These are all legitimate places and can be found on the state road maps, Rand-McNally Atlas, and the Post Office Zip Code Book.

"The names on maps are the language with which the nation's biography is written," Orth says. "These names paint all kinds of pictures of what has happened across the United States as it was settled."

Mammoth Remains Are Found In Area

Residents of the area have been intrigued this week by the discovery and unearthing of the skull of a prehistoric woolly mammoth about seven miles southeast of Summerfield on the south side of Frio Draw.

Archaeologists and scientists spent last Friday and Saturday unearthing the mammoth's skull, which had been discovered in a barrow ditch in the northwestern corner of Castro County.

The skull, with most of the ancient animal's tusks intact, was loaded onto a flatbed trailer on Monday and movement was begun to take the bones to Plainview's Llano Estacado Museum.

Eddie Guffee, Wayland Baptist University professor and director of the museum, identified the skull as that of the Mammuthus Impratur, or Imperial Mammoth, which lived 15,000 to 18,000 years ago.

"It could be as old as 130,000 years, but I doubt it," Guffee said. The woolly mammoth stood about 14 feet high at the shoulder, and the tusks, which curved up and crossed in front of the animal's trunk, measured up to 13 feet long. The mammoth was about twice the size of its cousin, the modern-day elephant.

At least three feet of the tusks on the archaeological discovery had been broken off, probably by the road maintainers over a period of years.

Discovery of the bones has been credited to a Friona native, Gordon Stokes, who is employed by Castro County. Stokes reportedly struck a large object while operating a maintainer well over a year ago that turned out to be a tooth from the mammoth.

Guffee said he had seen mammoth tusks before, but this

was the first time he had found them still attached to a skull.

"When I discovered that the tusks were connected to a skull, I became excited. It took about three days to uncover the skull," Guffee said.

The Plainview archaeologist had words of praise for the residents and officials of the local area who helped with the preservation efforts on the skull.

"The (Castro) County commissioners dug a diversion ditch to keep the site from washing in case it rained. They also sent a backhoe and front-end loader and men to help load the skull onto the flatbed trailer," Guffee said.

Guffee said that once work had started to uncover the skull, it was imperative to finish and get it retrieved, as vandalism was a threat, as was wet weather (which hit shortly after the skull was removed from its 10,000-year-old grave).

The diggers searched in the immediate area, but have not as yet located the rest of the mammoth's body. It may be buried in the adjacent field, belonging to R.G. Peeler. It was theorized that the skull may have washed away from the rest of the body.

Once the skull was uncovered, the bones were cleaned, and coated with a preservative. Then the artifact was covered with plaster of paris and strips of burlap to keep it from crumbling when it was lifted.

"The bones tend to become brittle as they are exposed to the elements. We had to add moisture to help stabilize it," Guffee said.

The scientists said the shaggy animal roamed this area during the Pleistocene Age, grazing on plants and grass in this area, which is believed to have been lush due to rainfall which is estimated to have

been as much as 40 inches per year.

The area's climate was much cooler at that time period. The mammoths were covered with long, shaggy hair. Perfect specimens were found a number of years ago, which had been frozen in ice for thousands of years in Siberia, so scientists know a great deal about this species.

The nearest mammoth remains which have been unearthed the scientists said, were near Clovis, and near Plainview.

"At Clovis, artifacts were discovered which indicated that the mammoth may have been killed by the Paleo Indians (Clovis Man)," Guffee stated. The mammoth was in the process of dying out as early man was developing.

(Editor's note: Editor Bill Ellis also photographed mammoth tusks which were discovered in Muleshoe near Blackwater Draw a number of years ago when a ditch was being dug within the city limits of the Bailey County seat.)

Might there be other such bones scattered around the draws in this area? Guffee figures there are. "The mammoths were herd animals. They didn't travel alone," he said.

The workers had to dig through packed clay, alluvial soil and riverbed sand from past eras. The skull was some seven feet below the county road level, and ten feet below the surface of the adjoining field.

The sand around the skull was described as extremely fine, resembling beach sand. In those days, the Frio Draw must have been a pretty fair-sized stream, and the mammoths and other animals used it for watering purposes.

Guffee said that the cleaning and preserving of the skull could take two or three years. It is planned to be put on display at the Plainview museum.

