SWEETWATER ELIMINATED

Austin, June 29.—The locating board is said to have eliminated all but Abilene, San Angelo, Amarillo, Lubbock and Snyder, when it met today.

THREE BOYS WERE LOST

Galveston, June 27.—About noon Wednesday, while pushing a row boat along the bay shore at Sixty-first street four young boys suddenly stepped into deep water where a strand ship was dragged out after the storm and three of them were drowned. The fourth was evidently near the stern of the boat and did not get beyond his depth. Members of the coast guard crew and the police, who were called to the scene, had not found the bodies up to a late hour on Wednesday.

The boys were Richard Marquardt, age 7; Jimmie Fink, age 6, and George Strain, age 7, all of whom resided in the west end of the city. Willis McMullen, age 8, managed to escape the fate of his fellows.

The boys were preparing for a fishing trip when the accident occurred.

CONDITIONS IN MEXICO BY MRS. OVERTON

Mrs. J. W. Overton whose home is in Ciudad Guzman, in Central West Mexico, is here on a visit to her daughter Mrs. Guy E. Morris. She was born and reared in Mexico, and practically all her life has been spent in that Republic. When the revolution broke out six years ago she came to this place where she resided five years, a part of which time she spent in teaching Spanish in the High School, and private classes, in the city. She returned to Mexico last August to be with her husband and to share his fortunes. He is a practicing physician in Guzman.

The Carranza government is employing every means to rid the country of banditry and to restore the country to a normal condition; especially is this true of the railroad. Government soldiers are every where to be seen along the railroad lines to guard against possible danger. After six years of revolution we may well understand that it requires time to rebuild roads, bridges and stations. These things are being done as fast as conditions will permit.

Since her trip down through the northern part of the republic last August she could easily see a marked change in the condition of things. Then poverty, filth and wretchedness were everywhere in evidence. The country is now on a silver basis and money has a purchasing value. Transformation is the dominant characteristic of affairs. Thrift, contentment and sanitation are the evident marks. Much of course remains yet to be done to restore and rehabilitate the country. But slowly the work moves apace.

BIG DAM GIVES AWAY

Baker, Ore., June 28.—Reports from Haines say the town of Rock Creek practically was swept away today when a fifty foot dam at the flooded Killmaeue lake, fifteen miles west of Haines, gave way. Residents of Haines, which is in the path of the flood, are reported hurrying for high ground.

Almost every building in the town is said to have been destroyed. Communication with the flood district has been cut off. It is not known whether there has been any loss of life.

Along the entire path of the rushing water people are fleeing, carrying with them what few belongings they were able to gather, according to reports reaching here. Several ranches have been completely flooded. The loss will run into thousands of dollars, it is believed as the district affected is considered one of the most productive grain and hay sections of Oregon.

PRESIDENT MAY CHANGE BILL

Washington, June 29.—A determined effort to modify the Food Bill so it will be free from the prohibition provisions, or at least to grant President Wilson authority to permit the use of foodstuffs in manufacturing beer and light wines will begin by the administration when President Wilson calls on the Senate leaders. It is said that Wilson desires authority to stop manufacture of malt and vinous liquors in case of emergency, but don't believe the immediate prohibition of their manufacture necessary or desirable.

Glasgow, June 29.—In discussing peace, Premier Lloyd George said if the war should be concluded a single hour before the allied powers reached the end they set out to attain at beginning of the war it would be the greatest disaster that ever befell mankind.

JURY GIVES BISHOP A LIFE SENTENCE

Anson, Tex., June 29.—The jury in the Bishop murder case came in at nine o'clock giving the defendant life sentence in the state penitentiary.

Anson, June 28.—The closing argument on behalf of the state in the Bishop case will be made by James P. Stinson. He will be preceded by W. B. Ferrell of Roby for the state. E. T. Brooks will make the closing argument for the defendant. He will be preceded by R. E. Rogers also for the defendant.

Following the close of the testimony counsel for the defense offered to present the case with argument if the state's attorneys would agree to request the jury to return a verdict of guilty and assess a life sentence. After consulting with Fisher county citizens the state's attorneys announced they would insist on the extreme penalty or ask the jury to give Bishop an axe and grubbing hoe and turn him loose.

GERMANS MAKE HEAVY ATTACK

Paris, June 29.—Picked German troops made heavy attacks last night on Verdun front near Hill 304 and avocourt Wood after specially severe shelling those points.

Today's official statement says the attack was disorganized by a sharp reply of French artillery, and that the Germans obtained a footing at only a few points in the first line.

This morning the Germans made another violent effort of Hill 304. It failed completely.

The Germans also are active on the Aisne front. All attacks were repulsed.

GERMANS CLAIM VICTORY
Berlin, June 29.—German forces yesterday captured the French positions on both sides Malancourt Esnes Road, on West Bank Meuse Verdun sector, two thousand yards wide and five hundred yards deep says an official statement.

Today the Germans stormed three hundred yard wide French position in Avercourt Wood.

More than 550 prisoners taken at both places.

Washington, June 29.—The House agrees to a series three day recesses until July nine.

