

#### THE SINGING DEMON.

Mosquitoes bite us only as a la resort-when they are unable to find any other kind of prey. Some of the residents of the section of the city that is near the Conchos may doubt this, but it comes from the man who is supposed to know more about mosquitoes than anyone else in the world. He is Dr. W. Rudolfs, scientist on the payroll of New Jer-

Rudolfs' investigations show that a mosquito will pass up a human any day for a horse, cow. dog, rabbitany kind of animal life except chickens and ducks. Just why they steer clear of fowls is unknown. When science finds out, it may open the door to immunization of the mananimal against the singing, stinging

You have swatted a mosquito and found it full of blood. About 9 out of 10 times, says Dudolfs, the blood is from an animal.

The mosquito is the universal pest. It is found in all parts of the world. Stefansson, the explorer, says there are more of them in northern Greenland than in the equatorial jungles.

Here's a riddle of nature: The mosquito never feeds when the atmosphere's humidity is under 40. Its appetite goes up with the barometer. water. A rusty old tin can with a lit-tle stale water in it will breed more mosquitoes than any one person can swat in a lifetime. That's your cue.

The mosquito is a biting fly. it hatches from eggs laid in stagnant water. Its life usually is only a few months. Some kinds, however, live all summer. Others hibernate through the winter, in worm stage, and emerge in spring from ice in which they have been frozen solid. With vitality like that, no wonder they are so hard to exterminate.

The song of the mosquito-saddest music that ever reached human ear-is a sort of lung and throat rasp caused by breathing. Flies are different, their hum is caused by fast whirring of their wings-like an airplane propeller.

No public problem is more pressing and emphatic than the mosuito tribe when they are present. The germs they carry kill thousands of people, usually by malaria, typhoid and other fevers.

You believe in swatting the mosquito. But it seems like a hopeless job when you go on vacation and tind them swarming in the woods and along the shores of fishing poois, by millions.

The mosquito, however, is not an explorer. He might fly a few mues in a season, but generally he haunts tne old homestead where he first tried out his wings.

Man never will be able to exterminate the mosquito. But we can keep hi m in bounds, away from cities and open places in the country. All inat's needed is to prevent stagnant all autoists. Art of road paving is to its infarc/

THE REAL RULER OF PARIS.

Prefe & c! l'olice Has Almost Despotic

Power in City. New York Tribun-ne dea" of M. Leul he appointment of M. Naudin to su eed the former as Paris prefect of police some light is thrown on the obscure duties of this august personre. His position seems all-power and his name on a piece of cardboard an"open sesame" anywhere in the French capital.

Paris. Technically, there are twenty mayors and twenty town halls, but these have no administrative power. The city is run b" a body of aldermen but the real power is in the hands of two men—the prefect of the Seine "I'ch is a district including some of the Paris suburbs, and the prefer of police. Both of these are appointed by the government and are responsible to the minister of the interi Each of these functionaries has the right to issue edicts, which the population must obey.

The prefect of police spends near-ly 160 million francs a year and has division of about ten thousand policemen in Paris depend upon him, s well as the many subordinate poons in Parts and to the rounding country. He commands the army of detectives who keep watch on every su picious person in town and he runs the judiciar; police which is a vast organization of criminal courts.

The fire department is under his ceivable purpose. If a truck falls over bridge or some other extraordinary event occurs he sends a group of firemen to readjust the difficulty

for the morals of Paris, and he has a special group of men to see that this side of French life is well regulated. Every theater in town depends on him. He not alone keeps a squad of policemen in the theaters at every performance, and two or three firemen, but he is responsible for morality of the plays offered for the public. His censorship has been light so far, but if any play should pre-sent scenes that might harm the pub-lic morality or cause any difficulty in maintaining the peace he could stop them at once.

Large staffs under his orders carefully keep track of every stranger in Paris. They cannot make a move without its being recorded.
