## NOVEL FLIGHT IS BEING PLANNED

Sir Ross Smith, Who Made Australia To England Flight—To Encircle The Globe.

MAY COME THROUGH THE U. S.

Route Is Partially Unknown—Two Comrades Will Share The Trip's Dangers.

LONDON, April 4.—Early next month Sir Ross Smith, the Christopher Columbus of the air, will start from London in his long-projected trip around the world.

If he completes his voyage, King George will give him higher honors, he will make a fortune from books and lectures, and he will have gained undying fame.

Secrecy surrounds the trip because it is being privately financed. The British government has officially announced that it is not contributing a penny to the undertaking. The cost will be \$200,000, or approximately \$10 a mile.

**Building New Type Plane.**  
Vickers, Ltd., is building the plane. It is a new type known as the Vickers Amphibian. It has wheels and pontoons, so it can land on either land or water.

Similar amphibians are being built by Vickers for the Japanese and United States governments for use on the Pacific.

Smith will follow the coasts as much as possible, for most of the land over which he will fly will be too rough for safe landings.

Sir Ross Smith will have as comrades on his voyage his brother, Sir Keith Smith, and Lieutenant Bennett, a mechanic. The three are Australians and in 1919 made the first flight from England to Australia.

The Australian government offered a prize of 10,000 pounds to the first Australian who would make this flight within a 30-day period. The Smiths and Bennett completed the voyage of 11,294 miles in 28 days, finishing December 10, 1919.

**Knights By King.**  
As a reward for this flight King George knighted the brothers.

Ross Smith's London-Australian flight was made easier by the fact that during his service in the World War he had surveyed airlines from Egypt to Mesopotamia.

His around-the-world tour will be simplified because he already has flown over nearly a third of the route.

The route will be from London, across France via Paris and Lyons, across Italy via Pisa, Rome, Naples and Brindisi, thence to Malta and along the North African coast to Aboukir and Kantara in Egypt, across the Holy Land to Bagdad, thence along the Persian coast to Karachi in India, to Delhi, Allahabad and Calcutta, Rangoon in Burma and Bangkok in Siam.

**Leaves Known Route.**  
At this point he will depart from the route he followed to Australia, heading for Japan via Hongkong, then to Kamchatka, Alaska, and across Canada by way of Edmonton, Moose Jaw and Nova Scotia, jumping off for his flight across the Atlantic.

Smith may take one of two other routes across the North American continent, including Winnipeg, Fort William, Sault Ste. Marie, Montreal, Fredericton and Sydney; or Winnipeg, St. Paul, Chicago, Pittsburg, New York and thence northward to Nova Scotia.

It's almost certain that Smith will cut down into the United States if possible for the sake of the advertising this will give his later writings and lectures.

Smith is a clean-cut youngster of 29, who looks even younger. He is as talkative as a clam, but is positive he will be the first man to circumnavigate the globe by air.

