Week's Rainfall Is Very Scattered

AS EVERYONE KNOWS, this is the computer age. It is also a new age for agriculture, according to a scientist at College Station.

Dr. Ernest E. Davis discussed this week the current era of agricultural biotechnology, which already is impacting the animal agriculture industry. Davis is an economist in livestock marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Davis said we've seen much of today's technology developed during our lifetimes. "Half of all the technology we know today has been developed in the last half century," he said.

"But hang on, because present estimates show that during the next two decades, technological change—mostly biotechnology—will take place 500 times faster than during the past 20 years," Davis said.

Davis said a U.S. Government Accounting Office report has defined biotech as "any technique that uses living organisms to make or modify products, to improve plants or animals or to develop microorganisms for specific uses."

"This could help to provide for mankind's most basic needs, ranging from food supplies to biomedical needs and health care," Davis said.

Davis said that biotech certainly is not new to the cattle business.

"Artificial insemination came along in the 1930s and frozen semen made its debut in 1951. Embryo transfer work began in 1953, frozen embryos followed in 1971, and microsurgical embryo splitting began in 1982," Davis said.

"But this is just the beginning. In the future, more will be achieved through genetic engineering by developing vaccines to prevent disease or designing cattle to fit specific needs or consumer demands," Davis predicted.

He said that from new biotechnologies, cattlemen can expect improved calving and survival rates, higher lean-yielding cattle with lower cholesterol levels, improved beef quality, better feed conversions and generally higher protein grasses.

"Biotech advances will enable cattlemen to tailor a product more in keeping with consumer desires, increase productivity, and lower production costs." He said this increased productivity means more beef production per cow. This ultimately may mean fewer, more technology intensive cattlemen.

Davis said that higher productivity and relatively lower costs of such competing meats as poultry and pork will force cattlemen to make investments in biotechnology.

He said that increases in consumer demand for beef must keep pace with increases in beef productivity.

"Otherwise, continued liquidation of the cow herd will be required for beef supplies and demand to equate at profitable levels," he said.

He said that with biotech's potential to produce cattle with certain desired traits and the concentrating packer segment demands, cattlemen will be pressured to develop cattle conforming to these packer specifications.

"If cattlemen do not invest in biotech advances, packers or private firms will, and they will own the new genetics. When developed, the genetically improved cattle likely will be expensive for traditional cattlemen to buy. They may only be able to contract to raise and condition these select cattle," Davis said.

TEXAS TRIVIA: Coldest temperatures ever registered in Texas? Twenty-three degrees below zero in Tullia in 1899 and Seminole in 1933. The hottest temperature on record is 120 degrees, at Seymour August 12, 1936. Hale Center recorded 33 inches of snow on February 3, 1956, and Thrall had 36 inches of rain September 1921.

The City of Friona had to be content with small amounts of moisture during the past week, while parts of the area had spotted showers of up to an inch and a half, and Bovina was hit with a flash flood.

Friona's measurement for the week amounted to only .44 inch on three different days, any three of which looked as though a good rain might be received.

Bulk of the measurement was .33 inch Monday, followed by .08 on Tuesday and .03 inch on Wednesday.

Meanwhile, portions of the area did somewhat better.

Dee Willard said he received an inch of rain early in the week. Willard lives southeast of Friona.

The Rhea area received from an inch to upwards of two inches. It was reported that Jerry Cass had measured 1.5 inches at his place, and Roy Miller said that was about the same measurement he received, just northwest of town.

In an unusual situation Tuesday evening, the city of Bovina received from 3.5 to five inches of rainfall in a 40-minute cloudburst.

That rain caused some damage to stores in Bovina, due to flat roofs. Highway 60 had water running across it for several hours due to the cloudburst.

It was the second bout of unusual weather for Bovina in a three-day period. On Sunday evening, tornadic winds broke out windows, and wrapped a

trampoline around a power pole.

The crops in the area could use a good rain, as the rainfall in the past three weeks has been very light.

