IS A VERY LARGE CORPORATION

Marks End of a Three-Year Endeavor Of Mayor George Sheppard to Sell

There is now no doubt that Sweetwater will have a gypsum mill, according to Mayor George Sheppard, who has been in close touch with the United States Gypsum Company, of Chi-cago, ever since he sold them Sweet-

water, three years ago.

Formal announcement from headquarters concerning the size of the plant to be built here and as to when it will be constructed, have yet to be received, but this is believed to be

only a short time away.

Finally acreage containing a large deposit of gypsum near the intersec-tion of the Texas & Pacific and Santa Fe railways was found and purchased by this corporation.

Then came the slump in business which, of course, affected the U.S. Gypsum Company as it did everybody else, and everything was permitted to

Coke Fiends Use Approximately \$60,-000,000 Worth In Paris Each Year-Use lucreasing.

By JOHN O'BRIEN (United Press Staff Correspondent) PARIS, Feb. 13. — "Coke fiends" and other drug addicts spent approxi mately \$60,000,000 in Paris alone last year in pursuit of the elusive intoxica-

tion that brings madness and death

in its train. And the traffic is flourishing, in spite of redoubled police efforts and the passage last summer of a law prescribing banishment for five years from France on conviction and jail sentence for dealing in the prohibited

This estimate is based on official figures just issued by the Bureau of Judicial Research compiled for communication to the Leagupe of Nations whic his directing the international fight against the sale of drugs. Dur-ing the year 1922 the "drug squad" of the Paris police department arrested 314 persons on charges of being engaged in the illicit traffic. In the period they seized 106 pounds of opium, 2 1-2 pounds haschish, 50