Miss Bronniman played basketball four years in high



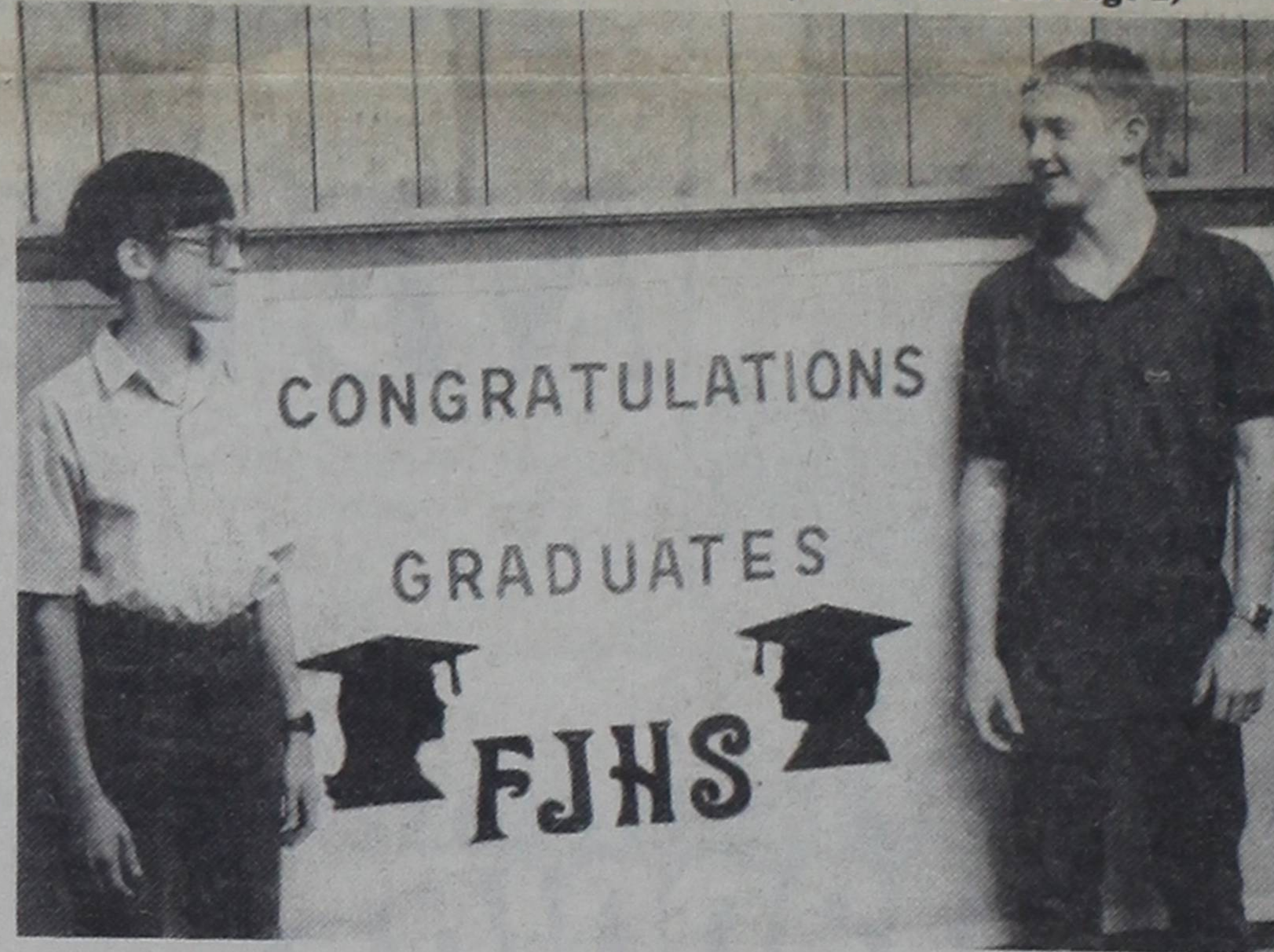

Area Gets Much-Need Rain In Week

The Friona area received some much-needed moisture during the past week, with a total of .82 inches being the official measurement in Friona for Tuesday through Thursday night.

On Tuesday afternoon, May 17, a cloud deposited .32 inches of

moisture around 4 p.m., accompanied by some light hail at the outset of the rain. There was not enough hail for damage.