**ELK WON'T HUSTLE**

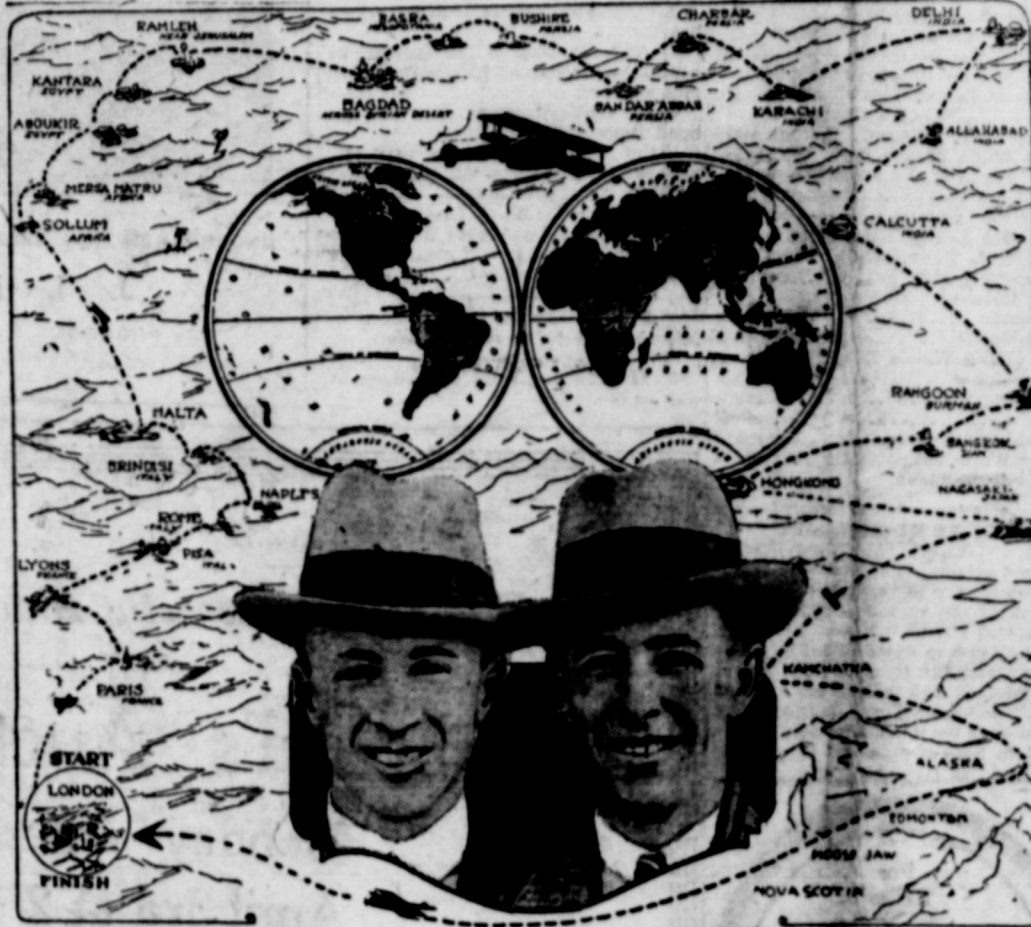
**BLACKWELL GETS RAIN**

## COMMANDANT IS SHOT

Officer Shot by Jurist Following Alleged Attack On Latters Wife—Is Released On Bond.

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 4.—Judge Jean D. Pay, in whose residence Lieutenant Colonel Paul Ward Beck, Commandant of the Post Field Aviation headquarters, was found dead, was released on \$5,000 bond today pending the coroner's inquest, which was scheduled to be held this afternoon.

Beck was found dead in the apartment following a bridge party. He had been shot once in the temple and death was instantaneous. Guests at the party have been warned not to talk. Day is said to have returned home after delivering the bridge guests to their respective homes in his car and saw Beck grab Mrs. Day.

Judge Day went upstairs in his home and procured a revolver. When he returned to the lower floor, it is alleged that Beck started toward him. In an attempt to club the officer, the revolver was discharged and Beck was killed, according to Judge Day.

## CHOSEN FOR CABINET

Paul Henderson Selected Second Assistant Postmaster-General—Succeeds Shaughnessy.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—Paul Henderson of Chicago has been chosen Second Assistant Postmaster General to fill the vacancy caused by the recent death of E. H. Shaughnessy, who was killed by the collapse of the Knickerbocker Theatre a few weeks ago.

The nomination of Henderson will probably go to the Senate, Wednesday, according to information from official circles at the White House today.

Henderson is 42 years old and is the son-in-law of Congressman Mad den of Illinois.

## SHIP ON FIRE AT DOCK

HOBOKEN, April 4.—Fire broke out on the former transport Mongolia as she lay in place at the dock here today. Hundreds of workers on the ship at the time fled from the burning transport, which was being converted into a passenger and freight liner.

## FROM BOOZE TO ICE CREAM

Sundae Replaces Liquors of Pre-Prohibition Days.

CLEVELAND, April 4.—America's on an ice cream spree.

That's the word of Robert Everett secretary of the National Association of Ice Cream Supply Men.

Sundaes replaced the liquors of the pre-prohibition days. Fear of poison whiskies and "Dago Red," Everett declared have caused Americans to order chocolate sodas in enormous quantities.

In one year America consumed 325,000,000 gallons of ice cream—that's \$350,000,000 spent on sodas and sundaes.

