Artile7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the not to exceed one dollar on the one hundred dollars valuation of property for the maintenance of the public schools of the district.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

Section 3. School Taxes. - Onefourth of the revenue derived from the State occupation taxes, and a poll tax of \$1.00 on every male inhabitant ci this State between the ages of 21 and 60 years shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools, and in addition thereto there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount, not to execed 20 cents on the \$100.00 valuation, as with the avail able school fund arising from all other sources will be sufficient to maintain and support the public free schools of this State, for a period of not less than six months in each year. The Legislature may authorize the levy and collection of an annual ad ties of this State not to exceed 50 cents on the \$100.00 valuation of prop erty situated within the county; provided, a majority of the qualified prop erty taxpaying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, for the purpose of maintaining the publie free schools of the county, and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general or special law, without the local notice required in other cases of special legislation, and all such school districts, whether created by general or special law, may embrace parts of two by the House March 6, yeas 104, nays or more counties, and the Legislature 12. State is hereby instructed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified veters of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in November, 1916, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution of the State of Texas relating to the levy of ad valorem school taxes not to exceed fifty cents of the \$100.00 valuation in the county and not to ex ceed one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation in the district, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the county or of the district." And those opposed to this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to Section 2. Article 7. of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the levy of ad valorem school taxes, not to exceed fifty cents on the \$100.00 valuation in the county, and not to exceed one dollar on the \$100.00 valuation in the district, for the purpose of maintaining the public schools of the county or of the district."




