# DEPOSIT IN BANKS THE COTTON MARKET. ON AN INCREASE

June 30 Report-Loans Are Increased \$19,065.92.

COTTON CROP IS RESPONSIBLE

Total Resources Also On The Rise-Income Of Cotton Money Increases Deposits Daily.

An increase of \$164,563.65 in total deposits of the hSweetwater Banks characterize their statements as rendered to the State and National Banking authorities on their September 15 call, over the June 30 call. In the same period loans increased \$19,065.92 with a corresponding increase in total

The cotton crop movement is responsible for the bulk of the increase. doney is coming in rapidly now. Above all, it is vital to see that all schools are adequately equipped with escapes and with automatic sprinkler systems. A system of piping close under the ceiling with fusible plugs of a low melting point at suitable intervals is the principle upon which the automatic sprinkler system works. Heat from a fire melts the plug and a deluge of water puts out the fire before it gets any headway. Insurance companies make so low rate on build ngs that are protected by his swinkler system that the device soon mays for itself, to say nothing of