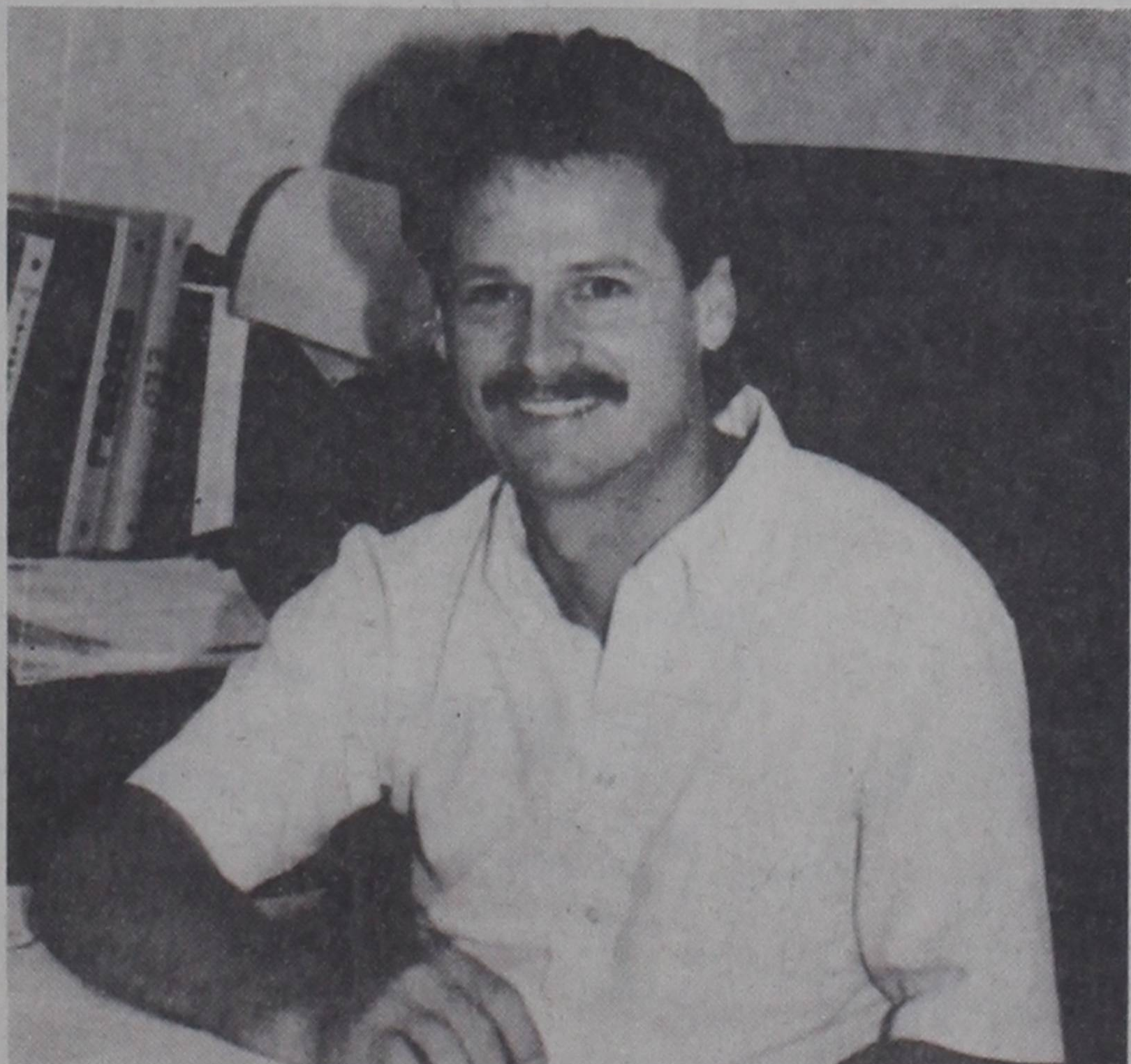
Plans are underway for the 1988 Miss Friona Pageant.

New Principal Is Anxious To Begin

Although the students, and even the parents for that matter, may not be ready to think about a new school term which will start on September 1, there is one person who seems anxious for the first bell to ring.

That is Cliff Stephens, the new principal at Friona High School.

"I have met a lot of the kids this summer, and this week I've been able to meet most of the football players, and I am excited about being able to work with the young people in Friona," Stephens says.

"I think you have a great bunch of young people in Friona. Several of the kids who won scholarships have been in my office, and I can tell that you have some super-intelligent youngsters," says the new principal.

Stephens hails from Lamesa on the South Plains, and has spent the past six years with the Midland Greenwood school system, first as a teacher and coach, and the last four years as principal.

One year at Greenwood, he served both as principal and as girls' basketball coach, and termed that experience one he would just as soon not attempt again.

Prior to going to the Midland school, Stephens taught and coached at Sudan, so he's well acquainted with this area.

"I had heard for a number of years about what a good school system you had in Friona, so when the opportunity came up, I was really excited," says Stephens, who was chosen from a field of 30 candidates last spring for the principal's position.

Stephens says one of the new wrinkles he has installed on the new school schedule is the "advisory class" (or home room period).

