LABOR BOARD STARTS OUT ON PEACE **NEGOTIATIONS IN THE R. R. STRIKE**

Interviews Labor Unions As To Best Proposition They Will Accept And Then Present Them To Rail Executives-**Railroads Reported Willing To Take Compromise.**

SERIOUS RIOTING BREAKS OUT IN DENISON, TEXAS

Strike Breakers Imported By Katy-Arrival Signal For Large Crowd Ut Sympathizers-Take Seventeen Out Of Town And Whip Them-More Trains Discontinued.

Peace negotiations between the striking shopmen and the railroads were undertaken today when Ben W. Hoopr, Chairman of the United States Labor Board obtained points on which the union will be willing to make peace and then presented Tem to the railroad executives, who are said to be in a concilia tory mood.

The Big Brotherhoods and the Switchmen's Unions protested to the rallroads against the operation of the trains where troops are protecting strikebreakers and also against operation of trains with defective equ.pment

Violence broke out in Denison where one man was shot and seriously wounded and several men including some United States Deputy Marshals were reported kidnapped and taken to the woods for beatings.

DENISON, July 12 .- Rioting broke out here today between strike breakers and sympathizers of the tarikers.

J. W. Pike, 67, an employe of the K. O. & G. was shot through the stomach and seriously wounded.

Several men were taken from the protection of four United States deputy marshals, loaded into automobiles, taken outside of the city limits, and flogged. None of the deputies were flogged. molested.

An early Katy train bringing in 47 strikebreakers, accompanied by several deputies, were met by a crowd of several hundred strike sympathizers and a large sized fight followed.

The situation was quiet at noon, but other strikebreakers are on the way and more trouble is rested. The tension bare is running high.




