FIRST POULTRY POOL COMPLETED

105,000 Hens Signed Up In Nolan, Mitchell, Scurry And Tom Green Counties—Headquarters Here.

COMMITTEE MEETS THURSDAY

Association Has Already Shipped Ten Cars Co-Operatively—Saving Growers On One Car \$1,170.

F. J. Neal was elected president, and George Lackey secretary and treasurer of the Southwestern Farm Bureau Poultry Association at a meeting of the organization committee held in Sweetwater Thursday.

A territory divided by the association was included into eight districts as follows:

District No. 1.—Commissioner's Precincts 1 and 2.
District No. 2.—Nolan County, Precincts 3 and 4.

District No. 3.—Fisher County north of Brazos, including Hamlin.
District No. 4.—Fisher County south of Brazos.

District No. 5.—Tom Green and adjoining County.

District No. 6.—Mitchell County.
District No. 7.—Scurry County.
District No. 8.—Western edge of Taylor County.

A director will be elected from each district with A. G. Carter of the Board of Regents of the Texas Tech to name the 9th.

Those present were Miss Katherine Bigelow and Dorr W. Brown, of San Angelo; Marshall Parker of Merkel; H. E. Lewellyn, and C. T. Cave of Hylton; W. W. Porter, of Colorado; J. T. Goforth, and E. L. Tanner, of Roby; C. E. Whitfield, Rotan, and C. C. Gordon, F. J. Neal, W. C. Calvert, and George Lackey of Sweetwater.

Organization of the first poultry pool in Texas is rapidly getting under way with the signing up of 105,000 hens in the district, which includes Tom Green, Nolan, Scurry, Mitchell and other West Texas Counties.

F. J. Neal presided at a meeting of the organization committee which was held in Sweetwater Thursday and attended by various members of the committee, including Dorr Brown from San Angelo, Miss Bigelow and others.

Election of directors for the organization will be held by mail among the members of the pool. Cards will be the poolman's stamp and returned with the members vote for directors there on or before May 26.

Another meeting of the committee will be held in Sweetwater May 29th at which time the mail vote polled and the votes counted. Expenses incidental to organization will be audited at that meeting.

Although only 100,000 hens were needed to organize a cooperative association, 105,000 have already been signed up and according to F. J. Neal, there will be at least 200,000 in this one district by the time every one has come in on it.

Scurry County leads with 40,000 hens under contract. Nolan County has 32,000, Tom Green County 23,000, and Mitchell County 10,000.

Although only in its preliminary stages, the association has already shipped ten cars of poultry and the producers have profited more or less on each car and in one instance \$1,170. In this particular car, producers were paid 18 1/2c per pound at a time when the local market was only 12 cents per pound. There were 18,000 pounds of poultry in this car at 6 1/2 cents a pound differential, netting the growers a total of \$1,170.

A pool car was started out of San Angelo Thursday, was in Bronie Friday and will complete loading at Sweetwater. In this car, according to Dorr W. Brown, Tom Green County Agent, who is in Sweetwater attending the meeting of the organization committee, producers received 5 cents a pound more for fryers, half cent a pound more for hens and 1 cent a pound more for cockerels than local dealers were offering.

The largest number of hens signed up by any one producer is 2,500 from the Breezeland Poultry Farm at San Angelo. Some years ago two young college girls came to San Angelo for their health. They started in the poultry business and now the Misses Bigelow and Schott have the largest poultry interests in West Texas.

WAR THREATENS IN THE BALKANS

Greece And Turkey Threaten to Erupt Again With Serbia Involved In A Fracas—Row Over Reparations.

OTHER NATIONS INTERESTED

With Breakup of Lausanne Conference Impending Another General European Conflagration Is Feared Now

LAUSANNE, May 17.—The renewal of the Turk-Greek war involving Serbians as allies of Greece and Bulgaria as an ally of Turkey, is now threatened.

Such Balkan conflagration is feared might precipitate another general European conflict.

The Greek delegates have threatened to leave the Near East conference in session here, tomorrow, unless the Turks forego their claim to reparations, and at the same time, the Athens Government is threatening to send troops across the Ritsa River into the territory now being held by the Turks.

SALE WILL BEGIN

CONTRACTS LET FAITH OUTLINED FOR TEXAS BANK BY REV. WALLACE

C. A. Clayton Signs Contract And Work of Tearing Down Old Masonic Temple Begins—T Finish Jan. 1.

TO BE TWO STORES IN HEIGHT

With Fixtures Will Cost \$100,000—If Sweetwater Lands Tech Will Build On Up For Five Stories Higher.

Work of tearing down the old Masonic Temple to make room for the new bank building for the Texas Bank & Trust Company started with the signing of the contract with C. A. Clayton, local contractor, Thursday.

The building is to be completed January 1, or before. It is to be two stories in height and will represent an investment of figures of more than \$100,000, according to Ed Bradford, president of the Texas Bank & Trust Co.

Mr. Clayton's contract includes heating, plumbing, wiring, etc., but does not include interior fixtures.

The contract calls for a base of red Liano granite, with main Butler brick to be used in the walls. White Landers stone will be used for trimming on the windows, doors, and for the large Doric columns on either side of the main entrance on Oak street.

The building will be 50x110 feet with the bank use 50x100 feet and two ground floor offices on Third street. The second story will be used for offices and is understood that the larger portion already contracted for.

The interior of the bank itself will be finished with noble wainscoting, counters, etc. Base grillwork will adorn the main entrance and windows expensively. The floor alone costing nearly \$1,000.

