The Farmers Warehouse Association was organized Friday afternoon at a meeting of the directors at the tabernacle by electing M. L. Bennett president and W. C. Calvert secretary and Treasurer.

The Association is organized under the Bonded Warehouse and Marketing Laws of the state and a manager will be appointed for the association some time today.

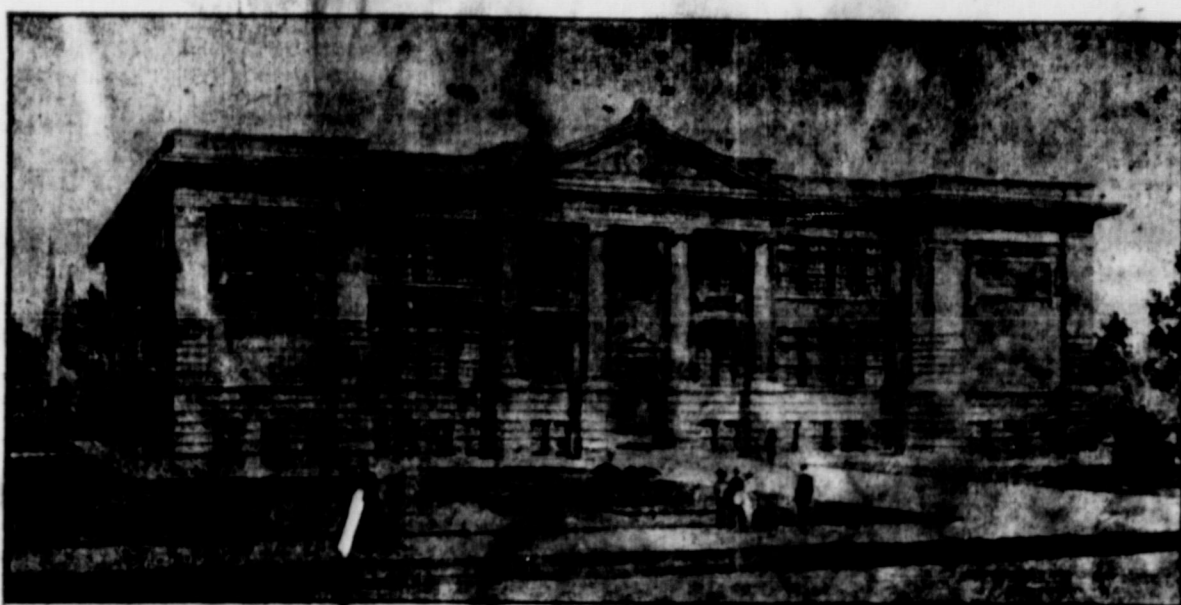
Want Band For The City

ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE CITY SCHOOLS WITH TEACHERS AND THEIR ASSIGNMENTS FOR 1916-17

The first general faculty meeting of the teachers for next session of the public schools was held at the high school this afternoon together with members of the board of trustees.

School policies for the session were discussed and the assignments were given to the teachers as follows:

High School: Mr. R. N. Richardson principal and teacher of algebra; Mrs. T. C. King, in charge of the tenth grade and teacher of history; Miss Trimmer Wilson in charge of the industrial section of the eighth grade and teacher of English; Mr. A. E. Paschal science teacher in charge of the eleventh grade; Miss Morton, domestic science teacher and in charge of the industrial section of the ninth grade; Miss DeShazo Spanish teacher and in charge of the classic section of the 9th grade; Mr. Robinson, manual training teacher in charge of the classic section of the eighth grade; Miss Oliver in charge of the industrial section of the seventh grade and teacher of the seventh grade; Miss Dameron in charge of the classic section of the seventh grade and teacher in the seventh grade Latin to be assigned.

East Ward School

Miss Lackey, Principal and teacher of the first grade; Miss Allen, teacher

of the second grade; Miss Musgrove, teacher of the third grade; Miss Winkler, teacher of the 4th grade; Miss Stillos, teacher of the 5th grade; Mrs. Richardson, teacher of the 6th grade.

West Ward School

Miss Fowler, principal and teacher of the first grade; Miss Cowan, teacher of the second grade; Miss English teacher of the third and fourth grades; Miss Lowden teacher of the fifth and sixth grades.

South Ward School

Miss Poe, principal and teacher of the fifth and sixth grades; Miss Eakman teacher of the third and fourth grades; Miss Davis teacher of the first and second grades.

A general meeting of patrons and interested friends will be held at the High School building Monday morning at nine o'clock and every one is invited to be present.

It is the earnest wish and hope of the trustees, superintendent, principals, and teachers that every patron and friend of the schools will give their earnest cooperation to all school interests during the session. It is especially hoped that every patron will line up with the teacher of their respective children and give them their earnest support.