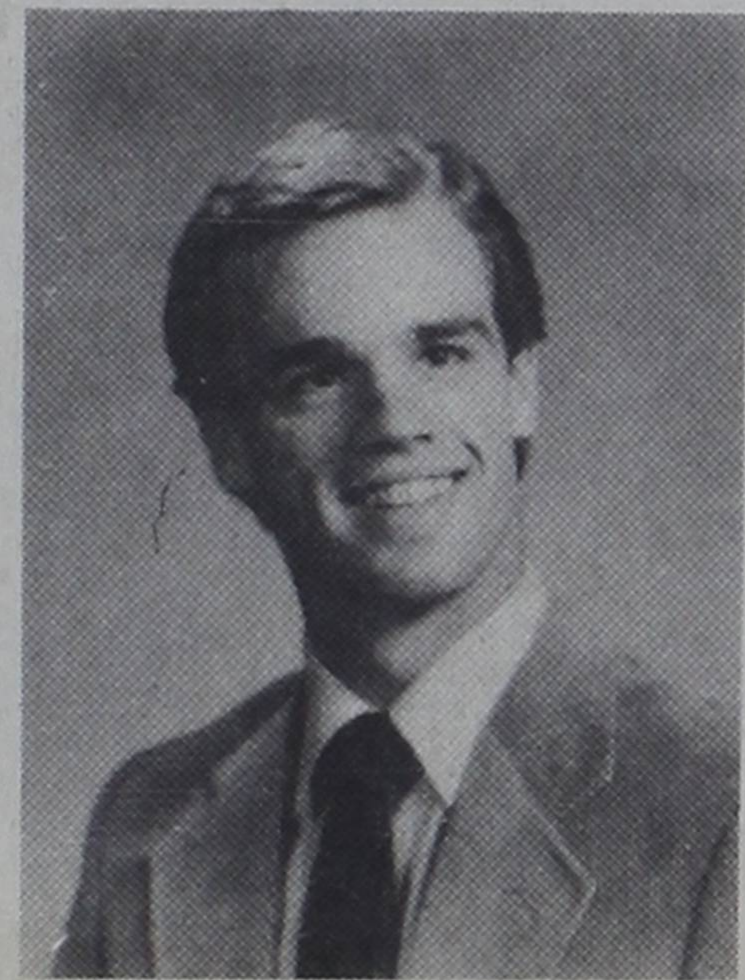
In the early morning hours on Thursday, May 19, another .42 inches were logged in Friona. This was in the form of slow-falling rain, with most residents being surprised to discover that it had rained.

Another afternoon cloud later in the day on Thursday added .08 inches to the week's total.

After the temperature had reached the 90-degree mark last Sunday for a seasonal high, the mercury dipped to a low of 45 on Friday morning after having reached only 70 on Thursday when it was overcast most of the day.

The rainfall in the outlying areas has been varied. Tuesday's cloud, for example, left two inches of rain in a cloudburst at Bovina.

Generally, a half inch was received Thursday morning both south and north of Friona.

It was announced this week by the Friona Teachers' Organization that Kellianne Coffey was chosen as the student of the month of March for Friona High School.

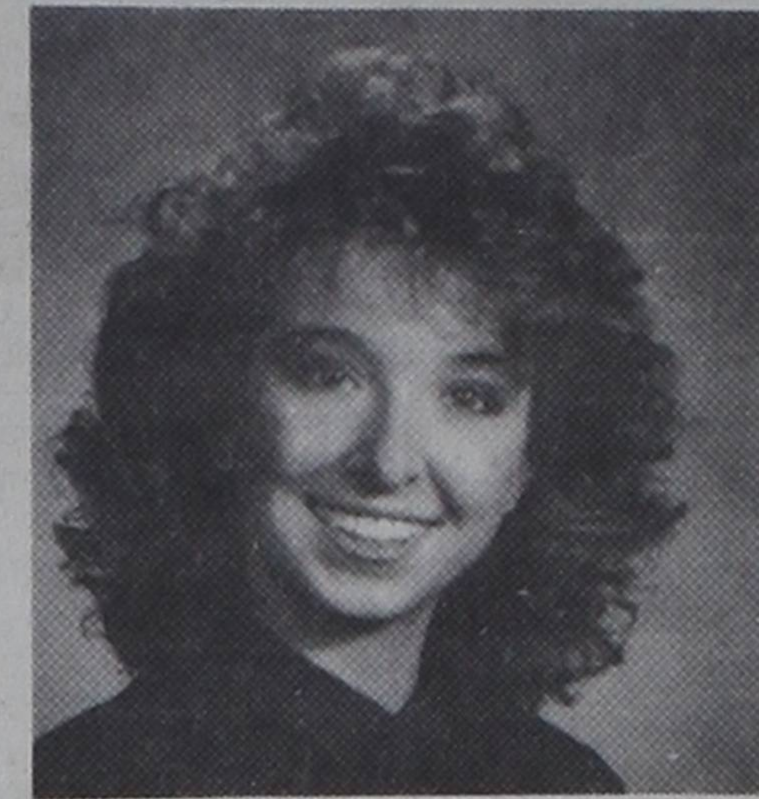
Kellianne is the daughter of Thelma and Leonard Coffey. She has attended local schools since kindergarten.

