

"MY TURN"

WHILE ENJOYING a juicy watermelon over the Fourth of July holiday, my adult children reminded me that when they were small, I used to tell them not to swallow the seeds or they would sprout in their tummies and the vines would grow out their ears.

What atrocious things we tell our children! Most of these were handed down to us from our mothers and grandmothers who used colorful metaphors to encourage children to behave correctly. I guess that was before "getting grounded" was invented.

For instance, do you remember being told that "Children should be seen but not heard" ... "You'd lose your head if it wasn't tied on" ... "You can't fool me; I've got eyes in the back of my head" ... "The Old Buggerman will get you if you don't watch out" ... "You know just about enough to be dangerous" ... "I've talked to you about that until I'm blue in the face" ... "If you had a brain, you'd take it out and play with it."

It's a wonder any of us ever grew up with the ability to think for ourselves, or had an ounce of creativity left by the time we reached voting age. Who were the free-thinking individuals who came up with such indispensable items as the ball-point pen, the zipper, the flushing toilet, scotch tape, the safety pin, the screwdriver and the toothpick, all the while his or her mother was saying, "If you don't quit wasting time with such foolishness as that, you'll never amount to a hill of beans."

Mothers of the pre-1950 vintage were really good at the ultimate guilt trip with such all-time favorites as: "You're not the only pebble on the beach" ... "Pretty is as pretty does" ... "Your time will come" ... "You embarrassed me so much, I just wanted to sneak" ... "When I talk to you it just goes in one ear, and out the other" ... "You'd try the patience of Job" ... "Don't pout or you'll trip over your bottom lip" ... "You're squirming around like a worm in hot ashes" (this was usually issued in a loud whisper during church service) and then "What will the neighbors think?"

We were also in jeopardy of growing up to look like freaks because we were told: "Keep a stiff upper lip" ... "Don't bite your nails or you'll get fat" ... "Drinking coffee will stunt your growth" ... "Your eyes are bigger than your stomach" ... "Don't cut off your nose to spite your face" ... "Little pitchers have big ears" ... all followed up with "Don't look like that or your face will freeze that way."

There were several expressions reserved for young girls when they began to express an interest in boys: "Boys don't make passes at girls who wear glasses" ... "I wouldn't trust him any farther than I could throw a horse" ... "You're known by the company you keep" ... "Going steady is like putting all your eggs in one basket" ... "I'll tell you that when you're older." Here's a really old one about a girl planning to marry a fellow whose last name started with the same letter as hers ... "Change the name and not the letter, change for worse and not the better."

Many of the old expressions centered around table manners and eating correctly: "You eat like a horse. Chew with your mouth closed" ... "Don't make a pig of yourself." Many of us today blame our dieting-gorging habits on such conflicting suggestions as: "Always leave a little on your plate for 'Mr. Manners'; he'll be along later" and "Eat everything on your plate; there are starving children in China."

Then, after we found out about Santa Claus, the Easter Bunny and the Tooth Fairy, we didn't for a minute believe Mom when she said, "This is going to hurt me worse than it does you."

Area Farmland Gets Good July Moisture

The Friona area received yet another good summer rain on Thursday, when a fast-moving front dumped 1.5 inches on the area.

There was some flooding associated with the Thursday rain, as it was accompanied by a high north wind that ushered in the cold front.

The official temperature in Friona dropped from its high of 83

degrees to 59 degrees--24 degrees--in a 20-minute period between 4 and 5 p.m. Thursday.

Downtown streets, particularly Highway 60, were flooded, and for the second time within a month, Frio Draw was flowing at a good pace past the bridge across Highway 60, and this time also reached east of the overpass on Highway 214.

Most of Thursday's rain fell

between 4:30 and 5:30 p.m., when 1.24 inches were measured. Thursday's measurement of 1.5 made the fourth time this year the city has received in excess of an inch of rain in a 24-hour period.

Previously, 2.81 inches were received on May 31; 1.78 inches on June 27, and 1.33 inches on June 14.

Earlier in the week, a shower left .10 inch on July 6, and with the .05 on July 1, the month's total now stands at 1.65 inches.

The "growing season" total rainfall (April through July) now stands at 12.70 inches, and the total for the calendar year has increased to 13.43 inches.

Farmers are encouraged, due to the fact that sometimes the month of July is not just for producing much in the way of rain.