"Our biggest hope for this 30-

minute period is to improve on the tutorials being offered. Those failing a major course will be required to take tutorial," Stephens says.

Previously, those taking tutorial classes had to do so before or after school, with the result that very few students took advantage of them.

By placing the extra period in the middle of the daily schedule, the excuses for missing the tutorial sessions will be gone, Stephens believes.

In addition, the period can be used for other things such as pep rallies, which also previously had to have special schedules.

"By having our pep rallies at 12:30, we are hopeful that the townspeople will be able to join us whenever possible. I think this would excite the kids to see the parents taking part," the new principal said.

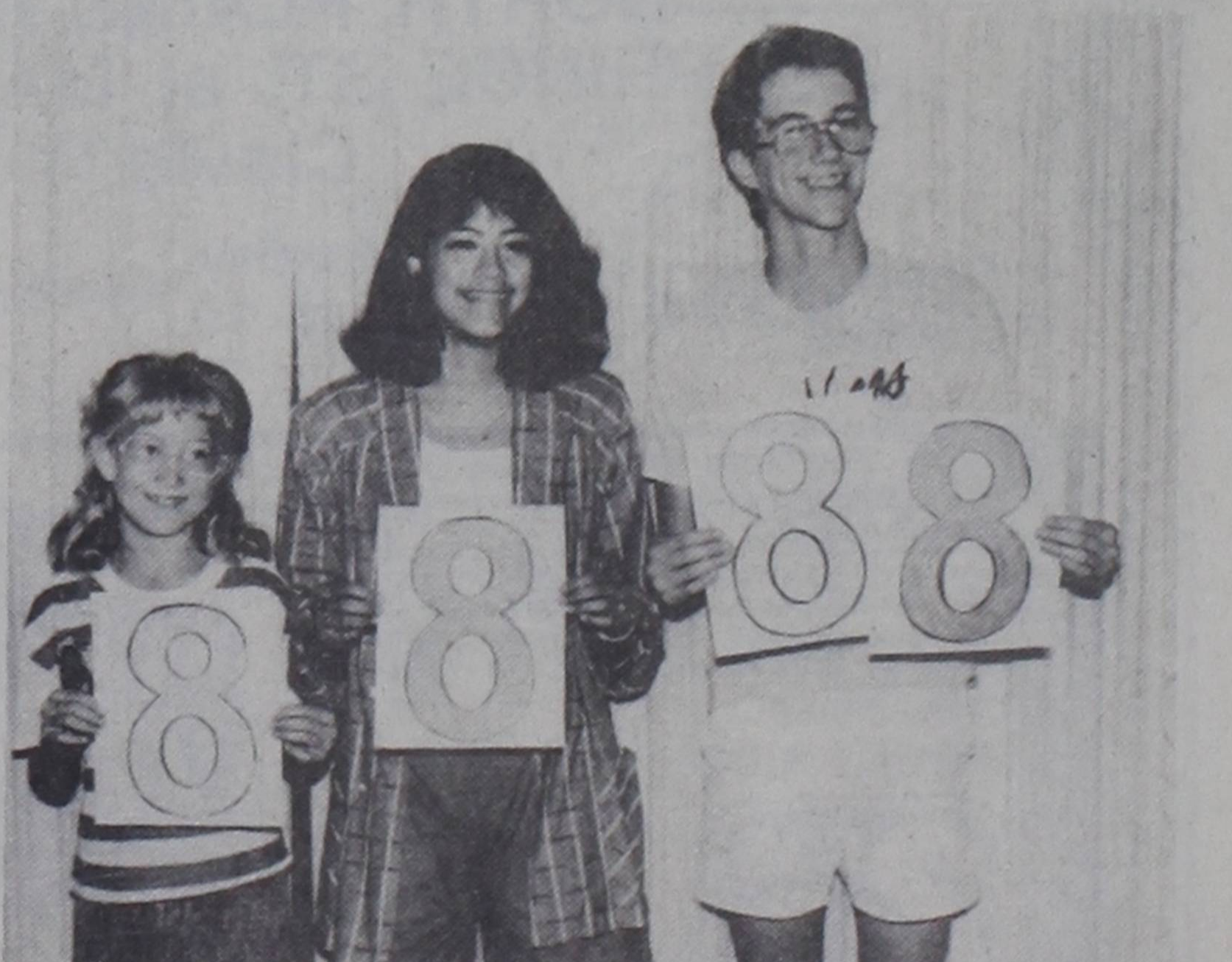
Stephens said that the length of the regular class periods will be trimmed from 55 minutes to 50 minutes to accommodate the advisory class, without having to add time to the school day.