MAN TRIED FOR MURDER

Franklin, June 29.—A case of long standing was finally disposed of in the district court here Tuesday. In 1887 a difficulty arose between Frank Patrick and Joe Miller, then citizens of Franklin, the result of which Miller was shot and killed and Patrick left the country. An indictment was returned against Patrick, charging him with murder, but the officers were unable to find him.

For many years all of Patrick's acquaintances supposed him to be dead. About a month ago, however, Patrick appeared at the court house and informed the sheriff that his name was Frank Patrick and that he had grown tired of being a fugitive from justice and had come home to stand his trial. After a careful investigation of the case, the district attorney agreed to permit the defendant to plead guilty to manslaughter and recommended his sentence be suspended. The plea was entered and the jury found Patrick guilty of manslaughter and suspended his sentence.

MEMBERSHIP OF RED CROSS CHAPTER SAT.

IMPERIAL BANK IN BAD SHAPE

Copenhagen, June 29.—For the first time during the war, the weekly report of the Imperial Bank of Germany shows a decrease in its gold reserve being as seventy six million marks below the preceding week.

The increase for along time has been steadily declining despite energetic propaganda appeals for the people to surrender jewelry.

Athens, though not yet declared by the Greek Government, considers that a state of war has existed since yesterday.

The recall of Greek diplomatic representatives, accredited to the Central Powers and their allies, is imminent.

WOULD KILL SEN. JOHNSON

San Francisco, June 28.—United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson was marked for death by the International Workers' Defense League, when he was governor of California, declared Assistant District Attorney Ferrerari, in the trial today of Mrs. Rena Mooney for murder, growing out of a bomb explosion here last July which cost ten lives.

"Thomas J. Mooney was secretary of the league and he offered resolutions which were adopted, threatening death to the governor for his failure to pardon Richard Ford and H. D. Suhr, convicted of the Wheatland hop riot murders," said Ferrerari.

HOME HORSE MAKES GOOD

(By George Daley in New York World.)

Pan Zareta is a chestnut mare by Abe Frank—Caddie Griffith and seven years of age. She won the Richmond Highweight Handicap at Jamaica yesterday, and thereby hangs the story of a truly wonderful race horse which almost puts fiction to blush.

This seven-year-old mare, making her first appearance in the East, took up 128 pounds, broke like a quarter horse, galloped in front all the way, won easily by three lengths and ran the five and a half furlongs in the fast time of 1.05 3-5, establishing a new track record.

And behind her were such good sprinters as Top o' th' Morning, High Noon and Wood Trap, among others, fairly reeling and dizzy from the pace they tried to follow in chasing her to the wire.

This is just the beginning of a story which has been told in part before in the South, in the Middle West and in Canada, but which will bear repeating here.

Pan Zareta won her seventy-second race yesterday out of 135 starts, slightly over 53 per cent. She has been racing winter and summer ever since she was a two-year old and has been in training constantly except for a short period last summer when she was turned out for a well deserved rest.

From New Orleans to Canada by way of the Middle West and back again has been her yearly pilgrimage and she has gone on winning race after race, usually under big weight, to the marvel of horsemen and to the profit of her owner and to her many ardent followers.

Her most striking performance perhaps was six furlongs in 1:12 2-5 under 140 pounds, but her race yesterday compares favorably with any she has ever run, considering her manner of winning.

Pan Zareta was bred by J. E. Newman at Sweetwater, Texas, and was raced by his son, Art Newman, up to last spring at Hot Springs, when she was sold to E. T. Colton for \$4,500, a puny price it would seem in view of what she has done.

She has won on an average of fourteen races a year and with her total of seventy-two closely approaches the mark of seventy-five set up by Kingston and is well along to that remarkable record of one hundred races won by Logan.

Pan Zareta is a dark chestnut

in color, with strong shoulders, plenty of depth through the heart powerful quarters and with legs and ankles as clean as the day she was foaled. She is by Abe Frank, a son of Hanover and looks every inch the high class thorough bred. Her neck is a bit light but otherwise she meets every requirement as to conformation. Best of all, perhaps, she is blessed with a remarkable constitution and a disposition which takes everything as it comes.

While being saddled in the paddock one of the big crowd gathered about to get a look at her remarked: "So that's the Queen of the West."

Quick as a flash, one of her handlers spoke back: "Yes and she'll be Queen of the East too, before she's been here long."

By the noisy reception she got in winning and on coming back to the scales, it will not take long for her to earn the same place in popular favor that she holds in the West, in the South and in Canada.

Pan Zareta Has More Than Speed

Pan Zareta is a race horse, but with those keenly developed instincts, so noticeable in some animals, which closely approach human understanding.

While she was being led around in the paddock yesterday, just before winning the fifth race, Eugene Foucon, who broke her as a yearling and trained her up to the time she was sold last spring, walked under the shed.

He had not seen her since the day she was sold, but Pan Zareta had not forgotten. She whinnied twice and tried to pull away from the boy who was leading her, to get to her old friend.

When he walked up to her it was almost pathetic to see a horse try to express affection.