The National Weather Service was predicting more rainfall for Friday, with more possible flooding, as the same system was enveloping the Panhandle-Plains area. **UPDATE--An additional .09 inch of rain fell in Friona as of noon Friday.**

Echols Moving To Levelland

Rev. Archie Echols, who has served as pastor of Friona's First United Methodist Church for the past eight years, will be leaving on September 1 to assume the pastorate of the First United Methodist Church of Levelland.

"I am excited about going to Levelland, but I definitely am not excited about leaving Friona. The church and community has loved us and supported us in all we've done. It has been a good 'marriage,'" Echols said.

The late appointment came about after the customary church appointments by the Methodist organization, due to the retirement of a pastor in Midland, which caused a number of area Methodist ministers to face a move after it appeared they would not.

Among the area ministers who will be moving is Rev. Bobby McMillan, a former local pastor who has been with an Amarillo church. Rev. McMillan will become district superintendent at Big Spring.

Echols was named Friona's "Man of the Year" in 1987. He has also served as chairman of the Friona United Way campaign, served as a speaker for banquets and graduation, served as a Little League baseball and Little Dribblers coach, and helped with the summer track program.

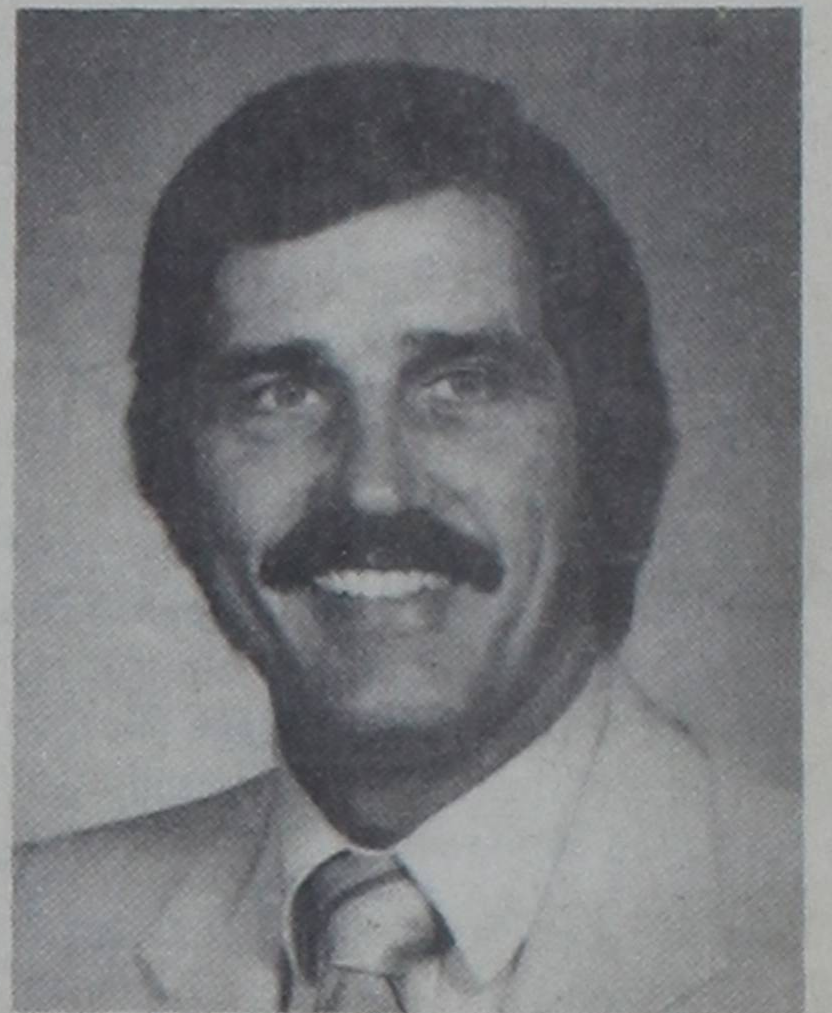
He has been a member of the Community Choir, served as president of the Noon Lions Club, and worked as a Camp New Dawn director for six years.

He has been active in the Friona Ministerial Alliance, and has by far the longest tenure among active local pastors.

Earlier this year, Echols received a certificate of merit from the Texas United Methodist College Association at a banquet in Dallas.

He has served on the board of directors of the Methodist Children's Home of Waco, and on the board of King's Manor Nursing Home in Hereford.

He presently serves as a member of the board of ordained ministry,

which counsels new pastors coming into the ministry, for the Northwest Texas Conference.

