## MORE RAIL MEN VOTE TO STRIKE

Walkout Orders Issued To Stationary Engineers And Firemen—Effective July The 19th.

## TROOP TRAIN AT CAMP TRAVIS

Officers Refuse To Divulge Moves—State Adjutant-General To Denison On Inspection Tour.

CHICAGO, July 14.—A strike of stationary engineers and firemen employed upon the railroads was authorized here today by the union heads. Practically the entire membership of this union is now striking in sympathy with the shop craftsmen.

WILL NOT SEND TROOPS  
DALLAS, July 14.—Governor Neff announced here Thursday night that no state troops would be ordered out for strike duty immediately and that his belief was unchanged that the local peace officials could control the situation.

EXPECTS CALL FOR TROOPS  
SAN ANTONIO, July 14.—State troops at Fort Sam Houston are being held in readiness for strike duty. No orders had been received by General Hines at Washington for troops early today, but indications pointed that the call was expected momentarily.

TROOP TRAIN "SPOTTED IN"  
SAN ANTONIO, July 14.—A troop train was "spotted in" on the Camp Travis spur shortly before noon today according to local union officials. Army officers in charge of troop movements at Corps headquarters refused to confirm or deny the report.

ATTORNEY GENERAL TO DENISON  
AUSTIN, July 14.—Acting upon the instructions of Governor Neff, Adjutant General Barton left here at 10 o'clock this morning for Denison to make an inspection of strike conditions there. Barton will report as to whether troops are needed at that place after the inspection.

PLEA FOR NO VIOLENCE  
CLEBURNE, July 14.—A mass meeting has been called here by strikers, who are co-operating with the city and county officers, in order to stress the necessity for avoiding violent outbursts.

## HOW TO CHOOSE THE EGG LAYERS

Texas Agriculture Experiment Station Advises How To Cull Flocks.

## WHITE LEGHORNS ARE STUDIED

Color Of Beaks And Time Of Molting Found To Be Accurate Indicators.

How to judge the poultry flock to save the layers and dispose of the poor eggs without resorting to the tedious process of trap-nesting, is a very live question just now. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station is constantly besieged with questions like these: Has the hen with yellow beak and shanks laid many eggs? Is the late molting hen a good layer? How do the pullets behave in the bad layer differ from those of the poor layer?

The Station has, for some time, been studying the relation between body characters and the number of eggs the hen has laid. In a study using S. C. White Leghorns it has been found that color of beak and color of shanks are two of the most accurate indicators of egg production.

The characters that showed the greatest correlation with egg production were those which were probably fairly uniform when the pullets began to lay, but showed changes and differences as the laying season progressed.

## BIG TRUNK LINES MAY AID ORIENT

Interstate Commerce Commission Is Hopeful Of Voluntary Action Of Greater Railroads.  
GENERAL MEETING IN CHICAGO

Appeal To Be Made To Labor Board For Adjustment Rules And Of Working Conditions.

WASHINGTON, July 14.—The Interstate Commerce Commission members, it was indicated here Thursday by Chairman McChord, are very hopeful that voluntary action by the big trunk line railroads, state railroad commissions and other agencies will be such that the Orient will not have to suspend.

To this end an agreement was reached Wednesday for a general meeting in Chicago next week, at which time another appeal will be made to the Railroad Labor Board for aid in an adjustment of rates, working conditions and classification of the road. Executives of the various trunk lines having encountered freight that could be sent over the Orient, will attend the meeting and it was stated as the opinion of Chairman McChord that a voluntary agreement would be arrived at that could deliver enough business over the road and to voluntarily increase the division of the freight as to not make it necessary for the Interstate Commerce Commission to get out a revised freight schedule giving the Orient a greater division of the joint freight rate.

It is understood that while the railroads effected have not objected to the increase in the proportion of the joint freight which the Orient is requesting, that the commission is loath to grant the request as it might set a precedent that would throw down the bars to hundreds of other roads in distress and not only flood the commission with new problems, but would disrupt the whole system of rate proportioning among the roads. If, however, the strong roads agree to give the Orient a better division of freight, it will not be necessary for the commission to make a ruling on the matter.