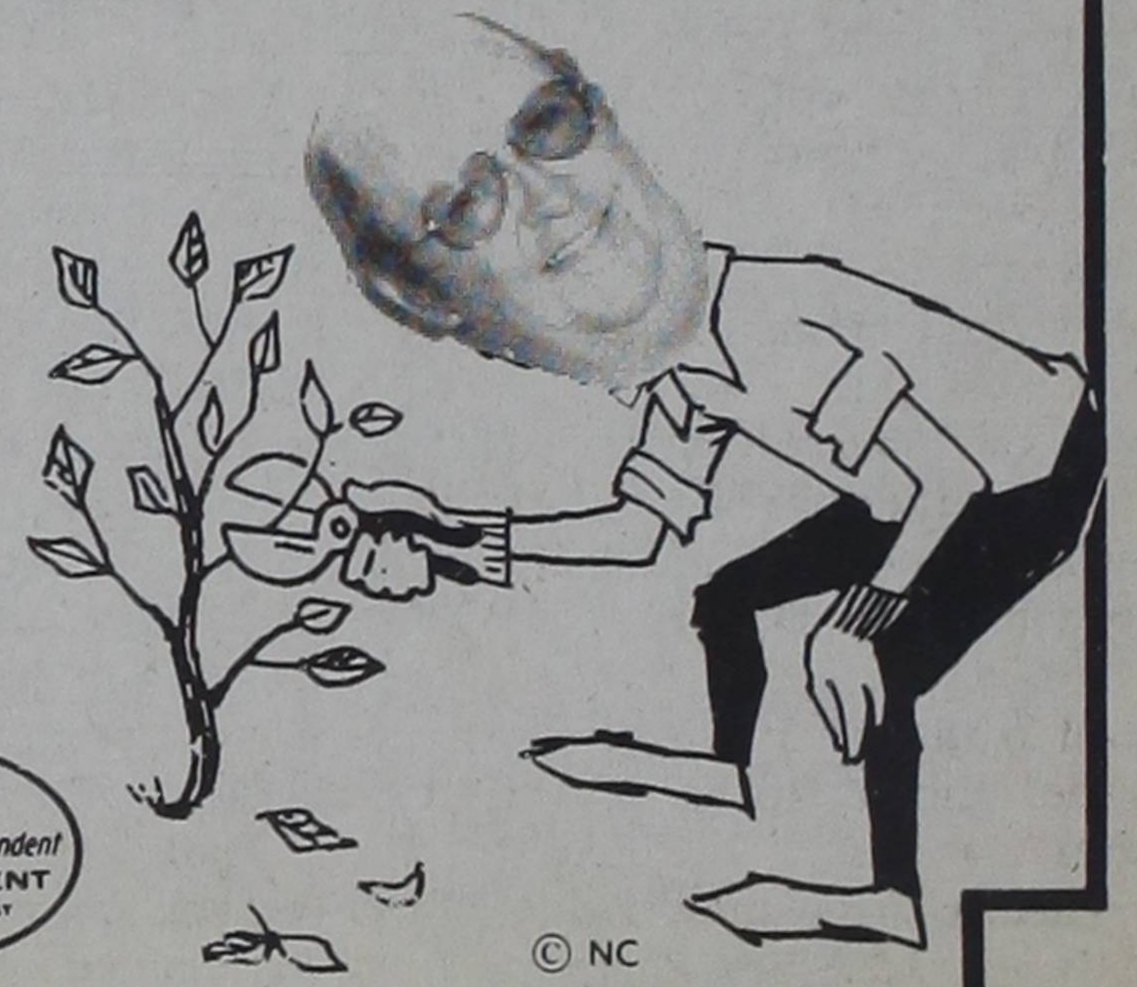
Proceeds from the give-away will go to improve the concession stand, fences and grandstand at the present park.

