THE PLIGHT of rural hospitals has been much in the news in recent months, and the Parmer County Community Hospital at Friona has not been exempt from the problems which are plaguing hospitals in all small towns.

Elda Hart, administrator at Parmer County Community Hospital, pointed out to us this week that a big problem lies in the discrepancies of the payments that Medicare pays the hospital for various charges.

Ms. Hart says that the hospital loses an average of \$1200 per month just in lab charges alone, due to the fact that Medicare's payment to the hospital for certain services is considerably less than the hospital's charges.

For example, the hospital's lab charges \$18.25 for a blood sugar test, but Medicare will pay only \$6.28 for the test. The hospital charges \$57.75 for a cardiac enzyme, but Medicare will reimburse the hospital only \$15.91.

Cholesterol tests cost \$18.00 at Parmer County Community Hospital, but the federal payment is approved at only \$6.86. A potassium test is billed locally at \$18.00, while Medicare will pay only \$7.19.

Patients usually get a notice from Medicare to the effect that "their charges have been paid by Medicare," leading them to believe that the entire amount has been paid, when most times it has not.

The payments listed above are reduced even more if the patient served is a nursing home patient and does not come to the lab.

Outpatient, in-patient and emergency room charges are paid by Medicare at 81 per cent of the hospital's charges, and the hospital writes off 19 per cent.

Even this is an improvement from the 76 per cent that was paid by Medicare in 1986.

Medicare will lower payments to physicians if they believe that the service could have been given in the doctor's office rather than in the Emergency Room.

Some factions are attempting to pass a law that if a rural hospital's occupancy is less than 75 per cent, the government will allow no capital gain expenditures.

In addition, the Texas Industrial Accident Board is trying to reduce payments to hospitals on workmen's comp cases.

Also, Medicare has cited the local hospital because two radiologists from Clovis have read X-rays for Parmer County Community Hospital, and are not on the hospital's staff.

The hospital administrator says that doctors are currently doing more "observation" than "admissions" due to government restrictions.

In addition to these financial restrictions, the local hospital administrator says that they continually face a myriad of paperwork necessitated by the periodic inspections which are a government requirement.

In a recent inspection, the local hospital was given 46 pages of citations, most of which deal with "nit picking," and have very little to do with the hospital's care or service.

Once the hospital has answered all of the citations, the inspectors then return to ascertain that the hospital has complied with all of the requirements.

With the federal regulations increasing, and with decreasing assistance from Medicare and Medicaid, it becomes increasingly hard for the hospital to show a profit.

But Ms. Hart says that Parmer County Community Hospital has always had a fierce determination to survive, and this is only made more intense by the new challenges.

Hinkle Wins Weekly Prize

Jerry Hinkle, one of the multi-year winners in the Friona Star's football contest, ended what he called a long dry spell by emerging as the weekly winner in the fourth week of the 1988 event.

Hinkle and Mark Neill, himself a three-time overall champion in the annual contest, were the only contestants to correctly pick as many as 15 of the contest games.

Hinkle claimed top money for the week on the basis of the Friona-Dalhart tie-breaker score, and Neill had to settle for second place.

Hinkle had picked the Wolves to win, 17-6, missing the actual score by only four points. Neill picked it 12-8.

Tom Johnson took third place, with a score of 14 for the week and a miss of 11 on the tie-breaker score. Johnson was one of five contestants correctly picking 14 of the games. The others were Robert Escalante, Cory Hamilton, Eddie Mann and Jimmy Walker.

Thirteen entrants correctly picked 13 games. They were Jim

Beard, Jerry Bentley, Adam Botello, Martha Espinoza, Alex Guerra, Mike Meyer, Charlie Morgan, Aubrey Parson, Elizabeth Peak, Jimmy Putman, John Seright, Joe Tongate and Don Max Vars.

On a week when several of the games ended in upsets, Hinkle suffered only five setbacks. They were Muleshoe-Greenwood, Amarillo-Plainview, A&M-Oklahoma State-Redskins-Cardinals and Broncos-Raiders.

Neill missed the same two high school games, plus three of the pro games: Giants-Rams, Redskins-Cardinals and Broncos-Raiders.

In the race for grand champion, Eddie Mann of San Angelo held onto first place with a score of 62 after four weeks. Neill's 15 moved him into second place with a 60. Dianne Morgan is next with 59. Alan Monroe and Mitchell Smiley stand at 58.

Scores of all the leading contestants may be found elsewhere in this issue. The leader at the close of the 13-week promotion receives \$100 in cash and bragging rights as the top football expert in the Friona Star's circulation area.

