House Votes 71 to 34 Not to Permit Teaching of Evolution as a Fact In The Public Schools.

HOUSE OVERRIDES THE VETO

Passes District Court Bill-Salaries In House Cut From \$5 to \$2 Per Diem Beginning Friday.

By The United Press. AUSTIN , Mar. 9-The Stroder bill prohibiting the teaching of evolution as a fact in the public schools was passed by the House today

OVERRIDE VETO

AUSTIN, Mar. 9-By a vote of 83 to 27 the House today passed over Governor Neff's veto the bill creating a new District Court for Hall, Childress, Collinsworth and Donley Counties.

Heavier Buying Pushing Up Price-Larger Demand From Domestic Mills In Full Operation.

Rather active buying pushed up the quotations on cotton during the last week, according to Sunday's issue of the New York Times, which carries the following item relating to the cotton industry:

"Back of all the speculative activity was the fact of the larger demand from the domestic mills which are operating at full speed. The Census Bureau's report, issued the mobile skidded from the road and up other day, showed that 35,240,853 spindles-a record number-were in operation during January and that the consumption of cotton during that month was 610,375 bales of lint and 49,804 bales of linters. The * spindle hours were over a billion in excess of those of December. In connection with the prospects of this year's cotton crop, the prediction is made that it will be at least 12.000,-000 bales. This is based on the preparations being made for increased acreage to be planted and on the efforts to combat the boll weevil, to-G. E.
