6 DEAD 50 INJURED IN KANSAS WINDSTORM YESTERD'Y

Kansas City, Nov. 11.—Six are known to be dead and at least fifty injured some fatally as a result of a terrific windstorm and rainstorm in Central Kansas last night. All wires are paralyzed and it is impossible to reach the stricken district at noon today. It is believed that the death list will go higher. Many reported dead last night were found alive today. The dead are at Great Bend two; Larned, two; Seyba one and Derby one. The storm swept Nebraska, South Dakota, and Iowa with lesser violence.

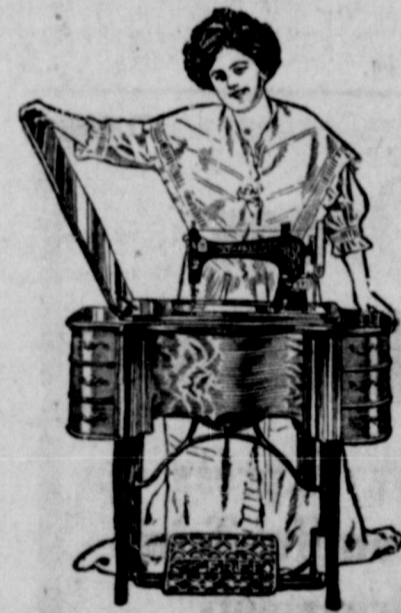

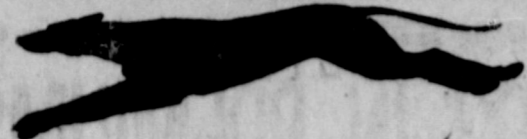

Mr. Braithwaite and Mr. Tuckett, both of whom are heavily interested in Orient securities and who represent the English portion of the bondholders, Reorganization Committee, are very favorably impressed with the property and predict a bright future for the road if the Reorganization Committee's plans for refinancing it are successful. It is understood that the plan, which is in contemplation for the reorganization of the property, provides for the raising of funds to complete the line from its present terminus at Wichita to Kansas City, and to put the track and equipment in thoroughly good shape.

The firm of Chas. H. Jones & Company has been interested in the Road for many years and will act as the Agent of the Reorganization Committee in securing the necessary money in this country. Mr. Banigan is also very much impressed with what he has seen and predicts a great future for the Orient Railroad and the country it traverses.

Vice President & General Manager O'Brien accompanied the party over his division.

We understand that the Reorganization plan has been finally approved and will be published as soon as the consent of the Public Utilities Commission to the issue of the new securities has been obtained.

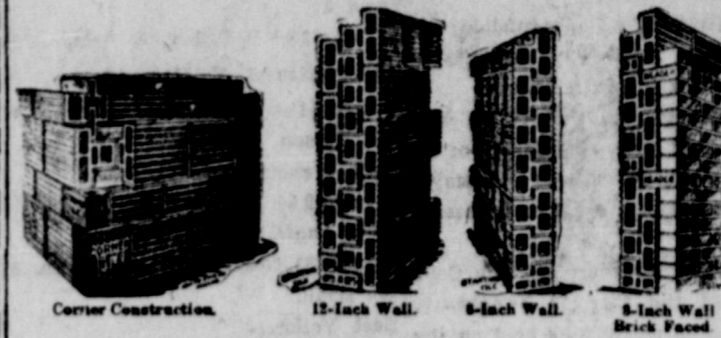

BAYLOR OBSERVES 70TH ANNIVERSARY

WACO INSTITUTION WILL STAGE ITS HOME COMING NOV. 24 AND 25.

STRONG PROGRAM IS IN SIGHT

Class and Society Reunions, Sorores, Historical Pageants and Football Will Afford Ample Entertainment to Those Attending.

Commemorating the foundation of Baylor University in 1845, when Texas was a republic, that institution is arranging a big seventieth birthday celebration in the form of a monster home-coming for Nov. 24 and 25 and she is inviting all her sons and daughters, old and young, to come back home and join in the festivities. Marking the program will be addresses by some of her children who have achieved distinctive success along various lines, a historical pageant setting forth the university's development, class and society reunions, sorores and a football game between the Baylor and T. C. U. eleven.

The celebration will begin on the afternoon of Wednesday, Nov. 24, with a reception to all visitors. On Wednesday night there will be an address of welcome by President Brooks, while the Home Coming message will be declared by Dr. W. E. Bizzell, president of the T. C. U. College, and Dr. C. D. Long, Jr., El Paso superintendent of Mexican missions. Following these addresses there will be an old-fashioned dance exclusively for the graduates and former pupils of the university.