Ice cream, Everett said, is purely an American institutional like Babe Ruth and Mammy jazz songs.

"It's too damp in England for the ice cream craze," he declared. "France sticks to French pastry. And Europe generally is too far behind in refrigerating. America alone has facilities to indulge in the luxury."

## IS OPPOSED TO KLAN

Texas Senator States Position on K. K. Issue.

Much criticism has been leveled at State official for hesitancy in declaring their opinion in relation to the existence and principles of the Ku Klux Klan organization.

In a letter to Major H. V. Fisher of Houston, C. A. Culbertson, Senator from Texas, states his position in regard to the Klan as follows: "You're recent letter asking my position with reference to the order known as the Ku Klux Klan which is now in operation in our state was duly received and I now answer at the earliest opportunity.

I have no affiliation directly or indirectly with this organization and I am unqualifiedly opposed to its operations. If not curbed, it will usurp the functions of the State and be destructive of government itself. It will indeed overthrow our Anglo-Saxon civilization in its relation to government.

Steps should be taken, therefore, at once to arrest its progress and finally to destroy it.

Appeal cannot be made to the Federal Government for this purpose for it is without jurisdiction unless application is made by Texas to the United States in the manner provided by the Constitution for protection against domestic violence, and this is unthinkable.

Fortunately, however, the power of the State is ample, and if no law now exists adequate to the occasion the Legislature may be called in extra session to supply this deficiency."

## 'WAR COUNCIL' MEETS

Greatest Drive Against Rum Runners To Be Started in a Few Days.

WASHINGTON, April 4.—The most determined effort made thus far will be started within a week after a conference with the leaders of the prohibition forces here today.

The War Council of the prohibition forces is composed of Commissioner Roy Hargrave, G. Watt and E. C. Yel-lowely, who have been organizing forces along the borders and are now planning a simultaneous onslaught on the rum runners on land and sea.

Spies and pickets have been stationed along the border points. Flotillas of sub chasers protect the boats. The army of the prohibition number more than twelve hundred men.

All the work in a Colorado Springs grocery store is done by electricity, the bins being opened by magnets and the scales being electrically operated.

## OIL TANKS BURNING

Three Containers Destroyed—Loss Estimated At \$300,000—Is Under Control.

SAPULPA, April 4.—A terrific oil tank fire, which has been raging here for the last thirty-six hours, is practically under control today. Three great tanks have been destroyed with an estimated loss of \$300,000.

The third tank exploded early today shooting flames hundreds of feet in the air and lighting the city brightly. The heat from the burning tank melted communication wires and warped the rails of the Frisco Railroad tracks into fantastic shapes.

Thousands of volunteers worked day and night erecting additional temporary fire guards around the blazing containers.

## TO FILE CHARGES

County Attorney Declares That He Knows Members Of Mob That Whipped Him.

STILLWELL, Okla., April 4.—The prosecution of the members of a masked mob, which recently kidnaped him, was made here today by George O. Grant, County Attorney of Adair county. The mob conducted Grant to a spot outside the city and administered a lengthy lecture, according to testimony given concerning the incident.

Grant declared that, despite the masks, he knew eighteen members of the mob and would file charges against them. The members of the mob accused him of "running around with a woman." It is alleged, Grant protested his innocence and said: "If the mob has anything on me, let them come into the courts and prosecute me."

## FIND OIL IN CONCHO.

MILLERSVIEW, April 4.—The second test for oil by the Jeff Meers Oil Company of San Angelo on the Zelle tract, 22 miles northwest of Brady, McCulloch County, gives promise of being a shallow producer. The bit struck an oil bearing sand Friday at 390 feet and drilling in will take place this week, Jeff Meers announced. The first Zelle well, going down 453 feet near where the Prairie Oil & Gas Company obtained production, missed the oil sand.

## RAINFALL INCREASES

Sunday Night, Monday And Last Night Brings Up Total To 2.25 Inches—Rain Was Scattering.

Additional rainfall late Monday afternoon and night brought the total precipitation since Sunday night to 2.25 inches.

The total rainfall for January was half an inch with a similar amount for February. March managed to register 1.25 inches, according to Doctor Dudgeon, who has a rain-gauge and keeps the records for this vicinity.

