BLANTON SAYS BIG MAJORITY; SMITH SAYS ELECTION IN DOUBT

Special to The Reporter:

Abilene, Texas, July 24.—Special.—Taylor county complete gives Grisham 126, Smith 691, Blanton 2,185. Incomplete returns from thirty-two counties give Blanton over 3,000 lead.

The El Paso Herald wired its congratulations to Blanton this morning.

A telegram message from Congressman W. R. Smith at his home in Colorado this afternoon stated that he regarded the election of Congressman from this district still in doubt between himself and Judge Blanton of Abilene. Mr. Smith said it would require the official count to determine the nominee.

I. S. Focht Is Renominated

Commissioner I. S. Focht of Precinct number one was re-nominated Saturday. He won over his opponent T. C. Donnell by an unofficial vote of 586 to 469.

Spinks wins Public weigher

The unofficial count gives E. H. Spinks the nomination as public weigher in a race where seven good men were running.

Spencer Appears Winner

In the race for Representative from this district E. R. Spencer seems to have won over C. P. Woodruff by a small majority the exact amount of which can not be determined until an official count is made.

Judge Beall Renominated

According to incomplete reports from all over the district Judge Beall has been re-nominated Judge of this district by a majority ranging around the 1000 mark.

Col. Chas. W. Lewis concedes the nomination to Judge Beall, but does not know the majority as the returns are not in.

Ellis Nominated Superintendent

From unofficial returns A. D. Ellis has defeated J. L. Ross for County Superintendent of Schools.

One count gives Ellis a lead of twenty while another counting gives him only seven in the lead.

S. W. Viser Is Nominated

S. W. Viser was nominated Constable in Saturday's primary for precinct number, over the present incumbent by a vote of 363 to 302 by the unofficial returns.

Askins Wins Over Lewis

H. J. Askins was nominated for County Commissioner of Precinct No. 4 in Saturday's election. He defeated the present Commissioner W. T. Lewis 55 votes according to unofficial returns received today.

John Bryan Nominated J.P.

John Bryan defeated W. T. Hightower for Justice of the Peace of Precinct No. One in Saturday's election by a vote of 396 to 281 according to unofficial returns.

Howell Wins Collector Race

From unofficial returns George Howell was nominated for Tax Collector in Saturday's primary.

He led his closest opponent, R. R. Haley, by 42 votes.

NOTICE OF REPUBLICANS COUNTY CONVENTION

By authority vested in me as Chairman of the Republican Executive Committee of Nolan County, Texas, and pursuant to the call issued by Hon. Phil E. Baer, Chairman of the Republican State Executive Committee, I hereby call a delegate county convention to be held at Sweetwater, the county seat of Nolan County, on Saturday, July 29, 1916, at 2 o'clock p. m., to elect delegates and alternates to attend the Republican State Convention called to meet in San Antonio, Texas, on Tuesday, August 8, 1916, and to the Congressional, Senatorial, Representative, and Judicial District Conventions to be held on Saturday, August 26, 1916, in accordance with the calls of the chairman of the executive committee of said districts. Also to nominate county tickets, to verify precinct returns, and to transact such other business as may properly come before said county convention.

On July 29, 1916, at 10 o'clock a. m., the county executive committee shall meet and canvass returns from precinct conventions hear contests, if any, and prepare the temporary roll of the county convention.

This county is entitled to one vote in said state convention, and each district convention, and under the call of the state chairman, may elect not exceeding four delegates and four alternate delegates for each vote the county is entitled to cast.

The election laws provide that no person may participate in any precinct county, district, or state convention who is not a qualified voter and only Republican electors and others who believe in the principles of the Republican party, endorse its policies and will support its nominees in good faith are entitled to participate in such primary conventions.

MULE KICKED BALLINGER MAN

J. E. Boone, a hauler of sand in Ballinger, was kicked into unconsciousness this morning at 11 o'clock when a horse became frightened as Mr. Boone was hooking the traces preparatory to returning home. The accident occurred near the court house Mr. Boone had voted and was getting ready to return home. He was looking the traces when in some manner the horse became frightened.

Mrs. E. C. Bailey of South Ballinger, who was one of the witnesses of the accident, said that Mr. Boone was kicked with both feet of the mule. The hoofs of the animal struck in the forehead and knocked the man unconscious. Medical aid was called but at noon the man had not gained his right mind although he was conscious of his surroundings. He claimed that he was knocked in the head just as he stepped from the polls but he knows not who committed the act. He does not remember having started to hitch his team to the wagon.