One of the most elaborate pageants ever staged in Waco is planned for the big down-town parade which will be held on Thanksgiving day. The pageant will be a reproduction of the removal of Baylor to Waco from Independence, Texas, the first home of the institution, and will represent Dr. Burleson, the president of Baylor at that time, with his family in the big carriage in which they came overland to Waco. Following this carriage will be a wagon with the household effects of the Burlesons, the student body with their personal belongings, who will be dressed as were the students during the days of the early eighties. In the pageant will also be wagon loaded with the handful of books constituting the library and other equipment making up the limited paraphernalia of the early Baylor.

On Thanksgiving afternoon will be the annual football game between Baylor and T. C. U. This will be one of the hardest fought games of the Texas gridiron this year. The schools have been hot rivals from the days when both colleges were located in Waco and the contests between them have been some of the hardest the Baylor Bears have had to enter. The Baylor eleven so far has the distinction of being the only undefeated team in the state and after playing over half of the season unscathed it is one of the strongest football aggregations in Texas this year. The contest will be witnessed by several thousand of the old students who will return for the celebration and there will be exhibitions of enthusiasm as well rarely seen on any athletic occasion in Texas.

The various classes which have graduated during the past years of Baylor's life will have reunions and renew the acquaintances made in student days. These class reunions form some of the closest ties of life as the members again meet the ones who were closest friends during the days when some of the greatest triumphs and defeats were being gone through, and it is during these moments of renewing acquaintances that friendships are formed which are carried for the remainder of life.

The Philomatheas and Erisophians the two male literary societies, and the Rufus C. Burleson and the Calli speans, the two young women's societies, will have reunions for the older members. Some of the men and women who helped form these societies and who fostered the life of these bodies while they were still in the formative period, will return to take part in these reunions and is celebrating with Baylor the successful completion of seventy years of usefulness in formation of character in the young men and women of Texas. Some of the oldest living graduates of Baylor will return and give vivid descriptions of the early life of the school and will tell of the hardships and struggles of the men and women who sought an education during the days when Texas was barely a state and still subject to raids by the Indians, and when the state was for eign to refining influences. Waco will put on gala attire and assist the University in welcoming the old pupils home.

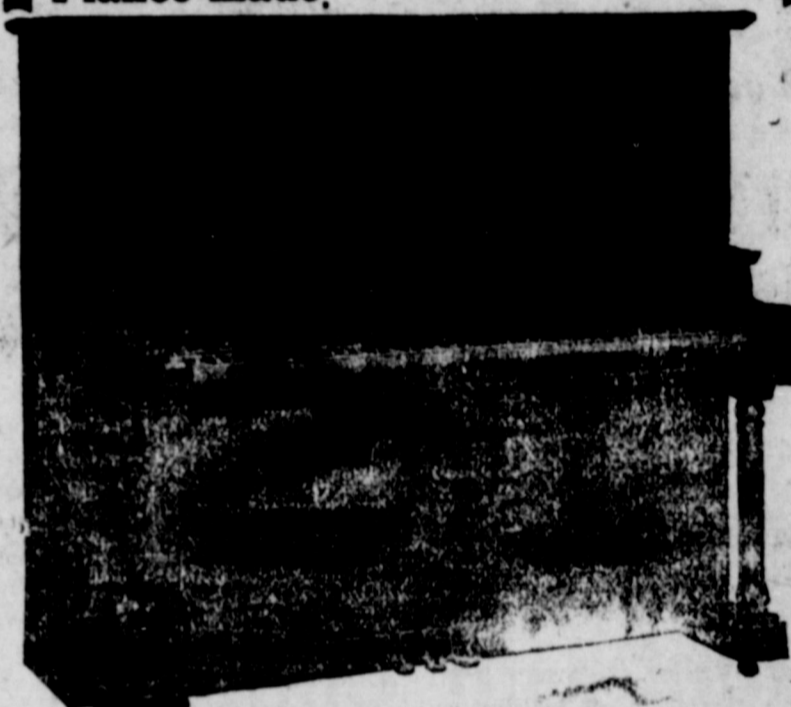

SERBIAN GOV'T. IS MOVED GERMANS QUIT THE FOREST

By Associated Press.

