NEW ORLEANS, L., Feb. 2:-A elic of the gays when the Old South was at the height of its prosperity is about to be swallowed up in the march of progress down the Mississippi Val-

ane historical old Ackland plantation near here-one of the largest estates of the Old South-has been acquired by the State of Louisiana and will be broken up for use in connection with the state convict farm sys-

The plantations are a part of an immense estate acquired by the Ackland family during the early part of the nineteenth century. The estate of this aristocratic old Southern family extended for miles up and down the Mississippi and took in thousands of

acres where bustling towns now stand. The lands surround the "Lake of th Cross" where, legend has it, the explorer La Salle and his priests first planted their banners and claimed Louisiana for "His gracious Majesty, the King of France." They were owned by Colonel J. A. S. Ackland, whose name was known the length of the Mississippi as a symbol of openheart-

ed hospitality. With the acquisition of the planta ton by Louisiana, teh last piece of property has passed from the hands of one of the wealthtest land owners in North America. In addition to the Louisiana plantations, the Acklands owned extensive properties in other parts of the South, including a huge ranch near Matagorda Bay, Texas, and an immense stock farm near Gallatin, Me.

Built A Palace.

In 1855, Colonel Ackland, becoming dis-art-clock with his home in Louisi ana, determined to build for his family a mansion that should be the most palatial residence in America. A few miles outside of Nashville, Tennessee, on a site of great natural beauty he gathered the finest artisans of the world, to plan his manston. For over pleted the home which he named To furnish this house he scoured the old world and brought to

America many art treasures. The fame of the magnificent dwelling spread even to Europe. Many travelers went out of their way to visit the mansion. Its ballroom, art galleries and seven conservatories were the marvel of the nineteenth cen-

tury architecture. After the deaths of Colonel and Mrs. Ackland, the mansion passed from one Ackland, the manner thanks into posession of a syndicate which converted it into the now flourishing Ward-Beimont College for women.

Helples, Without Slaves

The decline of the Ackland fortunes, which culminated in the transfer to Louisiana of the Ackland plantations. Without the help of his 1,100 slaves who had been freed, Colonel Ackland was unable to carry on the work of his immense plantation and it fell in-

to decay. The embankments which protected the lands from the overflow of the Mississippi river crumbled and allowed the flood waters to sweep the plantation. The drainage canals clogged, permitting the lowland to remain under water

With the advent of the boll weevil and other cotton posts the culture of cotton became so precarious that the land ceased to yield an income and

1 cup prunes cut in small pieces. 1 1-2 cups water.

3 tablespoons sugar. 1.2 teaspoon ground cinnamon, 2 tablespoons current jelly.

Juice 1-2 orange. Boil together the prunes, water, sugar and cinnamon until the prunes are soft, then add the jelly and orange Juice while still hot, and let stand until cold. One-fourth cup of butter is

Spiced Prune Preserves

After soaking dried prunes from 4 to 6 hours or overhight, using 2 pints of water to each pound of prunes, the water should be drained off. In it should be put, for each two pounds of prunes, 1 pound of sugar, 1-2 cup of vinegar, 1 teaspoonfull of cinnamon, 1 teaspoonful allspice and 1 teaspoonful cloves. Put the spices in a bag or cloth Boil all together without the prunes for 15 or 20 minutes, until sirupy, then add prunes, and cook slowly about 20 minutes.

Prune and Date Jam.

1 pound prunes. 1 pound dates.

Juice from 1-2 lemon. 1-4 cup sugar.

Cook prunes until tender in a small amount of water. Remove stones and add dates, stoned and cooked, also in very little water. Add lemon and sugar. Cook the mixture until thick. In the same way prunes may be combined with figs.

When we strike at advertising, meaning, of course, efficiently applied advertising, we are striking at salesmanship and the heart of business. For the banker to do anything to retard business right now is suicide.

When the merchant pulls down his shingle and waits for business to come to him in a buyers' market, we laugh at him, and call him a poor business man.

When he is forced to cut down one of his best methods of selling because his banker considers advertising an unnecessary item of expense and refuses an otherwise deserved loan purely on that principle, it is my humble opinion that we should laugh at the banker, and feel sorry for the merchant.

Don't mistake my meaning. It is a basic banking principle that a loan must be well secured, and a firm cannot borrow merely because it is a big and successful advertiser. But the fact that it is a believer in advertising and wants to use a portion of the money for that purpose should never stand in its way when it calls on the Bank's credit department.





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
