# CYCLONE HITS AMATING IN MISSISSIPPI

Many Deaths And Injuries Reported From Save, Mississippi When Cyclone Wrecks Damage.

### STORM AND SNOW WAS GENERAL

Panhandle Hit By Young Blizzard-Thermomet . Drops to 24 Degrees In Sweetwater On Thursday.

By The United Press. MEMPHIS. Mar. 16 .- The town of Save, Miss., was leveled by a cyclone which struck there during the night, according to refugees who reached here today. Numbers of people are missing and a score are injured, according to one of the refusees.

# STORMS SEVERE.

By The United Press KANSAS CITY, Mar. 16.—High

winds, snow and freezing temperature were reported today from various sections of the South and Southwest.

The brunt of the storm, which came out of the north, struck Mississippi where winds caused heavy property damage and serious injury to a number of persons.

Snow was general through Colorado to Arkansas and from Nebraska to Texas.

A near blizzard was reported in the Panhandle with low temperatures in many parts of Texas.



The site that has been settled upon comes within a mile of the east limits of Roscoe and extends to within a mile and a half of the west limits of Sweet. water. This site contains several grades of soil. In this tract is some of the best black land that can be found anywhere, a mixed land that is a black sandy loam soil, red sandy land. and rough broken land. The land lies so that it drains well and a sewerage system could be installed with very little expense.

### Water In Abundance

An abundance of fine water can be had at a depth of about 150 feet. The stream of water found at this depth is strong and will furnish an endless supply.

Some of the best land that can be found in Texas is to be found around Roscon. This, together with the differ. ent varieties of soil and the abundant supply of water and the railroad facflities of both Roscoe and Sweetwater makes the site Roscoe has selected an ideal place for the college.

Roscoe has two railroads, the Roscoe Snyder & Pacific and the Texas and Pacific. Sweetwater has three railroads, the Texas & Pacific, Santa Fe and Orient. The railroad facilities make it within easy reach o fany part of the state.

### Soil Fertility Shown

The soil will grow anything. The most extensive crops grown around Roscoe are cotton, maize, kafir corn, cane, wheat, oats and some corn. Allmost 7,000 bales of cotton were ginned land that has been broken out this year a much larger crop should be ginned.

The population in and around Roscoe is almost entirely white. There are no negroes and but few Mexicans. Geographically, Roscoe is within a few miles of being in the exact center of the bounds mentioned in the bill, The altitude is almost 2,500 feet making an ideal climate. The summers are cool and pleasant and the winters mild.