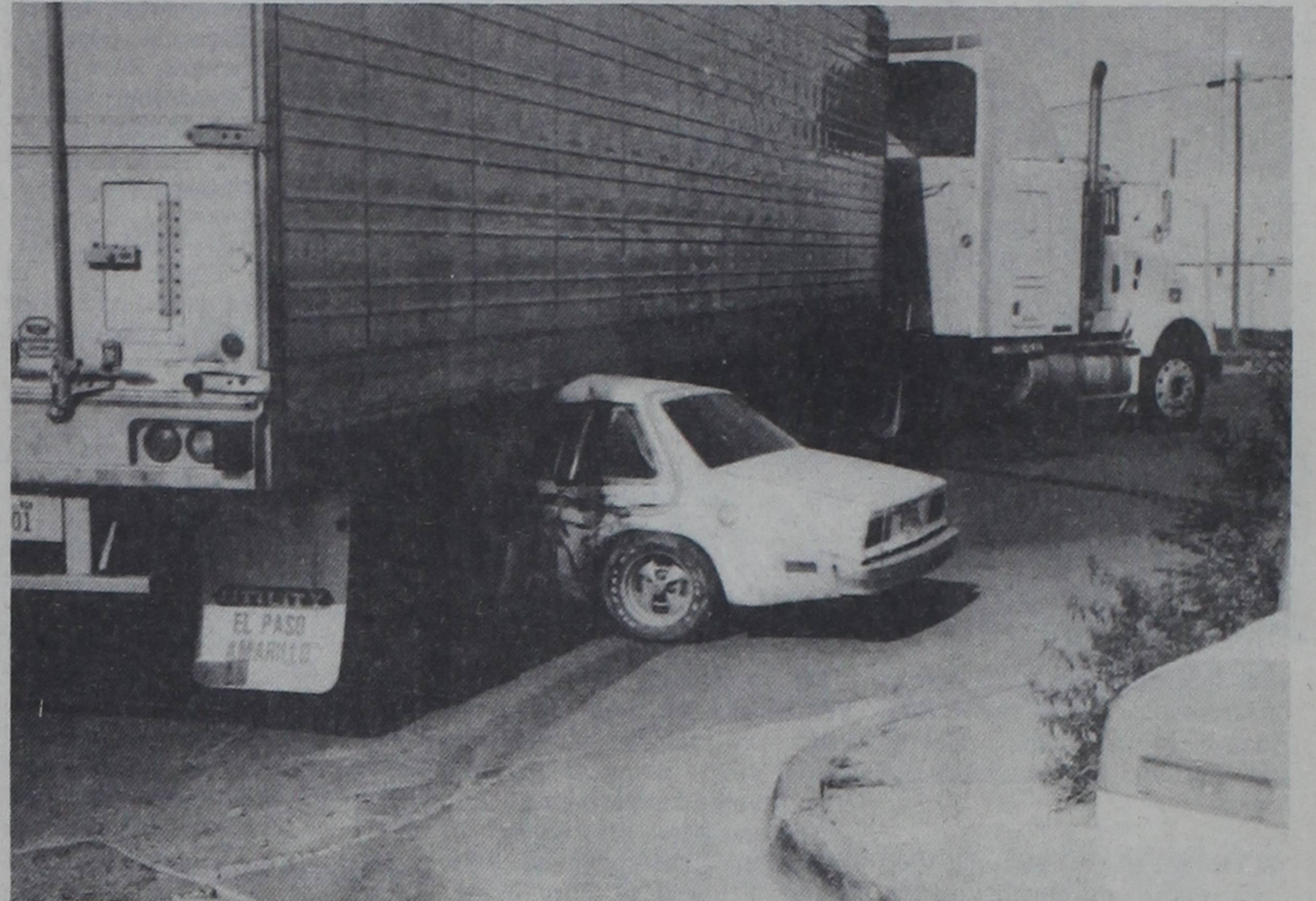

October 7 Proclaimed 'Red' Day

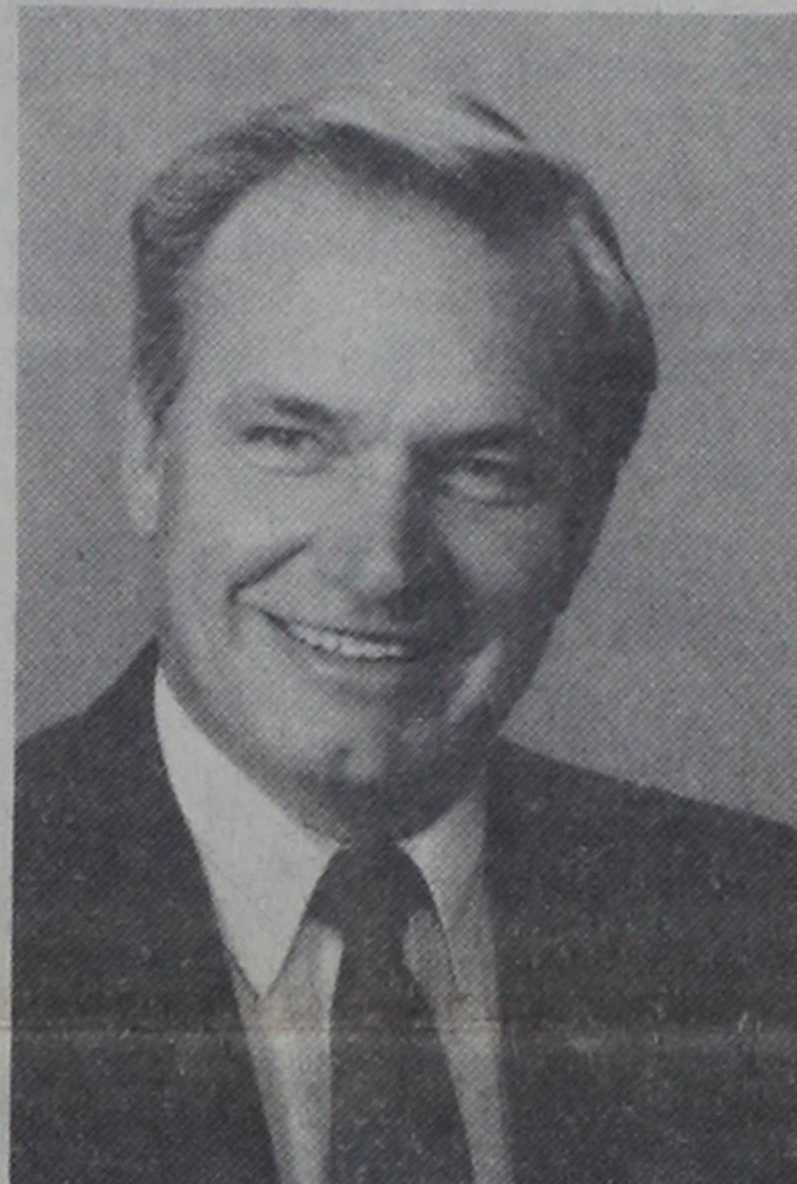

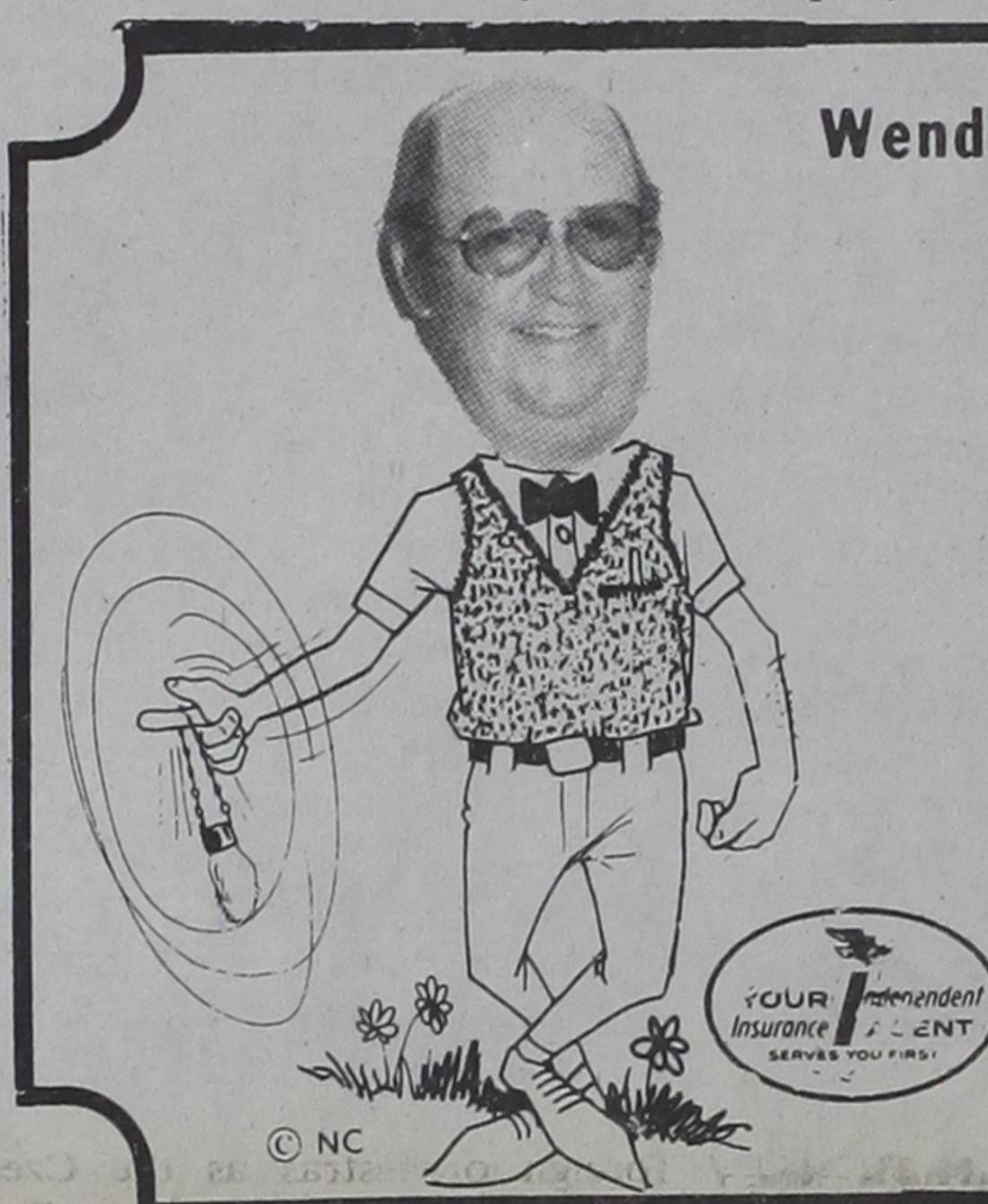