"We have always liked the people in this part of the country, so coming to Friona is sort of like coming home," said Stephens with a friendly smile.

"I have visited with our new high school staff members, as well as the ones returning, and I feel we will have an exceptional staff," the new Friona school administrator said.

Stephens is a graduate of McMurry College at Abilene, where he played basketball.

His wife, Tana, is an elementary teacher. Their children are Christy, 10, who will be in fifth grade, and Brandon, eight, who will be in the third grade.

A work session was conducted for the 1988-89 school budget. A public hearing on the budget will be held at Friona High School Cafeteria on August 18 at 7:30 p.m.

Chieftains Complete Week Of Workouts

Football workouts began for the Friona Chieftains this week, as coach Tommy Moss may be looking for a "rebuilding" year for the Chiefs, who have been in the district playoff chase virtually every year under Moss' guidance.

A total of 74 high school prospects had reported for workouts as of Thursday, with an average of 65 taking part in the 5 p.m. workouts. Moss said he expected another eight or nine freshmen after school starts, and perhaps a few other upper classmen in case of move-ins.

"I think we're probably as strong at each position as we have been in the last few years--especially at running back," Moss said as the team neared its first week of working out in shorts.

Moss welcomed junior running back Andre Duran--out most of the 1987 season with a knee injury, to go with returners Ben Osborn and Cody Bracken.

While the biggest loss for the team may have been at quarterback, where the graduated Daniel Echols set school records in the rushing department, Moss feels he has more than adequate prospect in senior Cody Burney.

"Burney can really throw the ball. And with the likes of Duran, Jeff Stowers and Chuck Sutter, he should have some receivers who can catch it," Moss said.

Also back off the injured list is big senior lineman Louis Dunnam, who like Duran was injured in the costly win at Portales last year. "I think he's ready to have a great year," Moss said.

Also back is 6-1, 294-pound senior lineman Loren Lookingbill and 6-3, 195-pound middle-linebacker and guard Paul Trimmell. Dempsey Jordan, another senior who saw a lot of action due to injuries last year, also returns.

David Bugg, who was another starter at linebacker last year, is expected to join the team later this week.

With 15 lettermen and six players on defense who saw considerable action, Moss feels that the team's defense should be in pretty good shape "if we can avoid injuries."

Moss said that the secondary on defense would have some spots to fill due to graduation, but there again was looking to Burney to plug one hole. "Burney played some in Echols' place last year. We could be a little bigger in the secondary this year," Moss said.

Due to his original scrimmage

opponents cancelling out, Moss said he didn't make an effort to replace the scrimmage foes.

"We don't have the depth on the varsity that we've had in recent years, so we're thinking about just scrimmaging ourselves and letting it go at that. We may even give the boys a day off next Friday, which was to have been the first scrimmage," Moss said.

The Chiefs play a pretty tough schedule in 1988, with non-conference foes Brownfield, River Road, Hart, Dalhart and Canyon, to go along with the usual tough district opponents, Littlefield, Tulia, Floydada, Dimmitt and Muleshoe.

Teel Bivins Met With Pres. Reagan

There are several areas in which Texas can be tougher in its fight against drugs, according to Teel Bivins, 31st district State Senate candidate. He said the need is definitely there. "People in the Panhandle are not only worried about their children, but also about their communities."

Bivins was in Washington recently, meeting with President Reagan and top White House advisors about the nation's anti-drug effort. At a Tuesday morning news conference, Bivins said he was invited to Washington, D.C., along with 70 other Republican candidates from around the country. The President said those 70 were selected from the 5000 contested races in the country, because they represented "the best hopes the Republicans have for the future."

All the candidates were briefed on efforts to stop drug use in the

United States, and were asked to help in the anti-drug effort in their own regions.

At the Tuesday news conference, Bivins said the Texas Panhandle and South Plains received more than \$730,000 in federal funds, for anti-drug task forces. Pending legislation would increase those funds.

Bivins proposed several measures which, if passed by the Texas Legislature, would elevate the state war on drugs. "One...is a proposal to stiffen the penalty for those who are caught in possession of guns, along with drugs. As in the federal courts, they'd get an extra five years tacked onto their sentence."

The Amarillo cattleman also proposed strengthening the asset forfeiture law, a zero-tolerance of drugs in schools, and strengthening of narcotic laws for crack possession.

Beef 'n More Offers Pet Owners Improved Product

Not many a man believes in his product enough to put his name on it, but Garth Merrick does. That's why he calls his newest product Garth Merrick's Beef 'n More High Protein Beef Dinner.

And like every other project Merrick undertakes, his dog food has qualities which set it apart from all other products on the shelf.