Echols is presently serving as district coordinator for the Amarillo District Council on Ministries for Young Adults.

Echols' wife, Donna, has likewise been active in local activities. She has been active in school-related organizations such as Chieftain Parents and served as a class sponsor and a substitute teacher.

She has worked as a secretary at Prairie Acres Nursing Home for the past three years, and previously worked at the local Farm Bureau office.

Donna taught studies for the local United Methodist Women, and made several trips to the Northeast where she attended workshops on church-related issues. She was involved in the National Women's Political caucus, and did some lectures on the gambling issue.

The Echols' son, Daniel, won a full football scholarship at Southern Methodist University after setting new school records as a quarterback advancing the football, an outstanding career at FHS.

Their daughter, Michelle, will be a junior this fall, and had been selected as a drum major prior to the end of the school year.

The Bronco League all-stars will be involved in a district

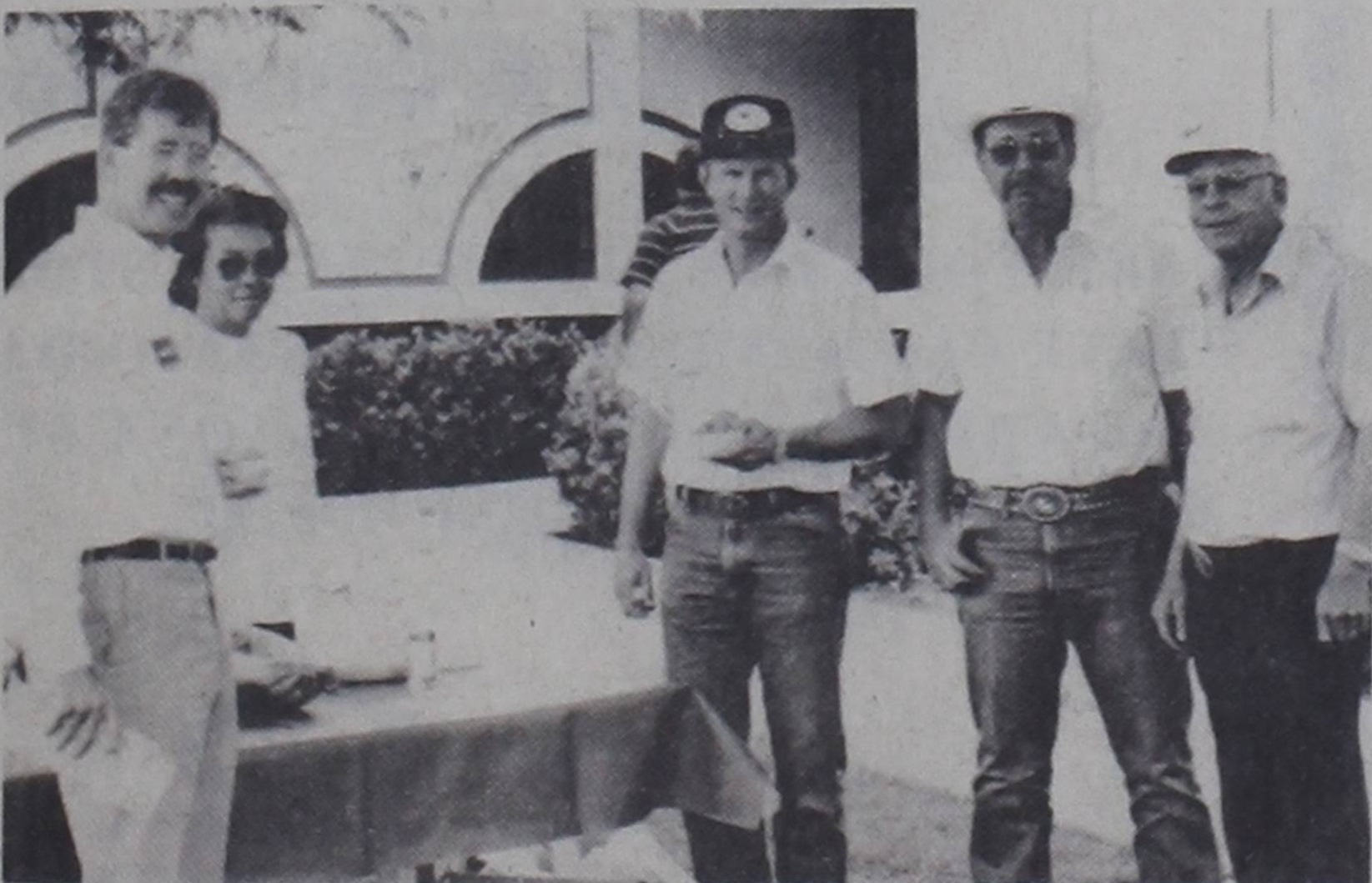
tournament next week in Bovina, and are scheduled to play Bovina on Monday.

