ORIENT TAXES

Taxes, above all things, should be equitably distributed. The schools, city and county government, sheriff and police protection, fire protection and the other items for which the tax money is spent are items which benefit everyone. Therefore everyone should pay alike.

Occasionally there comes an item which differs from the rest. No taxes are levied against schools which are themselves kept up by taxes, nor should there be taxes levied against churches and other institutions which are likewise kept up by voluntary contributions.

The Orient is not exactly in the same class, but if it is kept in operation, it will be done so by the charity of the large rail systems which donate it traffic by the charity of the Interstate Commerce Commission and other advantages over competing rail systems, by the charity of the communities which it serves in remitting taxes and in donating it freight.

If there was any doubt in the minds of anyone concerning the plight of the Orient, the statements made by Judge Clyde M. Reed or Kansas and Clarence Gilmore of Texas, who are disinterested persons in the fullest meaning of the word, should have dispelled them. For these men, one of them representing the Interstate Commerce Commission, strongly urged that not only should tax burdens be lightened but all local freight possible should be diverted to it.

ing the valuation of the Orient to \$100 per mile that are traversed by it, Nolan County and Sweetwater can afford to do no less. This is no question of showing partiality to a healthy, growing corporation like the T and P or the Santa Fe, and will establish no precedent. The huge sums spent by Sweetwater citizens to bring the Orient here, shows they realized fully the advantages of the road to the city and county. Can this community afford not to make some sacrifice to keep it in operation?

The early history of the Orient in Sweetwater is not tinged with the pleasantest of memories—and justifiably so. But the management responsible is out and has been out for some time. They did not profit by any duplicity they may have engineered and in any case that is water that has long since passed under the bridge. The point now to consider is whether Nolan County and Sweetwater can afford to lose the Orient. And whether or not they will stand aloof when other West Texas counties are doing all they can to continue it in operation.

ROADS

The visit of the state highway district engineer Henry C. Porter from Ballinger, his headquarters, to survey the four mile strip north from Sweetwater to connect up with the Fisher County roads, is promise that something will be done in the near future to get that road in passable shape. But the work should not stop until all the trunk roads at least in the county are similarly cared for. It will cost some money, but money spent that way has a habit of so increasing the value of adjacent property and other items of that sort that in the long run it is an investment paying increasing dividends, not an expense to be charged off.

VOTING UP IN OHIO

Interest Lessened By Removal Of Soldier Bonus Amendment Ballot—Many In For Re-Nomination

COLUMBUS, O., Aug. 10.—Politics—the stuff Ohio lives on—bubbled in the state's political cauldron today as balloting in the primary election got under way.

Congressman Charles L. Knight, republican candidate for nomination for Governor, comes nearest to being the type of progressive that has caused adherents of the old guard so much trouble in other states, but even Knight cannot be classed as ultra progressive.

As voters went to the polls virtually all indications that the primary elections will be referendum on Harding's administration had disappeared. Although both Co. Carmi A. Thompson, also a republican candidate for gubernatorial nomination, and Knight are strong supporters of the president, neither is meeting opposition on that stand.

If the referendum which loomed as a certainty early in the campaign, materialize at all, it will be in the races for Ohio's twenty-two seats in the house of representatives. All except two of the present Ohio delegation in the house are candidates for re-nomination and several have been persistent opponents of the Harding administration.

Congressman Simeon D. Fess, said to be the strongest republican candidate for nomination for United States Senator, also has been a strong supporter of the president but is not being taken to task for it by any of his opponents.

Senator Allee Pomerene, seeking re-election by the democrats, conducted his campaign without mention of the so called "Harding issue." He is opposed for the job only by former Congressman John J. Lentz.

Interest in this election was considerably lessened by the withdrawal of the soldier bonus amendment ballot. First plans for meeting the shortage in the state bonus fund called for submitting it to the people in the form of an amendment at today's election. Later, however, the funds were raised by appropriation from the general state fund by a special session of the legislature.

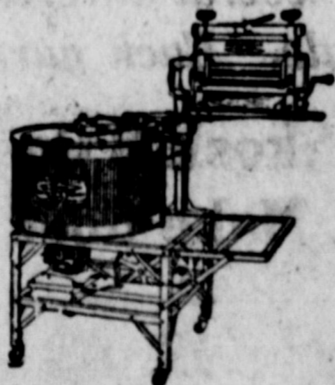

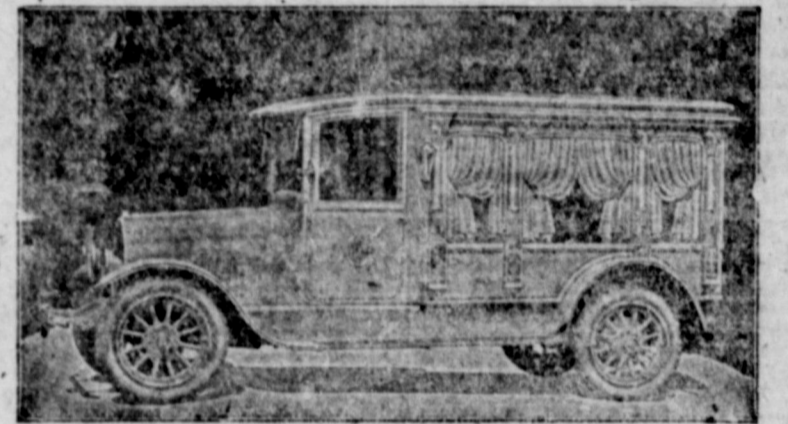