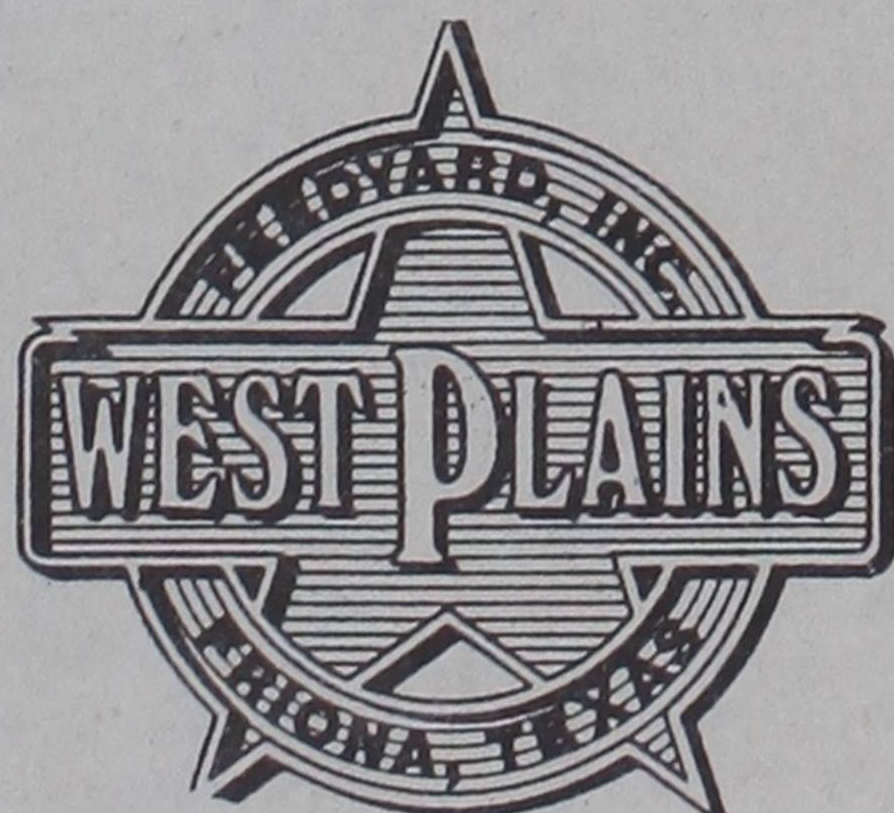

Bill, his wife Page and two children will be moving to Friona in October, and he will assume his duties on Monday, September 26.