London, Nov. 11.—German troops have evacuated the forest district in the region west of Rika because it has been transformed into swamps by the heavy rains. News from the Serbian front is vague, it is denied that the Germans have occupied the entire line from Krivelo to Krivolak, as was reported yesterday. The Serbians have reached Kutchank defile and occupy the railway which the Bulgarians were using from Uskup to Priesend. The Serbian government has been moved to Krusovo east of Perleue. Nothing of importance has been reported from other fronts.

SECRETARY DANIELS USES WIRELESS

Reports received by manager Hunter of the Southwestern Telegraph & Telephone Company describe the experiment by which Secretary of the Navy Daniels communicated his first official order by wireless telephone to Admiral N. R. Usher at the Brooklyn Navy Yard.

The words passed from the ordinary Bell telephone on the Secretary's desk over the wires to the wireless

tower at Arlington, thence to New York by Wireless and then by wire again to the Admiral. All of this was automatically accomplished by the recently developed apparatus of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company. This foreshadows the time when the Secretary of the Navy may hold conversation with commanders of ships at sea, just as he would with members of his personal family at home" explains manager Hunter.

"But that is not all. Before long you will be reading of the words of those on sinking ships as they cry into the thin air for the help which may and may not be forthcoming."

"When Jack Binns called for the Republic we thought the last of science miracles had been worked. Now think how it will be when the actual tones of the voice will come to us through the ether and answers may be given as the cries go forth. Orders may be issued in full appreciation for all conditions, and what was accomplished when the Republic sank will seem small in comparison as modern means are applied to the conditions of dire emergency."

JAPANESE CAPITAL SCENE OF GREAT CORONATION CEREMONY

By Associated Press.

Tokio, Nov. 10.—Possibly the most brilliant coronation ceremony ever conducted in Japan occurred today when Yoshihito announced his accession to the throne of the realm. Politics of an unusual type did not prevent Japan's grand old man, Premier Count Shigen Okuma, from playing a leading role in the coronation ceremony.

The scene of the ceremony was laid partly within the main hall and partly in the open air courtyard upon which the hill looked down. Halls for the spectators extended on either side of the courtyard. As the Japanese doors and walls were removed the arrangements gave all participants an opportunity to see the setting of the courtyard. The stairs leading to the throne and the throne itself.

The two main gates leading to the Shishinden were opened in early morning, the court police acting as guard. At the appointed time in the afternoon the police guard was replaced by the troops who lined up outside the gates and along the walls of the palace. Among them were daughters of Beau Brummel (one of the last siders by this famous bull) Beau Modest, Beau Donovan 3rd, Beau Donorus, Beau Dauntless, Beau President, Domino and Paladin. Sixteen were daughters of Beau President and 12 were sired by Domino.

NOTICE TO SCHOOL TRUSTEES WITH REFERENCE TO CENSUS

The Thirty-Fourth Legislature, so amended the law with reference to taking the school census as to make the following provisions:

The County Superintendent of Public Instruction and the Board of Trustees of independent districts shall on the first day of January of each year or as soon thereafter as practical, appoint one of the trustees of the district or some other qualified person to take the scholastic census, who shall be known as the census trustee of the district.

The census are to be taken by the census trustee between the first day of March and the first day of April of all children who are over seven and under eight years of age on the first day of September following and who are residents of the district on the first day of April.

The census trustees are to make a report under oath to the County Superintendent on or before the first day of June following the taking of the census.

Blanks for taking the census will be furnished from the County Superintendent's office.

WEEKLY NEWS LETTER FROM AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT

The crop report for the week ending October 30, for the section of Texas of which Garza, (Denton County) shows cotton 55 per cent with 75 per cent picked out; corn 85 per cent, about all gathered; turnips, 100 per cent; gardens, 100 per cent, pie melon, 100 per cent; sweet potatoes, 110 per cent; wheat being sowed with an increase of 20 per cent in acreage. Boll weevil the only pest doing any damage, and that considerable in Denton and Cook counties.

Angeline and Houston counties: corn, estimated yield 15 bushels per acre; cotton about nine-tenths gathered, yielding about one-fifth of a bale to the acre. Ribbon cane, 90 per cent; sweet potatoes 85 per cent; hay crop 50 per cent; fall gardens, and truck, 70 per cent; peanuts 75 per cent. Weather conditions ideal.

Some top crop of cotton is being made along the artesian belt in Atascosa county, but picking is over save for odds and ends. The yield is very light—about a bale to five acres. The irrigated farms are shipping sweet potatoes, peppers, etc. At Somerset on the Atascosa river some broom corn is being raised.