It's hard to know where to begin talking about Merrick and his projects—all of which bears his creative approach and all of which appear to result in success.

It's probably best to go back to the beginning, when Merrick was a youngster and his father was in the beef by-products business. "Growing up, the business had no appeal to me. So at age 21, I opened a bar in Colorado. I was the youngest person in the state with a liquor license, having turned 21 just two months earlier. But in the bar business, there was an element I hadn't counted on...like having a gun drawn on me. Suddenly dead cows didn't look so bad," Merrick laughed.

With the help of his father, Merrick came to Hereford, Texas, in the late '60s and started Hereford Bi-Products with a mobile home and two trucks traveling the area picking up (for free) dead cows. Merrick's creativity first piqued the interest of locals when they began hearing him refer to himself as "Your Local Used Cow Dealer."

Now most folks might not be too happy about the prospect of having a by-products plant come to town, but once again Merrick's creative style has made his Hereford Bi-Products plant a place where Hereford residents bring visitors—to gaze at the nine llamas, two zebras with their offspring (named Thunder and Lightning), longhorns, ducks, turkeys, chickens, dogs and cats which live at peace with one another beneath the trees on the beautifully manicured grounds of the plant at Highway 60 and FM 2943.

"Ours is not exactly a desirable business," Merrick admits, "but we provide a necessary service. People associate negative things with dead cattle. But here, people associate us with those trees and the zebras and the llamas. It's a plus for us and good for the community."

Because the nature of Merrick's business is cyclical, with the heaviest workload in the winter months, Merrick's creativity has carried his company in a number of directions and kept his work force (which now numbers more than 200) employed full time. His first venture was a shade tree nursery which kept employees busy during the summer months.

Hides shipped worldwide and bone meal manufacturing make up

a hefty part of the business. Also, the company picks up fat, meat and bones trimmed at butcher shops in most grocery stores in its service area and from packing houses.

Due to the constant use of knives and other cutting tools necessary to the by-products business, on-the-job injuries and workers' compensation claims used to be an expensive problem for Merrick.

But through the implementation of an unusual safety program, workers' compensation claims were reduced by up to 75 per cent. The plan? Beef certificates. If an employee works ten consecutive weeks of a quarter without a job-related injury, he or she receives a \$50 beef certificate, purchased by the company from the Hereford Cow Belles, a women's beef promotion group.

When a customer in Oklahoma asked Merrick to produce fresh meat to feed his greyhounds, Merrick's creative juices began flowing. Within a short time, he was supplying fresh meat to greyhound farms throughout the South and Southwest.

While selling beef and beef by-products to major manufacturers of pet foods, Merrick was beginning to formulate a plan for making his own dry dog food. Located in the middle of a major wheat and corn growing area, Hereford is a prime location for producing dry dog food, which uses a blend of beef and grains.

Merrick's first dry dog food was Track-Pro(tm), which is formulated especially for greyhounds to be fed with their fresh meat. Next, he began manufacturing Beef-Pro(tm), a dry dog food sold primarily in feed and pet stores. Another product, Farm and Track(tm), is a different formulation for greyhounds and other hard-working dogs.

But Merrick's current pride is his private label, "Garth Merrick's Beef 'n More(tm)," a dry dog food with pure beef as its primary ingredient.

"It's really a unique product," Merrick said. "Beef 'n More is the only dry dog food we can find that has 25-30 per cent pure beef in it. Since dogs are meat-eaters, it's only logical they like the taste of Beef 'n More and it's really good for them."

"We cook the red meat with the grain which blends them together, making the product very digestible. Dogs eat less of it in the long run. Formulated for maximum digestibility with a

minimum residue, Beef 'n More makes both dogs and dog owners happy," Merrick explained.

Merrick's new dry dog food plant has a capacity to produce 140 tons of food a day. So in addition to producing his own brands, Merrick has co-packing agreements to produce dog and cat food for several other manufacturers.

Even while Beef 'n More is making its debut in stores in West Texas and New Mexico this month, Merrick is looking at a number of other ventures, including a dry horse feed and a fish-based catfood. "Except for the fish, we can find producers around here for almost every ingredient we need for petfoods," Merrick said.

And that seems to be a key ingredient to Merrick's creativity and to his success. Whatever the job, he wants everyone to benefit. Whether it's enhancing the beauty of his surroundings, finding a new incentive for keeping his

employees safe, or using the on-hand resources to produce a new product, Garth Merrick always has the good of everyone concerned in mind. "We've made a commitment and our customers know they can count on dependable service whether we are picking up cattle or delivering our products."