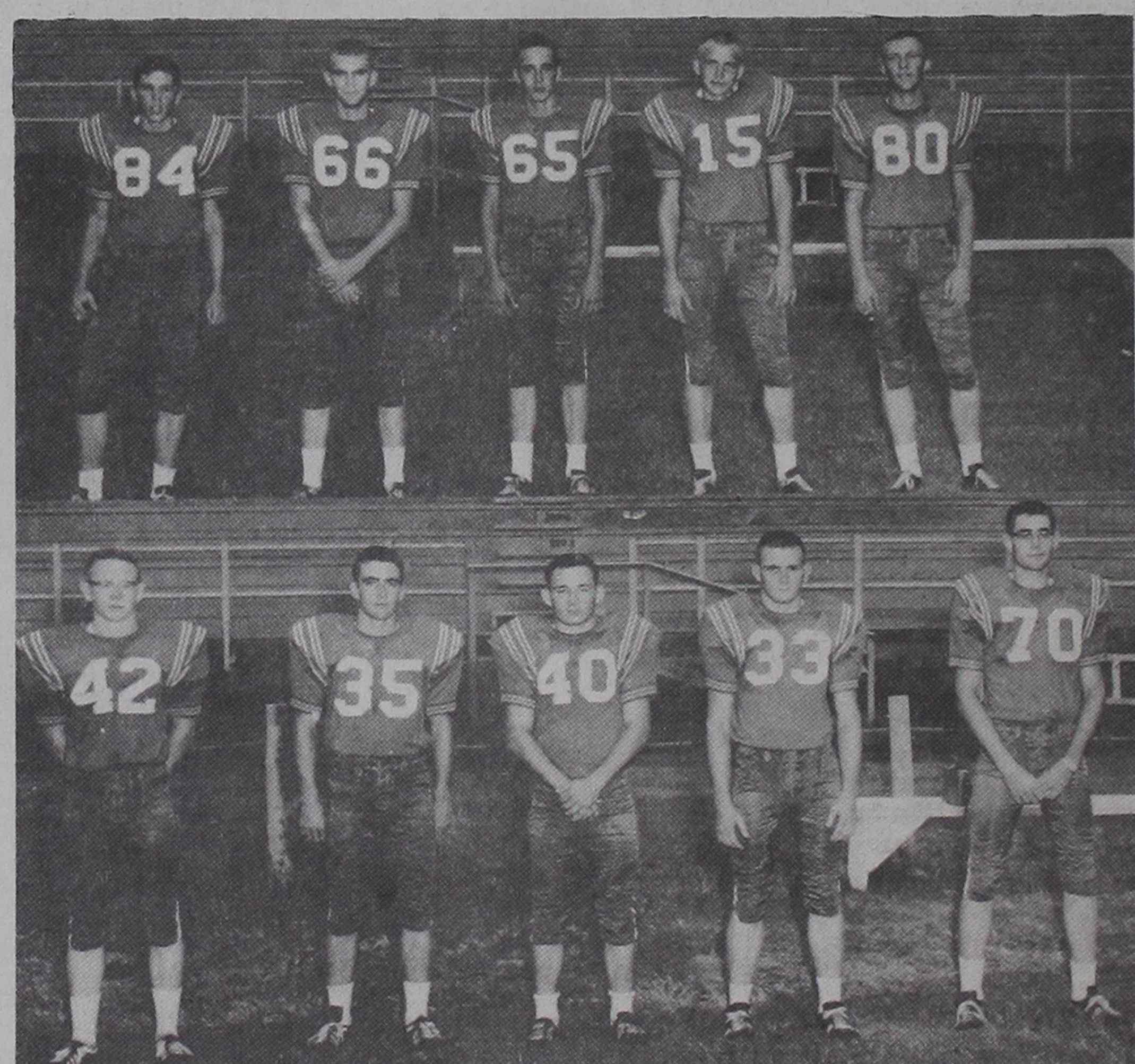

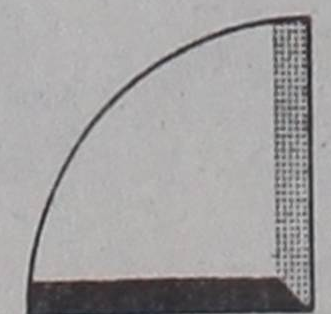

Lazbuddie School Offers Industrial Technology Class

Lazbuddie is one of few schools in this area now offering industrial technology courses to its students, and it is the only school in a wide area that has this program of study set up to begin with junior high school and continue through graduation.

Mark Scisson is the industrial tech instructor at Lazbuddie. He is beginning his fourth year as a teacher, and he said that the program has changed dramatically in the short time since he received his degree. He has attended numerous workshops and has updated his college training in order to effectively teach the modernized program.

Scisson commented that he is very proud of Lazbuddie's industrial technology program and of the importance that it receives in the total school curriculum there. "The new program is designed to interface with math, science, and social studies," he said. "It is not just woodworking, anymore. Although building projects in wood is still our major emphasis, we now expose our students to a wide range of interrelated fields of study, all of which will be very practical and useful in the future."

Texas industrial tech courses are based on a "hands on, learn by doing" approach. Students may select to study high technology areas such as computer application in drafting, using computer assisted equipment to make working drawings. Computer-aided drafting will be used in all future jobs in industry and manufacturing. Or students may be interested in robotics which include assembly-line manipulation of materials by small programmed industrial robots to locate, place, or distribute needed items.

Industrial tech courses also may

include communications activities and research and development in energy studies with construction of models of solar, wind, and other devices that conserve resources.

Industrial technology in high school has adapted to a more technological approach to manufacturing and industry. Lazbuddie has made every effort to provide students with the most modern industrial technology department possible. The school has purchased a new computer and software for computer-aided drafting. Scisson said that he will use this extensively this year, teaching each student how to create a 3-D, computer-drafted plan before each new project. In other words, students will decide on a project, make a computer draft, and then build it, using the most advanced tools—from the idea to the completed project.

Students at Lazbuddie, grades 7-12, will be able to enroll in a number of different technology courses, from Tech Systems, which will explore all areas, to specific courses of interest, such as Manufacturing Graphics (drafting) and Productions Systems.

Scisson said that he plans to have more group projects this year. He said that the junior high students may design and build a space station because there is a lot of emphasis on space projects in the new state industrial tech program. He plans to have some of the older groups work together to design and build a storage building or greenhouse. The senior group will do a scale model of a "dream house" and a bridge that will actually be tested for weight capacity. He said that these group activities will be in addition to individual woodworking projects. He commented that he was very proud of the individual projects

that students did last year.

Scisson said that he will apply for student membership in the Technological Students Association so that Lazbuddie may enter projects for regional competition, with a chance to go to state. He said that he attended the regional show last year and felt that his students, even the junior high students, would have done well there.

"I am excited about what's

happening in this field," said Scisson. "I encourage students to enroll in technology education. It can be a very rewarding experience and at the same time, will prepare the students to be productive citizens of tomorrow. We explore many interesting areas, and yet, this is still vocational training, and a 'learn by doing' experience. It is still very enjoyable and creative—perhaps more so because it is very applicable for our times."

Violinist Featured At Hereford Mon.

Renowned violinist Robert McDuffie will be featured in the first concert of the season sponsored by Hereford Community Concert Association. The event will be held Monday, October 3 at 8 p.m. in the Hereford High School auditorium, and membership cards are required.

McDuffie's highly personalized playing has won him a favored position among both audiences and critics. Martin Bernheimer of the *Los Angeles Times* called the violinist "spectacularly gifted" going on to describe how "McDuffie flew over the hurdles with invariably sweet and slender tone, with razor-sharp precision, with impeccable rhythmic punch. This was fiddling of the highest order."

Devoting as much of his concert season to concerto appearances as to the recital stage, McDuffie has an enormous repertoire, which feature several contemporary works. His orchestral engagements have included concerts with the Chicago Symphony, Atlanta Symphony, Baltimore Symphony, St. Louis Symphony, Cincinnati Symphony, Calgary Philharmonic, San Diego Symphony and Pasadena Symphony, and such foreign orchestras as the Czech Philharmonic and Danish State Radio Orchestra.

The 1988-89 concert season finds Mr. McDuffie on a European tour, appearing as guest soloist (Mendelssohn concerto and Bach Double Concerto) with the Netherlands Chamber Orchestra under conductor Yehudi Menuhin, which includes prestigious festivals of Switzerland, Italy and Holland.

He is scheduled to perform and record his first disc for Angel Records, with the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra and Leonard Slatkin.

McDuffie was soloist with the Czech Philharmonic in the Dvorak Violin Concerto during the Orchestra's recent North American tour. He has been heard in recital throughout the U.S. and Canada and was featured as guest soloist with the Danish National Orchestra, on their U.S. tour under Sixten Ehrling, in the Mendelssohn Concerto.

He has toured Greece as guest soloist with the American Symphony Orchestra, including appearances at the Athens Festival, and has toured the Soviet Union. He has also performed with Brazil's State Orchestra of San Paulo under conductor Eleazar de Carvalho, returning to South America repeatedly over the past several seasons.

An artist with an unusually diverse repertoire, McDuffie gave the world premiere of American composer David Diamond's Second Violin Sonata, written for and dedicated to Robert McDuffie, at the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C. (He has recorded both of the composer's violin/piano sonatas for Grenadilla.)

Louis Abeyta punted three times for a 34-yard average. Rocha had one pass completion, to Chris Hamil, for 20 yards.

