NOW UP TO PRESIDENT TO PREVENT STRIKE

I. & G. N. RAILROAD TRAINMEN WILL LEAVE THEIR POSITIONS TOMORROW, SAYS DISPATCH

(By United Press.)

PALESTINE, Texas, Oct. 21.—Indications are that between seven and eight hundred trainmen on the International & Great Northern Railroad will walk out at noon Saturday in compliance with the strike call of the railroad unions.

Although union leaders here had not completed their plans today, it is apparent that practically all the trainmen are in sympathy with the strike and will quit work at the above mentioned hour. The members of the other unions, it is understood, will remain at their work until 6 o'clock, October the 30th, which hour and time they will leave the railroad unless otherwise notified to the contrary by the heads of the great unions.

MURDERING NEGROES UP IN KANSAS CITY BY THE WHOLESALE

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 21.—The murdered bodies of Mrs. M. E. Grady and Mrs. Mattie Bailey, negro women, badly mutilated with knives, were found hidden in the weeds on a suburban road near the city limits last night.

The police state that this is about the seventh case of such like within the last four weeks, and feeling is running high among the negroes.

Authorities are unable to account for the tragedies, and are trying to find a motive for the crimes.

GAME BIRDS ARE NOW REPORTED ON THEIR LONG FLIGHT SOUTH EARLIER THIS YEAR THAN USUAL

The annual flight of wild game birds Southward from their breeding grounds is on and is ahead this year of the usual time such flights start, according to the Biological Survey, United States Department of Agriculture. Many more thousands of birds are now on the wing, the department states, than have flown South for years.

All indications are that the flight will not only furnish hunters excellent sport, but that there will have to be little waiting after the open season starts. No reason is assigned by the department for the earliness of the Southern flight. Only the birds know.

The pintail and teal already are on the wing. The mallard, the canvas-back, the redhead, the widgeon, the black head and other later emigrants soon will be on their way to warmer climes. Reports from almost every section tell of the great size of the flights already under way.

MAY USE SO-CALLED PORT PLAN TO HELP RAILROAD STRIKE

AUSTIN, Texas, Oct. 21.—Although no official request has been received by the attorney general's department for opinion in respect to what the so-called Texas Open Port law will have on the strike, it is generally conceded in state house circles that the law will be used to advantage if the railroads should strikers attempt to threaten or intimidate strike breakers in event they are placed at work. Governor Neff is not inclined to discuss the question, and attorney general will not render opinion unless official request is made from state or county officials, and this request has not yet been made.

All efforts at mediation having failed, the next step is up to the president. Harding has called a meeting of the Cabinet to decide what action is to be taken.

The railroad brotherhood chiefs have arrived in Cleveland after a break in Chicago with the mediation board and immediately set about perfecting plans to make the strike a complete success, board members announced this morning.

The next move is not yet known, but in the meantime Secretary Hoover is organizing a fleet of motor trucks to move food necessities and the railroads are advertising for strike breakers.

TWO BOYS AND PENNY BOX MATCHES CAUSE BIG FIRE IN HOUSTON

HOUSTON, Texas, Oct. 21.—Jess Willard Collins, aged five and Joe Cross, aged six, explained this morning how yesterday they started a \$50,000 fire with a penny box of matches.

The two boys had two cents between them. They spent one penny for a piece of candy and the other for a penny box of matches. They built a fire near a mattress factory, the factory and eight residences adjoining it were destroyed by the fire and Cross' father who worked in the factory is out of a job, and Collins' mother, a widow, without a home and carried no insurance.

TO DISMISS INDICTMENTS.

(Abilene Reporter.)

Announcement was made by District Judge W. R. Ely Thursday morning that all of the original cases against T. A. Bledsoe, former county judge, in which forgery and swindling were charged in connection with issuance of county warrants, would be dismissed and go off the docket with the completion of this term of court, which will be either late Thursday or Friday morning. Four cases remain against Judge Bledsoe, Judge Ely announced, and will be tried at the next term of district court, the date of their trial not yet having been set down.