Rain was falling at Lubbock at 9 o'clock this morning and Big Spring reports a good rain in that country during Monday night. A light shower fell at San Angelo and Roscoe received a sprinkle.

The storms of the last two days did considerable damage to local telephone lines, according to advice from the local exchange. Approximately seventy-three telephones were put out of order in Sweetwater and vicinity Monday morning. Sixty of these instruments were in working order Tuesday morning and the rest were repaired by noon.

The general appearance of the elements Tuesday morning indicated that further rainfall would occur during the day or in the next twenty-four hours.

F. Chesley, Sweetwater merchant, returned from Breckenridge this morning and stated that more rain had fallen in that city than they had seen for years.

## IMPROVES RANGE

The rain of a week ago was more than enough to start the grass all over the West Texas range and the rain of Monday will bring it on with a rush. Cattlemen who have been forced to feed more or less all winter are jubilant at the change in the situation.

Penetrated 18 Inches  
G. E. Bradford, of the Texas Bank states that in digging a post hole, he found the moisture had penetrated more than 18 inches at that particular place. All of which marks the recent downfall as being the best this section has had in recent years.

## THREE INCHES IN DALLAS

Trinity River Bank-full-floods In Low Lands Feared.

DALLAS, April 4.—General rains, which is the first to fall since last June, fell in this section of the State during the past twenty-four hours. Reports indicate that the precipitation averaged between one and two inches and in some sections there was a regular downpour.

Official estimates show that more than three inches of water fell in Dallas. The Trinity River is bank full and floods in the lowlands are feared. Transportation has not yet been effected, but highways, with the exception of the hard-surfaced highways, are practically impassable.

UNMASKED MOB WHIPS NEGRO  
WINTERS, Tex., April 4.—"Black and Tan" Smith, a negro man about 25 years old, was tied to a post and severely whipped in the outskirts of Winters Monday by an orderly crowd of unmasked men. The negro had previously insulted a white woman at the Abilene & Southern depot here, it was said.

He was later taken in charge of by and lodged in the county jail. No further trouble is expected as he is now in the hands of the county officers.

## CROP OUTLOOK GOOD

Two-inch Rain At Robert Lee Fell Sunday Night

## EX-SERVICE MEN ASK EMPLOYMENT

Co-Operating With Nation - Wide Movement To Find Jobs For All Ex-Service Men.

## MAYOR ISSUES PROCLAMATION

Sets Aside Thursday, April 6 As Day To Find Jobs For Most Worthy Cause.

A nationwide movement to provide employment for worthy ex-service men who owing to economic condition find themselves without means of securing a livelihood is finding co-operation in Sweetwater.

At the last meeting of the Oscar McDonald Post, American Legion, a resolution was passed asking Mayor Sheppard to designate an ex-service men's employment day.

Mayor Sheppard has issued a proclamation setting aside Thursday, April 6 as the day and asks everyone to give preference to ex-service men.

It is reported that there are from 10 to 12 members of the local post who are without a position at the present time. Persons who are in need of their services or who can find use for their services are asked to get in touch with Arnold Dressler Commandeer of the Post, or Geo. W. Outlaw, Jr. adj. at once. Co-operation in this worthy move will be very much appreciated by the American Legion members.

Mayor Sheppard's Proclamation follows:

"In the days of 1917 and 1918 when the nation was involved in the great World War, the youth and manhood of the nation responded nobly to the call of duty and endangered their lives for the honor and prestige of this great nation might remain intact.

Since then many of these men have suffered from lack of employment—have not been able to secure their daily living. These men do not ask charity, do not ask for donation. All that they ask is an opportunity. And the citizens owe them at least that much.

Recently a national movement to provide employment for ex-service men has been started. Cities everywhere have fallen in line. Employers have given preference to ex-service men and many citizens have found jobs that would serve temporarily at least, in providing these men who risked their lives for their country with the means of earning their living.

Therefore, I, as mayor of Sweetwater, do hereby designate Thursday, April 6 as Ex-service men's employment day and urge every citizen in Sweetwater to co-operate to the fullest extent in providing or helping secure employment for these soldiers of ours."