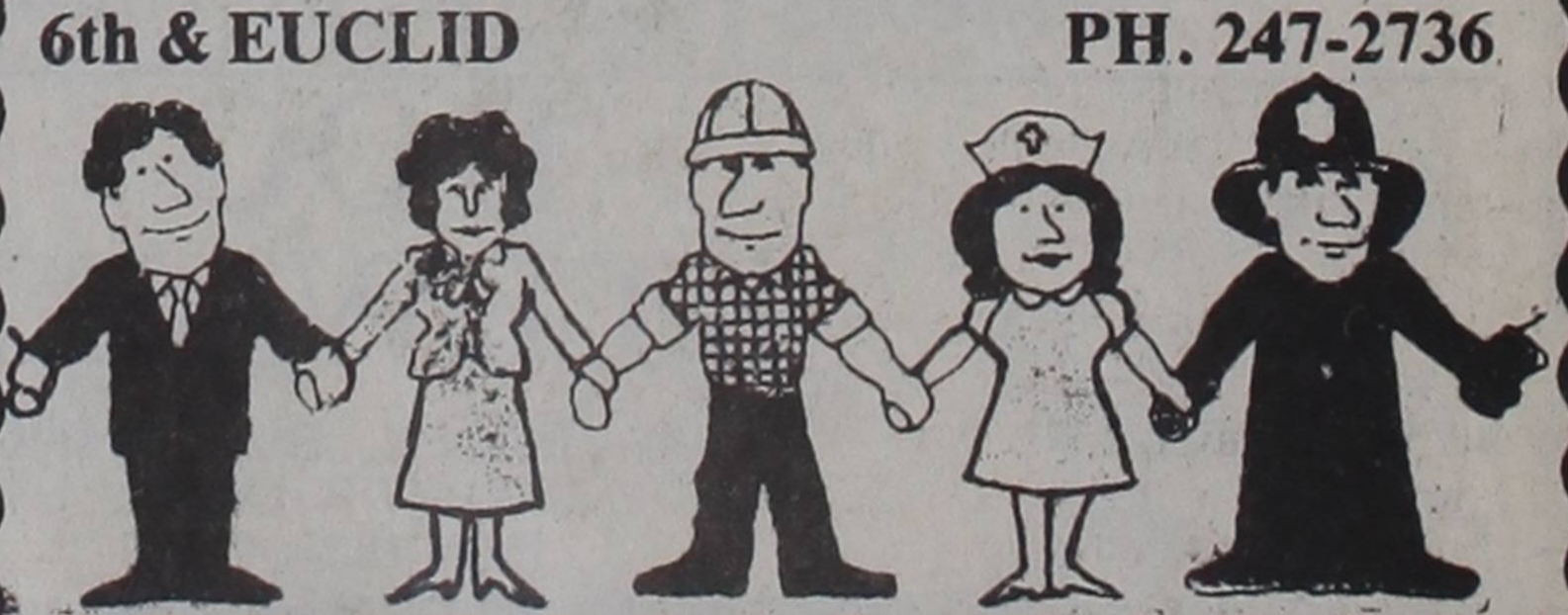

He has utilized structures such as low pressure center pivot systems, underground pipeline and surge irrigation methods in conjunction with management practices such as furrow diking, contour farming and crop residue management to make the most of rainfall and irrigation water.

These same practices also are effective in controlling wind and water erosion.

On land that is not suitable for cultivation, such as a lake bottom, Mark has found that this land is better suited to remain in native

vegetation for erosion control. This type of cover is also the ideal situation for upland game birds.

Craig To Head Parmer Co. Bee

For the 41st year, West Texas State University in Canyon and the Amarillo Globe-News will again sponsor the National Spelling Bee for young students in the area.

Named as director for Parmer County is James Craig, principal of Farwell School.

The director will coordinate the Bee program with the private and public schools and select a date for the county competition.

The Amarillo Globe-News requests that each county finalist be named by March 18, 1989.

The Scripps-Howard National Spelling Bee rules allow any student who will not be in a grade higher than the eighth or older than 16 by the end of the current school term to enter the contest.

Additional information is available from the county bee director.

There are two levels of competition.

A Junior Bee is for students in the fifth and lower grades. In previous years, the Junior Bee included the sixth grade students, but with the middle school concept, the sixth graders are now to be included in the Senior level, which also includes grades seven and eight.

The Junior Bee primarily serves as an introduction to the program. Junior county winners do not compete in regional unless they win the Senior county title. In some cases, directors combine the two levels of competition and choose only one county champion.

Each senior winner will compete in the AGN-WTSU area contest on the university's campus on April 15. The top winner in that event will be given an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. for the speller to represent the district in the 1989 national contest. The trip is for two, courtesy of the Amarillo newspaper.

The Junior winner and Senior winner from each county will be guests of the sponsors at a Bee luncheon in Canyon preceding the afternoon competition.

Copies of the study book, "Words of the Champions," are available from Jeane Bartlett, bee editor of the Amarillo Globe-News, at fifty cents each.

Parts of the Texas Panhandle, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas are included in the AGN-WTSU district. Forty-six counties will be represented in the 1989 regional bee in April.

Good Year For Grass In County

This has been a good year for grass in Parmer County, according to John Fancher of the Soil Conservation Service in Friona. Grass seed production has been very good on one year old and older plantings. The abundant rainfall this summer has really provided excellent conditions for grass growth and development.

"A lot of people believe that CRP land should look like a golf course—short grass! A lot of the grass that has been planted such as Kleingrass, green sprangletop and yellow bluestem, are grasses

that can easily be waist tall or higher," Fancher said. "These types of grasses can't be kept short or they will disappear. That will defeat one of the objectives of the CRP program, which is erosion control."

CRP land with weeds that will blow off and cause off-site damage will be shredded before frost. "Reluctance to do timely weed control means that grass establishment can be delayed for years. This can translate to money out of your pocket for quite some time," Fancher said. "I have been watching many acres of CRP land and timely weed control is the key."

There have been seven CRP sign-ups since the beginning of the program. In two sign-ups this year, there were 34 new contracts for 4,548.1 acres. The total for Parmer County now stands at 215 contracts for 46,280 acres, of which 37,007 acres have been planted with 9,273 acres to be planted in 1989 and 1990.

4-H News

No one can question the fact that young people are the future of America, and the 4-H program is continuing to play a vital role in preparing youth for the future by providing training in leadership, citizenship and coping skills.

Thus the theme of the upcoming National 4-H Week October 2-8, "4-H for Youth for America," points to this country's richest resources, its young people.

H.T. Davison, assistant director for 4-H and youth programs with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, says, "Through 4-H we try to provide youth with opportunities to learn and experience what life has to offer." The Extension Service is the parent organization of the 4-H program, an informal, out-of-school educational program for youth from the third grade to 19 years of age.

"We also lay the groundwork to help 4-H members explore opportunities for personal growth and to gain skills that will be useful in later life," Davison said. "In addition, 4-H helps youth to deal with stress and self-esteem and to learn to help others. We like to say that 4-H takes up where school leaves off. We offer experiential education."

Texas boasts some 388,000 4-H members, Parmer County having 200 of those members. Nationwide, 4-H is more than 4.5 million members strong and is the nation's largest youth organization. More 4-H members today live in suburbs and cities of more than 50,000 population.

Recent research shows that former 4-H'ers are more likely to assume community leadership, political and other citizenship roles than people who participated in other youth organizations. 4-H membership teaches youth that the community and giving to the community are important.

