With the American Army on the Marne, July 16 .- Allied defenses are not only holding but appear to have broken the enemy's spirit. At one point late yesterday the Ameri-TOMOTTOW cans counter attacked the Flank salient established by the Germans, driving them out in short order.

The Americans in this section occupied intermediate speak in this city tomorrow evening sections to the rear of the first lines. Germans were allowin the interest of Jas. E. Ferguson, ed to come through but when they tried to cross the open fields up grade the American gunners and infantry mowed down their advance lines, the enemy breaking and retiring at many places.

> Paris, July 16 .-- official .-- The battle continues violently, especially south of the Marne and in the region of Chatillon. Americans and French are counter attacking magnificently and taking many prisoners. South of the Marne Germans were unable to advance their lines beyond Stagnan Lachapelle, Monthodon Lizieras, the the forest of Boyquigney. The French here took a thousand prisoners.

> London, July 16.—Advices up to noon say little change has been effective by reason of offensive. Many German corpses are hanging to the wires in front of the French positions. Losses with the Germans must be exceedingly

> London, July 16 .- German attacks were resumed early this morning. Americans recaptured the cities of Fossoy and Crezancy, on the south bank of the Marne, which were taken by Germans when they crossed the river.

> West of Rheims the enemy attacked at two places on the Marne railroad and south of Dormans. The enemy threw six bridges across the river but at no point on the twenty-five mile front did they penetrate the French lines more than four miles. The enemy suffered heavy losses in

> Paris, July 16 .-- The Germans have in positions for the present offensive sixty or seventy divisions. Having already used forty divisions this would indicate a potential force of nine hundred and fifty thousand men, with five hundred and torty thousand engaged.

By Associated Press Amsterdam, July 16 .- Baron Burian, Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister, says Wilson's four principals named in his July 4th speech do not arouse our opposition. The allies demands urging active co-operation in getting regarding territory, he says, appear insurmountable.

The juices are also for seasoning in general | cooking and for making beverages. Sugar-beet clubs have been organized, among the boys and girls in many localities, and instructions are to be given in the making and use of home made sugar-beet sirup.