The injured man was carried to his home in the western part of the city shortly after consciousness was gained.—Ballinger Ledger.

NOTED POET IS DEAD

Indianapolis, Ind., July 24.—Family of James Whitcomb Riley today received a telegram from President Wilson expressing regret at Poet's death. Body will lie in State at State House this afternoon and evening.

Indianapolis, Ind., July 23.—James Whitcomb Riley, the Hoosier poet and friend of the children, died at 11 o'clock Saturday night as a direct result of a heat attack suffered earlier in the day.

The poet appeared to have recovered late in the evening, and his physicians gave out the statement at the time that there was nothing alarming in his condition.

Later, however, the patient weakened and failed rapidly until the end came.

James Whitcomb Riley was an Indiana product, just as his most famous verses have sung of Indiana folks and Indiana ways. He was born at Greenfield in 1853 and started out first as a sign painter after a public school education. His first verses were published under the pseudonym of Benjamin F. Johnson of Boone in the seventies. Before that time he had contributed scraps of verse and humorous comments to Indiana newspapers.

Riley received honorary degrees from Yale, Wabash College and the University of Pennsylvania.

Riley was a bachelor, but one of his most famous poems was "An Old Sweetheart of Mine," a poem of love and tenderness that probably has never been equalled by an American author. Works which endeared him to the children of America included "The Raggedy man," "Little Orphan Annie" and many other published in a volume known as "Rhymes of Childhood."

Riley had written but little during the latter years of his life. His quaint Hoosier dialect, which predominated in his leading poems, however, as well as their subject matter, stamped him as one of America's leading poets.

"Good-Bye Jim, Take Keer Yerself" is one of his most widely quoted poems. Riley had a quaint, simple philosophy which endeared him to readers throughout the world.

Although wealthy from his writings, Riley lived simply. His home for years has been on Locker street in Indianapolis. This street, a quiet, secluded thoroughfare, was made famous by Riley in the poem "Lockerbe Street."

By the terms of a will made some time ago, it is understood, the poet leaves a substantial fortune for a library site in Indianapolis.

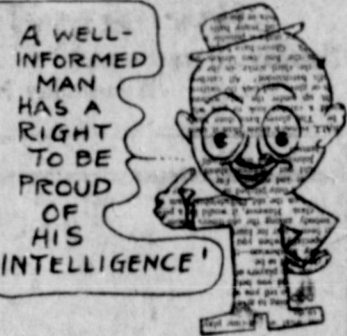

NOTICE OF ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held in the City of Sweetwater, at the City Hall on the 8th day of August 1916, at which election there shall be submitted the proposition to amend the Charter of said City to read as follows:

Art XXVIII. Sec. 6. Board of City Development.

The Commission shall appoint what shall be known and designated as a Board of City Development, which shall be composed of not exceeding fifteen members, who shall serve without compensation, and the Commission may prescribe the qualifications and duties of such board and their term of office and shall appropriate two mills on the one dollars worth of property in the City of Sweetwater, out of the General Fund of said City, to support the work of said Board.

Said election to be held and conducted in accordance with the laws of Texas and the rules and regulations of the Charter and ordinances of the City.

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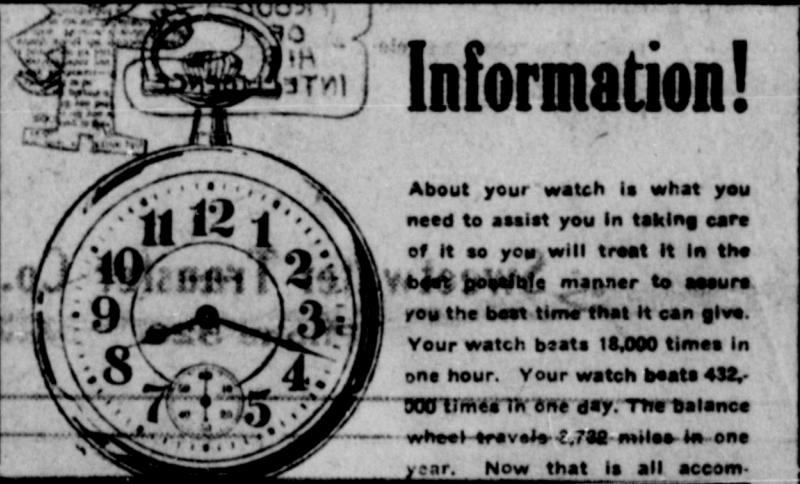
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