If a mutual agreement can be reached at Chicago, this will give aid to the road at once and not force the new rates to wait for a formal action by the Interstate Commerce Commission. An endeavor will be made next week to draw up and finally adopt a working basis by which some of the working of other roads may be diverted to the Orient through rates and more freight. The idea of the Orient being taken over by some strong railroad and operated by it was not discussed, it was said, owing to the fact that the Interstate Commerce Commission could not force this except in the case of excessive surplus earnings by some connecting road. Rather than take over the Orient, with its annual deficits, it is believed other roads would keep their surplus down by making improvements on their own property.

State and federal officials suggested that there would be no objection raised by them if the Orient should increase its local rates, if this was deemed necessary, but W. T. Kemper, receiver, declined to consider this as a solution of the Orient's difficulty on the ground that in his opinion any increase rates would drive such business as still remains from the road. Members of the Texas, Kansas and Oklahoma railroad commission will attend the conference in Chicago next week. It is believed also that Kansas and Texas commissioners will recommend a decrease in taxation for the road similar to that adopted in the state of Oklahoma, where valuations for taxable purposes were reduced to \$100 a mile.

## THE REPORTER'S HOUSEHOLD HINT COLUMN.

### SPANISH BUNS.

Two and half cups brown sugar, 1-2 cup butter, 1 cup sour milk, 4 eggs (saving whites for frosting) 2 1-2 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, 1 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon vanilla; bake in a dripping pan; cut in squares and pour frosting over. Mix as for cake.

### SPICE CAKE—Exceptionally Good.

Half cup butter, Cup of sugar, Two cups pastry flour, Two level teaspoons baking powder, Half teaspoon nutmeg, Half teaspoon cinnamon, Half teaspoon salt, Three-fourths cup water, Yolks of 4 or 2 whole eggs. Cream butter and sugar thoroughly and add eggs. Sift together three times flour, baking powder, spices and salt; add alternately with water.

### SUNSHINE CAKE.

Half cup butter, One and half cup granulated sugar, Two and half cups flour, One cup milk, Three-level teaspoons baking powder, One teaspoon lemon, Yolks of 9 eggs. Cream butter and sugar thoroughly, beat eggs and add to butter and sugar. Sift flour before measuring, then sift flour and baking powder together 3 times, and add alternately with milk to other ingredients. Bake in a slow oven 50 to 60 minutes.

### WHITE CAKE.

3-4 cup butter, 1 cup milk, 4 whites of eggs, 3 cups flour, 1-4 cups sugar, 3 level teaspoons baking powder, 1 level teaspoon salt. Cream butter and sugar. Add milk alternately to flour, baking powder and salt, sifted thoroughly. Add whites of eggs or fold in, last stirring gently. Use any flavoring to suit taste.

### WHITE LOAF CAKE.

Whites of 8 eggs, 1-4 cups granulated sugar, 3-4 cup butter, 1-2 cup water, 2-1-2 cups pastry flour, 2-1-2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon vanilla. Sift flour once and measure, add baking powder and sift three times. Sift sugar, then measure. Cream butter and sugar thoroughly. Beat whites of eggs until very stiff. Add to creamed butter and sugar, then flour and water alternately then flavor and stir very hard. Bake in ungreased mold in slow oven until raised to top of pan, then increase heat, and brown. Bake 40 to 60 minutes.

### ALMOND DROP CAKE.

3 cups pastry flour, 3 level teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, Pinch of salt, 3-4 cup sugar, 3-4 cup bleached chopped almonds, Yolks of 3 eggs, 2-3 cup melted butter, 2-3 cup milk (scant).

1 cup sugar, 3-4 cup butter, 2 eggs, beaten separately, 1-4 cup of milk, Pinch of salt. Mix as for cake, then separate dough putting in another bowl, and to one-half add rind of 1 orange and juice of half an orange; to other half add 2 ounces of melted chocolate. Save 1-4 cup of flour in sifter to add to white dough after orange juice has been added. Place dark dough on top of light dough and roll together very thin, and cut and bake in a quick oven.

### VANILLA WAFERS

1-3 cup butter and lard mixed, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, well beaten, 1-4 cup milk, 2-1-4 cups flour, 2 level teaspoons baking powder, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons vanilla.