Vital to the 4-H program are volunteer leaders. Volunteer leaders are the backbone of the 4-H program as they provide the organizational leadership for local 4-H clubs as well as training and resources in a host of subject-matter areas.

Almost 620,000 volunteer leaders support the 4-H program nationwide, with more than 30,000 of those in Texas. The time, travel and support contributed by these volunteer leaders across the U.S. is estimated to have a value of more than \$1 billion a year.

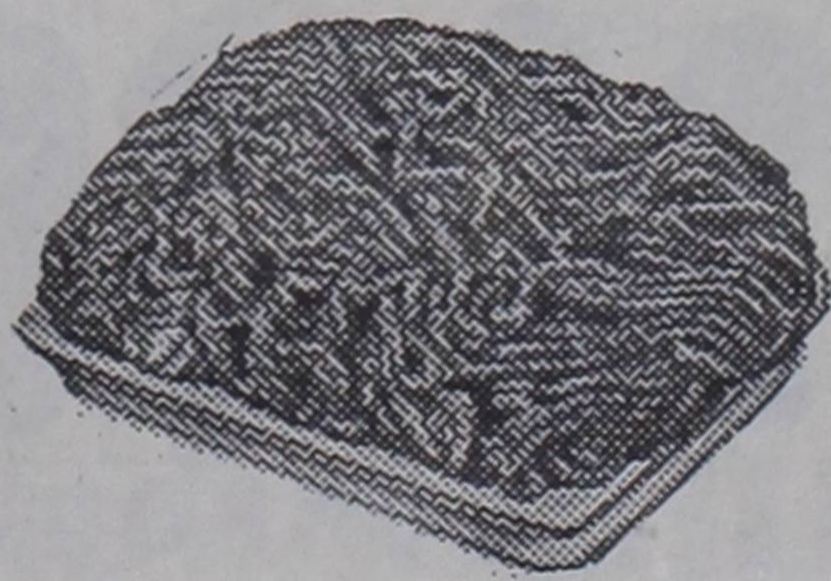

Second-Half Rally Pushes DHS To Win

The underdog Friona High School Chieftains carried the fight to the unbeaten Dalhart Wolves at Dalhart's Homecoming game last Friday night, before dropping a 21-6 decision.

For the second time this season, the Chieftains outplayed and outgained a team from District 1-AAA, playing on the road in both instances, only to lose on the scoreboard.

The Chieftains had a little consolation, finally scoring their first touchdown of the season.

However, it was inability to score when they got down in close situations that cost the Chieftains. Friona had the ball twice in scoring range in the first half, and turned the ball over to Dalhart both times after missing by a yard or less in making a first down.

The Chieftains came out fired up. Cody Burney hit Andre Duran with a 16-yard pass on the opening drive.

Later, Ben Osborn gained a first down and Burney ran a quarterback sneak on third down for another. Osborn ran three yards to the Dalhart 24 as the drive continued.

However, the Chieftains, who have been their own worst enemies on scoring drives, jumped offsidies at the 16, and this eventually cost them. On fourth down, Osborn was stopped for only a yard gained, and Dalhart took over on their own 14.

Late in the second quarter, Friona had to punt, and after Duran's kick backed the Wolves up to their own 12, they got a big break when the Wolves fumbled.

Osborn gained one, Duran five and Osborn two, and then Osborn was stopped a foot short on the fourth down try and this time the team turned the ball over at the home team's six-yard line.

Halftime found the teams scoreless, with the Chiefs dominating play.

Friona, which received the kickoff to start both halves,

couldn't move to begin the third quarter.

Dalhart finally got a drive going, and helped by a 36-yard pass play moved to the Chieftain five. Dalhart got good field position after rushing a Duran punt and forcing a short kick.

The Wolves finally scored with 2:12 left in the quarter to take a 7-0 lead.

Dalhart was facing fourth and 11 from the Friona 23 when the third quarter ended.

The Wolves lined up in field goal formation, but after a low snap, Dalhart threw a pass that carried down to the Friona one-yard line. They scored on the next play and opened their lead to 14-0.

Friona's bad luck continued when the Chieftains fumbled the kickoff and the Wolves were back in business at the Friona 23.

Only three plays later Mike Johnson went in from three yards out and the kick gave Dalhart a 21-0 lead.

Burney hit receiver Chuck Sutter over the middle with a pass. Sutter juggled the ball, but controlled it and shook off a couple of tacklers to make a nice 31-yard gain, Friona's longest gain of the night.

(The Chieftains had a 36-yard pass play, Burney to Jackie Lafuente, called back for offensive pass interference, on a call that Friona fans felt was very controversial, in the first quarter.)

Osborn then ran 17 yards for his biggest gain of the game to advance to the Dalhart 24. But Duran fumbled on the next play to stymie the drive.

The Chieftains, whose scoring drives had self-destructed all season long, finally ran one to completion on their next-to-last possession.

Duran atoned for his fumble by returning a Dalhart punt 17 yards to the Wolves' 28.

Burney hit Sutter for nine yards and a first down to the Dalhart 16. Osborn crashed for a first down and goal at the Wolves' one, and

then cracked the goal-line on the next play.

The FHS score came with 4:34 left on the clock. Burney's PAT kick was deflected, leaving the final score at 21-6.

Friona had one last threat when Burney hit Sutter again for a 17-yard gainer to the Dalhart 38, but the Chiefs could not advance further.

Friona led in first downs, 15-12, and in total yardage, 260-225. But the school's "jinx" at Dalhart continued. FHS has never beaten the Wolves on their home turf.

