burglaries of stores occur at night. A motor vehicle theft is committed in this country every 30 seconds. For every 100 cars
reported stolen, only 15 suspects reported stolen, onl
are usually arrested.
Professional auto theft rings are
responsible for most of the thefts responsible for most of the thefts
of expensive cars. But they are not the only hazards. Owners of inexpensive cars can be ripped off
by drug users who plan to re-sell by drug users who plan to re-sell
parts, such as tires or stereos, for parts, such
quick cash.
If your car is stolen by a juvenile
ioyrider, you have about a $50-50$ joyrider, you have about a $50-50$
chance of getting it back, according to the National Automobile Theft Bureau, but any
valuables inside your car will, most valuables
likely, be missing when you get it An estimated 20,000 hot cars
cross our southern border into cross our southern border into
Mexico every year. Officials in half of these vehicles every year. The remaining 10,000
disappear without a trace. Auto theft is a growth industry,
increasing each year by more tha increasing each year by more than
three per cent. A car thief can earn three per cent. A car thief can earn
up to $\$ 100,000$ a year stealing autos according to the Chicago
Crime Commission. The insurance industry gets
stuck with the bill for most of this type of crime. But the victims in the long run are the car owners and
policy holders, whose premiums will be raised to cover the losses.

phony claims run around $\$ 600$ million.
Your car or its contents have a one-in-five chance of becoming a target of theft sometime during the