Merrick applies the same principles to his family life as well. He lives with his wife, Susie, and their four children in a rustic two-story home on the plant grounds a few yards from the office. Since Merrick's business requires his attention seven days a week, he built his home where he and his family could be close and his children could visit him throughout the day.

So as the sun sets on the llamas, another truck load of by-products rolled off the lot and the petfood plant produces another ton of Beef 'n More, this used cow dealer takes a moment to count his blessings and look forward to his next creative venture.

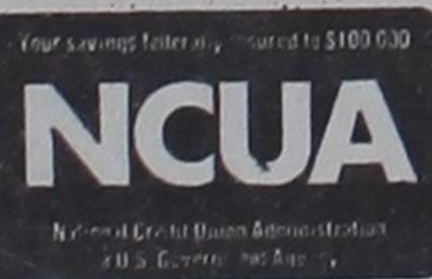

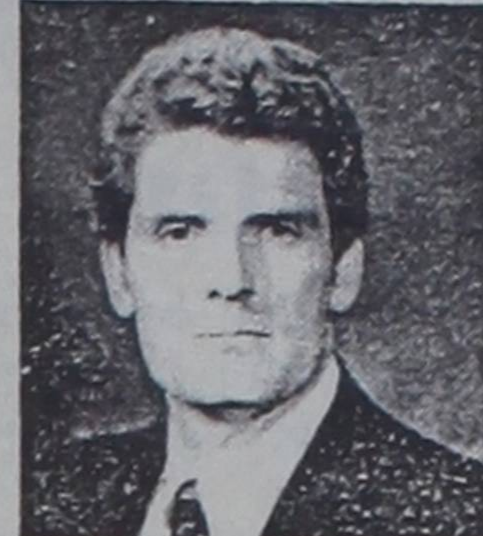

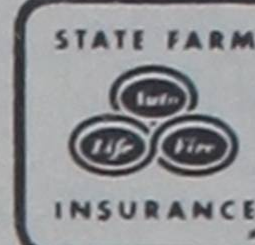

The long summer months come and with them the dry season. All growing things begin to feel the heat and show the effects of thirst. Plant life begins to wither and fade away.