Attention is called to the impossibility of giving to every one the teacher and building that they might want and parents are requested to refrain from anything that might be construed as hurtful criticism and to give teachers a hearty welcome and loyal support in their efforts for the children. Parents are requested to see that their children are enrolled in their respective schools and that they may be able to know without doubt as to the school ward in which they are to enroll the following information is given:

All children in the high school and 7th grade will enroll at the high school, all children below these grades and living east of south second st. will enroll at the South ward school, all children below the 7th grade and living west of the Orient R. R. will enroll at West Ward School, and all children below the 7th grades living East of the Orient Railway and north of the South Second Street will enroll at East ward School; with the exception of those living between Oak St. (West Side) and the Orient Railroad may attend either West Ward of East Ward at their own opinion.

NEW REVOLT THREATENED IN AFRICA

THE ASSOCIATED PRESS SUMMARIZES THE WAR NEWS OF THE DAY IN THE FOLLOWING DISPATCHES:

GENERAL KORNILOFF, FORMERLY COMMANDER OF THE RUSSIAN DIVISION, WHO WAS CAPTURED BY THE AUSTRILIANS IN GALICIA LAST YEAR, ESCAPED FROM THE PRISON CAMP IN AUSTRIA AND HAS ARRIVED IN BUCHAREST, AFTER WALKING AT NIGHT AND HIDING IN THE DAY FOR A MONTH RENEWING THEIR ASSAULTS ON SOMME FRONT LAST NIGHT THE FRENCH CAPTURED A SMALL WOODED AREA, ACCORDING TO PARIS ANNOUNCEMENT. THE GERMAN AND TURKISH TROOPS ARE FIGHTING STUBBORNLY WITH THE RUSSIANS NEAR HALICZ, GALICIA BUT COUNTER ATTACKS BY THE TEUTONS WERE REPULSED, PETROGARD ANNOUNCES. THE STATEMENT ADDS THAT IN CARPATHIANS SOUTH OF BARANOFF, THE RUSSIANS STORMED A SERIES OF HEIGHTS, TOOK FIVE HUNDRED PRISONERS AND CAPTURED A MOUNTAIN BATTERY OF SEVERAL CANNON. PARIS SAYS, AFTER VIOLENT ENGAGEMENT ON MACEDONIAN FRONT, THE SERBIANS CAPTURED THE HEIGHT WEST OF LAKE OSTROVO.

THE FORCES OF THE CENTRAL POWERS IN CARPATHIANS NORTH WEST OF KAPUL, YIELDED BEFORE THE PRESSURE OF THE RUSSIANS SAYS OFFICIAL REPORT OF THE GERMAN GENERAL STAFF PETROGARD REPORTS THAT THE RUSSIANS TORPEDO BOATS BOMBARDED THE RUMANIAN PORT OF BALTJIK ON THE BLACK SEA WHICH IS OCCUPIED BY THE BULGARIANS AND SANK TWENTY ONE BARGES LOADED WITH BREAD.

BRITISH CAPTURED GERMAN TRENCH IN HIGHWOOD ON SOMME FRONT LAST NIGHT AFTER A SHARP FIGHT, SAYS A BRITISH OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT. CAPETOWN, SEPT. 9.—THE DETAILS OF AN ATTEMPT TO FOMENT ANOTHER REBELLION AGAINST THE BRITISH IN SOUTH AFRICA WAS DISCLOSED AT TRIAL OF TWO MEN, VANDERMERWE AND SCHONKEN, CHARGED WITH TREASON. THEY ARE ALLEGED TO HAVE APPROACHED A NUMBER OF PROMINENT BOERS, INCLUDING GENERAL DEWEY, WHOM THEY TOLD A LARGE STORE OF RIFLES WERE AVAILABLE AND THAT CERTAIN BOER GENERALS ARE WILLING TO LEAD THE REVOLT.

200 AUTOIST TO PASS THIS WAY EVERY DAY

County Judge John H. Cochran is in receipt of the following letter concerning the proposed national Highway from El Paso to Fort Worth which the Reporter gladly publishes.

El Paso, Texas, Sept. 22, 1914
Mr. J. H. Cochran, County Judge,
Nolan County,
Sweetwater, Texas.

My Dear Judge:
I regret very much that I did not get to see you on my recent trip from Fort Worth to El Paso in the interest of a highway from Fort Worth to El Paso, following the Texas and Pacific Railroad. Attached herewith you will find a clipping from this morning's El Paso Times, setting this proposition out in full.

The counties all along this line are very enthusiastic over the possibility of securing this road and there is no question but what we are going to build this highway, connecting Fort Worth and El Paso, and we ask the co-operation of you and your Commissioners' Court.

We will have a meeting at Midland, either on the 26th or the 27th day of September depending upon what day the rates are put on for the Midland fair, of delegations from all the counties from Fort Worth to El Paso for the purpose of perfecting an organization to put this road through.

We ask that you and your Commissioners' Court and the incoming Commissioners' Court attend this meeting. It will be the best investment that your county can make to pay your expenses to this meeting. The present Commissioners' Court and the incoming Commissioners' Court of El Paso county will have a delegation from the Chamber of Commerce, who will attend this meeting.