Burnet county and surrounding territory: Cotton will make about a quarter of a bale to the acre; corn will average about twenty bushels to the acre. Smokehouses are full of meat and cribs full of corn.

McCulloch county: Crops in this section are being rapidly gathered and if the weather conditions continue the

cattle will soon be in all of the fields. Some plowing has been done and in some few fields small grain is coming up nice and, at the present time it does not look as if as much grain would be planted as last season. The high prices paid for cotton will very likely have the tendency to increase the acreage in this crop next year in spite of the ravages of the boll weevil. For the last several weeks cotton has been bringing fair prices and cotton has been brought here that in other years has gone to other places. Seed, as all over the state has been bringing record prices having brought as much as \$38.50 per ton. For the last several weeks the weather here has been great—warm in the day time and just pleasantly cool at night. As soon as the farmers are up with their work a rain will be of use.

Crop conditions in the section of which Teague (Freestone county) is the center as follows on the week ending October 31: Harvesting is about completed. The sweet potato acreage shows an increase of about 20 per cent over last year and the yield about 25 bushels per acre; ribbon cane shows about a fifty per cent increase of acreage over last year but is still small.

In that section of which Stryder, (Scurry County) is center, and including three or four adjoining counties, a representative of the Department has found that the scourge of ravens, rabbits and prairie dogs have become a menace to the entire maturing crop with the results entirely in doubt. A campaign of extermination will begin at once.

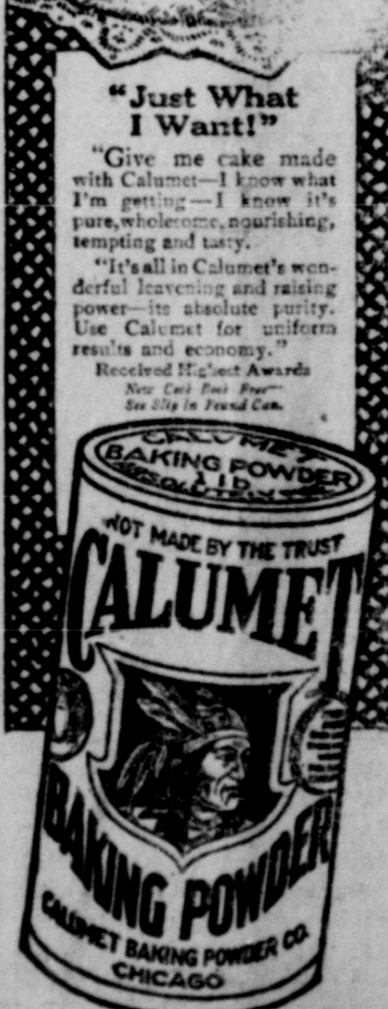

OFFICIALS ARE TOURING THE SOUTHERN NAT'L HIGHWAY

A party including the leading officials in the laying out and development of the great Southern National Highway spent a few hours in the city today. The party included Col. Potter, the originator of the great highway, Mr. Wm. B. Gross, Mr. B. H. Burrell, government engineer, Mr. Wilbur Hall, magazine writer who will write up the entire journey for various magazines, Harry B. Taylor, chauffeur.

The party was met here by Messrs. S. D. Myres, W. W. Gibson and other leading citizens who are interested in the project. Mr. Gross in an interview with the reporter for this paper said they left San Diego Tuesday, Nov. 2nd, coming by way of Yuma, Phoenix, Roswell, El Paso. They have made an average of 200 miles per day and stop at all county seats.

He said they found the greater part of the road along the route in good shape and where the roads are bad, they have made it their business to interview the commercial clubs and other good roads organizations and in many cases received assurances that the roads would be improved at once. He predicted that within two years practically all the road would be in good condition. He referred to California where eighteen million dollars in bonds have been floated to improve the highways, and much of this money will be used along the Southern National Highway through the state.

They are traveling in a fine Cadillac 8 automobile. Mr. Gross is special representative of the San Diego Exposition for which arrangements have been made to keep it open all during 1916. He says the city of Los Angeles is backing the proposition realizing the splendid results that California is receiving from the exposition.

The party appeared greatly interested in Sweetwater and the writer took particular pains to outline to their publicity man our splendid gravity water system the fact that Sweetwater is at the junction of three great transcontinental railroads, has the Santa Fe shops and other big assets were outlined and will receive prominent notice in some of the big magazines. They complimented our fine macadamized roads most highly, saying that they had not seen anything better on the long trip. The destination is Washington City.
