SUNDAY DINNER at the Ellis house must wait each week until after Bob Phillips' "Texas Country Reporter" program at 12:30 on KVII-TV (Channel 7).

It is patterned after the popular Charles Curral show, "On The Road." Of course, sometimes the Texas version gets shifted around to accommodate whichever sporting event is scheduled to appear immediately following. So you will occasionally find it on Sunday morning at 11:30 a.m. instead of 12:30. You might want to set your VCR before you leave for church. We have a tape on which we have recorded several segments of this interesting program.

If you are proud of your state and the hometown folks which make Texas great, then you will enjoy traveling the backroads as Bob Phillips shows you around and introduces you to the most interesting people.

With Phillips as our guide and Larry Ellis doing the breathtakingly beautiful photography work, we have visited with the cowboys on the 6666 Ranch, with a teacher and students of the Alamoore one-room school house, and watched the horse and buggy competition at McKinney.

Otho Stubbs is a working cowboy at Turkey and also a renowned Western artist. According to Bob Phillips, Otho is a "walking encyclopedia of Panhandle history."

We have visited the beautiful ranch home of popular cowboy cartoonist Ace Reid. We met the 80-year-old mayor of Pittsburgh, Texas who has single-handedly built several of the fire engines used by their volunteer fire department.

There is a flock of about 35 bald eagles who come down from Canada and winter at Lake Buchanan, Texas each year. A group of volunteers brave the chilly weather to watch, count and keep tabs on the birds each winter. The flock, which was once endangered, has been on the increase in the past few years.

The first female member of Congress in Texas was Lara Thomas, now age 86, living in Nacogdoches, Texas. She has taken on the task of preserving many of the old homes and other buildings of that area which were scheduled for demolition. Many are 150 years old, as Nacogdoches calls itself the oldest city in Texas.

The result is her own little village called "Millard's Crossing," consisting of a general store, barber shop, fire station, church, school house, a couple of log cabins and about five lovely old victorian homes. All have been restored and filled with antiques befitting their period of time. Mrs. Thomas says, "It's not a museum, but a collection of memories."

We were so impressed with the "Millard's Crossing" segment of the "Texas Country Reporter" show, that we made a point of traveling through Nacogdoches on our way to vacation in New Orleans earlier this summer. We discovered that there have been several weddings held in the little church with receptions following in the stage coach house. Also family reunions have been scheduled there with people attending from all around the U.S.

Due to the size of the district, which stretches from the top of the Texas Panhandle to Hockley County on the south, the candidates' paths hardly ever cross. But they did on Thursday.

Both candidates attended the press open house for Merrick Pet Foods in Hereford, and used the occasion to swing by Friona for campaign stops.

Phillips feels that the naming of Lloyd Bentsen, his uncle-by-marriage, to the national Democratic ticket, will be a big shot in the arm for himself and the area.

"If the Democrats win, we should be able to do some economic development in our area. There is always a 'honeymoon period' after a new administration

goes in, when you can accomplish some things..."

Phillips urged local leaders to discuss possible programs they would like to see implemented. "I feel that I will be in a unique position to secure some financial aid for our area, whether I'm working with Vice President Bentsen or Senator Bentsen," he said.

The candidate said that the area needs to look closely at ways of hanging onto the processing dollars from local products. "We can't continue to buy our things at retail and sell our products at wholesale," he said.

Bivins likewise referred to Lloyd Bentsen's choice as vice-presidential candidate. "I think that linking Bentsen with the liberal presidential candidate (Dukakis) probably helped my campaign as much as anything," Bivins said.

Bivins cited the state's workmen's compensation set-up, pointing out that Texas ranks in the top ten states in the cost for workmen's compensation premiums, yet is in the bottom ten per cent for the value of benefits paid to employees.

or, it's going to cost our state when it comes to attempting to lure new industry," Bivins said.

Bivins said he would work toward the consolidation of state agencies if he were elected. "We have 240 different state agencies. The national average is 100 state employees per 100,000 population, and in Texas, this figure is 120 state employees," the candidate said.

"When I watched the recent debacle regarding tax reform, I decided we hadn't begun to trim the state budget.

"I'm not interested in running for a higher office, but I feel that the Texas senate would allow me to maintain a family life," Bivins stated.