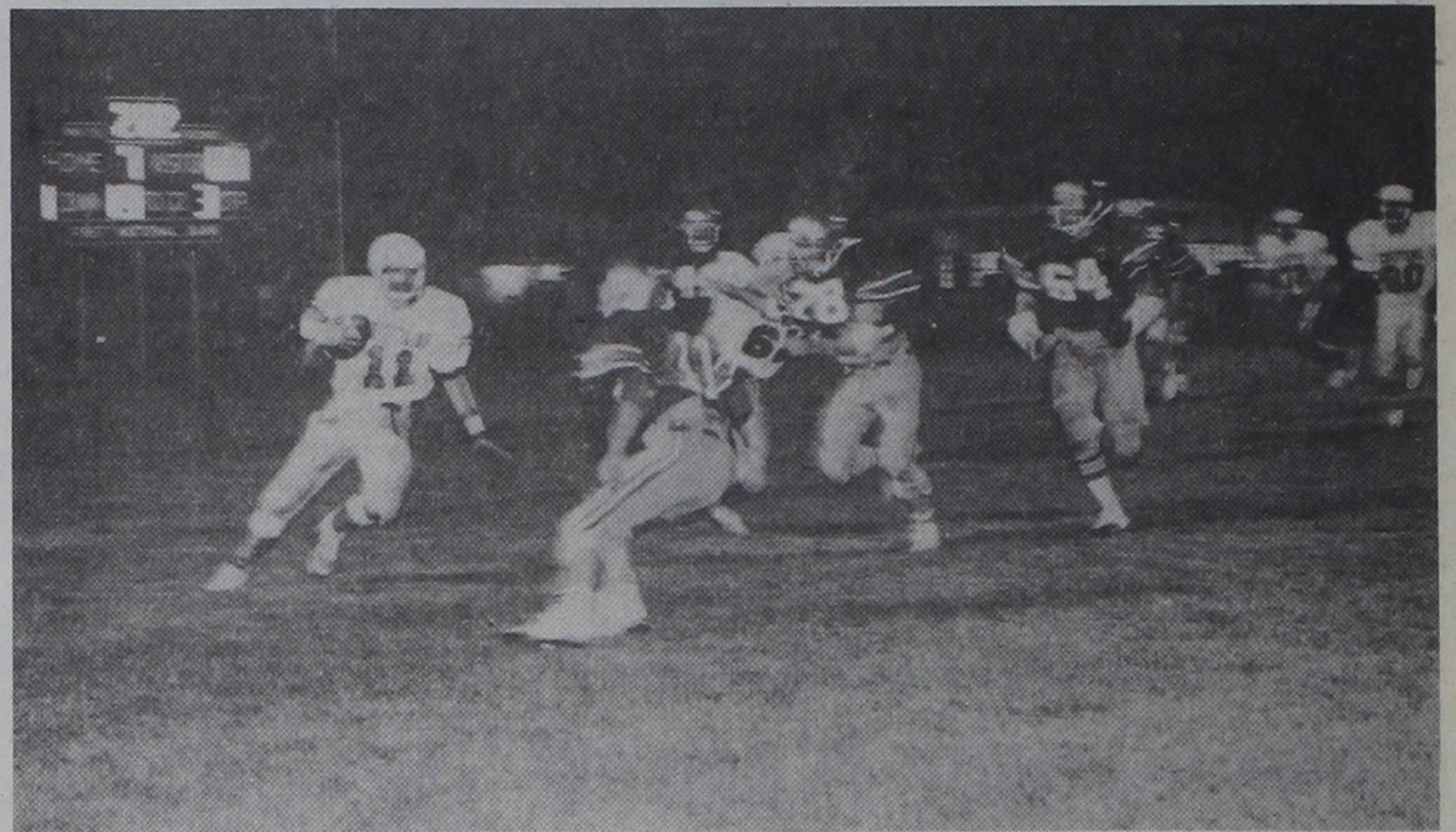

"If we can get our players back in the lineup, we still could give our district opponents a run for it," Moss said.

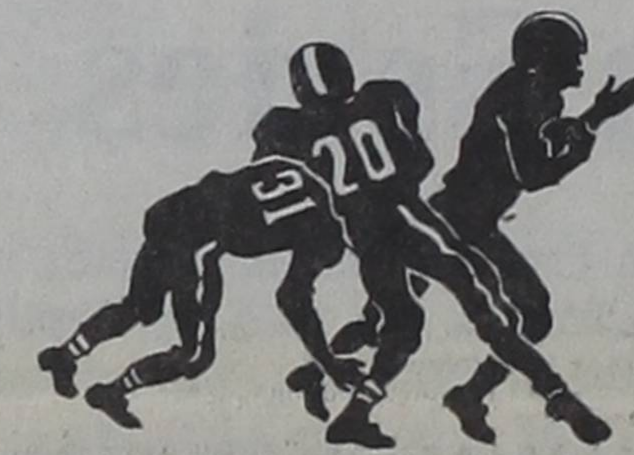
Senior lineman Dempsey Jordan underwent knee surgery this week, marking the end of his football career.

