crane, who is vice-president of the association) rendered this service to the state.

Another letter of appreciation received by Judge Crane is from Hon. Eugene C. Baker who has had much to do with the work of preserving articles and things of historical value.

When Judge Crane became aware that many valuable articles had been swiped from the capitol building at Austin and were offered for sale in New York he lost no time in taking the matter up with the state officials and with the Historical Association of Texas. In a number of cases did he consider the work of so great importance that the wires were brought into use in getting speedy results.

### 7 ROBBERS HOLD UP A TRAIN GET LITTLE LOOT

Enfala, Oct. 27.—Three posses are today beating the forests and marshes of the Canadian River bottoms near Onana and working toward Winding Star mountains searching for seven robbers who robbed the south bound Katy train number nine at an early hour this morning. They failed in their attempt to open three other express safes and did not molest the passengers. The holdup occurred a few miles north of here at the same place and the same train that was robbed three years ago.

Dallas, Oct. 27.—Katy officials here

say that four sacks of cheap jewelry resembling money bags were taken by the robbers. This is said to have been their principal loot.

St. Louis, Oct. 27.—The American Express Co., officially here today said that no money was secured by the robbers who robbed the South bound Katy passenger train this morning. The robbers took a package claimed to have been vouchers and passenger tickets.

#### DON'T DUMP THE MARKET

A good many farmers of thrifty proclivities in Texas and Louisiana, are producing a surplus of hay of various kinds upon which they naturally desire to realize early in the season. It has been observed, however, that the price is usually much higher in the winter along toward spring, and sales much easier to make at the price. This would seem to indicate that the advice as to holding cotton to relieve the strain of the fall rush to sell, would apply to the hay situation equally well.

And the same may be said of stock peas. These are in demand mainly for seed, and naturally the planter holds off buying till nearly planting time. Hence it would seem to be good business for the grower, or the merchants who purchase from the growers, to not crowd the market unduly until it is ready for the stuff.

Judge Wagstaff has resided in Taylor County for 30 years and is regarded by his acquaintances as one of the strongest lawyers in Texas.

Judge Wagstaff was an original Wilson man and has always supported the administration. He promises to inject some live issues into the coming campaign. He will make an active canvas of the District beginning about January First.

Judge Thomas L. Blanton was seen by a reporter for this paper Saturday and asked, if he would enter the race for Congress from the 16th district. He replied: "I have never quit running since I announced two years ago. I am in the race and expect to make the most energetic campaign of my life speaking in every county in the district, and am receiving much encouragement."

#### Notes for Hogs Paid by Boys

Temple, Tex., Oct. 23.—A few months ago President H. C. Poe of the Temple State bank staked 300 Bell county farm boys to one registered brood sow each, taking personal notes of the lads in payment therefor. Nearly all these notes have been paid, said Poe.

Only about 2 per cent of the boys this far have failed in obtaining litters from the sows, and as a result of the practical experiment of Poe, there are thousands of additional hogs in this vicinity.—Ft. Worth Star Telegram.

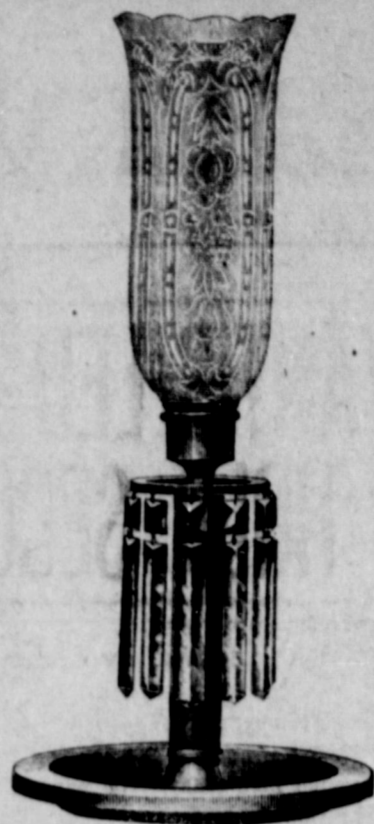

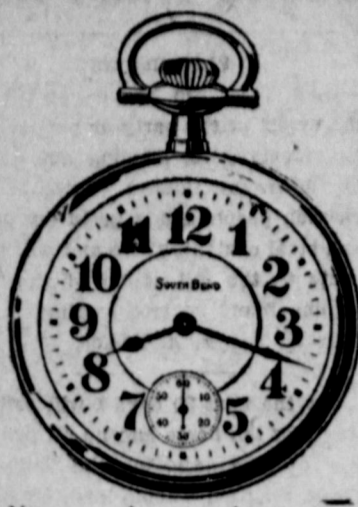

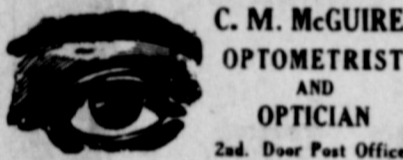
