

McCord Buys In Granite Works

B. S. Cox Retires—John Aycock Will Retain Half Interest In Local Monument Works.

TOMBSTONES ARE CUT, POLISHED

Granite From Llano, Texas, Superior to That From Barre, Vermont—Marble From Georgia Used.

By a deal which was closed last week, C. G. McCord, of McCord Bros Dry Goods Store purchased the half interest of B. S. Cox in the Sweetwater Marble & Granite Works. The other half interest in this firm is retained by John Aycock.

Tombstones in many West Texas cemeteries have been erected after being cut in this establishment, which is equipped with complete cutting, grinding and polishing machinery.

Texas granite from Llano, superior to the Barre, Vermont, granite is used for most stones, with Georgia and Vermont and some Italian marble. Marble, while considered a prettier stone in the beginning, is subject to the action of the weather, and loses its finish in the course of time. Granite, however, withstands the elements.

The stone is roughly blocked out in "standard" sizes at the factory. At the local plant it is worked over with automatic air hammers. After this treatment it is polished. A large whirling disc works on the surface to be polished, with steel shot mixed with water under the surface of the disc.

After the steel shot have smoothed the surface, carborundum is used under the disc, which gives the final glossy surface. The lettering is put on by cutting away the necessary portions by the air chisels. The granite dust cut away from the stones is saved for concrete basis for the monuments.

Few cities in West Texas have so completely equipped granite and marble cutting establishments as the one situated in Sweetwater.

are two pumps that supplied the whole city of Sweetwater for 8 months one dry time back in the days before Lake Trammell was completed.

And then there is the stores building, where George McKnight has a multitude of bolts and nuts and screws and oil and waste, springs and other items needed for engine and car repair, etc. He even has signal oil, it is said.

Burn Oil.

The change from coal to oil burning in the locomotives has rendered nearly obsolete the big coal elevator where a car of coal was dumped, hoisted by chain hoists to a tower, then dropped into a locomotive tender as needed. Now the oil tanks are filled from a spout that is similar to the water crane. The oil is metered, too, so that the amount used in each engine is exactly figured out to the drop.

Engines undergo from six to ten inspections in the roundhouse at the end of their run before being sent out again, being held here for 24 hours up for the purpose. The air, the boiler, the sand, in fact, the whole mechanism is inspected and if any part is defective, it is repaired or replaced. When tires show a quarter of an inch wear on the drive wheels, they are replaced. This care and inspection is perhaps one reason why 20-year old engines are still good for their 60 miles an hour while automobiles are not. An engine, however, costs a little more in the first place, at least more than a Ford anyway.

Santa Fe engineers are not permitted to slip their drive wheels when starting a train. Such procedure has a tendency to dislocate the necks of passengers for one thing and wears out tires on the drive wheels for another. Which is perhaps one reason why Santa Fe gets 100,000 miles to the tires more than some other roads. And the Santa Fe, it seems, has officials who do nothing else but come around and try to find fault with things. They are expert fault finders, too, and ask horribly inconvenient flocks of questions who are supposed to do things, and for reasons best known to themselves, don't. Which may or may not be the reason why the general public so seldom finds fault.

Engineers have quarters where lockers for clothing, shower baths and other

conveniences await them. Other employees are also provided with lockers and showers and there is a nice eating house for employees conducted by Mr. and Mrs. C. A. McCorkle, with lodging house for the men who have homes at the other end of the division, as many of the road men have.

FIND OLD RELICS

Corner Stone of Snyder High School Has Items of Interest 22 Years Ago—Masons Had Charge.

In the building of the new Snyder school, the corner stone of the old structure was examined. And, according to the Snyder Signal, here is what they found:

"According to historical records, the corner stone of the old Snyder High school building was laid on the 18th day of June, 1901, under the auspices of the Masonic order of Snyder, as indicated by relics found in the stone. In it was found a copy of the Dallas News of June 7th, 1901, also a copy of the El Paso Times and one of the St. Louis Republic of the same date. About a dozen pieces of silver, ranging from a 5 cent piece to 25 cents were found, also a few pennies, jewelry, keys and a Masonic apron, a local paper was not found in the corner stone. One might have been placed there and perhaps rotted away, as the papers that were found, were in a pretty bad condition from the effects of dampness that had in some way reached it. On each of the other three papers found, the name of B. J. Norton, Colorado, Texas, appeared written in pencil and still legible. "Prof. B. W. Hodgins (now deceased) was superintendent of the Snyder school at the beginning of the term after the then new school building was completed. That building served its usefulness for 22 years and has now been removed, that another one more modern and in conformity to the progress of the people of Snyder, could take its place."

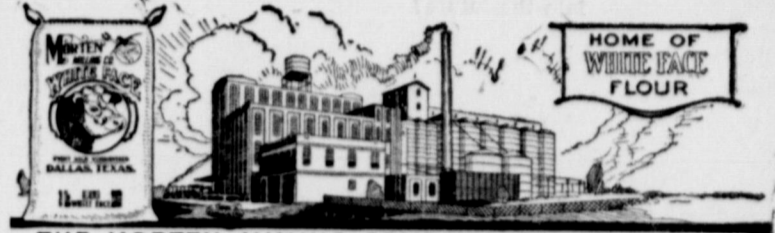
