sing" the government to say nothing
of the more serious crime of
organizing to hinder when the life
of the nation is at stake.

It is indeed fortunate that Amer-
ica has a practical party in power
at this particular time to deal with
practical but stubborn issues in a
practical way. Lead by the dis-
tinguished Woodrow Wilson, the
Democratic party is doing every-
thing possible to carry on this na-
tions part in the greatest war of
modern times with the least possi-
ble inconvenience to the people in
a general way. The draft law,
while not perfect, is now regarded
as the only wise solution to the
question of raising a great army.
The men who must enter the army
are receiving decent and living
wages. A great insurance scheme
is being worked out that protects
the dependants of the soldier who
may be slain in battle, giving not
only protection when needed, but
it will go a long way in solving
the pension problem after the war
is over. The food supply is being
conserved wisely and the prices
are far lower than would be the
case were the nation not taking a
hand. While the awful war is de-
plorable to a degree almost un-
thinkable still we are glad that
we have a man and a party with
progressive and practical ideas to
steer the ship of state through the
troubles time.

Revolution Was Complete

Athens, Oct. 23.—The upheval
in public affairs which Greece has
passed through in the last few
months is now officially designated
as "the revolution" and it will
doubtless go down in the records
of the European war as the Greek
Revolution of 1917. Premier Ven-
izelos gave an indication of this
in repeatedly referring to "the
revolution" in his address to par-
liament.

While it has been a peaceful,
and largely a bloodless, revolution
yet to the Greeks, it has revolu-
tionized their political system al-
most as much as the Russian up-
heaval has affected the Russians.

The abdication of King Con-
stantine and the Crown Prince on
an ultimatum of the protecting
powers, France, England and Rus-
sia, backed by a military and va-
lual demonstration; the setting up
of a new king and the recall of
Venizelos to direct the central gov-
ernment at Saloniki the complete
reversal of policy toward the Eu-
ropean war by Greece joining the
Entente allies; and, finally, the
complete disappearance of royal-
ist control of public affairs, and
the reestablishment of a govern-
ment based on the control of re-
sponsible cabinet ministers—
these summarize some of the out-
standing features of what is now
designated as the Greek Revolu-
tion.
