Editor Sweetwater Reporter: In the past year there has been a great deal published in the Reporter. About patronizing home merchants and Home Industries. But aothing about the Home markets of the Far mers. The merchants of Sweetwater spend thousands of dollars every year trying to build up their trade. And not a dollar towards encouraging the farmers to produce the supply of vegetables that the citizens of Sweetwater use when the farmers around Sweetwater raise vegetables, melons etc. They have to compete with truck shipped in from East and South Texas. This stuff is generally sold on commission and dumped on the market for what it will bring when our farmers produce begins to come in and thus ruins our home markets so that the farmers have to take very low prices for their produce and often can not sell it. This virtually leaves the farmers with nothing but cotton money to spend. As cotton is a cash crop anywhere. The farmers are not dependent on any one in Sweetwater, to buy it they can ship it or let the Farm Bureau sell it for them or sell it to neighbor towns. How wou'd the merchants of Sweetwater like to see some Dallas or Ft. Worth firms. have some of their farmer friends tak ing orders for Groceries, every day and spending their cotton money with now then if the merthose firms. chants won't protect the farmers home markets why then the farmers are under no obligation to spend a dollar with them. The farmers would like to see the merchants prosper but not at the expense of their Home Mar kets. The farmers are watching these things close'y Now then if the Business men of Sweetwater mean refness why not organize in a solid Phalanx and look after the farmers home markets this would do more to coment the friendship of the farmers than anyone thing that could be done. This would help stop the mail usiness to a great extent. I would like to hear from others