The building is planned so that additional stories can be added.

"If Sweetwater gets the Texas Technological College, we are going to erect a five story building instead of a two-story building," Mr. Bradford said.

TESTINATTLE.

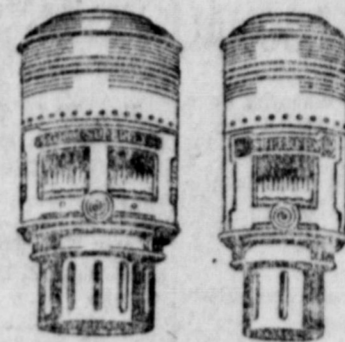
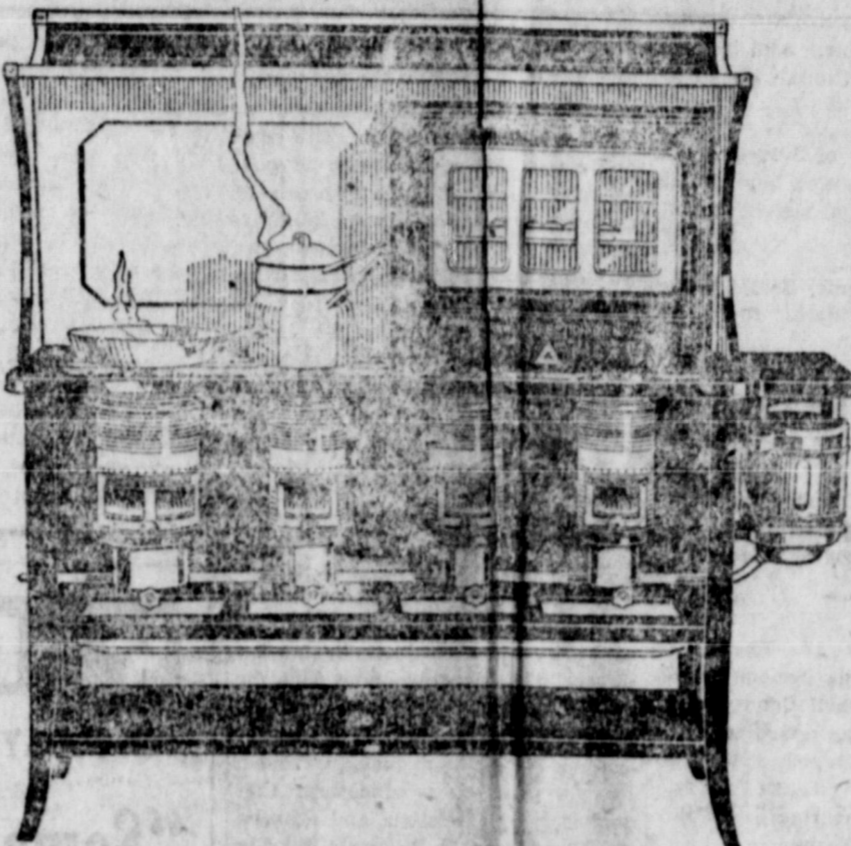

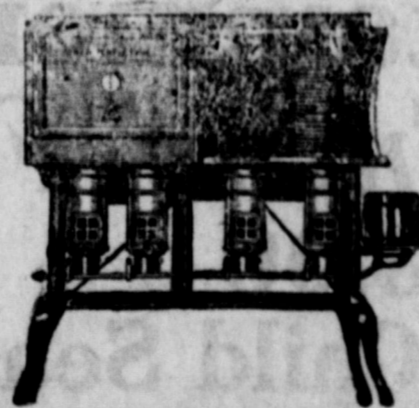

MONEY DONATED

Additional Checks Donated for Relief Colorado Cyclone Sufferers—2 Additional Deaths Are Recorded.

COLORADO, May 17.—The death toll in the disastrous cyclone which swept through Mitchell County early Monday morning, was raised today to a total of twenty-three, with two more of the seriously injured dying.

Relief funds are pouring into Colorado from all over Texas.

Several additional checks were received at The Reporter office and also some money, bringing the total contributions to the relief of the cyclone sufferers at this office to some \$75.

The local lodge of Elks donated \$100 to this relief and by the time all the money is in and accounted for, it is probable that the sum will amount to between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

Judge R. A. Ragland was in a reminiscent mood the other day and recalled a severe windstorm in Sweetwater in the early '80s. He was room-

ing with Steele, the editor of the Sweetwater Review in the courthouse at the time. The wind came up along about 9 o'clock one night. The court house was built of rock with a wooden cupola. The cupola began to snap and crack under the wind pressure and they got out. Sticks, stones, dirt, awnings from buildings were flying around fairly lively, so they took refuge in the lee of a stone pile in the courthouse yard. And then it began to rain—so they had to move. But the wind lessened its force and they went to a one story building, where they found many others, likewise, seeking shelter.

J. A. J. Bradford, who came to Sweetwater in the early '80s, recalls a twister at Lane Wolf, just this side of Colorado, that ruined a herd of cattle, attendant cowboys fleeing for safety. This occurred about 1885, he said. Another time, a twister removed a house very neatly just west of Roscoe, that he had just purchased. He also recalled a windstorm that damaged the Christian and Baptist church buildings in the early days in Sweetwater, but this was not a cyclone. And he told of the prediction

of Lucian Faber's father, an architect, inspected the first Court House foundation, and said the building would fall down, if built, which it did and who also predicted that Sweetwater would never have either artesian wells or cyclones. And it never has, to date. Old timers in West Texas never recall a cyclone like that of Mitchell County either.