Judge Ely said that the original cases against Bledsoe would go off the docket on account of the fact that the indictments were returned at a place other than the county courthouse. The indictments were returned at that time not being in condition to be used. The first indictments were returned against Judge Bledsoe in 1913. Another reason given for the dismissal of the original indictments is the fact that Miss Fannie Tippet, considered a very material witness for the state, has recently died. Her testimony was declared to be very vital in the case.

Two of the cases upon which Judge Bledsoe is to be tried at next term of court charge swindling, and two charge forgery. They were returned by the grand jury after Judge Bledsoe's return to this city.

CLOSING OF NATIONAL BANK AT CLEBURNE BECOMES SENSATION

CLEBURNE, Texas, Oct. 21.—Further investigations connected with the closing of the National Bank of Cleburne has developed that more than five hundred thousand dollars in securities and Liberty Bonds are missing from safety deposit boxes.

The city of Cleburne is reported to have lost seventy-seven thousand dollars in securities, and one business man forty-six thousand dollars, these being the heaviest losers thus far reported.

A rigid investigation is now under way, and doubtless other astounding irregularities will be brought to light.

DENTON, Texas, Oct. 21.—A party of white men took two negro boys from the city jail in Pilot Point last night, escorted them to the outskirts of the city and gave them a sound whipping.

This morning a notice was found on the door of the local newspaper office reading:

"Yes, we did it, applied the lash to them good. This should be a warning to all law-breakers and loafers of whatsoever character or color."

The notice was written on the back of a plain white envelope and signed "K. K. K."

It is announced that the Japanese cabinet has decided to accept the agenda for the conference as proposed by our State Department. THE CREED OF AN AMERICAN

A man born in Europe writes to us, "I would like a statement telling me what an American should believe in regard to the fundamentals of our government. It is sometimes hard to tell just what is Americanism with the number of theories I read in the newspapers and hear expressed on the street. I want to follow the best thought so that I can be worthy of the name of an American."

In answer to the above question we think of no better answer than to refer the questioner to the first inaugural address of Thomas Jefferson. We quote in part his address:

"About to enter, fellow citizens, on the exercise of duties which comprehend everything dear and valuable to you, it is proper you should understand what I deem the essential principles of our Government, and consequently those which ought to shape its Administration. I will compress them within the narrowest compass they will bear, stating the general principle, but not all its limitations. Equal and exact justice to all men, of whatever state or persuasion, religious or political; peace, commerce, and honest friendship with nations, entangling alliances with none; the support of the State governments in all their rights, as the most competent administrations for our domestic concerns and the surest bulwarks against anti-republican tendencies; the preservation of the General Government in its whole constitutional vigor, as the sheet anchor of our peace at home and safety abroad; a jealous care of the right of election by the people—a mild and safe corrective of abuses which are lopped by the sword of revolution where peaceable remedies are unprovided;

absolute acquiescence in the decisions of the majority, the vital principle of republics, from which is no appeal but to force, the vital principle and immediate parent of despotism; a well disciplined, militia, our best reliance in peace and for the first moments of war, till regulars may relieve them; the supremacy of the civil over the military authority; economy in the public expense, that labor may be lightly burdened; the honest payment of our debts and sacred preservation of the public faith; encouragement of agriculture, and of commerce as its handmaid; and the diffusion of information and the arraignment of all abuses at the bar of public reason; freedom of religion, freedom of the press, and freedom of person under the protection of the habeas corpus, and trial by juries impartially selected. These principles form the bright constellation which has gone before us and guided our steps through the age of revolution and reformation."
It would be well for all of us to remember the above principles as stated by Jefferson for as he says: "They should be the creed of our political faith, the text of civic in-

struction, the touchstone by which to try the services of those we trust; and should we wander from them in moments of error or alarm, let us hasten to retrace our steps, and to regain the road which alone leads to peace, liberty and safety.—Austin Statesman.