HOLLY SUGAR FIRE

Friona Firemen Respond To Call

An A-frame pulp warehouse was destroyed Monday evening in a fire at Holly Sugar west of Hereford.

The value of the 60,000-square-foot warehouse could not be determined, said plant manager Dennis Printz, who also said the fire should not affect the upcoming sugarbeet harvest. "We may have to find a place to store some of our pulp for a while, but it shouldn't hurt our harvest operations at all," Printz said.

An unidentified Holly worker said that a crew had been cleaning inside the warehouse, but had left about 6 p.m. The fire was reported at 6:20 p.m.

By 7:30 p.m., the warehouse was destroyed. The only evidence of the wood and metal building was twisted metal leading from conveyors and catwalks to where the warehouse, one of three similar buildings, had been standing.

The Hereford Fire Department used all 42 available men and most of its equipment at the fire, leaving only enough at the station to cover in case of another fire or other emergency. The department also called in additional manpower and equipment from Walcott, Canyon, Dimmitt and Friona. Eighty firefighters and nineteen units responded to the fire.

Canyon brought a snorkel unit used late Monday. The fire was extinguished at about 10:30 p.m., four hours after it was reported.

Holly Sugar Road, Bradley Street, and South Greenwood were filled with traffic as Hereford residents drove west to see where the brown smoke, visible from all over the city, was coming from. Many of them parked their cars along Holly Sugar Road, north of the plant, and watched as the building seemed to melt as it was consumed by the fire.

Some didn't stay too long. "Boy, that stuff smells terrible," one fire-watcher said before getting back into her car and leaving, unable to take the smell of the smoke any longer. Just before the warehouse was consumed, the smoke's color changed from brown to gray-black. All the while, the building seemed to melt as the metal roof slowly fell into the building.

Despite the falling metal, there were no injuries reported.

Printz said the warehouse was empty. "It usually is empty this time of the year," he said. The building is used to store pulp, a by-

product, from sugarbeets as they are processed following harvest. The harvest season usually runs from October through January, and that's when the warehouses are full.

Much of the pulp is used for cattle feed.

Friona's Fire Department responded to the call with nine men and two trucks.

Another Hot, Dry Week Here

It has been another hot, dry week in the Friona area, although the high temperature reached the 90-degree mark only one day.

With high temperatures daily in the high 80s range, residents could feel spared, in light of the heat wave in parts of the country where maximum temperatures topped the 100-degree mark.

The temperature has yet to reach the 100-degree mark for 1988 in Friona, with the high point for the summer being 97 degrees.

Only a trace of moisture was noted in the city, that being on Wednesday morning, August 3.

However, parts of the area had at least a light shower. Shirley Garrison, who farms nine miles north of Friona, said he received a quarter of an inch Tuesday night at his place.

The month of July ended with a total rainfall in Friona of 2.24 inches. So far, no measureable moisture has been logged for the month of August.