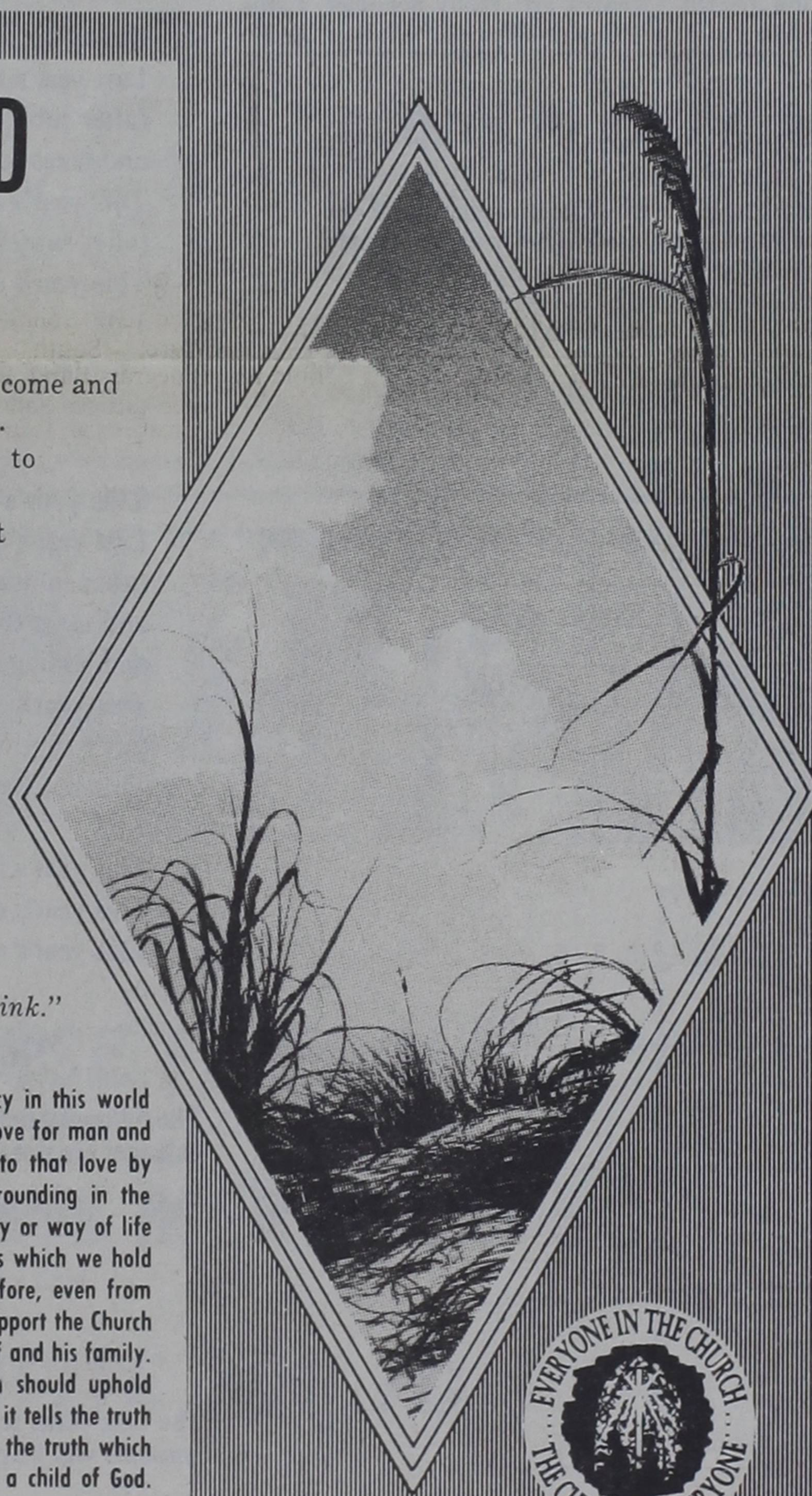

5. Keep clean and groomed.

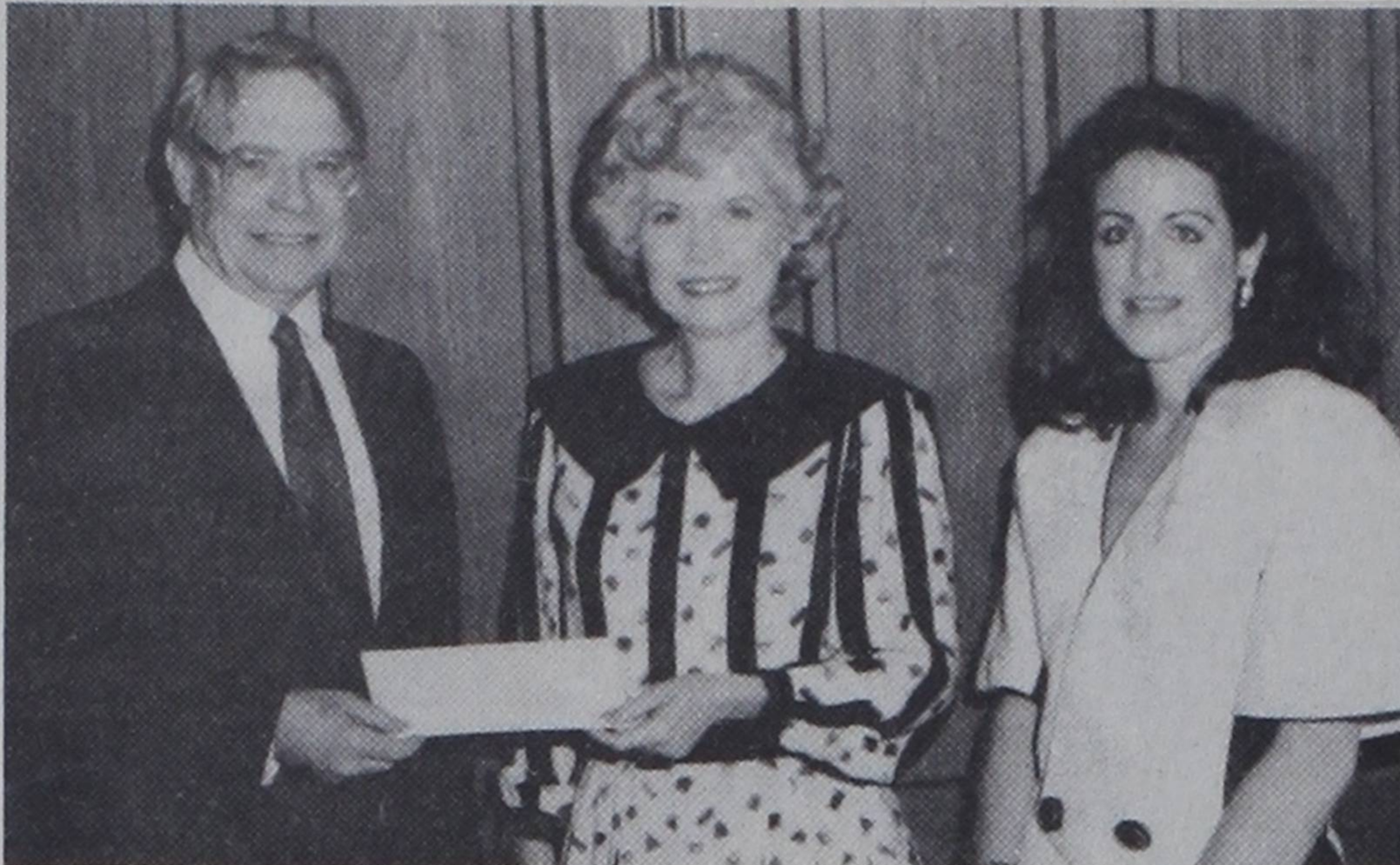
6. Use leash when traveling.