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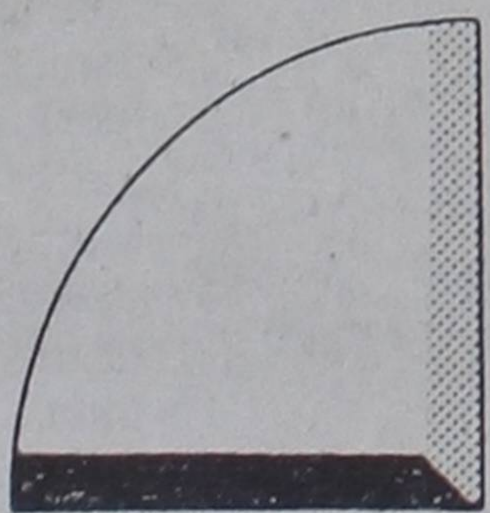

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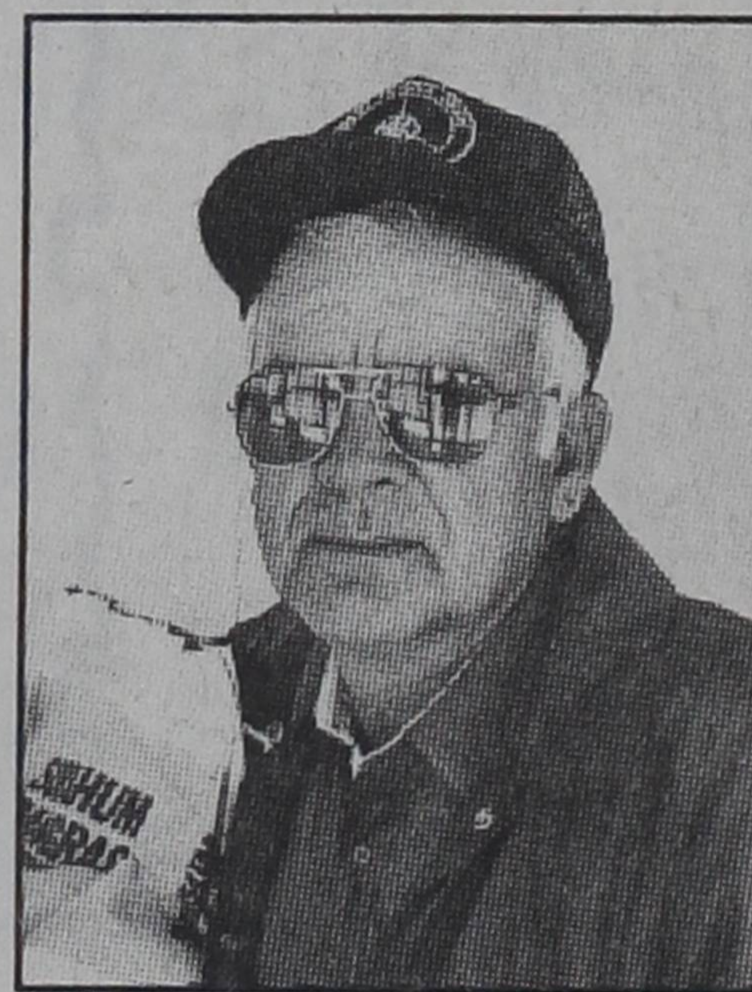

Burial was in Rest Lawn Memorial Park of Hereford, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