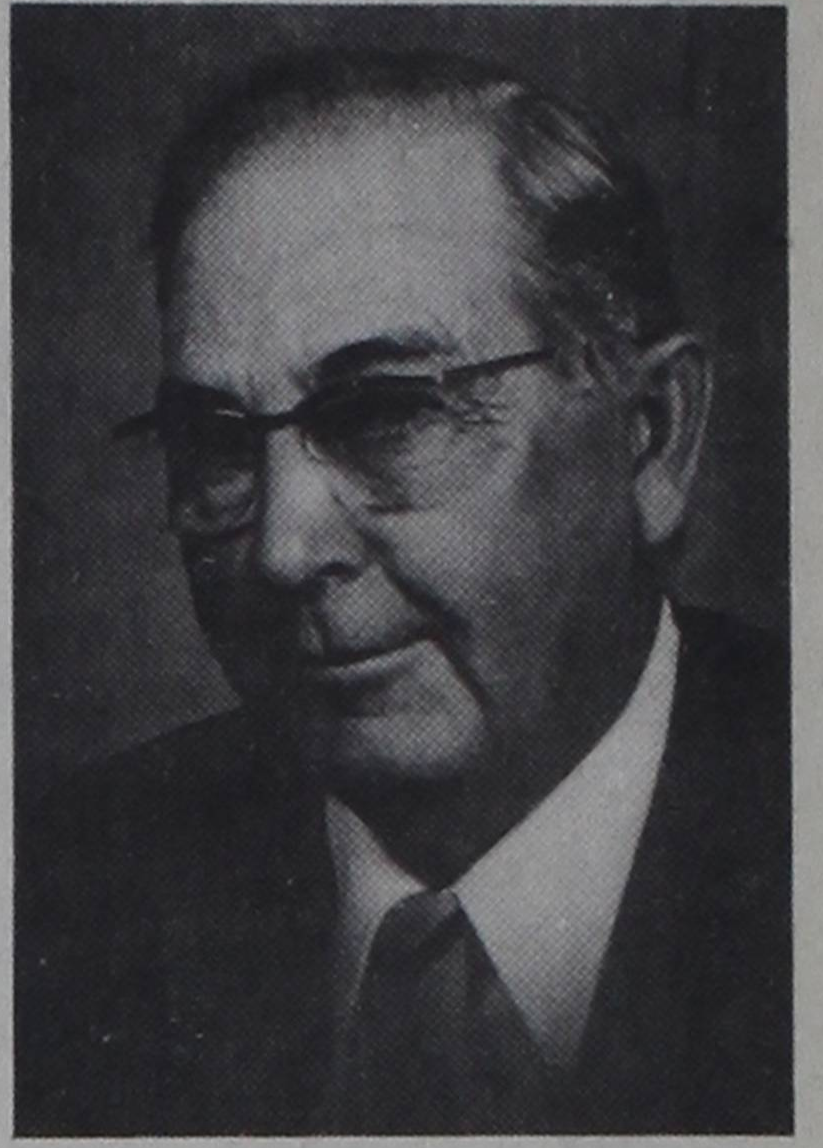

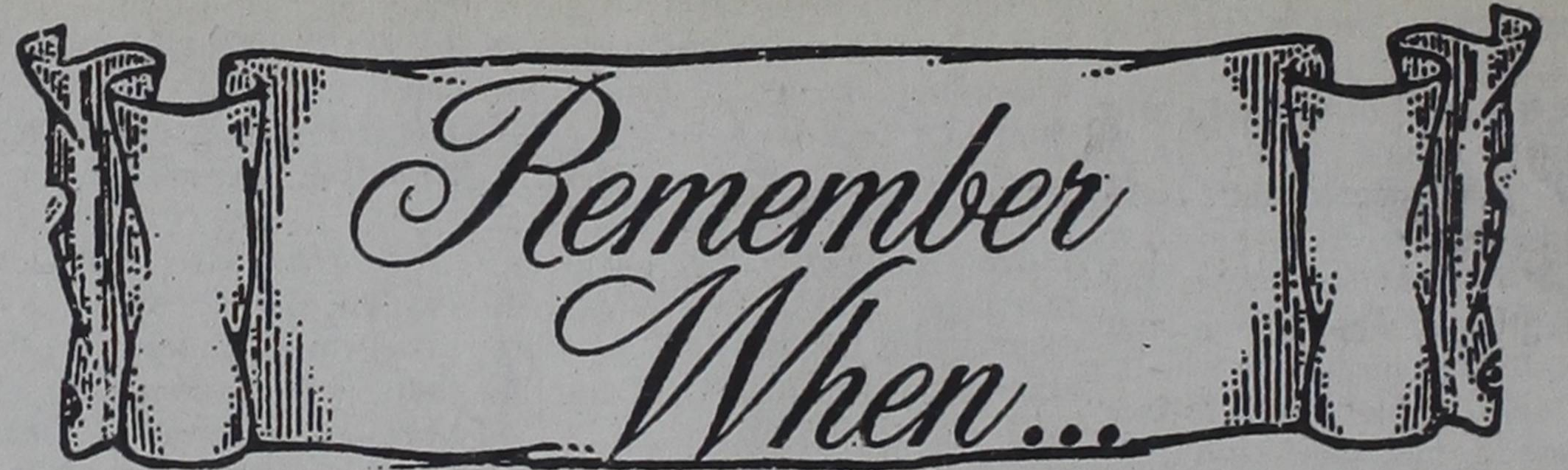

FmHA Accepting Board Nominations

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) began accepting nominations August 1 for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Weldon Rainey said this week.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer or anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Rainey said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has

been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Rainey said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for October 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Rainey said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 207 Avenue D, Farwell, Texas.