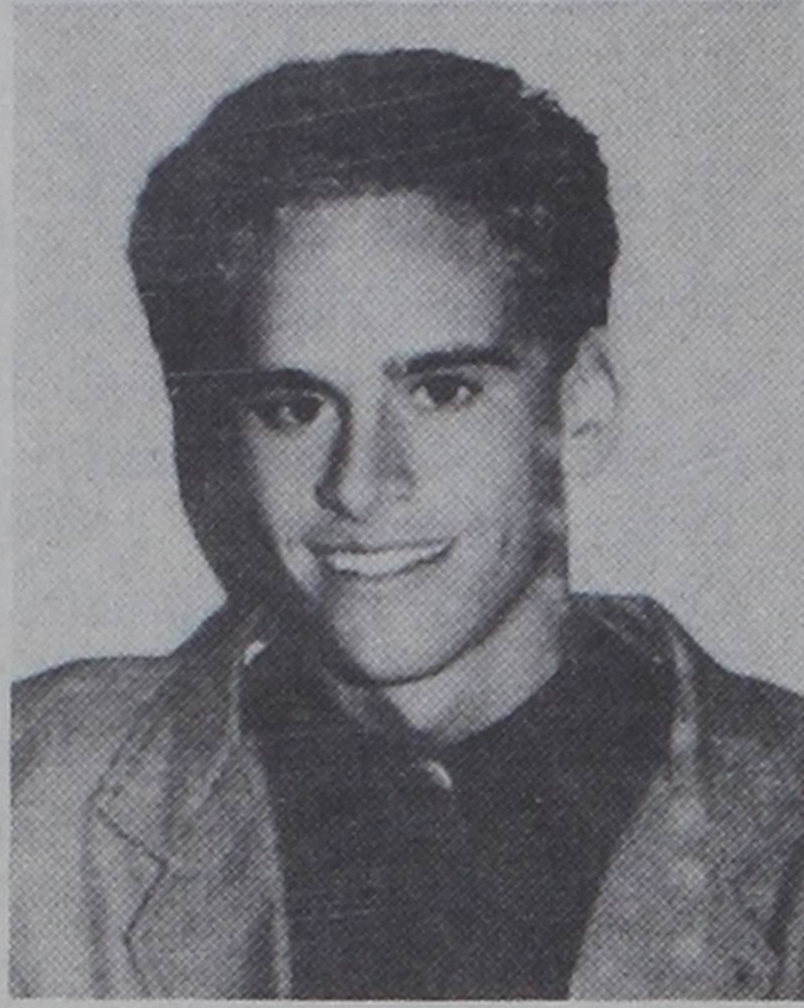

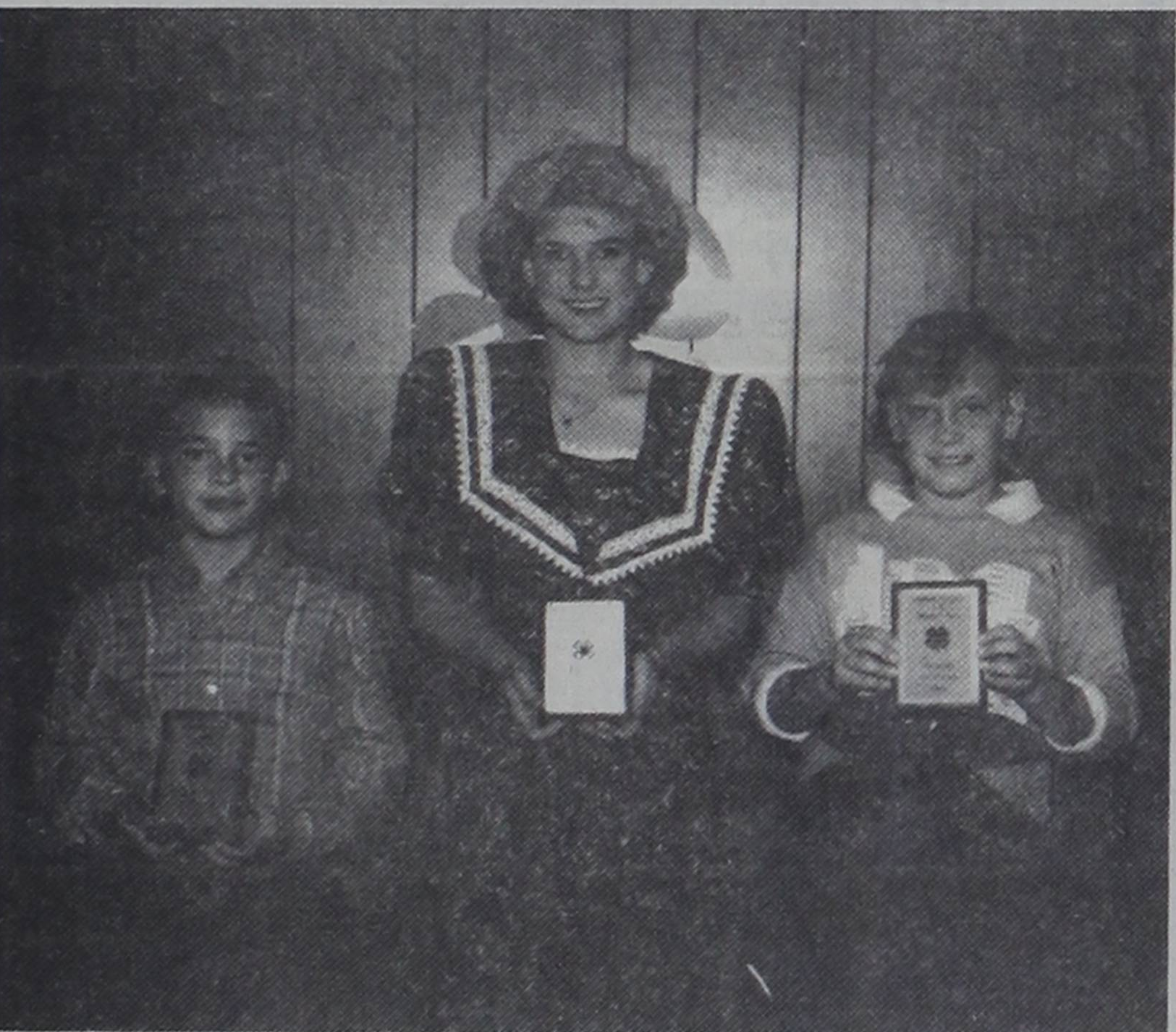

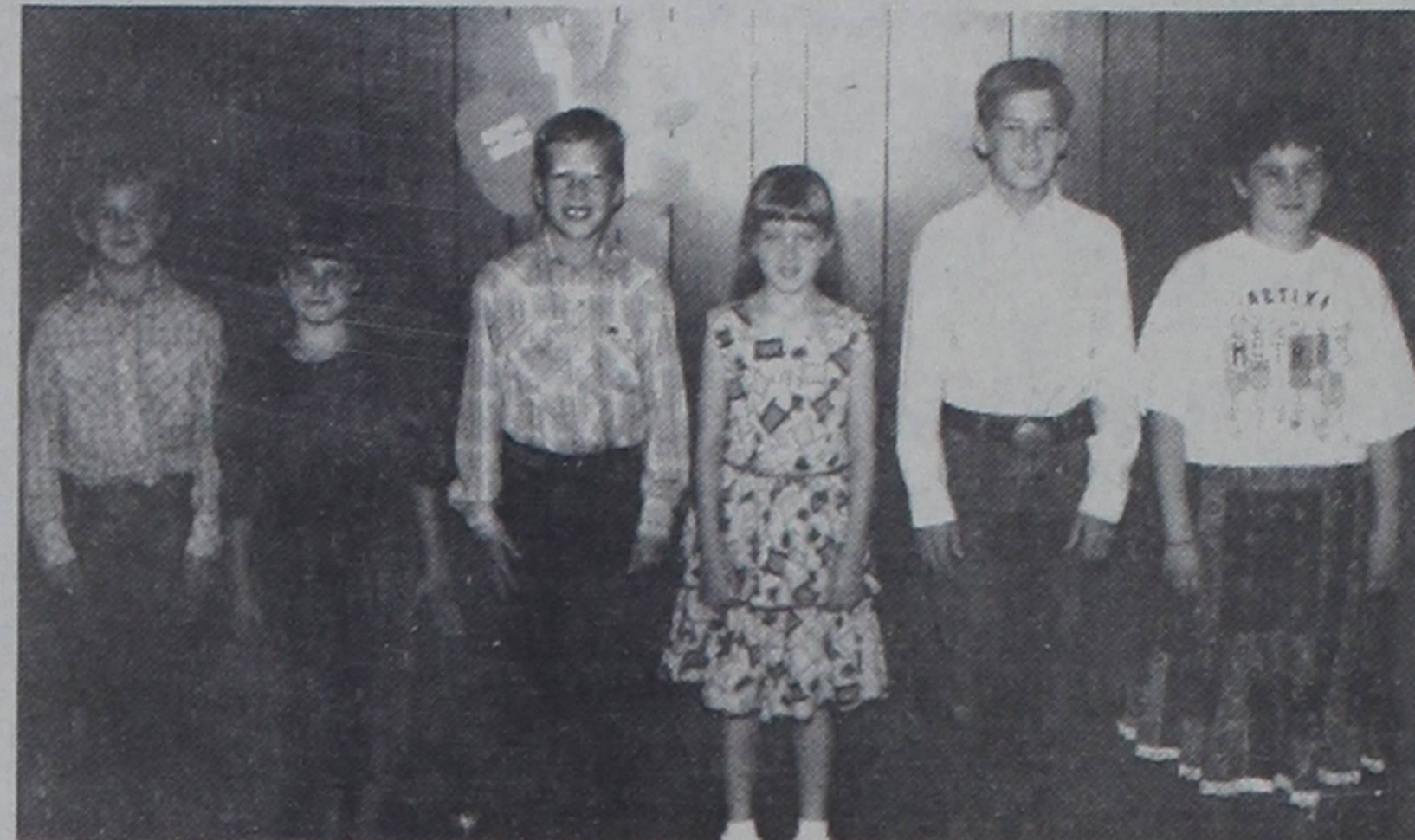