Please take this matter up with your Chamber of Commerce and get them interested in this proposition. Also kindly send me the names and addresses of your present County Commissioners and the names of the incoming Commissioners' Court, as I would like to write each one of them a personal letter, setting out the necessity of their attending this meeting at Midland. I would like very much to have this information by return mail.

If you can get your local papers to print as much of this clipping from the Times as is possible, it will probably serve to get your local people interested in this matter. Will communicate with you from time to time as developments arise concerning the Midland meeting. Also send me names of Secretaries of Commerce and Good Road Organizations in your county.

El Paso Speaks For Road.

The movement to have a highway connecting Fort Worth with El Paso and thereby cause more than 200 autoists daily to go to California by the Southern route will be crystallized into a definite, co-operative working plan at a meeting to be held in Midland on September 26. The plan which was proposed by Judge Adrian Pool at the recent meeting of the Texas Good Roads association in San Antonio, received the approval of the eight hundred delegates.

Judge Pool says he realized there was an enormous tourist business from coast to coast passed through Dallas and Fort Worth and that El Paso was getting little or none of the traffic. He went to Dallas and Fort Worth to find out, and found all of the traffic was being detoured at Fort Worth by way of Wichita Falls and Amarillo.

200 Cars Pass Daily.

"I went to Wichita Falls, to watch the tourist traffic pass," Judge Pool said yesterday. "It was estimated that more than 200 cars a day passed over this road to the Pacific coast and to Colorado points. I talked to many of these people and asked them why they traveled this road instead of coming direct to El Paso, where we had a connection with all Colorado points, and all California points over the best auto-

mobile roads in the country. The universal reply was they understood this was true, and they much preferred going through El Paso, but they could not get from Fort Worth to El Paso without a flying machine.

Mineral Wells Enthusiastic

"I decided that I would see what could be done to make connection from Fort Worth to El Paso, in order to bring this immense amount of traffic through El Paso. I first stopped off at Mineral Wells having decided at the San Antonio convention that the Mineral Wells delegation was a bunch of live wires. I arrived there at 12 o'clock. Two hours later one hundred business men were at the Chamber of Commerce to discuss the proposition they being as much interested in the matter as myself. At all of the largest towns between Mineral Wells and El Paso, the proposition to build a road from Fort Worth to El Paso, following the Texas & Pacific railroad, was enthusiastically received. Many of the towns closed their business houses and went to the court house for an hour to discuss the proposition.

What Road Will Mean.

"I have never seen so much enthusiasm over any proposition as there is in the towns from here to Fort Worth over the proposition of making this automobile connection from Fort Worth to El Paso. It will mean, at least, 200 cars per day through these towns into El Paso. A great many of these cars will stop in some of the towns along the route and spend a few dollars. It probably means at least a couple of hundred dollars per day to any town between here and Fort Worth. The business men in these towns realize the value of this traffic to them, and are determined to get the connection built. It will be no trouble to follow the Texas and Pacific all of the way from El Paso to Fort Worth with the exception of Ward and Ector counties. "It may be necessary to detour from Midland by way of Grand Falls to Pecos, on account of the sand in Ward and Ector counties. These counties are abundantly able financially to build roads through their counties and it depends entirely on whether or not they see it this way, as to whether they get this road.

200 Miles of Good Road.

"It would be much better to bring the road straight through these counties but if they do not fix their roads it will not interfere in any way in the road from Fort Worth to El Paso, as we have already made arrangements to detour from Midland by way of Grand Falls to Pecos, if we find it necessary to do so. We already have an excellent road from Pecos to El Paso of about 200 miles. Many of the counties along this road have already built fine roads. Mineral Wells has an excellent system of roads. Taylor county, Mitchell county and Reeves county have excellent road systems. Most of the roads through many other counties are in good condition.

"El Paso county, alone, will by the first day of November have 140 miles of this road completed.

"We will have a meeting of all of the counties between El Paso and Fort Worth either on September 26 or 27 to organize and put this road through. D. E. Colp, secretary of the Good Road Association the biggest man in Texas in road building will be at the Midland meeting. He will have one of the directors of the national highways to take charge of this road and push it to a speedy completion.—El Paso Times.

Mexico Taxes Be Increased

LAREDO, Texas, Sept. 8.—Enormous increase in the tax rate in Mexico will become effective September 10, according to a de facto government decree posted in Nuevo Laredo opposite here today.

The largest increase, according to the decree, which is dated September 1, is on realty on which the new rate is given at twelve times the present tax of 12 per cent. The school tax against real estate is increased 600 per cent, while an additional increase of 720 per cent in realty is to be imposed to create a sinking fund, making the total increase on realty holdings 2,520 per cent.

The object of the decree, it states is to raise 2,000,000,000 pesos within five years to finance the republic. The taxes are payable in uncounterfeitable Carranza currency. Some merchants and property holders in Nuevo Laredo stated today that the new decree was practically confiscatory.

COTTON MARKET

The local cotton market has ranged from 14 3/4 to 15 cents today.

Cotton seed has been bringing \$42 per ton by the local buyers.
