Major League Teams Begin Training For the Long Championship Grind In The Cities Of The South.

INTEREST CENTERS ON N. Y.

Other Teams Expected to Give Them Strong Competition For Flag-Mc-Graw Spends Money For Men.

By The Associated Press. NEW YORK, Feb .26,—Heralding the approach of spring and anotehr diamond campaign, advance caravans of nearly all of the sixteen major league baseball clubs now are on their way south for the annual conditioning

process. The rivalry for regular berths prom ises to be especially keen among several clubs going through a marked process of reorganization, including the Cleveland and Boston Americans, and the Brooklyn, Chicago, and St.

Louis Nationals. Interest among the fans is centered largely in the prospects of the New York Giants and Yankees repeating their triumphs of the past two seasons in the face of increasing strength among several their more

gerous rivals. Both pilots declare their teams will be decidedly stronger, although they plan relatively little rebuilding. The Pittsburgh Pirates, in McGraw's opinion. loom as the club the Giants must eliminate to stay at the top of the heap, while the Yankee leader expects his strongest battle from Ty Cobb's Detroit Tigers. Cincinnati, in the National and St. Louis in the American, are picked as the net strongest contenders by the metropolitan club

McGraw has announced that he will stand pat on his 1922 championship line-up, with the possible exception of centerfield, devoting most of his attention to bolstering weaknesses in the pitching staff which nearly cost his club the pennant last season. Jim my O'Connell, \$75,000 "Phenom" from San Frachisco, is expected to fill the berth in midfield.

Jack Bentley, another expensive ac quisition, is expected to add considerable strength to the pitching corps.





Judge Bean Has Some Unique And Distinctive Ideas About Law Enforcement In the Trans-Pecos.

Special to The Reporter.

DALLAS, Feb. 26 .- "Judge" Roy Bean i sone of the legendary figures of the odl Texas-the Texas of gun piay and law made on the spur of the moment and enforced by any one who had the nerve and the shooting ability ability to "make it stick."

A lot of people questioned whether there ever was such a man. But a picture and a tattered note book redid live and hold his court and get away with his decisions.

Judge Bean presided in what was then Vinegarron, along in the virgin days of the present century. The judge's sign, over a saloon, "Law West of the Pecos". The Pecos te it known, is one of the big rivers of Texas. "West of the Peços" in tho those days meant about the same thing as no law and mighty little civtilzation.

The picture shows Bean seated on a beer keg on the porch of his saloon, a whiskey jug at hi saide, and a volume of "Statutes of Texas" before him. He wrote his rulings in a notebook, which ha sbeen preserved. Here was one of them:

"Rewl-In all kinds of gains, from poekr to highway robbery, everybody caught bluffing loses, Another one in the case of a cow-

boy shooting a Chinese "There ain't no law against killing aChinyman. The law is against killing a reasonable being and a Chinyman ain't a reasonable being, but

nothing but a chinyman. Fined A Dead Man. Bean once fined a dead man \$40. The body was found under a trestle. It was taken before the "Judge", who found \$40 and a pistol on it. Bean fined the body \$40 for carrying a pis-

### tol and calmly collected it. Lily Langtry, famous actress, pass ed over the Southern Pacific from San Francisco to New Orleans. When she stopped at the "Judge's town it

.was named Vinegarron, but when she left it's name was Langtry—the "Judge" had fallen for Lily.

"Judge" Bean's decisions were us ually final, and only on matter in which his authority was questioned wa srecalled. He had marired a number of couples, and divorced a few Aregularly constituted court rebuked him for granting divorces. Bean's answer was that if it was wrong for him to grant divorces, it was wrong for him to marry folk, so he guessed he hed a right to correct his own mistakes.

The march of civilization eventual ly reached Langtry and Bean adjourned his court, moving to San Antonio, where eh died in 1911.




