HARDING WILL GO **BEFORE PEOPLE**

; To Appeal Direct for Support On His Court of International Justice To Country At Large.

SENATE GAVE IT COLD SHOULDER

Says This Country Should Participate In Foreign Relations As This Court Would Provide.

WASHINGTON, MAR., 5- President Harding today asked the American people tosupport his efforts to secure the American entrance in to the permanent Court of International Justice.

In a letter to Lt. Governor Earl D. Boom of Ohio, in response to a resolution of the ObioAssembly commending his stand for American participation in the court, the nations chief executive indicated his intendion of an attempt to swing American public opinion overwhelmingly in favor of such a step during the Congressional recess.

"It is inconcieveable to me that the American people so long devoted to this ideal should refuse adherence now to such a program as is reprecented by this tribunal." the president wrote.

"I felt that the adhesion of the count ry to the program and purposes of the Court of International Justice would at \$76,178.48. according to the figures in toward the assumption of relationrt compiled by Fire Marshal ships to international affairs which should be born by such a country as our own".

Gas Was Being Used to Rid Chicago Restaurant of Rate And Cockroaches And Other Vermin

Dead Represent Three Generations of One Family-Many Others En-dangered Living Upstains.


By The United Press. CHICAGO, Mar. 5 .- Six persons were killed and the lives of scores of others were endangered as a gas used to rid a restaurant of rats and cockroaches escaped into living apartments above.

The fumigation was under the direction of C. W. Hull, a former inmate of the Dunning Insane Asylum, who represented himself as the head of the National Hygienic Corporation of Buffalo. He was held for questioning. The dead represented three generations of one family.







In a material way, the location of this new Technological college in any city in West Texas, should mean in the ordinary course of events that the city so favored will be the largest city in the west in just a few yars' timea city of tall buildings, street cars, and a business life greatly enhanced.

Now For The College

But it means more than that. For just as the new college will stimulate the buusiness life, it will too a far greater extent stimulate the culture and refinement of the city wherein it is located. The religious, musical, artistic, literary life of the favored city will be such as to appeal to the finest sensibilities of everyone.

The competition is going to be keen. In fact, it would be a serious reflection upon any city in West Texas were they not after the college with all that is in them.

That means that Sweetwater. If she stays in the race, has got to exert herself to the very utmost-never at any time letting the interest die, not even for one moment,