MONTH OF JUNE 1988
The Friona Police Department received 268 calls during the month of June.

Thirty-three vacation watches were requested; 87 security checks were made.

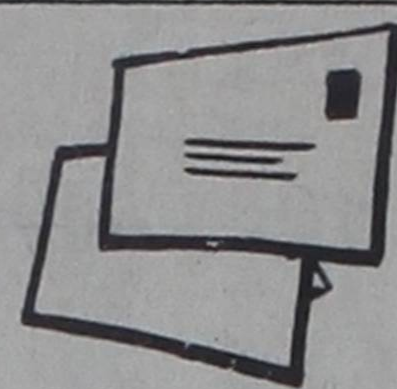
Three Make Honor List At TA&M

Two students from Friona have been named to the Dean's Honor Roll, and one to the President's Honor Roll for the 1988 spring semester at Texas A&M University.

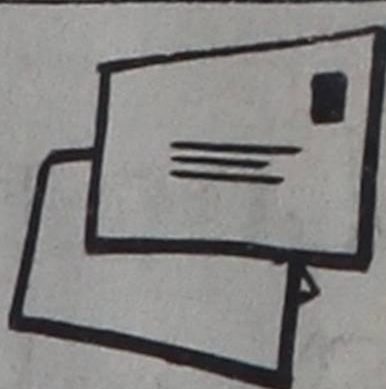

Letter To The Editor



To My Fellow Ex-Students Of West Texas State University, Wherever You Roam:

Our University is in crisis...that is no longer debatable, but its Board of Regents continue to refuse to recognize the problem, or to take any steps to alleviate it. The regents have ignored the urgent protests of the faculty, and of the student body, and have rejected the unanimous verdict of its own "select committee" of independent investigators; and may also ignore our individual protests as ex-students of WT, but there are a lot of us out here in the tri-state region and we need to let our voices be heard.

Those of us who feel that we owe something to WT for our education (and there must be thousands of us) need to stand up now and be counted. WT has given us a lot over the years...now we have an opportunity to do something for WT, by demanding that the Regents take action now, without further delay, while there may still be time.

The removal of Dr. Ed Roach, and his Administration, may not resolve all the problems that plague our troubled campus, but it seems obvious by now that other problems cannot even be approached until this stumbling block is removed. In the words of the Select Committee, "only with the restoration of free inquiry, free expression, and time-honored procedures that guarantee reasoned debate throughout the academic community can West Texas State University heal its animosities and return to its mission of preparing students to become productive and informed citizens of the republic."

The committee, remember, was basing its conclusions on 145 detailed interviews with faculty, students and representatives of the Administration...and these independent and un-biased educators were convinced by the preponderance of evidence, beyond reasonable doubt. The regents, who were unable, or unwilling, to hear the evidence

themselves, have rejected it out of hand; but we, as concerned ex-students, who have been unable (but surely not unwilling) to hear the evidence should now be willing to accept it in good faith, and it is not unreasonable for us to demand that the regents do likewise.

If you love our alma mater for its past, and care about its future, give it your support now when it needs it most. Let us join by lending our names to the cause, and our money as we are able, and create a real Buffalo Stampede of such magnitude that it cannot be easily ignored.

Carmichael Rites Held In Hereford

Troys Carmichael, 76, a pioneer farmer and agribusiness leader in Hereford and Deaf Smith County, died Saturday morning at his home

in Hereford, following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services were held at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday in First Baptist Church officiated by Dr. Ron Cook of the church and Doug Manning. Burial was in West Park Cemetery under the direction of Gililand-Watson Funeral Home.

Carmichael had been suffering from ALS-Lou Gehrig's Disease and had been under a doctor's care for some time.

A retired farmer, realtor and agribusiness leader, Carmichael was born July 10, 1911 in Delhi, Ohio. He moved to Deaf Smith County with his family in 1924, settling in the Wyche Community where his parents, D.R. and Ida, had bought a farm. While living in the Indian Territory, Carmichael's father dug water wells by hand for Quanah Parker, the famed Indian chief.