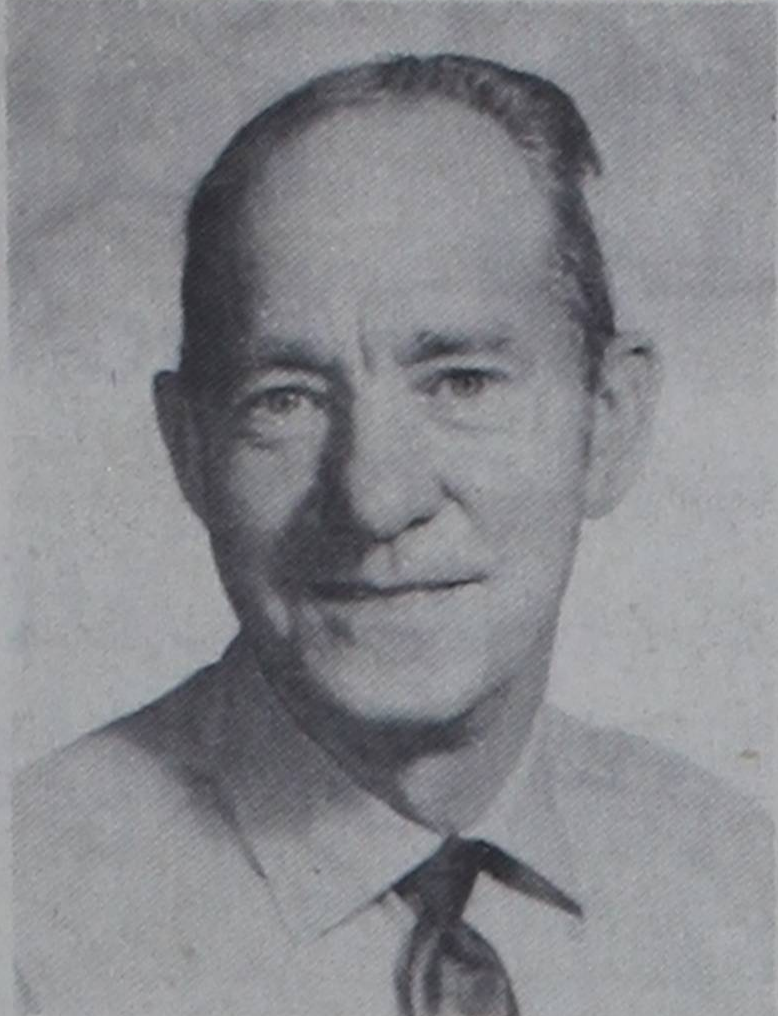

of grandparents are enjoying him and his brother very much.

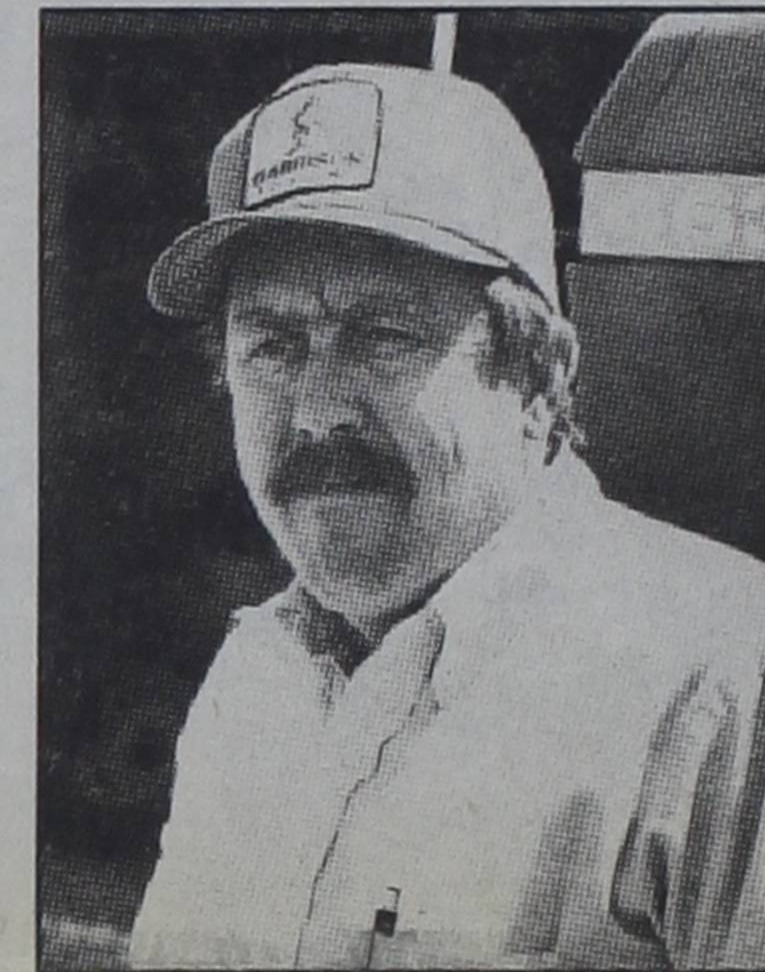