Unusual Insect Is Spotted In County

Mike D. Blanton, Extension Agent for Entomology for Farmer and Bailey counties, said this week that an unusual insect has been spotted in the area.

Blanton's statement on the insect was as follows:

In recent days, I have received several inquiries regarding an extremely large wasp found in area yards. Wasps of this group are commonly called "cicada killers" or "ground hornets." The scientific name of this species is Sphecus Speciosus. This wasp is approximately 1 1/2 inches long and is one of our largest species.

It is active during July and August. Both male and female wasps may be encountered on flowers and in nesting areas. Males exhibit territoriality and investigate all intruders vigorously. Territories may be 100 square feet

in size in the vicinity of an emergence hole. Mating occurs when a newly emerged female flies through a territory.

The burrows angle into the soil for a distance of .3 to 1.2 meters, ending in a number of branches and cells. Each branch may terminate in 2-3 loosely grouped cells. Burrow entrances are left open during provisioning and may not be closed until the job is complete.

Depending upon their size, 1-4 adult cicadas are provisioned per cell. They are usually paralyzed by a single sting in the membrane at the base of a front leg. Eggs are laid on the last cicada in a cell. As many as four females may provision a single nest simultaneously, although only one of them made the initial excavation.

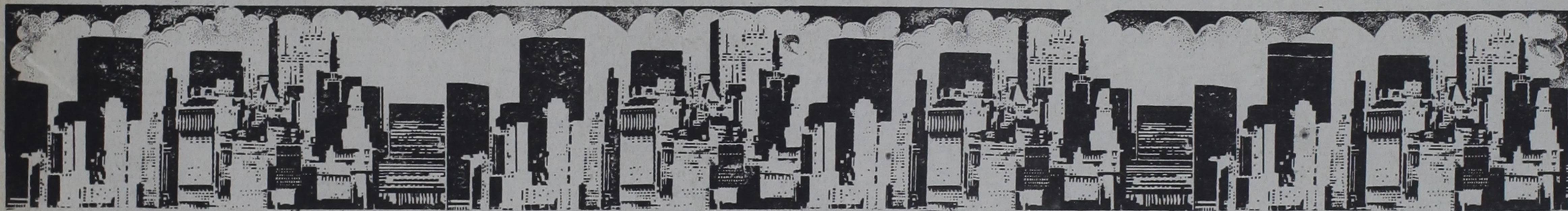

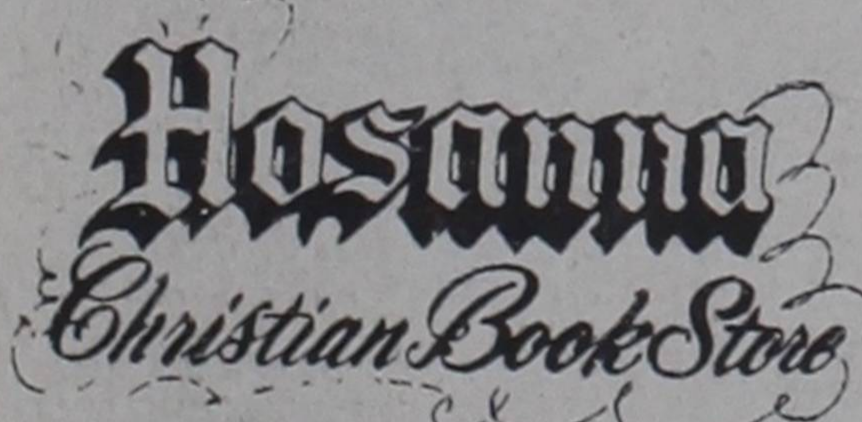


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Company Honors 19 For Safety