Carmichael married Ruby Thompson on August 1, 1937 in Hereford. She and her sister, Margaret Schroeter, are daughters of another pioneer family, Alex and Audrey Thompson.

He was a member of Rotary and the First Baptist Church. Carmichael served on the Hereford City Commission from 1969 to 1971.

Conservation Reserve sign-up: the next sign-up will begin on July 18 and run through August 5. Haying or grazing of CRP has not been approved.

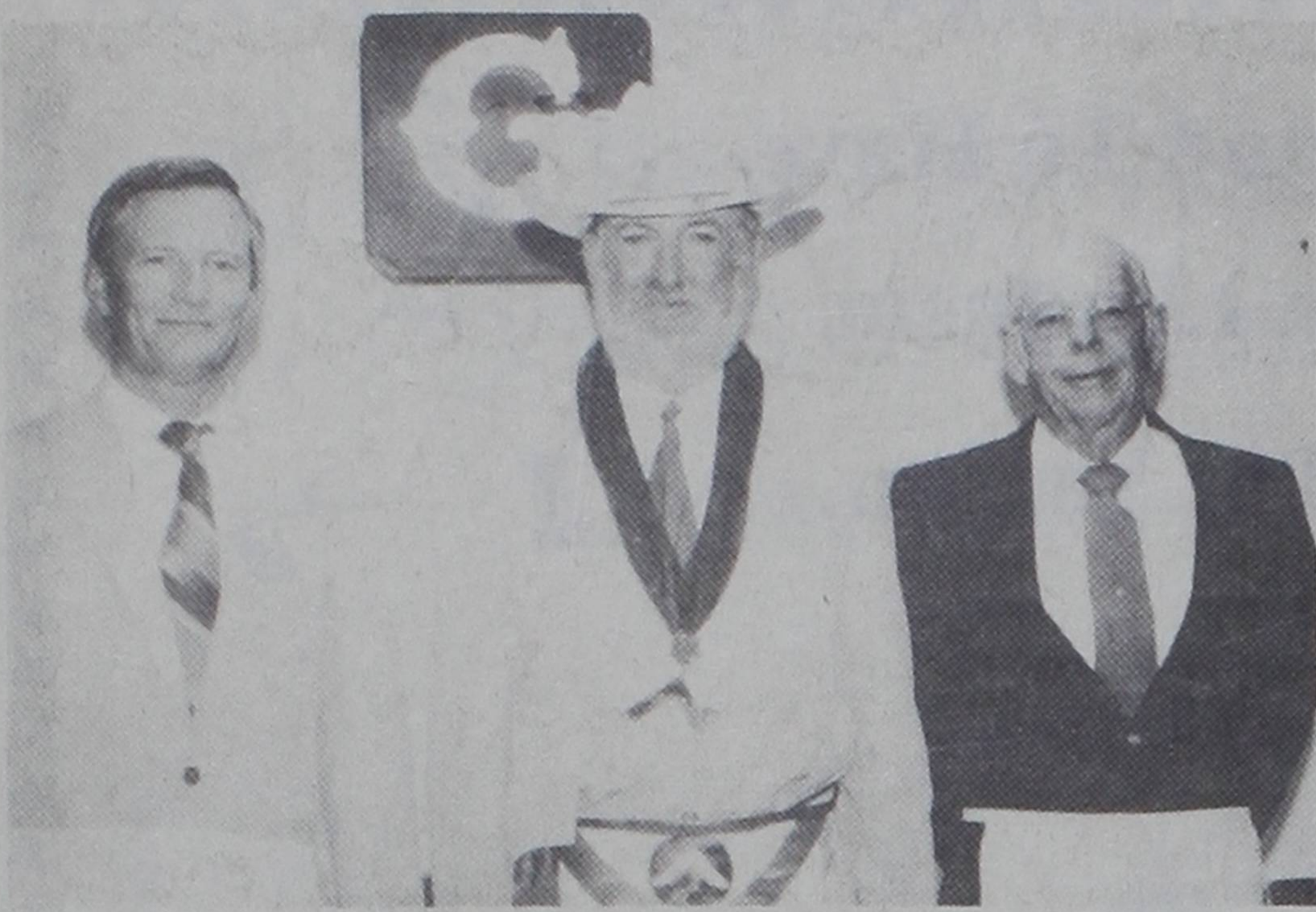