### GINGER SNAPS.

1 cup molasses, 2 teaspoons level baking powder, 3-1-3 cups flour, 2 teaspoons ginger, 1-2 cup butter or drippings, 1-1-2 teaspoons salt. Boil molasses two minutes and pour on butter; cool. Sift together thoroughly flour, baking powder, ginger and salt and add. Chill; roll on a floured board as thin as possible, using small part of dough at a time. Cut into a shape and bake in moderate oven.

### NUT COOKIES.

1-3 cup butter, 1-1-2 cup sugar, 2 eggs, 1-2 cup flour, 1 level teaspoon baking powder, 3-4 cup chopped nuts, 1 teaspoon lemon juice. Cream butter and add sugar and eggs well beaten. Sift flour and baking powder together. Add first mixture; then add nuts and lemon juice and enough milk to make a soft dough. Drop from a spoon on an unbuttered baking sheet leaving an inch space between them. Sprinkle with chopped nuts and bake in a very slow oven. This makes two dozen cookies.

### SUGAR COOKIES.

2 cups sugar, 1 cup butter, 3 eggs, 3 tablespoons water, 2 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon nutmeg, Half teaspoon cloves, 3 cups flour. Cream butter and sugar, beat in whipped eggs, add baking powder and cup of flour, then water and spices; add remaining flour gradually, working in more flour until dough is stiff enough to roll. Sprinkle flour over pastry board. Make a ball of dough, and lay on the board. Rub rolling pin with flour and roll out dough into a sheet 1-4-inch thick. Cut in round cakes, sift granulated sugar over each, and bake quickly.

### MARBLE COOKIES.

3-1-2 cups sifted pastry flour, 3 level teaspoons baking powder.

Cream butter, add sugar, milk and vanilla. Sift together thoroughly the flour baking powder salt, and add. Roll as thin as possible, cut with a round cutter, and bake in a moderate oven.

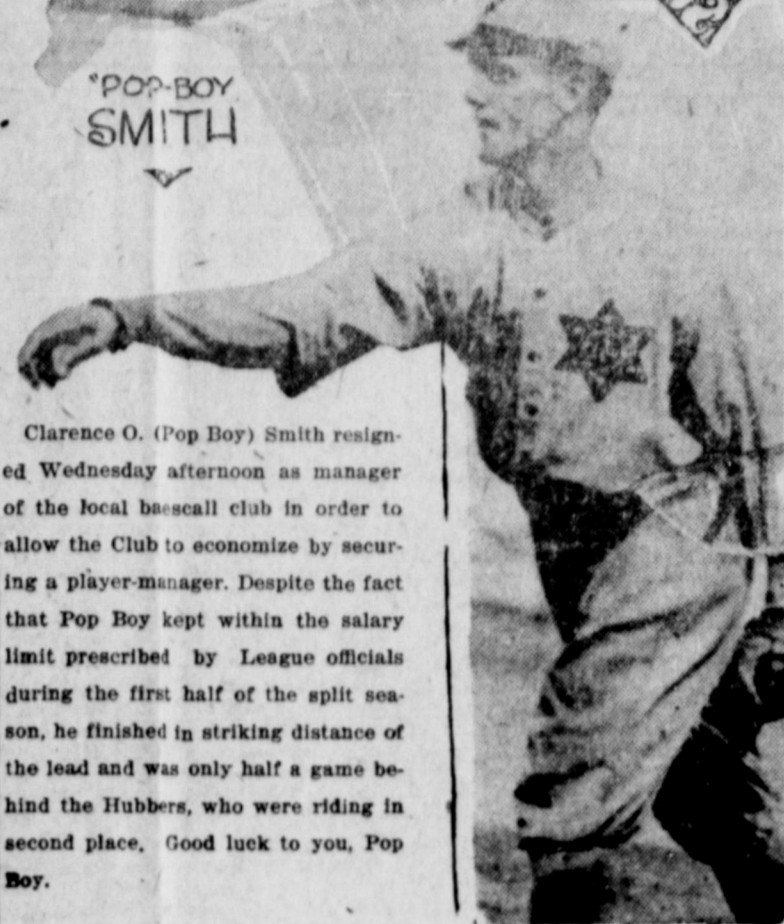
